### Interfaith Leaders to Mark 9/11 with "Healing Hands"

To commemorate this year's anniversary of the attacks on September 11, 2001, a group of local therapeutic touch professionals have offered to provide relief from physical stress in exchange for donations to community relief funds. The Saturday, September 11, event "Healing Hands Strengthen Community" will be hosted by members of the Greenbelt Interfaith Leadership Association (GILA) at Roosevelt Center from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m.

An outdoor pavilion will feature employees of Pleasant Touch and other certified professionals, providing seated massage on a first-come, first-served basis. (In case of bad weather, the event will move into the nearby Pleasant Touch facilities.)

"We touch people's lives literally every day, hoping to bring them to greater wholeness," said Gwen Vaccaro, owner of Pleasant Touch. "We'd like to contribute more toward the needs of people in our town."

Individuals from GILA administer the Good Samaritan Fund and the Interfaith Eviction Relief Fund, which will receive all proceeds from the event. GILA tries each year to creatively commemorate this hard anniversary, hoping that it may become an annual Day of Service to strengthen the bonds of community at all levels.

anniversary by offering a healing touch for charity came a year ago, as Vaccaro heard her minister, the Rev. Dan Hamlin, pastor of Greenbelt Community Church, speak from the pulpit. He helped promote GILA's 2003 anniversary effort, which challenged residents by issuing "A Call to Be Neighborly" as a more lasting memorial to the great losses and pain resulting from the attacks.

That Sunday morning experience deepened Vaccaro's active commitment to providing ways her business can give back to the community. She also wanted to help raise the visibility of local spiritual resources so the idea of a joint 9/11 anniversary project with GILA was born. She approached Hamlin, who carried the inspired suggestion to his colleagues during one of their monthly meetings.

"September 11, 2001, was a terrible day," Hamlim said. "But the brightness in it was the service of so many people, police, firefighters and passengers on the flight that went down in Pennsylvania and countless ordinary citizens who did whatever they could to help. It is fitting to remember the best of that tragic day with community service."

The Maryland Court of Special Appeals remanded the case to the Prince George's County Circuit Court, requiring them to enter an order reversing the approval of both the conceptual site plan and the preliminary plat of subdivision.

Greenbelt firefighters responded to a two-alarm fire at 8148 Mandan Terrace home of Kelby Brick, former candidate for Greenbelt City Council, that started at approximately 6 p.m. on Wednesday, September 1. One occupant of the house escaped, unharmed, to a neighbor's home. It is believed that the owner was out of town at the time. The interior of the house is destroyed and it is unlivable, according to Assistant Fire Chief John Wynkoop. The neighboring townhouse, 8150, suffered only smoke damage. No one was home at the time.

Neighbor Judy Moien heard the commotion when she walked her dog.

"I heard all the sirens and all I could think about was the Greenbriar fire last year," said Moien. "When I went outside, I

saw smoke filling the [neighborhood]. There were [firetrucks] and ambulances everywhere."

"The initial incident coordinator was Deputy Chief Morgal.

The fire was contained in under 40 minutes," said Wynkoop. "The cause of the fire is unknown at this time and is under investigation."

When my family and I moved to GHI two Labor Dav weekends ago, I never thought I would be in the same company of such celebrities as the governor of Maryland and his predecessor, a United States Senator, and, ah yes, GHI board and committee members.

Politicians rode past the parked GHI float as we attached banners to it for the Labor Day festival parade this year. When we moved, GHI Board Director Betty Deitch and committee member Sue Krofchik and I waved to new and familiar faces on Crescent Road from our table shaded by an umbrella. During our neighborly court party, committee members Isaac Robinson and Roger Brown joined us in sipping sodas and chomping chips from a nearby bench on the float. Since our theme was "GHI - Bringing People Together," it was fitting that people gathered their thoughts and commented on our float.

#### **Greenbelt CARES** Offers GED I, II

Greenbelt CARES will offer GED I and GED II classes from September 21 through Thursday, December 2.

Registration for both classes will be held on Tuesday, September 21, from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. only. The first class of instruction will be held on Thursday, September 23.

GED I meets from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. for students who need review of basic math (addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, fractions, decimals, percentages and word problems) and English grammar skills.

GED II meets from 1 to 3 p.m. for students who have successfully completed GED I and/ or are ready to learn algebra and geometry, English literature and writing skills and prepare to take the GED test.

Classes are held every Tuesday and Thursday for 10 weeks in the Municipal Building Conference Room, 25 Crescent Road.

There is no charge for Greenbelt residents in either course. Non-Greenbelt residents are required to pay a \$150 registration fee. All students are required to purchase a copy of the GED textbook and calculator from Greenbelt CARES.

Students do not have to be 16 years of age in order to take the GED course. Students are eligible to take a GED pre-test given at Greenbelt CARES at no cost. The actual GED test is given by the State of Maryland, not Greenbelt CARES. However, students who are ready to take the GED test can obtain the application forms from Greenbelt CARES.

The City currently processes approximately 450 tons of loose leaves, branches and Christmas trees at the in-house processing site at Northway each year. This processed material is then available for use by City landscape crews and city residents. The City estimates it saves \$2,000 annually in the purchase of mulch.

### **An Artful**

Afternoon Sunday, September 5 from 1-5pm at the Greenbelt Community Center

Enjoy this free mini arts festival featuring a studio oper house, art exhibits, projects, Greenbelt Museum tours, etc.

In addition to the yard waste processed in-house, city crews also collect approximately 300 tons of yard waste in plastic bags each year. Since the City doesn't have a debagging machine, this material is transported to a County facility in Upper Marlboro. The yard waste is debagged, then processed and rebagged as mulch for sale. Additionally, the City pays \$25 a ton for the disposal of this bagged material.

In order to recycle more bagged yard waste with fewer negative environmental impacts, it is proposed to discontinue collecting leaves in plastic bags as of March 1, 2005. Residents will be required to place yard waste in brown paper bags or bins/cans for collection.

The leaf vacuum will continue to provide collection of loose leaves from detached homes from November 1<sup>st</sup> through January 15<sup>th</sup> and the chipper will continue to collect branches throughout the year.

Paper yard bags can be purchased at local stores such as Giant, Safeway, Costco, Home Depot, etc. Also, bags will be sold at the City Municipal Building during regular business hours and at City events such as Earth Day, Electronics Recycling, Labor Day and SchromFest.

Plastic bins/cans can be purchased at Target, K-Mart, Home Depot, etc. The City will provide "YARD WASTE" stickers bins and cans. Each yard waste bin/can must weigh less than 50 lbs. for collection.

**GHI RESIDENTS**: Residents of GHI can pick up 10 free paper yard bags each fall (beginning in the fall of 2005) at the GHI Maintenance Facility. The City will provide these bags free to GHI residences since they do not receive city leaf vacuum service.

\*\*Be sure to visit the Public Works Information Booth at the Labor Day Festival this weekend. To promote the proposed yard waste collection program which takes effect March 1, 2005, the City will be giving each residential refuse customer who stops by the booth 10 FREE paper yard bags.

A record number of 72 entrants participated in the parade, including 22 marchers from Greenbelt's sister city of Ziguinchor, Senegal.

#### 1990

Chinese Lion dancers from the District participated in the parade. Ground was broken for construction of an indoor swimming pool.

#### 1998

The New Deal Café sponsors the First Annual Celebrity Pie-eating Contest, won by firefighter Chris Ransom. 2004

Greenbelt celebrates its 50th Labor Day Festival.
