### Harry Falls, an Early City Resident, Dies at 92

Greenbelt Pioneer Harry A. Falls, 92, died on August 9, 2005. Falls was not only one of the first residents of Greenbelt, he was also involved in the construction of the town and was one of the chief compilers of early Greenbelt history.

The scrapbook that he maintained when he lived and worked in Greenbelt is a collection of newspaper articles and other memorabilia that gives insight into how the town was constructed, what was going on during the planning process and how county officials and citizens reacted to the new town. It also records reactions of people throughout the country to the idea of a planned community created by the federal government. It is an invaluable resource for scholars and others interested in Greenbelt's early days. Falls presented his scrapbook to the city in 1987 during Greenbelt's 50th anniversary celebration.

Harry Falls obtained his job with the Resettlement Administration in 1935, through a series of See FALLS, page 6

serendipitous events. In the midst of the Great Depression he, like so many others throughout the country, was unemployed. He had worked as a builder of architectural models in Baltimore for architect Bertram L. Keyes. When Keyes' business folded because construction projects came to a virtual halt during the Depression, Falls clerked for a few years in a grocery store. Then he heard that President Franklin Roosevelt's New Deal administration was creating jobs in Washington, D.C., to boost the economy.

Falls trudged from government office to government office one September day in 1935 receiving no offers of employment. At day's end, he found himself at the Walsh Mansion near DuPont Circle, where architects for the new Greenbelt towns were working. The man who interviewed him happened to have met his former employer, Bertram Keyes, on a flight to New England and

The band were twice named Cashbox's "Entertainer of the Year." As "Herman" Noone graced the cover of nearly every international publication. He performed on hundreds of top-rated television programs with such luminaries as Ed Sullivan, Jackie Gleason, Dean Martin and Danny Kaye. He also starred in ABC's musical version of "The Canterville Ghost." Hallmark Hall of Fame's presentation of "Pinnochio" (in which he played the title role) and three highly successful feature films for MGM, "Mrs. Brown, You've Got a Lovely Daughter," "Hold On!"

#### Just the Opposite

Al Geiger's article "New City Skate Park Awaits Minor Adjustments, Permits" (Greenbelt News Review, August 11, 2005) incorrectly attributes a delay in the issuance of permits for several projects in the city, including the skate park, to the R-P-C zoning controversy. The facts suggest that the city's projects have actually been expedited by the zoning controversy.

It is rather misleading to blame the skate park delay until next spring on what essentially amounts to a one-month delay in the issuance of permits related to the zoning controversy. The explanation for the delay fails to take into account the fact that the skate park, as well as the public works building, have faced many delays during over three years of planning to date.

The more salient point is that the city is able to move forward on the skate park without the required detailed site plan. As of September 12, 2005, public projects in the original portion of Greenbelt will be exempt from the requirement to obtain site plan approval. This change, which the city was able to request after GHI had prevailed upon the county to exempt large residential additions from the law, will save the city over two months in processing time.

#### Parents May Opt Out of Recruiting Lists

by Doug Love The "No Child Left Behind Act," signed by President Bush in 2001, requires secondary schools to provide a list of names, addresses and phone numbers of students if requested by military recruiters. The law also contains a provision that mandates schools to inform parents of their right to "opt out" of having their children's information being sent to the military. Many school systems have developed "opt out" forms to allow parents to remove their children's names from these lists. Prince George's "opt out" form may be completed and returned to the student's local high school. The deadline for submitting this form is September 30. People may access the form by downloading this PDF www.pgcps.org/~webdocs/ gendocs/forms/consent.pdf.

The rumor recently spread over some radio call-in shows that sending in this form keeps children from receiving scholarship information is not true.



Dorothy A. Jewell, age 90, of Ridge Road died Friday, August 19, 2005.


A long-time resident of Greenbelt, Mrs. Jewell was preceded in death by her husband Jesse H. Jewell and her sister Matilda Shannon.

### Monolith Exhibit at Greenbelt Arts Center GH

Those with an appreciation for the arts should come by the Greenbelt Arts Center, where a new exhibit consists of monoprints by artist Martha Oatway. The works are divided between two themes, the Forest Series and the Math Series.

The Forest Series originated from Oatway's love of the woods, from her having grown up among Maine's acres of trees and land. She starts with a photograph she takes of the forest, which she then enlarges and manipulates. Shapes like twigs add to the print's visual look, as does the use of different colors. One piece, entitled "Fields," began from a trip Oatway took with her daughter from Maryland to California, where her daughter was attending graduate school. As her daughter drove, Oatway took photos of the passing scenery.

The set of prints in the Math Series was inspired from a science book published in 1890 about fluid motion. The work is covered with equations and geometric shapes. When asked which series she prefers, Oatway said, "I feel connected to the math series because of the interplay of color and shapes which gives an archeological look to it."

The method Oatway used to create the monoprints is called Xerox lithography. The process starts with a paper image that is copied on a Xerox machine. The paper is coated with a gum arabic and then an oil-based ink. A paper for the final print with the inked Xerox image on top of it is run through a press to create the monoprint.

In addition Oatway adds some visual elements like collographs on the forest prints. These are pieces of cardboard glued to act as a plate to blend in with the background. Other such elements are the circular shape found on the DNA strand exhibit and the circles in the background of the math series. Viewers can also notice that the colors used are not distracting but are subdued in light shades of brown and green.

"When people see my work, I hope they can bring their own experiences about nature. If a person grew up in the city and had a park they loved, then they can appreciate this," Oatway says. Gallery Manager Mary Seng was instrumental in bringing Oatway's monoprints to the Arts Center. "I was impressed with Martha's work at a show in Washington, D.C. three years ago and thought it would be great to have her work displayed here," said Seng.

Oatway, 51, resides in Crofton. She is a member of the Washington Printmakers Gallery on Dupont Circle. Oatway holds a B.A. in art from the University of Maine and has had her work exhibited in Maine, Connecticut, Maryland and the D.C. area.

The monoprints will be on display at the Arts Center through October 22. Show hours are by appointment or pre-show. Call Mary Seng at 301-441-8770 for information.

Specific committee goals for 2006 include conducting research and forming recommendations on new heating systems for the homes; creating a bulk purchase program for sustainable products (products that use less energy and less environmental impact to produce); and increasing community awareness and support for adoption of sustainable principles.

#### Red Scarf Program

The Companion Animal Committee has been busy. They are proposing a red scarf (bandana) safety program. In this program a dog that does not like to be approached by strangers would wear a red bandana around its neck. This safety program has been used by other localities. The committee plans to promote the program during the Labor Day Festival. Davis was very impressed with this proposal and wants GHI to coordinate the program with the city.

The committee is also investigating the possibility of helping the Greenbelt fire department obtain oxygen masks that fit companion animals. The help might take the form of a fundraising activity. Preliminary contact has been made with the Fire Department.

#### Salary Survey

GHI uses compensation surveys to compare salaries and other compensation among employers that they consider to be in the same market as GHI. These include the City of Greenbelt and the University of Maryland. During the discussion it was noted that due to changes in the city's and University of Maryland's salary scales GHI is lagging behind in several categories. A member asked if the GHI workers were union members; the response was that they were not unionized.

After a discussion about how the salaries were set and how many employees were approaching the top of the scale, the board asked management to work up some new proposed salary scales and to describe how they would affect the budget if enacted.

The next meeting will be on September 8.

the two had discussed architectural models.


Falls related the incident in the book of recollections compiled by Dorothy Lauber for the 50th Anniversary celebration: "The man knew about the kind of work I could do. About a week after the interview I was notified to join the staff of the Greenbelt project."

Falls worked with architect Gordon Herr, who had just graduated from the Frank Lloyd Wright School of Architecture at Taliesen West. Falls recalled how the two of them built the models of houses, schools, underpasses and the business center that were used by Greenbelt's architects and planners.

For three years Falls watched Greenbelt being constructed. He got to know the new town manager Roy Braden. Braden asked Falls to work for him. While waiting for the job to be established, Falls and his wife Ruth moved into a one-bedroom honeymoon cottage at 2-H Eastway in October 1937.

Falls soon became a member of the town's theatre group and was instrumental in the creation of the Greenbelt Federal Credit Union. He became its first president.

He proudly told Dorothy Lauber that he submitted designs for the town seal and flag contests, winning second place for

his seal design. He also received a resolution from the town manager expressing appreciation for the poll he conducted in November 1937 regarding whether pets should be allowed in Greenbelt. (Note: Pets were not permitted during the 15 years that the federal government owned and operated Greenbelt.)

#### Parkbelt Resident

After only eight months living on Eastway, Fells and Ruth moved to one of the 10 single family homes in what was called Parkbelt (homes on Woodland Way and Forestway). These were constructed by a private contractor, the Fisher Brothers, as an experiment in steel frame construction. He agreed to keep a daily record on structural problems in the houses and to see that repairs were made when necessary.

During this same period, he was offered a job building mod-

els and exhibits for the Works Progress Administration (WPA). The WPA job nearly doubled the salary Braden had offered. After working a full day for the WPA, Fells returned home each night to a barrage of complaints concerning problems with the Parkbelt homes. His wife persuaded him that it was time to move again, he said in his recollections.

Falls continued to work for federal housing agencies on projects to create low cost housing. Eventually, his career took him to Pittsburgh, where he joined the staff of the Pittsburgh Housing Authority as assistant director of development. In 1972 he directed a housing rehabilitation program for the Allegheny County Health Department. He retired in 1978.

Although Falls lived in

Greenbelt for only a short time, and was involved in housing projects for more than 50 years, he expressed his belief that Greenbelt was one of the finest examples of town planning in the world. In 2002 he visited the Greenbelt Museum with his daughter Donna Falls Tocco who lives in Gaithersburg.

During the city's 50th anniversary celebration, Donna visited the house on Eastway and the Parkbelt house where Harry and Ruth Falls had lived. In addition to Donna, Falls is survived by his daughter Gail Falls of California, his son David Falls of North Carolina, nine grandchildren and 17 great-grandchildren. His wives, Ruth Anderson Falls and Violet Kennedy Falls, preceded him in death.

#### Giant Announces Medicare Info

#### Changing Weighs Uses Metabolic Tool

A handheld device for determining metabolism is being offered in Greenbelt and is changing the way individuals manage nutrition, weight and fitness. By determining a metabolic fingerprint the calories burned naturally at rest each day are measured.

Historically, estimation equations have been used to determine metabolism but have proven to be accurate for only 20 percent of the population. So knowing one's unique metabolic fingerprint can be the key to success.

"Trying to manage weight without an accurate metabolism measurement is like leaving for a vacation without knowing how to get there," said Rebecca Bitzer, MS, RD & LD with Changing Weighs. "By determining an individual metabolic fingerprint, we can help people understand their bodies' unique needs and create a personalized nutrition, weight and fitness plan that works specifically for them."

Weighing less than five ounces, the device is an indirect calorimeter using sensor technology to measure a person's consumption of oxygen, the universal fuel of metabolism. The user simply breathes into the mouthpiece for five to 10 minutes and the device measures the volume of oxygen to determine resting metabolic rate, a critical component for customizing a successful individualized weight and nutrition management program.



#### Inca Trail Exhibit At Cultural Center

An 81-image photographic exhibit, "The Great Inca Trail," opens at the Pope John Paul II Cultural Center in Northeast Washington on September 7. The photographic exhibit, sponsored by the Embassy of Peru, celebrates Hispanic Heritage Month. The images document the Inca's great engineering feats and their respect for nature. The exhibit runs through September 29.

The Royal Inca Road, which covers more than 4,000 miles of the Andean Highlands, crosses rugged mountain passes and Inca ruins throughout Peru, Bolivia, Ecuador, Chile, Argentina and Colombia. Photographed by several well-known professional photographers, the Inca Trail images show a variety of vistas including deserts, mountains, rivers and marshy land.

The network of trails over paved roads, suspension bridges, steps and through tunnels joined the Inca Empire together and acted as a communications system through runners positioned at interim rest areas. One of the most famous sites along the Great Inca Trail is the rediscovered stone city of Machu Picchu, made up of some 200 granite structures used for living quarters, temples, storage and public assembly.
