# City Council Approves Proposals For Two New Developments

New construction in both Greenbelt East and Greenbelt West moved closer to realization as the Greenbelt City Council in their regular meeting on June 6 voted approval of two next-step actions. In the first of these council approved, with conditions, the detailed site plan (DSP) for an ambulatory care center in the Maryland Trade Center development on the last piece of vacant land at that site.

Later in the meeting council approved architectural covenants for the proposed Pulte Homes townhouse development in the South Core of Greenbelt Station.

### **Ambulatory Care Center**

A new owner and new developer have resurrected a plan originally approved for a medical office building in 1998 near the Holiday Inn in the Maryland Trade Center. The plan for the medical office building had been proposed by Dimensions Healthcare for Parcel I (Maryland Trade Center IV) but the site has since been acquired by Caperian, Inc. Caperian now proposes construc-

tion of a three-story, 42,300-square-foot outpatient medical care center and office building on the 2.7-acre site.

The proposed facility will be partitioned into condominium office units sold to physicians, all of whom will focus on orthopedic medicine. The top floor will be dedicated to an arthritis pain center, while the first floor will be used for on-site, out-patient surgical procedures.

A May 18 Greenbelt Advisory Planning Board report notes that in order to construct all three floors above ground, the developer must use retaining walls to secure the soil grades for construction. The addition of these retaining walls represents a slight departure from the proposed 1998

Ethan Bindernagle of the Greenbelt Department of Planning and Community Development provided council with current information on the proposal. He noted that planning department staff recommended that the Detailed Site Plan for

Maryland Trade Center IV be approved, subject to six conditions: (1) submission of all proposed signage for review and approval; (2) maintenance in good order, condition and repair of all required trees and vegetation on the site; (3) addition of a second bicycle rack on the north side of the building; (4) provision of details for amenities and equipment on the landscape plan for review and approval by the city; (5) clarification on the DSP regarding 12 parking spaces not related to the ambulatory care center but available for its use and (6) adoption of low-impact development techniques and/or green building technologies in development of the site where applicable and to the extent possible. Several conditions derive from covenants placed on the property at the time of the original 1998 proposal.

Questions raised by council related to the number of offices planned, storm water management and the accessibility of the build-

# City Council Meets Its Deadline, Adopts City Budget for 2006-07

Following about nine worksessions, including presentations by city department heads and citizen groups, the Greenbelt City Council at its regular meeting on June 5 finally adopted the Fiscal Year 2007 budget.

The budget review process had begun with introduction of a proposed budget by the city manager at the March 27 council meeting.

The Greenbelt City Charter requires that the budget be adopted by June 10 for the fiscal year that begins on July 1. Once again City Manager Michael McLaughlin provided a memo listing all changes that have been made to the proposed budget. For this meeting, the manager's memo served as the template for various motions council would have to make in order to adopt the modified budget. All actions reflected changes agreed to at the final budget worksession of May 17 and changes announced at the final public hearing on May 22.

With Councilmember Edward Putens absent, certain critical votes necessary for adopting the budget (involving suspension of the rules for adoption) prior to the June 10 deadline require that all four members present approve the action. This turned out not to be a problem, although for some specific votes on changed elements of the budget, Councilmember Rodney Roberts voted no, making

those votes three to one. Roberts voted no on several issues involving a modification of the proposed budget to increase the per unit inspection fee for rental apartment inspection by \$15 (an increase of \$72,000 in expected revenue) and an expenditure increase of \$7,000 for purchase of new speed units/traffic counters.

The final budget adopted reflects Total General Fund Revenue for FY07 at \$21,574,400 and Total General Fund Expenditures of \$21,272,400. As reported previously, the FY07 budget does not provide for an increase in the current city tax rates of \$0.766 for real property and \$1.68 on personal property.

In their traditional summation commentary on the budget, councilmembers expressed pleasure at being able to hold the line on increases in the tax rate this year. Roberts labeled it a "minor miracle." Other members of council reflected the view that the city manager had listened to them earlier in the year when his proposed budget projected no increase in the tax rate.

Everyone acknowledged, however, that real property assessments for Greenbelt homeowners have increased substantially this year and are likely to continue to rise. The mayor and council also noted inclusion in the budget of \$15,000 to provide for a part time

small post office retail outlet in the Municipal Building.

The only mystery in the adopted budget is the \$26,000 increase in budget account #995-82 for a fund transfer applicable to expected changes in the city's lease arrangement with the current theater management. When queried by this reporter as to details of the proposed changes to the theater lease, the city manager responded that actual changes have not yet been discussed in open sessions of council and that the \$26,000 reflects a "ball-park" estimate to cover any expected changes to the lease.

# Refuse Fees

In addition to adopting the FY07 budget and enacting the ordinance to appropriate funds included in the budget and to establish real estate and personal property tax rates for the new fiscal year, on a motion by Councilmember Leta Mach, a resolution to establish service charges for refuse and recycling collections in the city was introduced for first reading and will be acted on at the June 19 meeting. The FY07 budget contains an increase in the refuse collection fee of \$3 per quarter (to \$200/year) and an increase of \$1 per year (from \$25 to \$26) for customers who have other service for refuse but for whom the city picks up recycling.

# GHI Home and Garden Tour Features North End in 2006

As part of the Greenbelt Day festivities each year, the Home and Garden Tour sponsored by Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI) usually draws more than 150 neighbors and prospective buyers to the cooperative homes of Old Greenbelt. For many it's a highlight of the summer season and this year's tour brought record numbers.

This year's tour was no exception and the weather, too, was looking its best as a steady stream of visitors strolled through the North End, enjoying the sights or looking for inspiration in garden design or home renovation

Cindy Cutright, chair of GHI's Member and Community Relations Committee which organizes the tour, noted that in earlier years the tour covered the entire GHI community. "But it grew too large," she said, "so now we show the North End one year – from Eastway to the end of Ridge – and the next year we focus on Eastway to Crescent Road"

# Barrel Debut

Veterans of the tour noted new touches: the colorful large sign near the GHI office where the tour began and elegant smaller signs at each stop along the way. Visitors also saw the debut of the first 130-gallon rain barrel or-

dered through GHI and installed only two days before the tour, just in time for a soaking rain. It didn't even resemble a barrel – it was far too fashionable, with sleek modern lines and a fauxgranite surface.

Jim Cohen of 1 Court Northway, a member of the co-op's new Sustainable Design and Practice Committee, showed visitors the features of his new rain barrel. Water enters the container from a copper drainpipe coming off the roof of his row of brick townhomes and passes through a screen at the top of the barrel and then through a sock of fine mesh that catches those pesky mosquitoes and other fine debris. The main outlet hose is hooked up to a soaker hose which supplies Cohen's garden. When the barrel fills up, a bypass hose takes out the water in another direction in the garden - which, indeed, is lovely, with circular beds planted to attract butterflies and bees and a high privet hedge that, on daily dog-walks, had always reminded me of "The Secret Garden" which I'd read as a child.

# Homes

Only three homes were open to visitors this year, as compared to 14 gardens – a source of disappointment to some but the

ing to local WMATA bus service on Hanover Parkway. For the last item Mayor Judith Davis seemingly wrung a commitment from the developer's representative for financial support for construction of Greenbelt's trademark bus shelters to serve the immediate area

### **Pulte Homes**

In April council had approved the detailed site plan and land-scape plans for the Pulte town-house/condominium development of 342 units in the South Core of Greenbelt Station. That approval was subject to approval by council of covenants setting forth conditions related to building design and architecture. The proposed covenants, which have been reviewed and approved by the city solicitor, were on the agenda for council review.

Most discussion revolved around the project developer's request that they be allowed more flexibility in substituting non-masonry materials for certain buildings, depending on their location and the view from traveled roadways. Council concerns, on the other hand, focused on not permitting a lowering of standards for all-masonry construction throughout.

The developer representatives tried to assure council there would be no lessening of standards. They claimed that the use of non-masonry materials for certain units would enhance the appearance of the development with some diversity of style and streetscape.

Bindernagle persuaded council, however, to stick with the language in the covenants that only masonry building materials shall be used on the front and side elevations of all units, except above the primary elevations. Durable, low maintenance or no-maintenance siding materials may be used on front and side elevations with the façade area enclosed by the angle of the roof line.

He suggested, however, and council concurred, that language be added to that section of the covenants noting that the "applicant may request that these covenants be revised to incorporate alternate designs for end units." With that change, council approved the covenants document by a vote of three to one, with Councilmember Rodney Roberts voting no.

# Mental Health Help Sought

Strategic Outreach to Families of All Reservists (SOFAR), a program in partnership with the American Psychoanalytic Association (APsaA), seeks volunteers for a workshop to train and orient psychoanalysts to work probono with family members of the Reserve and National Guard deployed to Iraq and Afghanistan.

SOFAR (www.sofarus.org) is replicating nationally a successful program in New England that utilized volunteers from analytic institutes in Boston. SOFAR's focus is working with family members to prevent or treat "secondary trauma" and to manage the impact on the family of returning soldiers suffering with anxiety, depression or post-traumatic stress disorder. # Council Meeting Begins with Commendations

Most Greenbelt City Council meetings begin with a variety of items called Petitions and Requests and sometimes celebrations of special events or special people and their achievements. At the regular meeting on June 5 Felicia Andrews, a graduate nursing student from the School of Nursing at Bowie State University and Christal Parker Batey, Greenbelt's Community Resource Advocate, were on hand for a presentation to council on this year's Pediatric Wellness Program. This was a collaborative project addressing the "leading health indicators" and educating parents on overall pediatric wellness needs in the Springhill Lake (SHL) community. The program was free and open to children ages newborn to 18 and their parents.

The collaboration involved SHL community members, undergraduate senior nursing students from Bowie State and one graduate nursing student. The goals of the program were to create a community forum to address physical activity, obesity, injury/violence, immunizations and access to health care topics for the families and to increase parents' knowledge and awareness of health-promoting and prevention activities.

The contact with the families took place mainly through registration forms and flyers distributed by SHL Elementary School. The sessions, conducted over the early spring, averaged about 15 families for each session. Andrews reported she was satisfied with the response, especially among Spanish-speaking participants

The overall impression was that participating residents were very satisfied with the forums and indicated they had benefitted from the program. Concluding her report to council, Andrews recommended that if the program were repeated next year, a community governing or advisory board should be created to oversee and help guide the program.

According to Andrews and Batey, in order for the program to be repeated next year, a Bowie State graduate nurse would be needed to lead the effort. Council expressed thanks to Andrews for her efforts and Batey presented her with a certificate of appreciation for bringing such a successful program to Greenbelt.

### **Small Cities Day**

Although Councilmember Edwards Putens was unable to attend the meeting, council noted that two proclamations would be presented to him in his position as current chairperson of the National League of Cities' (NLC) Small Cities Council. One proclamation provides Greenbelt support to the NLC Small Cities' Partnership for Working toward Inclusive Communities and another declares June 10 to be National Small Cities and Towns Day.

Several councilmembers remarked on Eleanor Roosevelt High School commencement activities the previous week, noting with pride that the 2006 ERHS graduating class has accumulated a total of \$23 million in college scholarship awards.

Under Petitions and Requests, Susan Krofchik of Lakewood commended the city's Department of Planning and Community Development for their outstanding efforts in providing planning and zoning advice regarding plans for the Greenbelt Station and SHL (AIMCO) developments. She told council she was "totally amazed at the planning department's efforts on the city's behalf and that they were deserving of a quality or meritorious award."

The final action taken by council at this meeting related to an application submitted to

the county by Best Pawn for a Special Exception to open a pawn shop in College Park at 5051 Greenbelt Road on the south side of the street near the split where University Boulevard becomes Greenbelt Road. With College Park and Berwyn Heights already on record in opposition to the Special Exception, city staff recommended that council either oppose or take no position. Showing no affection for a proposed pawn shop at that location and in solidarity with Greenbelt's neighboring communities, Councilmember Rodney Roberts moved that council oppose the Special Exception. The motion was approved unanimously.

# City Notes

The special details crew checked the city for unauthorized signs and removed graffiti from the signs at Buddy Attick Park.

The facilities maintenance crew hung a large art mural on the third floor of the Community Center.

The parks crew completed work on the 8 Court Southway playground. Wood fiber was spread, 6 x 6 timbers installed and swing chains and seats were hung.

Recreation staff made contact with M-NCPPC staff on specifics for the Summer Playground Program located at Schrom Hills Park, Greenbelt Elementary and Springhill Lake Elementary. The new area supervisor for Greenbelt is Craig Newell. He is at the Berwyn Heights Community Center

The temporary skate park is following the summer schedule this week. The park is open seven days a week from noon to 5 p.m. (weather permitting).

The Aquatic and Fitness Center had 1,085 daily admissions and 2,291 membership admissions last week. In addition 166 memberships were sold.

Blood is a precious resource for which there is no substitute. With the life span of blood cells as little as five days for platelets and 42 days for red cells, the American Red Cross depends on healthy members of the community to give blood. Over 1,300 blood donations are needed daily to supply the needs of patients in this community. Each blood donation can be separated into components and may help three or more sick or injured people.

To be eligible to give blood, donors must be at least 17 years old, weigh at least 110 pounds and be in good general health. Donors can safely give blood every 56 days. Bring some form of positive identification such as a driver's license, blood donor card or work or school ID photo. It only takes 20 minutes to donate.

# Fire & Rescue Log

The Fire Department Log is a bi-weekly report of the activities and news from the Greenbelt Volunteer Fire Department and Rescue Squad, Inc. (GVFD&RS). The report includes recent incidents, news and upcoming events, fire safety and other fire department related information.

### Incident Report

During May, the GVFD&RS responded to a total of 151 engine and 177 ambulance calls. Among those calls, 50 were reports of smoke or fire, 14 were automatic fire alarms, six were gas leaks, 65 were motor vehicle accidents and 135 were medical calls.

On May 17 Greenbelt was among the first eight stations to receive a new ambulance under the county's ambulance replacement program. houses themselves were satisfying in their diversity: a single-family home on Woodland Way built in 1948; a 1970 four-bedroom, two-bath (with a basement) brick townhome located on Ridge, with similar homes nearby on Laurel Hill; and a lovely kitchen expansion and two-story addition to a 1941 frame dwelling at 53 court

Isabelle Gournay of Woodland Way, an architectural historian, noted that her 1948 single-family home - "a cross between a Cape Cod and a Craftsman bungalow," as she described it, with its original radiator and a detached garage - was part of Greenbelt's legacy and represented the compact homes built during and after World War II. Several similar homes are located on Woodland Way.

Vicki van Duyl of 65 Court Ridge showed visitors around her four-bedroom townhome. Of particular interest were the window seating with storage cabinets below in the dining room, the airy kitchen and the "portrait-style" gas fireplace in the living room, which "came in handy when the power went out in December,"

It's the personal touches that make the homes and gardens come alive. Van Duyl showed her powder room with its bird theme: a bird nest nestled on a small shelf and nearby a photograph of the eggs found in that nest. Even the hand towels had bird motifs.

Betty Wellborn of 53 Court Ridge shared the renovation of which included moving the front door to the side of the home, opening up and expanding her kitchen, and a two-story addition featuring a full bath on the ground floor and French doors. The effect was seamless and integrated and the welcoming kitchen drew "ahs" from several visitors entering the

### Gardens

The gardens were all different and lovely and mirrored the interests of their caretakers: jewel-like shade gardens and more manicured lawns and perennial beds. At 62 Court Ridge Michael and Mary Giles have developed several small gardens in their large side yard and gardenside area, including a small pond and rose arbor. But the statuary drew my eye: a large owl and a small grotto sheltering a statue of St. Fiacre, patron saint of gardeners and taxi drivers who were linked to sainthood, Michael explained, after transporting French troops to the front lines to win the Battle of the Somme during World War I.

At 57 Court Ridge, neighbors Kenneth Mahan and Mary Haker showed their adjoining gardens. As I arrived a crew from Channel 76 was interviewing Mary, who has transplanted family history in her yard: a clematis from one grandfather, a lilac from the other, bridal veil and a Rose of Sharon from her mother and tiger lilies from her sister.

To this biased reporter the gems of the North End are the gardens that melt into deep woods. The gardens of Judith Kornett at 7 Court Plateau and Amitiyah Elayne her end-unit frame dwelling, Hyman at 14 Court Laurel Hill are fine examples. As the end unit on the last row, Kornett's home embraces the velvety forest - "woodlands" seems too tame for this view. She's spotted red fox, a wood duck and the resident pair of pileated woodpeckers and developed her garden over 20 years, including a pond with two waterfalls. Kornett, an artist who draws the woods in winter, laughs and says, "I don't do grass. That's for sheep and horses.

Hyman's garden on Laurel Hill at the woods' edge has a Zen-like serenity with a multi-level deck and steps that lead into the trees. Visitors also admired her progress in building a brick path, including a circular design accent.

Nearby at 14 Court Laurel Hill, Kate Bucco offers an unconventional approach to gardening. After pulling out exotic plants, she filled in her side yard with a mixture of native plants and used a mulch of wood chips and cardboard for a minimalist look, which earned a "must-see" designation by the Woodlands Committee.

Hats off to all of the North End residents who opened their homes and gardens this year; added to those already listed are: David Paul, Maxine Smith, Phil Harley and Ann Marie, Gail Richards and Dina Sykes.

Next year the tour will showcase Eastway to Crescent Road - and will need more generoushearted GHI members willing to share their creativity with tour fans. And, North End take note: the tour returns in 2008, so there's lots of time to spruce up and open one's door and garden gate.





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
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# Teenager Wins International Trumpet Award

Greenbelter Annie Lemieux, 15, at right, won the 2006 youth solo competition of the International Trumpet Guild (ITG) on June 7 at Rowan University in New Jersey. With 11 other finalists she performed in the senior youth division for students aged 14 through 18. Competitors represented seven states in the U.S. as well as New South Wales, Australia.

Lemieux played the first movement of the Concerto in E flat Major for trumpet or soprano horn by J.B.G. Neruda (ca. 1707-1770) and the third movement of the Sonata for Trumpet by Eric Ewazen (b. 1954). She was accompanied by pianist Dr. Leslie Spotz. ITG Secretary Dr. Kevin Eisensmith reported on the guild's website that Lemieux's performance was "very musical, with a compact, unforced sound."

Her teacher, David Kellert of Silver Spring, teaches music at the St. Stephen and St. Agnes School in Alexandria. Lemieux has also studied with Chris Gekker, a frequently recorded soloist and Professor of Trumpet at the University of Maryland, College Park.

"David is a wonderful trumpet teacher," Lemieux says. "I decided to be a musician partly because of David's teaching, Eric Ewazen's beautiful music and encouragement from Chris Gekker and also from Dr. Robert Smith and all my friends at the Maryland Summer Center for the Arts."

Judges for the senior youth competition were international soloists Ibrahim Maalouf and Rodney Mack and ITG board member Frank Campos of the music faculty of Ithaca College in New York.

Lemieux is a member of the Chesapeake Youth Symphony Orchestra of Annapolis, led by Julien Benichou, and the Academy of St. Cecilia's Youth Orchestra at Damascus United Methodist Church in Damascus, Md., conducted by the Reverend Walter Edmonds. She has appeared with the Prince George's Philharmonic, the Washington ProMusica Orchestra, the Maryland Summer Center for the Arts Orchestra and the Maryland All-state Band. This past year she played under band director Sally Wagner at Eleanor Roosevelt High School.

Lemieux will attend the Baltimore School for the Arts next fall. She has been a semi-finalist for the last three years at the National Trumpet Competition. which is led by Dr. Dennis Edelbrook of George Mason Universi-"I was very happy to win on the day after my 15th birthday," Lemieux said. "I didn't expect to receive a prize at this level with so many accomplished players in the competition. The whole ITG conference was great, with recitals and concerts all day and night. It was very fun."

Awards were announced on Saturday, June 10 at the ITG conference banquet.
