Jeremiah Voigt's Firefighter of the Year award was just one of the many honors celebrated at the Greenbelt Volunteer Fire Department's (GVFD) annual banquet held on March 11 in the hall of the department. In attendance were Mayor Judith Davis and several members of council, County Councilmember Douglas J.J. Peters and representatives from other fire departments including Berwyn Heights, Branchville and Beltsville.

Following the invocation and a catered dinner, Vice President Jay Remenick introduced the guests. A representative from the office of County Executive Jack Johnson delivered a proclamation which congratulated the GVFD for its dedication in completing 51 years of public safety. Davis administered the eath of office to

the seven 2006 trustees and three 2006 line officers – Fire Chief Brian T. Rudy, Assistant Fire Chief Jason Morgal and Deputy Fire Chief Robert Holland.

Noting his "outstanding dedication and motivation," Chief Rudy presented the large Firefighter of the Year trophy to Jeremiah Voigt. Rudy stated that Voigt, whose father is also a GVFD firefighter recognized for his service, has spearheaded many projects this year. One project he completed was refurbishing the large map of Prince George's County used for the important task of providing directions for the GVFD vehicles. Voigt and fellow firefighter Marcus Paxton were also promoted to the rank of sergeant during the ceremony.

New Election Procedures Discussed at LWV Meeting

Several election law changes designed to encourage greater participation in voting were presented in a League of Women Voters (LWV) sponsored metting on Saturday, April 22 at the Community Center. Greenbelt's delegation – State Senator Paul Pinsky and Delegates Anne Healey, Tawanna Gaines and Justin Ross – was at the speakers' table along with Robin Downs Colbert, chief administrator of the Prince George's County Board of Elections.

The delegation informed those present of changes made for the 2006 election by the Maryland Assembly and answered questions from the audience. The primary election will be held Tuesday, September 12. These changes were made to encourage more citizens to come out and vote.

"Whatever brings the voters out . . ." added Ross.

The last city election brought out under 20 percent of registered voters in Greenbelt.

Early Voting

The polls will be open five days before the primary, September 5 through 9 from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m., throughout the state. In Prince George's County there will be three locations, one in Hyattsville, one in Upper Marlboro and one other.

Anyone can now ask for and receive an absentee ballot without having to give a reason for it. Provisional ballots may be counted regardless of the precinct where they are cast.

Mitigation Site Approved For Capitol Cadillac

An ordinance and a resolution concerning the city's admissions and amusement (A&A) tax and approval of a forest mitigation site to replace woodland to be destroyed by the expansion of Capitol Cadillac were among the agenda items considered by the Greenbelt City Council when it met on April 24. There was also time set aside for a public hearing on the proposed Fiscal Year 2007 budget.

Greenbelt parkland will become even greener in the future when a 1.72-acre area of Parcel 15 near "Buddy" Attick Park is reforested as a mitigation site required as a condition for approval in 2005 of an expansion project by Capitol Cadillac. Celia Craze, chief of the city's planning and development department, told council Parcel 15 is the last site within city limits that complies with mitigation site criteria set by the county.

Craze said City Horticulturist Bill Phelan suggested "knitting" the open site into adjacent existing woodlands using native upland tree species including white oak, hickory and black gum.

Councilmember Rodney Roberts had concerns that reforesting

the site would mean there would be no space available in that area for a playground, which is needed by residents of the Belle Point and Charlestowne Village complexes. Craze said the site is flat at the end nearest the subdivisions but then slopes downhill, away from Belle Point. She suggested moving the mitigation site further downhill, leaving space for a playground on the flat area. Council then approved the mitigation site, wih this amendment.

Resolutions Adopted

In the future Greenbelt's A&A tax will be determined by resolution instead of by city code. Council adopted, by unanimous vote, an ordinance amending the city code to allow the change.

The ordinance was drafted in order to enable a temporary reduction of the A&A tax as a means of helping the management of Beltway Plaza keep open the remaining eight theaters there that would have closed had Quantum Management not stepped in to purchase and remodel them, as previously reported in the News Review. Without the ordinance, the city code would have to be

Future of Schools Is Chief Topic of Peters' Meeting

Douglas J.J. Peters, 4th District representative on the Prince George's County Council, thanked Greenbelt leaders for working toward a massive redevelopment of the Greenbelt Metro Station at a town hall meeting on Thursday, April 20. He emphasized the importance of improving public mass transportation and of planning development accordingly.

"Greenbelt will have the premier Metro station in Prince George's County once construction begins," Peters told a small crowd comprised mostly of community leaders. His 4th district constituency includes about 90,000 residents from Bowie, Glenn Dale and Greenbelt, among others.

Peters held the meeting to highlight the past year's accomplishments and advancements, though much discussion focused on the continually divisive issue of where and if to construct a new Greenbelt Middle School and Springhill Lake Elementary School.

An expansion of public schools will be needed soon as the Greenbelt City Council and Prince George's County recently approved a proposal by AIMCO, the owners of Springhill Lake Apartments, to expand the complex from 2,800 to 5,600 units. However, council has struggled

with AIMCO for nearly two years to reach an agreement to expand the schools.

AIMCO wants to demolish Springhill Lake Elementary, saying its low elevation would make a prime location for the artificial stormwater retention ponds the company wants to install in the complex. It would be replaced by another school, perhaps on the school bus site.

Many in the audience expressed opposition to that plan, arguing that Springhill Lake's location saves money on transportation costs since nearly every student walks to school. It would cost around \$15 million just to build a new school bus parking lot.

Peters said he told AIMCO that if they want to demolish the elementary school, they must pay for another 15 acres of land at the location of the new school. He said the developers gladly agreed to his demand.

However, the issue of where to find such a large area in Greenbelt remains uncertain. At any rate, Peters would like to see officials reach an agreement with AIMCO soon. He said that an agreement would generate \$4 million in advance from public safety surcharge fees. He said

It's a Microburst

The article "Tornado Touches Down . . ." in the April 20 issue of the News Review (p.12) appears to describe a microburst.

The description from the online website encyclopedia wikipedia.org states "A microburst is a very localized column of sinking air, producing damaging divergent and straight-line winds at the surface that are similar to but distinguishable from tornadoes which generally have convergent damage.

"The term was defined . . . as affecting an area 4 km (2.5 mi) in diameter or less

"Microbursts are recognized as capable of generating wind speeds higher than . . . 168 mph."

A microburst was cited as a primary factor in causing the crash of Delta flight 191 in 1985 as it approached for landing at the Dallas-Fort Worth airport.



rewritten each time the A&A tax is changed.

Also adopted by unanimous vote was a resolution setting the A&A tax at one percent for movie theaters, effective in FY07. The tax had been previously set at 10 percent. According to the memorandum between the city and Beltway Plaza, the tax will be restored to 10 percent in five years.

Local Post Office

Roosevelt Center merchants are still looking at opening a postal unit in the Center, according to Councilmember Konrad Herling, who had attended a meeting of the merchants' association. Council and many senior citizens hope to keep a postal facility within walking distance.

Herling said there is support for the provision of transportation to the new post office on Ha-

nover Parkway in Greenbelt East. He also noted that the Greenbelt Federal Credit Union has joined the Co-op in selling stamps.

Budget Hearing

Early in the meeting Mayor Judith Davis suspended the meeting to open a public hearing on the proposed budget for the next fiscal year. When no one came forward to speak after repeated invitations to do so, Davis reconvened the city council meeting.

this money could be used to build a new fire station in Greenbelt.

Vertical School?

Eleanor Roosevelt High School Principal Sylvester Convers asked why nobody has proposed expanding the middle school vertically so that a smaller amount of land is needed. He cited Bladensburg High School as a successful example of vertical development.

When concern was raised that the high school population would also strain resources, Convers confidently assured those at the meeting that his faculty is able to deal with large student bodies. ERHS, with 2,900 students, is the second largest high school in the state. At one point, the school enrolled as many as 3,200 students.

"Students really don't mind a large student body. It's mostly parents that complain. But there's no discernible drop in services or quality thereof due to the amount of students. Sure there are challenges administering large schools but we've proved we can handle it," said Conyers.

Councilmember Edward Putens noted that AIMCO isn't the only business whose development proposal will put a strain on school capacity. The owners of Beltway Plaza are seeking to construct residential apartments on the north side of the mall. Councilmember Rodney Roberts decried the proposal, saying that residential development on Greenbelt Road will only increase traffic congestion.

Grant Money

Peters received a significant amount of grant money for District 4 this year, much of which went to Greenbelt. ERHS received \$26,500 to construct a new coach's box in the gymnasium. Greenbelt also received a grant to install a traffic light at the Greenbelt Road and Lakecrest Drive intersection. Councilmember Leta Mach applauded the light for making roadways safer for pedestrians.

"As a rule, I try to give Greenbelt half of the grant money I receive every year," said Peters, adding that he also received \$100,000 for the construction of a Greenbelt skateboard park. He recognized that many citizens are concerned with soaring property taxes and was proud to say this year's budget actually calls for a tax decrease. He explained that Prince George's County has been blessed with "incredible financial fortunes the past four years as a result of house values skyrocketing."

mail. If identification is not provided at the time of registration by mail, people may have to show identification before voting.

While candidates cannot receive money from developers, a twist or loophole remains. If the candidate runs as part of a slate, the slate can be given money.

Although the delegation sought to have a paper trail from the new voting machines as many citizens had requested, that will not happen this year. Passed by the House of Delegates, the bill reached a stalemate in the state Senate. The idea of a viable paper trail was discussed in the Senate but some believed it would be better to wait until the 2008 elections. It seemed to be too close to the time of the election to shift machines and there would not be enough time to train workers. Colbert said there

is no perfect voting equipment.

School Board

The Prince George's County school board will be an elected board this year. School board elections are non-partisan. This year all school board candidates will be elected at-large instead of individually in the nine districts.

Five districts will have residency requirements, four will not. The residency requirement is that the person who files in that district must live in that district.

Voter Information

Voter information will be recorded electronically so it will be impossible for people to vote more than one time. An electronic book will be available for all poll workers to use.

One pulled the passenger from the vehicle and assaulted him, punching and kicking him several times. The other opened the driver's door, punched the driver and took his wallet. AEDs Now in Place For Police Use

The Greenbelt Police Department now has six Automatic External Defibrillators (AEDs) for use in emergencies. One is located at the main headquarters at 550 Crescent Road, a second at the police substation at Beltway Plaza and the remaining four are located in cruisers for each patrol squad.

An AED is a device about the size of a laptop computer that analyzes the heart's rhythm for any abnormalities and, if necessary, directs the rescuer to deliver an electrical shock to the victim. This shock, called defibrillation. may help the heart to reestablish an effective rhythm of its own.

Sudden cardiac arrest (SCA) cases are usually due to arrhythmias – abnormal heart rhythms, the majority of which are ventricular fibrillation. Ventricular fibrillation is a condition in which the heart's electrical impulses suddenly become chaotic, causing the heart to cease pumping blood effectively. Victims of SCA collapse and quickly lose conscious-

ness, often without warning. Unless a normal heart rhythm is restored, death will follow within a matter of minutes.

Currently, all Greenbelt police officers are trained in the use of AEDs.

Summer Program Offered at Martial Arts School

As the school year winds down, working parents are once again faced with the task of occupying their children while they themselves are occupied. Be it sports practices, outdoor camps or summer reading programs, parents struggle to find an activity that is personally fulfilling and that their child enjoys.

For parents faced with this annual dilemma, Master Navid Shahraki would like to introduce them to Kim's Karate, a private gym that teaches martial arts to area youth. Shahraki, 37, is head instructor at the gym he originally opened in Greenbelt in 1986. Kim's Karate moved to Eastgate Shopping Center off Greenbelt Road in Lanham several years ago to accommodate a larger gymnasium. Currently 200 active students are enrolled in one of Kim's Karate programs, ranging in age

from 4 to 70 years old.

While Kim's Karate teaches students the art of self defense, Shahraki insists the teaching is about "more than just kicking and punching." Aside from learning karate every day, students in the summer camp go roller skating and go-carting, visit parks, play laser tag and even visit Six Flags. The summer camp is offered in weeklong sessions, though a minimum of three weeks is required to sign up. The camp lasts from 7 a.m. to 6:15 p.m. every day.

While the camp is relatively expensive, Shahraki urges people to see the value in the expense. All the fees and admission prices are included in tuition. Students need to bring their own lunches but the gym provides recreational equipment. Students also receive greater personal attention than is often given at summer camps. There is one instructor for every 10 students.

"We really try to develop well-rounded, responsible citizens at Kim's Karate. We adhere to a strict code of ethics and expect our students to always show respect to one another. We aren't just another summer camp that allows your child to misbehave and be disrespectful. We strive to improve their moral character," said Shahraki, a 5th degree Black Belt who himself is a product of Kim's Karate.

Shahraki said he dragged his mother to the Kim's Karate in Baltimore as a four-year-old to receive karate lessons. He's been hooked ever since. He opened the Greenbelt location as a way to give back to the sport that has given him so much. Another instructor, Master Christopher Smith, is also a Kim's Karate alum.

Tournament

About 20 students from Kim's Karate in Lanham competed at a tournament in Washington, D.C., in February. Every student placed in the top three in his or her division, many of whom took first place. Master Navid and Master Chris also competed in their division; both took first place. Shahraki says the overwhelming success at the tournament is a testament to the student's hard work and dedication. He is taking students to another tournament in Oxon Hill the weekend of May 7.

Shelly Henderson, a mother of two from Bowie, has sent both her children to Kim's Karate for several years. She said her children love the gym, especially summer camp. She regrets that Kim's Karate does not offer scholarships so that all children are able to experience the camp. She feels fortunate that her children are able to enroll.

Henderson said the self-defense training has done wonders for her 8-year-old son's confidence. He suffered a stroke when he was four and has undergone occupational

therapy ever since.

"He used to be self-conscious about his limp and poor health but now his confidence level is through the roof. Every time I turn around, he's punching or

kicking the air, just dying to become a little ninja [The instructors] have been so patient about his condition and provided a loving environment for him," said Henderson.

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

Long-time Greenbelt Peace Activitists to Attend MUPJ

Greenbelt is on the map when it comes to peace activism that bequeaths the state of Maryland enduring organizations and life-long peacemakers. One of the former is MUPJ, or Maryland United for Peace and Justice, which holds its 21st annual conference this weekend, April 28-29.

Local residents Esther Webb and Bert Donn were closely involved in founding MUPJ. Webb also contributes beyond the county and state levels through the Quaker organization, for instance, in having also co-founded the Institute of Positive Action (IPA). Lifelong peace activist Becky Otter recalled working with Greenbelters Webb and Donn during the 1970s and 1980s.

Webb downplayed her role in helping to found IPA, giving credit instead to former resident Becky Williams. When contacted by this reporter, Williams, also known by her maiden name of Becky Otter, claimed that Webb was "the main engine" for IPA. She specifically mentioned that Webb and her co-religionists in the Middle Atlantic Friends Meeting supported IPA and its objectives of education and peace promotion for all ages, including the youth, but "outside the school curriculum," as she expressed it.

Williams nurtures links and memories with Greenbelt. The IPA has now merged with MUPJ but former Greenbelter Williams fondly and repeatedly remembered friends, supporters, the Labor Day Festival and the News Review. "Before the internet, I relied on it for local news totally," she said during a recent telephone interview. Williams said she had moved to Greenbelt in 1970 or 1971 after a divorce, hoping to find a friendly community. "Greenbelt proved to be more than that," she said with enthusiasm. She also said she keeps in touch with her many friends here "a few times during the year." She has not been able to travel much in recent years but last visited Greenbelt in 1992.

She left Greenbelt in 1989 for the Eastern Shore where she now lives with her husband Paul Morehead. Williams has continued her peace education work and mentioned Bladensburg Elementary School, which is called a "Peace School" by its principal; she also started a new group since her move, Talbot County Peace and Education Effort.

The efforts of Donn, Williams and Webb have given Maryland MUPJ-IPA an intimate, workshopstyle conference every year during spring. Generous prizes awarded

to students come from a bequest of Fred Benjamin, whose son Ron is a Greenbelt resident. Students who participate in the Fred Benjamin Peace Essay Contest are 9th through 12th graders attending Maryland high schools.

Three \$200 cash prizes and several smaller awards for peace essays or related submissions will be awarded on Saturday. This is a highlight each year when the winning student(s) and sponsoring teacher(s) are honored, the student usually reading his or her essay, while art submissions are displayed around the conference venue.

Baltimore's Seton-Keough High School is the location for this year's conference.

Saturday will showcase the most interactive part of this 21st Annual Peace, Justice and Environmental Conference. It will open with the theme "Creating a Culture of Peace." Among the participants are the Rev. Mac Legerton, Center for Community Action, North Carolina and Bill Jenkins of the Washington Buddhist Peace Fellowship, who will focus on "Paradigm Shifting."

Other Connections

The Presbyterian Church in Berwyn Heights has hosted the MUPJ-IPA conference at their church location on Greenbelt Road twice over the past 21 years. Neither retirement nor health issues have stopped Webb and Donn from helping to plan and also attend the annual conference that is held in Maryland each spring on a rotating basis.

Donn and this reporter went to Annapolis last month where both testified before the Maryland Senate in support of a bill sponsored by Senator Gwendolyn Britt to establish a task force on nonviolence. Separately, they also do educational work in promoting nonviolence.

Donn led a workshop on nonviolence at the Greenbelt Community Center last fall that covered personal, family, community and international aspects of theory and practice of nonviolence over several Tuesday evenings.
