Council Approves Development Plans for Greenbelt Station

Consideration of two detailed site plans related to the proposed development at Greenbelt Station consumed much of the meeting when the Greenbelt City Council convened on Monday, April 24.

The Greenbelt Station development is projected to be a "New Urbanist Community," utilizing a planning concept that attempts to reduce sprawl by creating mixeduse communities that are "diverse, walkable neighborhoods" where many necessities of life are met within the community, according to the website of the Congress for the New Urbanism (www.cnu.org). These communities are designed to be more pedestrian friendly and less reliant on automobiles than typical suburban developments.

In these new developments, streets are narrower, with businesses open to the street, not parking lots, and where neighborhoods foster community, not isolation.

Kentlands, in Gaithersburg, is considered a model of a New Urbanist Design (NUD). However, considering the characteristics of this "new" urban design, one is reminded of Greenbelt and led to wonder what's "new." South Core

The Detailed Site Plan (DSP) for a 342-unit residential development by Pulte Homes in the South Core of Greenbelt Station shows a proposed community exemplifying this type of design, according to Celia Craze, chief of the city's Planning Department. Craze showed council a computerized presentation of how the project would, and would not, look. The presentation also demonstrated staff concerns about how well the DSP fulfills the NUD ideal. Craze's agenda comments said members of her staff have learned much about NUD in this review process and spent "hundreds of hours" reviewing and discussing the plan.

The project is composed of townhomes and condominiums. Most garages are in the rear of the structures and accessed via alleyways, although some units are "front-loaded." Streets are narrow; there is very little yard area per unit. On-street parking or green space areas are also very limited. Some units have a six-foot deck on back, which initially disturbed Councilmember Ed Putens because they face "nowhere." He thought they cheapened the project and was inclined to vote against approval because of his distaste for this aspect of the design.

Staff Concerns

City planning staff had concerns about the width of the alleyways, lack of green space, the ability of emergency vehicles to maneuver through the project, location of utility boxes and the providing of utility easements. Connections to trails to more natural areas and community open spaces were also a concern. Another issue dealt with whether lighting will be adequate. Craze said all lighting is required to be "dark sky" approved and energy efficient.

Some staff recommendations have already been incorporated into the DSP, said Craze. They have tweaked the plan to improve walkability, adding three additional entries to the trail system. Streets and alleyways have been

Greenbelt Homes to Hold Annual Meeting and Election

The annual meeting of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI) will be held on Thursday, May 18 at 7:30 p.m. in the Greenbelt Community Center. This year, elections will be held for five of the nine seats; four will be for a two-year term and one for a one-year term. The board positions currently held by Dorothy Lauber, Gail Alexanderwicz, Don Hudson and George Moore are up for election. In addition, long-time board member Chuck Hess has accepted a one-year position abroad and is resigning his position on the board. Since his position is not up for election until next year, the person who wins that seat will serve for only one year. The three audit committee positions are elected every year.

Presentation

There will be a presentation at the meeting by Carl Elefante, an architect and member of the Potomac Valley chapter of the American Institute of Architects (AIA). In 2007 the AIA is celebrating its 150th anniversary. The AIA is commemorating this event by helping selected communities through a "Blueprint for America" program. The chapter members will use their expertise to "increase public awareness of livability issues . . . build consensus on improving livability and help citizens articulate a vision."

Elefante met with the board, members of GHI's Sustainable Design and Practice Committee and others on March 15. He will be addressing members at the annual meeting about a new initiative called "greening of Greenbelt" that is being considered by the board.

There will be a presentation on the Greenbelt Community Emergency Response Team (CERT). Several committees will have displays, including a rain barrel program, informational handouts and plant give-aways. There will be door prizes from the Co-op, the New Deal Café and certificates toward GHI monthly charges.

Dr. Raymond Peterson Heads Greenbelt's Education Committee

As chair of the Advisory Committee on Education (ACE), Dr. Raymond Peterson plays an important role in the ongoing debate of where and how to construct a new middle school in Greenbelt. The 50-year-old Greenbelt Middle School, already in need of repair, is too small to meet expected capacity when Springhill Lake Apartments expands from 2,800 to 5,600 units.

Ever since the Greenbelt City

Dr. Peterson's careful analysis of school needs in Greenbelt West. He delves deeply into the issue and lays out his research neatly for council . . . He's really become an outstanding chair," said Councilmember Leta Mach, who chaired ACE from its inception in 1995 until she was elected to council in 2003.

While resolving the AIMCO issue is currently ACE's principal goal, it is not the only topic committee members tackle in their monthly meetings. The ACE scholarship fund and the summer reading program both encourage community involvement in schools. ACE also lobbies the Prince George's County Board of Education to make decisions that are beneficial to the community. Peterson was honored that the Prince George's County Council recently asked him to be a citizen representative on behalf of ACE in the interview process to elect a new CEO of county schools. One of ACE's more recognizable efforts is the Educator Awards Ceremony. Every year ACE recognizes one teacher and two students from each of Greenbelt's schools for their outstanding achievement and rewards them in a public ceremony.

Sieglinde, whom he met in Washington, D.C., while working as a scientist at the National Institutes of Health. They have two children, Catherine, 7, and William, 5. Although both children attend the private Friends Community School in College Park, Peterson said that having children influenced their decision to live in Greenbelt.

"My wife and I appreciate the cooperative structure of Greenbelt and all the activities it promotes. We love taking the kids to many of the community events in town. It's a wonderful place to raise children," said Peterson, adding that he hopes to reside in Greenbelt for years to come. "We plan on enrolling our kids at Eleanor Roosevelt High School when the time arises," he said. Peterson is now a scientist at a biotechnology company he co-founded in Hyattsville seven years ago. He graduated from the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School of Business with a degree in economics in 1985. He obtained a doctorate in biological anthropology from Penn State University several years later. He has no ambition to run for city council or any other political position in the future. He said he is satisfied contributing to local schools and does not plan on leaving ACE anytime soon.

Astronomy Day to Be Feted At NASA and Owens Center

Special activities will be held at Goddard and at Owens Science Center to celebrate National Astronomy Day on Saturday, May 6. The Howard B. Owens Science Center, 9601 Greenbelt Road in Lanham will hold its program from 3 to 6:30 p.m. followed by the program at NASA/ Goddard Space Flight Center Visitor Center, 8800 Greenbelt Road, which will be held from 6:30 to 11 p.m.

Owens Science Center, in conjunction with the Astronomical Society of Greenbelt and members of the Goddard Astronomy Club, will offer a planetarium show, a talk on solar science and an actual viewing of the sun using telescopes equipped with safe solar filters. The special outreach event at Goddard will include John Dobson, internationally famous telescope maker and advocate of amateur astronomy, as the featured speaker at 7 p.m. The event is being hosted by the Goddard Astronomy Club and is designed to help those of all ages experience the pleasures of amateur astronomy from learning the constellations and finding the planets to buying and using a telescope.

Dobson is the creator of the affordable "Dobsonian" telescope, a simple-to-use design that has become an international best seller. He is also co-founder of the organization known as the

A Review Shakespeare Play at GAC Gets Critic's Thumbs Up

One of Shakespeare's earliest comedies, "The Two Gentlemen of Verona," is a play about love: between friends, between parent and child, between master and servant and, of course, romantic love. These relationships shine forth in this production at the Greenbelt Arts Center, produced by Sheilah Crossley-Cox and directed by Stephen Cox.

Valentine (Chris Fominaya) and Proteus (Ryan Anthony) are boyhood friends who separate to find their fortunes yet reunite later. Their love for the same woman causes most of the play's dramatic tension. Anthony and Fominaya make full use of the stage as they engage in horseplay, exult in love and fall into despondency. The costuming choice of jeans topped by a period shirt is therefore wise.

Christine Boyce as Julia, Proteus's love, shows the range of emotions of a young girl in love. Sylvia, the woman loved by both men, is well played as a vamp by Heather Martin.

As good as the leading actors and actresses are, the supporting roles provide most of the entertainment. Rachel Duda as the maid Lucetta, Pallas Bane as the servant Speed and the three outlaws who capture Valentine are excellent in bringing comic relief to their roles.

Panthino, the self-important servant to Proteus's father, is played wonderfully by Penny Martin. The "foolish" servant to Proteus, Launce, is portrayed by Sandy Irving - an IRS lawyer by day, according to the playbill - who has a real talent for comedy.

"The Two Gentlemen of Verona" continues at the Greenbelt Arts Center, located at 123 Centerway, on May 5, 6, 12 and 13 at 8 p.m., and May 7 and 14 at 2 p.m. Including an intermission, the play runs about two and onehalf hours. For ticket information call 301-441-8770.

Starting Friday, May 5 Old Greenbelt Theatre offers a double-bill of "Capote" (initially shown in February) and the earlier, intimatelyrelated "In Cold Blood." Ruby and Nelson Guidry Early Greenbelt Residents

Ruby O. and Nelson P. Guidry, who lived in 2 Court Research Road from 1947-1955, died within five hours of each other in Lewes, Del., where they had lived since 1985. Mrs. Guidry was 88 and her husband was 90. They had been married for 69 years. He died on Sunday, April 2, 2006, and she died early on April 3.

Mrs. Guidry had worked as a cartographic aid for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service in Beltsville until her retirement in 1978. Mr. Guidry was a foreign agricultural economic geographer, also for USDA. He retired in 1973 after 36 years of service. One of his publications was translated into Japanese and Spanish and also was printed in a geography textbook. Oxford University has reprinted two of his maps.

Mrs. Guidry was born in New Orleans. She was a graduate of Kohn High School where she was a journalist for the school newspaper. Mr. Guidry was born in Gueydan, La. They moved to the Washington, D.C., area in the mid-1930s. During World War II, Mr. Guidry was a cartographer aboard the USS Ancon, an auxiliary command ship where he made maps for part of the invasion of Okinawa.

After moving to Lewes, Del., they both became active in the Lewes Senior Center. He drew up the architectural plans for the building on Nassau Park Road. She was active in the Meals on Wheels program and continued her membership in the Unity Chapter Eastern Star and Bethel United Methodist Church. Mr. Guidry was a member of Birmingham Lodge in Maryland, Jefferson Lodge in Lewes, as well as the Rehoboth Beach Lions Club and the Bethel United Methodist Church.

They are survived by their son, Philip N. Guidry of Dover, Del., and daughter Claudia Hakala of Severna Park. Services were held at the Bethel church, arranged by Parsell Funeral Homes and Crematorium, Lewes. Burial followed in Bethel Methodist Cemetery.


Stamp Out Hunger Drive Is May 13







narrowed to increase green spaces. Designs have been changed to keep speed to around 20 miles per hour. Some front-loaded units were changed to be rear-loaded, improving the view for owners at the edge of a future park.

The original site plan contained 383 units, but the city negotiated this number down to 340 so that a center commons could be included. Space for two additional units was created by later changes in the layout.

Approval Recommended

The Advisory Planning Board (APB) reviewed the plan and recommended approval, with the condition that Pulte Homes execute a covenant with the city by May 1 that would give the city the ability to enforce the standards set by 12 architecture and site design conditions outlined in the APB's report. The 12 conditions refer to materials that may be used in construction, landscape features, gutter and downspout colors, setbacks and other architectural details.

Council Concerns

Councilmember Rodney Roberts said he could not support the plan because of insufficient open space or playgrounds. He was concerned there is too little street parking and said people won't always put their car in the garage, making maneuvering through the streets difficult. Despite the New Urban Design concepts, he thought automobiles certainly would dominate. He described the Greenbelt concept of green and open space as much better.

Councilmember Konrad Herling asked hopefully if art deco design was under consideration for the architecture, but he learned it was not. He wanted people in the project to be able to look around and know they were in Greenbelt. He was assured by Craze a prominent sign would be at the entry welcoming people to Greenbelt.

After hearing from a Pulte representative on the selling points of the decks and the rationale for them even without a view, Putens relented his position and voted for the motion to approve the DSP, with the covenant condition cited in the APB report. The motion carried, four to one, with Roberts voting against.

Apartments Plan

After approving the DSP for the Pulte development, council moved on to consider the DSP for Fairfield, a luxury apartment complex of 302 residential rental units. The project will consist of three buildings, each connected at right angles to a five-story parking garage.

The APB had also reviewed this

DSP and recommended council's approval. Planning staff review also led to a recommendation to approve, subject to five conditions. The conditions address details of wording, certain construction materials and specifics of signage and link approval to the prior approval of the Pulte project.

The fifth condition requires an alternative method for screening industrial areas south of the complex as well as rail tracks on the west side. Plans for this alternative should be submitted to the city for review and approval.

The plan with recommended conditions was approved four to one, with Roberts voting against because he thinks recreational facilities are inadequate. He said it would burden the rest of the city to meet these needs. The Fairfield project will have its own outdoor pool but other public park and recreation facilities would be available for use by the whole Greenbelt Station development.

Developer Commitments

Prior to addressing the DSPs for Greenbelt Station development, council was obligated by an earlier agreement with the developer, Greenbelt Metropark LLC, to approve a time-line for delivery of commitments assigned the developer in the agreement. All told, the developer has agreed to contribute over \$4 million to the city to cover improvements related to the development of the Greenbelt Station area.

Specific contributions include \$2 million for a recreation building, \$500,000 for improvements to the police station or for construction of a facility inside the development, \$500,000 for improvements to Cherrywood Lane, \$300,000 for an interpretive program in a created stream park with informal areas for sitting and picnicking, funds to hire six new police officers and construction of the roundabout earlier discussed.

During discussion of this timeline Norman Rivera, representative of the developer, explained they are seeking financial assistance from the county because of the considerable expense involved in preparing the site for development. He said it has cost four to five million dollars to reclaim the wash ponds at the sand and gravel operation area. Most large projects such as this have public financing, he said.

Nonetheless, when Putens moved to approve the time-line, Roberts stood by his resolve that the project should not be tied to county financing and voted against it. The motion passed, four to one.

For children there will be sessions on constructing a basic telescope and making a "star finder." Kits and materials will be provided free of charge.

Also on display at the Goddard Visitor Center are the "Hubble Space Telescope New Views of the Universe" exhibit and the new "Science on a Sphere" animated global projection system. Breast Cancer Race Registration Opens

Every three minutes a woman is diagnosed with breast cancer.

On June 3, more than 50,000 runners and walkers are expected to gather to raise money and awareness to fight breast cancer at one of the world's largest 5K run/fitness walks.

The Komen National Race for the Cure is expected to raise millions for breast cancer research, education, screening and treatment programs. Seat Belt Safety Campaign Underway

The Greenbelt Police Department is one of many police agencies in Prince George's County participating in the 2006 Maryland Chiefs' Challenge. The Chiefs' Challenge is a twomonth campaign from April 6 to June 6, focusing on increasing seat belt/safety seat usage.

Every 15 seconds, someone in America is injured in a traffic crash. By focusing on increasing seat belt/safety seat usage, law enforcement officials hope to drastically reduce these numbers.

In Prince George's County the recent trend has been to look at ways to reduce crime. Because criminals drive, stepping up traffic enforcement helps catch many criminals.

During the 2005 campaign, officers from the Greenbelt City Police Department made over 200 arrests resulting from traffic stops. Several guns were taken off the streets and large quantities of illegal drugs were seized.

Although the campaign includes stepping up enforcement, that is only a small portion of the effort. Educational seminars will be conducted, child safety seats will be checked, schools will be visited and surveys will be completed. Numerous public safety ads will be released and it is hoped that residents and visitors to the county will see the message often.

The intent of the campaign is not to punish drivers by issuing a ticket. The intent is to make drivers think twice about not buckling up and thus prevent an injury or save a life.

Emory Harman Recalls Early Effort for New Post Office

For any resident inconvenienced by the location of the new Greenbelt Post Office on Hanover Parkway, former Postmaster Emory Harman has a simple message: "You should have listened to me 40 years ago."

Harman, 89, worked at Greenbelt's Post Office from 1958-1980 while it was still located in the middle of town, near the movie theater. In 1964, as the city's population exploded to nearly 23,000 people, Postmaster Harman "had a dream to give the people of Greenbelt more and better postal service."

He knew this would require a larger facility, so Harman made plans to construct a new post office on Parkway. He received approval from the post office and Greenbelt Homes, Inc., which owned the plot of land where Harman envisioned the new facility. But, to his chagrin, Harman said politics got in the way.

"City Council didn't even look at the proposal for months even though construction was ready to begin. There were blueprints and everything," said Harman, a Greenbelt resident since 1948. "Council never approved the idea but their only complaints were that the mail trucks were too loud and the location was too near the fire department." He still isn't sure why council disapproved the plan. After all, he said, mail trucks aren't even loud.

To this day, Harman regrets there isn't a post office on Parkway. The old post office was eventually moved to its location in the basement of the Co-op grocery store. "We need a new post office because the basement of the Coop is too small but I really don't appreciate its location. It's impossible to walk there, especially for older people. If my proposal had passed in the 1960s we wouldn't have this problem today."

Harman was nominated to be postmaster by President Lyndon Johnson and was confirmed by the United States Senate in 1963. He was one of the last postmasters to be selected when the position still required a political appointment. **Other Service**

Even though his attempts to improve the postal service in Greenbelt were denied, Harman continues to serve the people of Greenbelt. He joined the Greenbelt chapter of the Lions Club 51 years ago and remains active in the community service organization today. He chaired the group off and on for about 40 years and has brought in 114 additional

members during that time. "The Lions Club is such a great project. We get out there and help the less fortunate, whether they have physical handicaps or financial shortcomings. We recently sat outside businesses in Greenbelt collecting funds to donate to organizations that help the blind. A couple years ago, I got University of Maryland President C.D. Mote to give a speech in Greenbelt encouraging community service." said Harman.

Harman is no stranger to U-Md., which he says is the greatest university in the world. He graduated from U-Md. in 1947 and played on the Terps football team for one season in 1944. He remains an avid supporter of the Terps, serving on the booster club of every athletic team.

Harman was able to attend Maryland thanks to the G.I. Bill, which provided college scholarships to veterans who couldn't otherwise afford an education.

"The G.I. Bill is the salvation of my life. It allowed me to become the person I am today," said Harman, who served in the Army in WWII, fighting in England, Scotland and North Africa.

A Maryland native, Harman graduated from Catonsville High School in 1936 and took a teaching job at Greenbelt Middle School in 1948. He was elected to the Catonsville High School Hall of Fame in 2004 and continues to support the school today.

Awards

Harman is the recipient of numerous awards, including the Gottswald Award from U-Md. in 2002 for outstanding contributions to the university. He was nominated for the Maryland Hall of Fame and will be inducted in 2007 if the committee approves his nomination. He was presented the Outstanding Citizen Award in Greenbelt in 2003.

Harman claims his love of Greenbelt is unmatched, although there's one change he'd like to make. "I want to go back to 1964 and put that post office on Parkway where it belongs."







The City Council of the City of Greenbelt proposes to increase real property taxes.

GREENBELT

- 1. For the tax year beginning July 1, 2006, the estimated real property assessable base will increase by 7.7%, from \$1,332,603,379 to \$1,435,103,741.
- 2. If the City of Greenbelt maintains the current tax rate of \$0.766 per \$100 of assessment, real property tax revenues will increase by 7.7%, resulting in \$785,153 of new real property tax revenues.
- 3. In order to fully offset the effect of increasing assessments, the real property tax rate should

4. The City is considering not reducing its real property tax rate enough to fully offset increasing assessments. The City proposes to adopt a real property tax rate of \$0.766 per \$100 of assessment. This tax rate is 7.7% higher than the constant yield tax rate and will generate \$785,153 in additional property tax revenues.
