Local Citizens Join Discussion On Public Safety Concerns

The Greenbriar Community Building was the August 28 site of the first of two public forums on public safety concerns and solutions for the vicinity of Roosevelt Center, Gardenway and the Spellman Overpass. This forum and the second one, to be held on September 15 at the Municipal Building, are being jointly conducted by the city's Community Relations Advisory Board, Public Safety Advisory Committee and Youth Advisory Committee at the request of council.

The backdrop for the two forums is lingering concern regarding crime and antisocial behavior occurring in and around Roosevelt Center and recent heightened public concern following an assault on a local resident near the intersection of Crescent and Gardenway

As reflected in recent letters to the editor published in the News Review, a major focus of public concern is the access that the Gladys Spellman Overpass may provide to fleeing assailants or other wrongdoers.

Although the Greenbelt Police Department's increased presence in the Roosevelt Center area this summer has brought some relief, council requested the advisory committees to schedule the forums to gather information from concerned citizens, to evaluate the extent of public safety issues in the area, specifically including Greenbelt East on the east end of the overpass and to develop recommendations for possible solutions to address these concerns.

The Greenbriar forum was well organized, well attended and efficiently conducted. The attendees were welcomed by Silke Pope, chair of the Public Safety Advisory Committee (PSAC). Pope also introduced the moderators of the forum, Mary Crawford of the PSAC and Kevin Hammett of the Community Relations Advisory Board (CRAB). In addition to Pope and Crawford, PSAC members Cindy Comproni, Bill Holland and Luis Vazques also attended. Attending CRAB members included Scott Legendre, the Reverend Dan Hamlin, Dea Zugby, Rick Ransom and Janet Parker. Crawford noted that while no Youth Advisory Committee members were present, they have been active in planning for the forums.

Crawford indicated the procedures to be followed for the forum and urged everyone to be courteous and respectful of those wishing to speak.

The moderators also indicated

cil. He has been a resident of Greenbelt for 40 years, living in Springhill Lake, Charlestowne North, Windsor Green and recently in Greenbrook. He was born in Hazelton, Pa., and grew up in Baltimore.

Putens has been employed by the federal government for 35 years and has received many awards and commendations. For the past 20 years he has worked for the Food and Drug Administration. Putens previously served in a variety of senior management and staff positions for the Department of Labor, Office of Personnel Management and U.S. Postal Service.

Putens has taken a leading role to improve police protection and crime prevention. He has for many years advocated the revitalization of Springhill Lake and other property west of Kenilworth Avenue, in part to improve public safety. The council earlier supported his initiative to use video cameras in strategic areas in the city and to place two School Resource Officers in Greenbelt schools for security. He previously led the successful efforts to have a traffic light installed at Greenbelt and Mandan Roads and a guardrail installed at Eleanor Roosevelt High School.

He proposed the city's new Public Safety Advisory Committee, as well as the Advisory Committee on Education (ACE). Putens also successfully initiated the Four Cities Coalition among Greenbelt, College Park, New Carrollton and Berwyn Heights

Board of Education members Rosalind Johnson (District 1: Greenbelt, Berwyn Heights/New Carrollton), Heather Ilis (District 2: College Park) and at large members Ron Watson and Donna Hathaway Beck will attend.

The coalition, composed of Greenbelt, Berwyn Heights, New Carrollton and College Park officials, have prepared an agenda that will facilitate discussion centering on the status of Greenbelt Middle School, particularly with respect to the amount of new construction versus renovation.

Concern about school capacity in Berwyn Heights, College Park

Café to Consider Closing At September 16 Meeting

With debts amounting to nearly \$100,000, the board of directors of the New Deal Café will consider a motion to declare bankruptcy at a meeting scheduled for Sunday, September 16 at 7:30 p.m. (see advertisement on page 3). This is not the only choice the board will ask members to consider but unless a way can be found to raise needed money and put the cooperative Café on a sound financial footing, bankruptcy could be the only feasible choice for the membership.

Board President Peter May

told the News Review Tuesday night that this summer's sales have been really slow in spite of the boost received over Labor Day weekend and from special Café events. The additional space added to the Café in 2005 has not resulted in sufficient added revenues to pay for the increased costs, he said. In spite of good weekends, the Café needs to be better utilized during the week.

May was appreciative of the






Senior Softballers Win Record Slugfest



ANY REGISTERED GREENBELT VOTER MAY CHOOSE TO VOTE ABSENTEE

This is the second municipal election in which any qualified voter of the City of Greenbelt may choose to vote by absentee ballot in municipal elections. There is no longer any need to present an excuse for why you wish to be absent from your polling place on Election Day.

The purpose of the change is to give an additional option to voters and make it easier to vote in City elections. If you prefer to come to your polling place on Election Day, meet up with your neighbors, talk with the candidates, and use a voting machine, you may still do so, just as before. But if you prefer to vote early, or if you like the idea of voting by mail or using a paper ballot instead of a voting machine, you now have more choices. Just be sure to vote. No more excuses!

First, request a ballot in one of two ways. Each individual requesting a ballot must submit a separate, signed application form or letter.

- Fill out an application form that you may 1) pick up in the City Clerk's office, 2) request from the City Clerk by phone at 301-474-8000 or by e-mail at kgallagher@greenbeltmd.gov, or 3) print from the City's Web site at http://www.greenbeltmd.gov; or
- Write a letter of application to the City Clerk, 25 Crescent Road, including your full name, domicile address in Greenbelt, signature, and telephone number.

Military service members, their families, and other U.S. citizens abroad who are covered under the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act may also use the Federal Post Card Application (http://www.fvap.gov) to request an absentee ballot for City election.

Applications to receive absentee ballots will be received from Wednesday, October 17, until noon on Monday, November 5, 2007. The completed ballot must be received by the City Clerk no later than 6 p.m. the day of the regular election, November 6, 2007. No absentee ballots will be distributed prior to October 17.

Return your executed absentee ballot by 1) sending it through the U.S. mail in time to arrive by November 6, 2) hand-delivering it to the City Clerk's office, or 3) placing it in the locked drop-box at the east door of the Municipal Building at 25 Crescent Road. the Safety Committee's interest in approaching the topic from a citywide perspective and that following the forums the three advisory groups would jointly prepare a report for submission to council.

Probably the most important rule established for the forums was that the format would focus on hearing comments from residents. The advisory groups themselves would be listening, they stressed. The moderators noted that no Greenbelt Police would be in attendance and that advisory committee members would not try to answer questions.

Speakers were given the option of providing their names and each speaker could take up to five minutes for their commentary. In addition the advisory groups welcomed any written comments that residents wished to submit.

Testimony

Early in the forum, one speaker's comments elicited support and applause from portions of the audience. After a reminder from Crawford that the audience should refrain from demonstrations, no others took place for the remainder of the meeting.

Spellman Overpass

As expected most speakers addressed the safety of the Spellman Overpass. Nevertheless a variety of viewpoints emerged concerning the role of the overpass in increased levels of crime and the range of solutions to the problem. No one called for outright closure of the overpass.

Several speakers supported a gate for the overpass and its possible restriction for use during certain hours of the night (generally from about midnight to about six a.m.). Other speakers urged no restrictions on the use of the overpass but offered suggestions for making its use more friendly, such as improved lighting, camera surveillance, a call-box and clearing of vegetation near its approaches.

The public forum brought out several Greenbelt East residents and others who generally testified that the overpass gets undue blame for crime in the area. Residents of several subdivisions in Greenbelt East noted that their neighborhoods, far removed from the overpass, experience unwelcome levels of crime and vandalism.

In addition several Greenbelt East residents noted the great value of the overpass to them and their neighborhoods in allowing access to the array of public facilities in the Center.

Several Greenbelt bikers argued that the overpass was critical for bicycle access from either side and much safer than having to use Greenbelt Road (Rt. 193). One speaker related his experience as a Goddard Space Flight Center employee. Goddard is a 24/7 operation and employees bike to and from work making use of the overpass at all hours of the day and night.

The victim of the assault that occurred near Roosevelt Center testified in favor of the installation of surveillance cameras, a call box and late night gate closure for the overpass but lamented that "the gate proposal has created such controversy and he resents the efforts to mischaracterize the overpass objections. It is not about conflicts between neighborhoods; it is about public safety."

Gardenway Experiences

The public forum also provided an outlet for residents in the Gard-

enway neighborhood closest to the Center approach to the overpass to vent their concerns and experiences with crimes in the area. These residents signed up to speak about the day-to-day vandalism, intimidation and unruly behavior they put up with from mainly young people either using the overpass or hanging out in the nearby woods or playground area.

Vandalism included slit tires, broken car windows and destruction of planted landscaping. The experience of these speakers was generally that the overpass was being abused by the "kids" and they were most interested in better police presence in the area and better police response to citizens calls regarding unruly behavior. The descriptions of the behavior by the young people were very vivid, with one speaker attesting to sexual acts being performed at the playground adjacent to their homes.

Some from the neighborhood called for the removal or relocation of the playground.

Residents living close to the overpass approach at Gardenway also suggested that the National Park Service be called upon to address some issues within their area of responsibility; namely, repair of the breaks in the fence on either side of the overpass and the clearing of vegetation in areas near the overpass approaches. Speakers related eyewitness accounts of young people using the breaks in the fencing to cross the Baltimore-Washington Parkway at road level.

Near the end of the forum some speakers reiterated that more citizen involvement could help the situation. One speaker noted she has had no problem getting a response from the police and urged that the situation needs everyone working on solutions.

Larry Noda, a longtime resident of Greenbriar Phase I, close to the overpass, called for more responsiveness from the city's School Resource Officers. He, along with others, noted that when crime rates go down in areas, the interest in citizen involvement in crime watch organizations tends to go down.

The public forum ended after a little more than one hour. The participants continued to discuss the issues among themselves and with members of council who were in attendance, city administrative staff and Prince George's County State's Attorney Glenn Ivey, who was also in attendance.

to expand inter-city cooperation on issues and projects of common concern. Putens has taken a leading role on senior citizen concerns and initiated a Senior Task Force, which led to establishment of the permanent Senior Citizen Advisory Committee.

Until 1993 Putens was the only councilmember living in Greenbelt East and he has worked actively with the Greenbelt East Advisory Committee (GEAC), which he co-founded. He was an original member of the Windsor Green Board of Directors and served on its board for eight years. He is currently a member of the Greenbrook Estates Board of Directors.

Prior to his council service, Putens was chairman of the Community Relations Advisory Board, which developed the proposal to establish a city-wide crime prevention program and led eventually to the current Public Safety Advisory Committee. He has been active at different times in a variety of community organizations, including Greenbelt Consumer Co-op, Friends of the Greenbelt Museum, Greenbelt Arts Center and the Eleanor and Franklin Roosevelt Democratic Club. He was an active participant in the Greenbelt Boys and Girls Club programs when his two children were young.

While on the city council, Putens has served on numerous county, state and national committees to represent Greenbelt's interests. He is the past chair of the Small Cities Council of the National League of Cities and has also served on numerous other committees. He is also a member of the regional Washington Metropolitan Council of Governments (COG), Prince George's County Municipal Association and the Maryland Municipal League. He currently serves on the COG Human Resources and Public Safety Policy Committee, which he previously chaired and was a member of its Transportation Planning Board.

Putens is a graduate of the University of Maryland, where he earned his degree in microbiology, and was a member of the university's lacrosse team. While attending college, he was employed in various research capacities for medical and research development companies and coauthored several patents dealing with minimizing air pollutants.

efforts of Friends of the New Deal Café Art which helps support the cooperative by renting space in it for the display of art and by organizing special events to bring patrons to the venue.

Since the board announced in May that it was facing financial difficulties, substantial donations have been made. Some \$10,000 has been raised, May said. That still falls far short of what is needed to resolve the organization's finances.

The sale of beer and wine is some help but May noted that less than 10 percent of the Café's sales are for alcoholic products. While all the approvals have been obtained for permitting beer and wine sale on the patio, capital expenditures must be made to accomplish this. New furniture needs to be put there and a required fence to separate the area from the rest of the mall needs to be installed. May said that at one time a donor was lined up to buy the furniture and another to install the fence.

New Board

In February board elections resulted in three new members for the five member board. One board member was defeated for reelection and two others had decided to leave the board. May became president at that time.

The position of manager was also vacant at the time of election. Since then Joel Moodie has been hired as the manager. Moodie has prepared for the board a business plan which May would like to see implemented. It requires the consolidation and refinancing of existing outstanding debt and the installation of a new kitchen. To do the latter would require closing the Café for at least a month.

Being a cooperative has made it difficult for the Café to borrow money, May said. Lenders have required its loans to be cosigned.

The Café's air conditioner has broken down four times during the summer, May said. Air conditioning is the Café's responsibility, not the building owner's. Also, the largest refrigerator broke down last week and must

and the Greenbelt area is also up for discussion, specifically dealing with the capacity of the proposed new middle school, the impact of potential development and redevelopment in Greenbelt West and the framework for on-going coordination and cooperation between the school board and the coalition. Still another agenda item calls for an update on discussions held with AIMCO relating to the proposed redevelopment of Springhill Lake.

The coalition also requests an update on the International Baccalaureate Program at Greenbelt Middle School, where seventh and eighth grade students come from Greenbelt and Berwyn Heights. Sixth graders from Springhill Lake also attend the middle school.

According to Judith Austin, principal of Greenbelt Middle School, the International Baccalaureate Program, an expansion of the international program, requires an application. She noted that the program "offers a holistic approach to learning and to recognizing the relationship between school subjects and the world. It is designed to combine relevant knowledge, experiences and critical thinking to solve problems."

Another concern is the need and commitment for an addition at Eleanor Roosevelt High School where more temporary classrooms have been added. Funding which had been planned several years ago for an addition at Roosevelt was transferred to DuVal High School. That construction has now been completed.

Heater Recall May Affect Some GHI Homes

On August 30 the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, in cooperation with Berko Electric, now known as Marley Engineered Products of Bennettsville, S.C., announced a voluntary recall of about 84,000 Toe-Space Electric Heaters that are typically installed in kitchens and bathrooms at floor level in the recessed space under cabinets. If the fan stops working and the heater continues to run, the unit can overheat, posing a fire hazard.

The recall includes Berko Electric catalog numbers TS, TS-1 and TS-1A and Emerson Electric "Chromalox Comfort Heating" and "Environmental Products" catalog number KSH2000. The heater is controlled by a wall thermostat or a thermostat mounted on the front of the heater. The heater has a removable black metal grille that measures 23-1/2 inches wide and 3-1/2 inches tall with five sets of openings, each with seven horizontal louvers.

week out – at the editing desk of this paper. So it was a true pleasure to hear her name called out by committee chair Bob Zugby – The Outstanding Citizen for 2007: Barbara Likowski.

More about that in a moment. Let's look at some of her history that Zugby recounted. She had an early start in newspaper work, beginning with her high school newspaper in Plymouth, Pa. She was following in her father's footsteps, since, as a high school teacher, he chose his extra-curricular activity advising the school newspaper, teaching journalism the first semester.

But she veered away, taking a degree in sociology and later working with children as a social worker in Scranton, Detroit and Philadelphia.

Greenbelt

Since 1966 when she and her husband the late Julius Likowski came to Greenbelt, she has lived in the same GHI house on Hillside Road, where she raised two children, Alex and Betsy.

During most of the years since then, until her retirement, she worked as a substitute teacher in Greenbelt Elementary School and taught the prototype after-school program there under a grant from the Casey Foundation for children at risk.

Much of her volunteer work has also been devoted to children's needs. She taught Sunday School classes at her church and led a local Brownie troop. She was a member of the PTA in the schools her children attended and a Girl Scout volunteer. In another context she was a charter member of both the Eleanor and Franklin Roosevelt Democratic Club and Citizens for Greenbelt.

But in 1971 she joined those of us already working as staff mem-

NOTICE OF CHARTER AMENDMENT RESOLUTIONS

At its regular meeting of August 13, 2007, the City Council adopted two resolutions to amend the City Charter. As required by state law, these resolutions will be posted in their entirety for 40 days, until September 22, at the Municipal Building, as well as on the City's Web site at www.greenbeltmd.gov. Copies may also be requested of the City Clerk. Each charter amendment will become effective on October 2, 2007, unless a proper petition to submit the amendment to the voters on a referendum is filed as permitted by law. This notice is given to provide fair summaries of the two resolutions, as also required by state law.

Charter Amendment Resolution No. 2007-1

A Resolution . . . to Amend the Charter of the City of Greenbelt . . . by Amending Section 31, Titled "Election of Council" to Clarify a Certain Requirement for Holding a Runoff Election: Section 31 of the City Charter lays out a number of situations in which a runoff election would be required to determine which candidates had properly been elected to the City Council. It indicates that if fewer than five candidates receive the required minimum number of votes (equal to 40% or more of the number of voters voting in the election), a runoff must be held. The amendment to the charter specifies that this would apply only if more than five candidates are running. In a case where only five candidates were running, no runoff would be required if not all five receive the minimum number of votes.

Charter Amendment Resolution No. 2007-2

A Resolution . . . to Amend the Charter of the City of Greenbelt . . . to Empower the City Council to Require Reporting of Contributions and Expenditures Made for the Purpose of Furtherance of or Opposition to Any Ballot Question: Section 21 of the City Charter empowers the City Council to provide for the reporting of contributions and expenditures made either in support of or in opposition to the nomination and election of candidates running for City Council. The amendment to the charter would also allow the City Council to require similar reporting of expenditures for made in support of or opposition to any issue, principal or proposition submitted to the voters as a ballot question at an election. It is noted that this is enabling legislation only. It does not legislate a requirement for such reporting. It authorizes the Council to require such reporting if Council later chooses to take action to do so
