City Council Disposes of Mixed Agenda at Its July 10 Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Greenbelt City Council took place on Monday, July 10.

Among the smaller but no less significant announcements was the news that Mayor Judith Davis had been reelected to the board of the Maryland Municipal League. Also the council thanked all who made the July 4th Independence Day events a success despite the rainstorm earlier during that day.

Meals on Wheels

The mayor and councilmembers welcomed Don Byrd, director of Meals on Wheels. Davis presented Byrd with a check for \$600 made out to Meals on Wheels. Greenbelt residents participate and benefit from the nonprofit program which is located in College Park.

In accepting the check on Monday, Byrd shared samples of his food, anecdotes of his clients and examples of his dedication to Meals on Wheels. Volunteers, especially drivers, are needed for any number of days a month that could be donated.

P&J Coalition

Doug Love and Bill Orleans, both Greenbelt residents, presented a petition to the city. Speaking for the Peace and Justice Coalition, they wanted to update the city on Peace Month celebrations. Love and Orleans, members of Prince George's United for Peace and Justice, requested the city consider its members' concerns on a number of political and justice issues.

Thanking the coalition, Davis accepted their petition requesting that the city express to NASA the urgency of allowing NASA scientists to speak freely, especially on global warming. The mayor said while no action could be taken that night, council would have to investigate how best to broach this topic with NASA.

Museum Year

In recognition of the 100th anniversary of the American Association of Museums, 2006 has been declared the "Year of the Museum." The Greenbelt Museum is part of this celebration, which coincides with its successful fundraising to fulfill its commitment to a challenge grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Stephen Oetken, president of Friends of the Greenbelt Museum, received a proclamation signed by Davis calling upon "all

our citizens to experience, celebrate and support the Greenbelt Museum and to participate in the wide variety of programs offered by the Friends of the Greenbelt Museum."

Oetken accepted the proclamation and remembered former volunteer and Greenbelt pioneer Lucille Howell who died in June. He said she had been an inspiration to Oetken and many others in Greenbelt.

Davis suggested the museum might consider celebrating May 18 every year as Museum Day, with activities to match.

Playground, Skatepark

City Manager Michael McLaughlin provided documents relating to an application for upgrading two playgrounds in Greenbelt East, one at 8301 Canning Terrace, the other at 7128 Ora Glen Court. A letter from Derek Thompson, president of the Windsor Green Home Owners' Association, was sent to Program Open Space in the Department of Natural Resources in Annapolis. The city supported the association's request for \$34,257 for the Canning Terrace Playground

he has held since 1987. Before that he served eight years in the Maryland House of Delegates where he became the voungest person to be elected speaker. Cardin has received the endorsements of numerous state elected officials led by 5th District Congressman Steny Hoyer and Maryland Senate President Mike Miller. He also is reported to have a sizeable amount of cam-

Mfume, who was once a five-Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), is believed to have strong support among African Americans who reportedly constitute some 40 percent of those registered as Democrats. While Mfume now leads in some of the polls, pundits believe that could change when Cardin begins advertising. Issues that might be raised relate to Mfume's troubled youth, after which he turned himself around and obtained an education and success. Also, while Mfume did a good job of raising funds and returning the NAACP to good financial health, his departure from that organization was under a cloud that has never been clearly discussed. Mfume has many endorsements including the strong support of Prince George's County Executive Jack

Museum Members Celebrate Meeting NEH Challenge

In December 2003 the Greenbelt Museum received a Special Initiative for Local History Challenge Grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH). This challenge grant helped the museum raise \$100,000 over a three-year period. As a matching grant, every dollar the museum raised was matched by the NEH, up to \$100,000, resulting in a \$200,000 endowment. This endowment will be used to pay the salary of an education/volunteer coordinator for the museum.

The fundraising efforts were divided into one-year goals - raising \$40,000 in 2004 and \$30,000 in both 2005 and 2006. Each year the museum met its goal, exceeding the final goal by over \$3,000. This ambitious fundraising endeavor for the museum has expanded its fundraising and programming abilities.

On July 10 the city's Director of Planning and Community Development Celia Craze, sent a memorandum to Greenbelt City Manager Michael McLaughlin advising him that the city has permitted and is now inspecting grading work on the South Core of Greenbelt Station, the former A.H. Smith sand and gravel operation property. Greenbelt Station is the projected mall and housing development in Greenbelt West. The South Core is on the east side of the Metro tracks between the Metro Station and Greenbelt

In the memorandum Craze provides a history of the city's earlier problems in obtaining county enforcement of previous grading work. At that time the property lay outside Greenbelt's corporate limits. It has been recently annexed.

Since its annexation this project is finally under city authority and subject to its sediment and erosion control enforcement. Previously that had not been the

History

Starting in August 2004, the developers of Greenbelt Station began the grading and reclamation of wash ponds and spoils stockpiles on the site of the former A.H. Smith property, purchased by Greenbelt Station in early 2000. The reclamation activity consisted of removal of concrete spoils and filling of large pools of water which had been sand and gravel wash ponds.

When Greenbelt Station initially started work, sediment and erosion control measures were sparingly installed. A sediment

Looking for Beauty In the Woodlands

"Get outside and appreciate the beauty around you," the News Review reminded us recently. Get a guidebook on birds, trees, flowering plants, reptiles or mammals and a pair of binoculars. Woodlands are more than plants – they are a vast complex, connected layer upon layer, a myriad of living organisms on a geological strata.

Look now for birds – right now a breeding population but soon to be migratory – passing through, wintering and resident. Do you know about the precipitous drop in migrating warbler populations? Once the woodlands literally vibrated with their songs and movement. Now the woods are almost silent – not because of pesticides but habitat destruction.


Know as you walk the forest litter teems with creatures marking your passage – shrew, voles, moles, mice, toads, frogs, snakes (hog-nosed and black), worms, insects (bees, beetles and darkling beetles, jumping and wolf spiders), endangered salamanders and Eastern box turtles. In the canopy are squirrels – fox and flying (night) – and dead trees with woodpecker apartments.

Look closely at the furrowed bark of a tree – observe fungi, the web of a dwarf spider and spider webs glistening in the sun on an overhanging branch.

Who can name all these marvelous things before your eyes? Try – see a mosaic of leaves, of beautiful and marvelous beings waiting for you to find them and love them.

Bridge at Beaverdam Creek Is to Be Fixed

The State Highway Administration's Bridge Inspection and Remedial Engineering Division (BIRE) has arranged for the repair of the stone bridge over Beaverdam Creek on Edmonston Road (Md. 201) north of Cherrywood Lane. The work will maintain the historical integrity of the bridge, according to Cecil Kincaid, team leader.

The subcontractor assigned to make these repairs, 3-State Construction, will use existing and purchased masonry stones to repair the parapets. The purchased masonry stones will match the existing stones in aesthetics and material type.

3-State Construction will perform the majority of the masonry work by hand. BIRE has used this subcontractor on multiple historically-sensitive structures. The work for this project could begin in as early as six months.

After raising four children, she received an M.Ed. degree from the University of Maryland in 1970 and continued her teaching career with the Prince George's County public schools until her retirement in 1981.

She had been an active member at the churches she attended, including Calvary Baptist in N.W. Washington, First Baptist of Hyattsville and Wallace Presbyterian in Adelphi. For many years she was an active member of the Christian Women's Club as well as the Bishop method sew-

Her husband John W. Travis preceded her in death. Mrs. Travis is survived by her brother William A. Roemer of Ocean Springs, Miss.; sons John, Jr., of Waldorf and Jeffrey and Michael of Greenbelt; daughter Genevieve Wheeler of Takoma Park; grandson Troy Travis, two granddaughters Debora Fitzgerald and Kathleen DeCampos; seven greatgrandchildren; and many friends.





upgrade and \$29,229 for the Ora Glen Playground.

Dr. Thompson's cover letter to Program Open Space stated: "The Windsor Green HOA has entered into an easement agreement with the City of Greenbelt whereby the public is granted access to playgrounds in our community. In exchange for this easement, the city has agreed to bring the playgrounds up to current standards and perform routine maintenance and inspections."

Other Business

Over the weekend the city received permits for the skatepark to be built next to the Community Center. McLaughlin announced that ground breaking would take place on July 17.

On another congratulatory note, John Shea, who assists City Solicitor Robert Manzi on city legal work, has been elected president of the Maryland Municipal Attorneys Association.

and erosion control plan, grading plan or permit had not been filed. Immediately the city's inspection personnel made inquiries of county inspectors, who issued a violation notice and placed a stop-work order on the site.

These actions, however, were subsequently rescinded following intervention by the director of the Prince George's County Department of Environmental Resources (DER), who had approved a sixmonth temporary permit according to Craze. Although city staff met with the DER director to explain its objection to the county's relaxed regulatory approach to the active grading at this site, the work continued.

State Intervention

In response, the city contacted state inspectors, who intervened. The state officials required that Greenbelt Station file a Sediment and Erosion control plan and obtain a county grading permit. On November 5, 2004, a consent order was executed between the state and Greenbelt Station setting forth violations committed by Greenbelt Station, agreeing upon remedial actions and levying a fine.

On November 12, 2004, the Prince George's County Soil Conservation District approved the Sediment and Erosion control plan for the site, and on March 2005, the Department of Environmental Resources issued a grading permit.

Forced Compliance

The city's appeal to State of Maryland officials was heeded and Greenbelt Station was forced into compliance. While officials were determining how to respond to the violation, city inspectors were excluded from site meetings though kept apprised of the state's actions.

Ultimately sediment and erosion control devices were installed, regular inspections conducted and appropriate regulatory actions taken.

Craze's report concludes that the site is now under the control of the city's inspection personnel and that the site is in compliance. The city's sediment and erosion control program is audited by the state on a regular basis, as it has final authority.

Challengers

Three other candidates, and possibly a fourth, could affect the outcome of the race and one could possibly become the winner. All are expected to take more votes away from Cardin than from Mfume.

Josh Rales has undertaken an early and extensive television advertising campaign. Born in Pittsburgh, he grew up in Bethesda and obtained a law degree from Georgetown Law School. In 1984 he founded RFI Associates, a real estate investment company. Its success has apparently enabled him to finance his election campaign. He has not previously held elective office.

Dennis Rasmussen of Essex, the former Baltimore County executive and now the principal in a successful lobbying firm, has received past support from many of the same constituents as Cardin. He also once served in the Maryland House and Senate.

Allan Lichtman, with a Ph.D. from Harvard and 30 years as an educator and now a professor and former chair of the History Department at American University, is a well-known political commentator on television and in newspapers. Like Rales, this Montgomery County resident has never held elective office.

The fourth person who could impact the race is a political unknown with a famous Maryland political surname. Mike Schaefer of Baltimore is the president of an investment firm, a legal writer, a tobacco farmer and a former prosecuting attorney and city councilmember. Schaefer claims to have come in second in a 1986 U.S. Senate primary with little expenditure because he has the same surname as former governor and now State Comptroller William Donald Schaefer, who is no relation. He now expects to win this primary because of his last name.

Another candidate with an interesting background, although little known to most Maryland Democrats, is David Dickerson of Cockeysville. With a bachelor's degree from Loyola College, a masters in international marketing from Johns Hopkins and a doctorate from Cambridge University in England plus a specialty in weapon's instruction as an Air Force reservist, he has had a varied career in international marketing and airline security. He is an adjunct professor with Hawaii Pacific University and has taught and conducted research throughout Asia. He is a published author on engineering change and crosscultural business strategies.

Another professorial candidate is James H. Hutchinson who has been a practicing physician and psychiatric consultant for 35 years. He is an adjunct professor at Georgetown University and resides in Montgomery County.

Other Democratic candidates who have filed without known websites are George T. English of Montgomery County, Anthony Jarworski of Montgomery County, Robert A. Kaufman of Baltimore, Thomas McCaskill of Fort Washington. Bob Robinson of Havre de Grace, Theresa C. Scaldaferri of Prince George's County, Charles Ulysses Smith of Baltimore, Blaine Taylor of Towson, Joseph Werner of Harford County and Lih Young of Montgomery County.

Republicans

Lieutenant Governor Michael

S. Steele, considered to be the only viable Republican candidate for the U.S. Senate on the ballot, is being challenged by seven others. A resident of the Landover Hills area of Prince George's County, he has the distinction of being the first African American to hold a statewide elective office in Maryland. He was elected lieutenant governor in 2002 when Robert Ehrlich was elected governor. He holds a degree in international relations from Johns Hopkins University and a law degree from Georgetown University. For three years he studied to be a Catholic priest but decided instead to become a lawyer. As one, he specialized in financial investments for Wall Street underwriters, product liability litigation and other corporate matters. He founded his own business and legal consulting firm, the Steele Group. Raised in a Democratic family, he became a Republican at an early age. Before becoming lieutenant governor he had been chair of the Prince George's Central Committee, a delegate to national party conventions and in 2000 chair of the Maryland Republican Party.

Challengers

Two of the most unique candidates for the Senate are challenging Steele. Ray Bly is the owner of an appliance shop in Hyattsville and a resident of Howard

County. According to his website, he has been convicted of child abuse, assault and battery of a minor and a fourth degree sexual offense involving his stepdaughter, a minor. However, he contends his innocence because his step-daughter is actually dead and the person he is accused of assaulting is not a minor but an alien instead.

Daniel Vovak is on the ballot with the nickname "Wig Man" between his first and last names. He has been contesting this with the Maryland Board of Elections and in court because he contends it should be "The Wig Man." He got this nickname in an article written by John DiStaso for the New Hampshire Union Leader when he spoke there about political philosophy during the Third Party national conference but his website does not explain how the nickname came about. Although he states that he has a residence in Rockville much of his political activity has been in Ohio and Illinois. By profession he is a ghost writer and president of Greenwich Public Relations. Vovak claims to be the founder of Gangs for Change, an organization to overthrow incumbents in Maryland, although he has endorsed Ehrlich for governor.

Other Republican candidates include Thomas J. Hampton, a corporate controller/accountant and life-long Maryland resident from Severna Park who advocates


reforming the political process and transforming the Chesapeake Bay. John Kimble, a 30-year resident advocates bringing the troops home to protect the country's southern border from the invasion of illegal immigrants. Corrogan Vaughn, who grew up in Baltimore, was an airline pilot laid off after 9/11 and is now a small businessman, co-host of two radio shows and a deacon at Sharon Baptist Church who has attended Baptist national meetings.

Republican candidates without known websites are Earl S. Gordon of Montgomery County, Edward Raymond Madej of Pasadena, Daniel Muffoletto of Ellicott City and Richard Shawver of Sykesville.

MVA Makes Changes To Combat Fraud

Due to an unprecedented increase in fraudulent cases of individuals applying for driver's licenses and identification cards, the Maryland Motor Vehicle Administration (MVA) announced it has completed and filed emergency regulations to strengthen and protect the integrity of the Maryland driver's license and identification card. In 2003, 146 cases of fraudulent documents were handled by the MVA. Last year, over 515 cases of fraudulent documents were handled, a 233 percent increase.

Along with the tightening of accepted documents, the MVA is also recommending the use of additional documents, not currently accepted as identification or proof of residency, to make the process more amenable for Maryland residents.

The proposed emergency regulations also mark the administration's first significant effort to come into compliance with the requirements of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security and the Federal REAL ID Act, which requires all motor vehicle administrations nationwide to use only those documents that can either be authenticated or verified when issuing driver's licenses or identification cards.
