Md. Appeals Court Reverses County Metrolands Approvals

In an opinion filed on August 30, the Maryland Court of Special Appeals reversed the Prince George's County Council's approval of the Conceptual Site Plan (CSP) filed by Metroland Developers LLC for the proposed Greenbelt Metro Station development and adjacent properties in Greenbelt West. The court also reversed the approval by the Prince George's County Planning Board of the Preliminary Plat of Subdivision (PPS) for the property.

The court stated in its opinion, "Because the PPS cannot survive without an approved CSP, we likewise reverse the approval of the PPS. We direct the [Prince George's] circuit court to enter an order reversing the Planning Board's approval of both the Conceptual Site Plan and the Preliminary Plat of Subdivision."

The Maryland Court of Special Appeals finding specifically supported the City of Greenbelt and the owners of Beltway Plaza Mall (GB Mall Limited Partnership and Quantum Companies) in their appeal of the Circuit Court orders in July, 2003. (See chronologies for the cases.)

The court's holding hinged upon the critical question posed by the appellants in their appeal of the CSP approval; namely, "Did the circuit court err in finding that the proposed development was adequately served or would be adequately served within a reasonable period of time with existing or pro-grammed public facilities?" The appellants argued that the Planning Board found the roads and highways surrounding the proposed development area to be inadequate unless certain improvements were made and that, because the necessary improvements were unfunded at the time

The Court of Special Appeals noted that the zoning ordinance, as well as the interpretive guidelines provided in the Prince George's County Code, formed the center of the appeal. The zoning ordinance provided a definition of "shall," requiring that the word always be interpreted as mandatory and not disof the board's finding, the ap- cretionary. Had there been ambivalence in the codified meaning of this term as applied to the requirements for the approval of a CSP, the court's decision might have deferred more to the discretionary powers of the agencies involved and may have upheld the Planning Board's, the County Council's or the circuit court's rulings in the case.

Patti Brothers Is Named 2004 Outstanding Citizen

"The luckiest thing that ever happened to me was when I moved here." Townhome Fire Displaces Greenwood Village Family

At around 6 p.m. Wednesday evening, September 1, the Greenbelt Fire Department and Rescue Squad was responding to a house fire in Bowie when firefighters saw smoke in the sky from the neighborhood of Greenwood Village. The smoke was coming from 8148 Mandan Terrace, home of Kelby Brick, a former candidate for the Greenbelt City Council. The entire house was ablaze. Under the circumstances, the fire department redirected the call from Bowie to the townhouse on Mandan Terrace. A "box alarm" was sounded, meaning that the fire was located in a multiple family dwelling (townhouse, condo or apartment). The cause of the fire is still under investigation. The monetary damage to Brick's home is unknown at this time but the damage appears significant. The interior of the house was destroyed and the home is unlivable. There were no injuries to either the firemen or the residence's occupants.

their mother, Jeannette Pereira "JP", who had been eating dinner when alerted to the fire in the back of their home, escaped unharmed to a neighbor's house. Brick was out of town. Neighbors then banged on the house next door, alerting a resident who had been sleeping. That person also escaped unharmed. There were no pets in either home. According to Fire Chief Brian Rudy, when a "box alarm" is sounded, four engine companies (hose trucks that put out the fire), two ladder trucks and a rescue squad with life saving, lighting and rescue equipment respond. A rescue squad also has all the necessary equipment to get people out who are trapped in a fire. A second alarm was then sounded, which means that a second round of all the equipment described above was also brought to the scene. There was a total of eight engine companies, four ladder trucks and two rescue squads. Units from Greenbelt, College Park, Land-

proval of the CSP was erroneous.

The Appeals Court agreed and found that requirements for a Metro Planned Community go beyond those for CSPs or Detailed Site Plans.

Public Facilities

In the view of the Court of Special Appeals, the Prince George's County zoning ordinance requires that public facilities and roadways necessary to serve the development must be "shown in the adopted County Capital Improvement Program, within the current State Consolidated Transportation Program, U.S. Department of Transportation Program and/or Federal Highway Administration Program or to be provided by the applicant." The court held that the adequate public facilities requirement must be met before approval of development plans. The conditions that the Planning

Meritorious

As the court saw it, however, the appellants' reliance on the Court of Appeals holding in a previous case relating to Annapolis Market Place, LLC was meritorious. That decision, plus the court's reliance on its own construction that "shall" is mandatory, proved to be crucial aspects of the case.

The effect of the court's decision is to remand the controversial case back to the Prince George's Planning Board to correct the erroneous findings and a long time.


Corrections



Honor Zack Dobbin, Send a Kid to Camp

Zack Dobbin, age 25, son of former Greenbelters Lynn Klukowski Dobbin and Patrick Dobbin and grandson of former Greenbelters Ed and Marian Klukowski and the late Bill and Shirley Dobbin, is currently fighting for his life at Sloan-Kettering Hospital in New York. Helen German, a lifelong friend of Zack's mother, is requesting donations to Camp Care in his name as a way of honoring him. "I am not offering cookies, pizza kits, wrapping paper or raffle tickets but a chance to help send a sick child to a wonderful camp experience," said German.

David Fisher

David Fisher, 90, died Monday, August 23, 2004, in Amherst, Mass., exactly five months to the day after his wife of 68 years. Ethel Zubkoff Fisher, died.

He was born in Antwerp, Belgium in October 1913 and came to the United States when he was seven years old.

After he married Ethel in 1935. the young couple went to Israel, where they spent the next three years on a kibbutz, one of the earliest in what was then Palestine. (At that time, Mr. Fisher said the only so-called Palestinians were the Jewish settlers. The Arabs were simply called Arabs, like those in the 20-odd Arab countries surrounding the country.) Their first child, a son named Shalom, was born there.

After the Fishers returned to the U.S. in 1939, they lived briefly in Buffalo, N.Y. before moving to Washington, D.C. and then to Greenbelt in the early 1940s. A mathematician, Mr. Fisher worked for the federal government, first for the post office, then for the U.S. Navy's Bureau of Aeronautics and finally for NASA. He retired from NASA, where he specialized in calculating rocket trajectories and satellite orbits, after 30 years of government service and 30 years in Greenbelt. Their two daughters. Lee Fisher (Kurz) and Rebecca Fisher (Allaben), were both born in Greenbelt.

During their 30 years in Greenbelt, the Fishers were both active in community affairs, participating extensively in the orga-

nization of GCS (Greenbelt Consumer Services), GHI (Greenbelt Homes, Inc.), and other co-op organizations such as the nursery school, the Cooperator (newspaper) and Group Health. They were also active in organizing the Jewish Community Center of Prince George's County (the present Mishkan Torah Synagogue).

Mr. Fisher was president of the congregation in 1951 after serving in various board positions over the previous several years, when the members were deciding to build a synagogue themselves. He personally worked on the building evenings and weekends during the three years it took to complete it. Mrs. Fisher, with other congregation wives, served cold and hot drinks and other refreshments to the volunteer workers.

After Mr. Fisher retired in 1972, with their children long since grown and independent, the Fishers moved back to the land that had become Israel in 1948 after the United Nations in November 1947 had partitioned Palestine into two countries, one Jewish and one Arab.

The Fishers lived in Israel from 1972 to 1994. Throughout that period. Mr. Fisher taught celestial mathematics as a volunteer at Tel Aviv University. His work was essential for the Israelis in determining the precise orbits of Soviet and American satellites and their times and positions over various Middle East locations. During their declining years, they returned to the U.S. to be closer to their children.

Aside from this work, Mr. Fisher pursued a lifelong interest in ancient Hebrew, Aramaic and other Semitic languages, a field in which his expertise was widely recognized.

He is survived by his son Shalom, of Greenbelt, his daughters Lee of New York and Rebecca of Amherst, Mass.; six grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren. The family has asked that those wishing to contribute in memory of David Fisher send their donations to "Operation Rehovoth," c/ o the JCC of Amherst, 742 Main Street, Amherst, MA 01002. This is a charitable institution that helps to educate Ethiopian children in Israel.

A special memorial service for David Fisher will be held at Mishkan Torah on Sunday, October 24, 2004, at 8 p.m.





funds into the red, Brothers has been undeterred. She has carried on fund-raising events throughout the summer – bake sales for which she bakes cookies and other goodies, raffles and T-shirt promotions - to recoup the losses.

And as if Labor Day weren't work enough, Brothers has also chaired the Greenbelt New Year's Eve party for the last three years. The Greenbelt Lions Club named her their Hero of the Year, and she has been a leader in activities of the Community Church and the Arts Festival.

Stage Presence

The credentials of the folks on the festival stage during the opening ceremony were different this year. Together with Abbey Crowley, his fellow school board member from Greenbelt, Morales presented Brothers with a certificate of appreciation from schools CEO André Hornsby and board chairman Bea Tignor.

Several additional certificates of acknowledgment were also presented to Brothers including one from the governor, from both the State Senate and House of Delegates and from the Prince George's County Council.

The September exhibit at the New Deal Café in Roosevelt Center features colored pencil drawings and watercolors by Greenbelt artist Ingrid Cowan Hass. The show, called "Songs of Summer," emphasizes still life and musicmaking. A reception for the artist, to which the public is invited, will be held on Sunday, September 12 from 7 to 9 p.m.

Originally from North Carolina, Hass moved to Greenbelt in 1998 with her husband, Ole. Although Ingrid is a professional singer with a master's degree in opera performance, she majored in studio art during her undergraduate years at Smith College and takes her visual side very seriously. In Ingrid's words, "Performing takes a special type of focus and energy and I need my drawing and painting to keep me balanced. Even when I am most busy with rehearsals and gigs, I always have a picture brewing in my head.

"I am passionate about both my music and my art. I could never have one without the other. Many types of subject matter inspire me, especially nature. I paint a lot of flowers.

"Realism and space are important elements in my work, but I

do view things through my special glasses, which may mean I choose some strange colors or have abstract elements. I can get very excited about a color or combination of colors."

Hass's still life drawings capture daily vignettes of summertime. Even if the subject has nothing directly to do with music, she likes to use musical words to describe her work. "Themes of music-making seem to naturally infiltrate my art," she writes, "even if it is just a suggestive title. I am interested in the interplay of color and shapes and the rhythms I can create with them. I hear my pictures.

"Is the scene I'm depicting in a major or minor key? Does the day sound like blasting trumpets or mellow flutes? I want the rhythm and intensity of the zinnias to knock the viewer over because they knock me over. I try to capture the song that the subject is singing, whether it is a mountain view or a pile of veggies from the garden. That's why I chose the title "Songs of Summer."

Hass also has a collection of drawings of musicians in the show. "I usually do several gesture drawings of the persons playing or singing, depending on how long they're at it. When I'm surrounded by the sound and pulled in by the concentrated effort of the musician, my mark-making and palette are influenced by the melodies and beat. Later, at home, I compose a final drawing from the sketches but I try to maintain an expressive or playful line inspired by the actual moment. I also use under-paintings to help evoke the mood of the performance."

"Songs of Summer" opened September 1 and runs through the end of the month. The exhibit is sponsored by the Friends of New Deal Café Arts and is supported by a grant from the Prince George's Arts Council.

bounty of the garden, the brilliance of the natural world and the energy of outdoor music festivals.

As a professional musician Hass' colored pencil and water color offerings bear names evocative of the classical world - etude, dance, solo, refrain. Her choice of a warm color palate with strong undercurrents of cool hues echoes the close weave of harmony and exquisite timing of a singer's quartet with years of respect and rapport among them.

One such example is "Solo in Gardenia Minor." This work in colored pencil on sandy colored paper shows the full-blown blossom at its peak. Hass avoids the commonly used soft whites and pale blues and pinks that make the gardenia often appear so delicate it seems to fade before one's eyes. Instead, she makes it dance on the paper in bold textured golds and greens and oranges with the

In contrast, the misty reverie of "Smokey Mountain Refrain," a water color, is the pianissimo moment, allowing the viewer to catch a breath.

On a different wall, the still life movement is left behind for several studies dealing with the Fairbanks Music Festival in Alaska. These were sketched while the actual musicians performed and carry with them the residual energy of the live show. In "Petite Symphony in 25 Bites," Hass has painted a skewed checkerboard of color over which she depicts the people. The colors in swatches remind the viewer of what it is like watching the show live with the stage lights shining through their colored gels and filling the performance with a wash of faceted color.

"Songs of Summer" runs through September 30.

Filmmaker's Sci-fi Flick Premieres in Greenbelt

The 300-seat Greenbelt theater was turned into a "red-carpet" arena on Monday, September 6, as the actors, director and wellwishers arrived for the 1:30 a.m. premiere of "The Last Move." Nick Dobson, a 17-year-old Greenbelter who is the director and primary force behind this scifi/action thriller, unveiled his fulllength feature film to an enthusiastic, packed house of high school students, cast members and parents, friends and family.

"The Last Move" has shades of "Star Wars" and "The Matrix" and showcases Dobson's skill with technical computer-animation and special effects. The film resulted from two years of blood, sweat and tears for the young director, who requested the forbearance of the audience by asking them not to point out the flaws of the film because, "We know."

The cast is made up of a hodgepodge of family members and high school classmates, local Greenbelters and various co-workers of parents rounded up for the all-volunteer effort. The plotline is a mixture of sophisticated endof-the-world techno thriller combined with romance, some humor and a philosophical perspective on the human condition.

The scenes were shot at various locations in Greenbelt, at the Community Center, at Greenbelt Lake and in the basement of the Dobsons' home on Lakeside Drive, also the locale of Dobson's many, many hours of technical computer work on the film. Nick is a second generation native Greenbelter, the son of Dorothy and Norman Dobson and the brother of Matt, who plays the young Caleb, the protagonist of the film.

Aaron Woodall, 17, of Bowie, plays the grown-up Caleb. The role involved a great deal of physical action. The feature has many battle scenes. "We spent every spare moment working on this movie. Nick would call and we'd be out in the woods Saturday at 6 a.m. [to shoot film]. I'd get in to work in the morning with scratches." Projectiles have been made "obsolete." Woodall says he has had no formal martial arts training but has learned how to fall and do swordplay "naturally."

Mike McMullin, a local filmmaker and one of the stars of "The Last Move" plays the "overseer," a mysterious intergalactic character who wears dark sunglasses and a black robe with an odd shiny metallic insignia on the back. "Making this film was a lot of fun," said McMullin. "I saw Nick's animation when he was a kid. I'm inspired by his potential and I was helping a fellow filmmaker. When Nick asked me to work on the movie, I was confident. I knew it was going to be a well-done project."

Dobson, who works for GATE, said "No one will appreciate how really, really low-budget this film was." The biggest costs were the video camera and computer. The plot was a collaboration with high school classmate Tristan Gilford of Glenn Dale. Now that the film is complete, Dobson says he is relieved but also empty . . . confronted once again with the "deep, dark abyss" of his soul. New projects are already in the works.


