Planning Staff Adds Many New Functions and Capital Projects

At a Budget Worksession on Thursday, April 8, Celia Craze, Greenbelt's director of Planning and Community Development, made sure that council received all the information they needed to evaluate her department's budget needs for the FY 2005 budget. In a session lasting until 11:30 p.m., Craze covered all facets of the department's current responsibilities for planning, community development, animal control and its expanding role in managing the city's capital projects.

Craze started off the evening by noting that this was her 18th budget. The department's activities are guided by several basic values, she said - completion of its operational tasks, providing service to Greenbelt citizens, protecting the legacy of the historic core and "utilizing the authorities we have been given to protect the public health and safety."

Meets with HUD Official

She traced the history of the department from 1986 when she began her career as city planner, when all city inspections were done with consulting inspectors; through the '90s when the department and its responsibilities grew with in-house inspections, authority for sediment and erosion control, development of the property maintenance code and code enforcement, development of the city alarm licensing and registration; to the recent years when animal control, the noise ordinance, enforcement of civil codes and increased planning and zoning responsibilities were added.

She reviewed the department's accomplishments during the past year. Council seemed to pay more attention to several justcompleted projects or those nearly so and where reports will be transmitted for review to council. Mayor Judith Davis expressed interest in a recent crosswalk study and looks forward to reviewing its recommendations and a proposed maintenance plan. Also of interest is the department's report on the study of boundary encroachments along the Greenbelt Lake path adjacent to Lakeside homes. Councilmember Leta Mach expressed appreciation for the department's efforts with foot patrols in Roosevelt Center for "nuisance abatement."

In regard to the somewhat controversial enactment of a new ordinance by the previous council to address the problem of cars being parked for long periods in residential neighborhoods (for greater than 30 days), Craze reported that seven such vehicles have been removed by towing since the new ordinance came into force.

With the new animal control facility being constructed adjacent to the rear of the police station, the animal control program engendered some discussion. Craze characterized Greenbelt's animal control program as "noneuthanizing," with loose or abandoned animals held for five days, after which the city begins ads for adoptive placement or seeks foster homes.

Future Concerns

Next on the agenda was a discussion of challenges and issues facing the department in the FY2005 budget and beyond. With its mission continuing to expand, the department's ability

City Council and Developer At Impasse on Annexation

Shortly after 9 p.m. at the Wednesday, April 7 Greenbelt City Council worksession with representatives of Metroland LLC - a meeting scheduled to complete an agreement concerning plans for the future Greenbelt Station development - Mayor Judith Davis read a short prepared statement bringing the session to an end. By then only a few citizen commentators had spoken.

At issue in cutting off discussion, Davis said, had been the inability of the city staff to broker an agreement with Metroland on what Davis described as "several key points" - most impor-tantly "deletion of the provision allowing the city to annex the south core."

(The south core is the section of property owned by the A. H. Smith Company that lies south of the Metro parking lot and abuts on Branchville Road, the Beltway Plaza west of Cherrywood Lane and Cherrywood Lane.)

This property is not currently within the city limits of Greenbelt nor any other adjacent municipality. Development of the property would have most impact on Greenbelt, however its traffic and other services. The city is therefore concerned about the issues of annexation and about all development plans.

Although several points of difference had been unresolved at the March 29 regular council meeting when the city and the developers had earlier discussed the subject, those concerned felt both parties were very close. At that time the April 7 worksession had been scheduled to complete the agreement.

Indeed, as recently as April 2, Alfred H. Smith, Jr., an owner of the south core tract, had listed in a letter those topics on which he believed agreement between the city and the developers had been reached. At the top of the list was annexation.

Smith's letter expressed disappointment that council at the March 29 meeting had failed to accept the compromise negotiated with his company by the city staff. Besides annexation, he listed other topics of agree-

Greenbelt Homes Inc. President Julia Eichhorst, joining other board members from the National Association of Housing Cooperatives (NAHC), met with Allen H. Jones, the senior advisor and special assistant for cooperative housing at the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) on April 2. Jones serves as HUD's point person for cooperative housing issues and policy. The purpose of the meeting was to brief NAHC about a study that HUD is doing on using the cooperative model to increase minority homeownership. In May, HUD will award the contract for the study to be mid-August annual conference in Boston.

At last year's annual conference in Atlanta, the NAHC membership elected Eichhorst to a three-year term on the board of directors. Eichhorst is a legal administrative specialist in the record information dissemination section (formally known as the Freedom of Information and Privacy Acts section in the Records Management Department) at the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Located in Washington, D.C., NAHC is a nonprofit organization that represents, informs, perpetuates and inspires the nation's housing cooperatives.

Report on Tom Renahan's Work in Iraq

Greenbelter Tom Renahan traveled to Iraq in December as part of a team working to create a democratic government. He felt strongly that he wanted to help the Iraqi people write their Constitution. Renahan has a one-year contract with Research Triangle, Inc., (RTI) a subcontractor to International City Management Association. He was scheduled to return to the United States in March for three weeks before returning to Iraq. However, he emailed this reporter that he was so busy that he decided to postpone his return until late April or May. Renahan stated that "I am supervising a 35-member team, our democracy presentations were just getting on a roll and I needed to stay until we were far-

ther along." However, recent terrorist attacks against foreigners, especially Americans, have made it very dangerous to remain in the country. Renahan reports that he and most of the RTI team are in Kuwait, where they were moved in response to the serious secu-

rity problems that have developed in most parts of Iraq. "So, I am well but frustrated," he wrote, "as my program was going very well and is now suspended."

Renahan noted that he met with former Greenbelt police officer Doug Sappington who is also working in Iraq.

Kathleen Weber


Kathleen Weber, 16 Court Ridge Road, died in her home on Tuesday, April 13, 2004. She was 81. Mrs. Weber was born




She was active in the early days of the New Deal Café and organized jazz performances in Greenbelt.



bring about the city's agreement to dismiss its legal appeals before the Court of Special Appeals concerning the concept plan for Greenbelt Station and the preliminary plan of development. Before and after the March 29 meeting, city staff had been working hard with the developers to reconcile any remaining differences.

But now reconciliation seemed very far away. "[B]ecause of the developer's position," Davis read, "the city will not consider the matter this evening." At the same time she made it clear that productive discussion "would continue with the developer" – as she put it, "to address the city's concerns and improve the proposed Greenbelt Station project."

What Happened?

Between Smith's April 2 letter and the April 7 meeting, what For a time the city's right to approve the site plan, after first having been agreed to, had also been taken away by the developer. Following further negotiation, however, this right to site plan approval had been restored.





to meet the capacity and timing for needed services continues to be a major concern.

The department is facing a number of challenges. In the planning area, several critical projects are looming on the horizon: overseeing the proposed Greenbelt Station development and the potential redevelopment of the Springhill Lake apartment project; working with the newly created Forest Preserve Task Force on the development of maintenance/management guidelines for the designated preserves; coordination with the Greenbelt East communities on specific traffic calming projects and starting work on a comprehensive longrange plan for Greenbelt. In addition, the proposed budget also contemplates a return of full responsibility to the department's staff for the city's capital projects.

In total, there are currently 25 planning projects, 17 capital projects, nine development review projects and 11 administrativetype projects either open or actively being worked on by the department staff. While these and other new initiatives are added to the department's workload, the manager's proposed budget adds no new staffing.

The budget text, however, includes several departmental requests for additional staffing: repeating a request for a half-time office assistant (creating a fulltime position), a new request for an additional full-time inspector (as a code compliance officer) and another request for a half-time Animal Control Officer (mainly for greater coverage in the off hours). Craze estimated the total cost for these positions as approximately \$75,000.

Other challenges were a serious space shortage, primarily for archived files and plan documents, and a need to replace two older vehicles used by the depart-

On the revenue side, the planning and community development budget includes an estimated \$472,000 in assorted permits and license fees. Council has received a memo regarding the department review of its fee structure and will consider the memo and staff recommendations and possibly make changes to the budget.

Capital Projects

Following the review of the proposed planning, community development and animal control budgets, council next reviewed the Capital Projects Fund section of the budget. The manager's proposed budget appropriates a \$390,000 contribution from the General Fund for Capital Projects for FY2005. This amount, combined with other funding sources such as Program Open Space, state and other grant funds and city bond authorization funds, is estimated by the manager to total \$1,156,000 and be able to fund

18 listed proposed capital projects for FY2005.

Assuming the 18 projects are completed, the fund is projected to end the year with a balance of \$231,593. Funds are included to study an expansion of the police station and its parking lot, to develop additional traffic calming projects (other than Greenbelt East) and for bus shelters, gateway signage for city entrances and a Metro Access Drive/Cherrywood Lane roundabout. Other projects in the works are street resurfacing for Prince James Way and Lakecrest Drive, sidewalk and other concrete repairs, the proposed restroom facility at Buddy Attick Park, the proposed skatepark and city assistance with the construction of an Astronomy Club observatory at Northway Fields.

Community Center window repairs, a proposed "Wall of Honor" at the Community Center, the next phase of work on upgrading city playgrounds and restoration of the historic bas relief and Mother and Child sculptures are also on the list. Finally, a planning process for assessing community needs at the Northway Fields, including a boundary study for the forest preserve in the adjacent area; seed money for restoration of the derelict Jaycees Clubhouse adjacent to Attick Park; the repair of the Youth Center gym floor and a stabilization program for the storm water outfall at the south side of the Greenhill Road underpass are also on the department's agenda.

In keeping with tradition, council's review of the proposed projects did not go into detail at this time. Following the adoption of the budget, council will schedule another worksession to evaluate and prioritize the proposed projects.

General Fund

In response to a question regarding the \$390,000 included in the manager's proposed budget for the General Fund contribution to the Capital Projects fund, Assistant to the City Manager Davie Moran noted that the \$390,009 figure was less than the equivalent of a three and a half cent take levy, the amount that previous council policy had set for this contribution. Moran indicate that at an upcoming budget worksession covering "Miscellaneous Funds," city staff will propose some ideas to address adequate annual funding of the Capital Projects fund as well as the Replacement Fund for equipment and the new Building Maintenance Fund. Council could then consider those proposals in their decisions on the final approved budget. In her closing remarks to council, Craze provided council with views regarding the her manager's proposed changes to the Leave Buy Back Program (see News Review, April 8, "First

Budget Review by Council"). Although the city manager believes that his proposal would have the least impact on the city employees in the lower pay grades and that the savings would allow other choices for the benefit program that would impact all classified employees, Craze asked council to avoid situations (in the program change) where employees are treated differently. She feels that the proposal reduces benefits for only a certain portion of city employees.

The mayor and councilmembers expressed appreciation for the tireless efforts by Craze and her staff in the ongoing negotiations over the past several months with the Metroland developers.
