Terry Kucera, Solar Physicist, Bicycles to Work at Goddard

The lights dimmed. The members of the Greenbelt Astronomical Society settled back to hear a presentation on "STEREO." Dr. Terry Kucera, solar astronomer and physicist, handed out 3-D glasses. Yes, she indicated, some of the slides will be in 3-D. From the enthusiasm in her voice as she discussed the mission and answered the many questions, it was obvious that it was a topic that she loved and was happy to share with others.

Greenbelt resident Terry Kucera is an internationallyknown solar physicist and is the deputy project scientist for solar spacecraft missions with NASA at Goddard Space Flight Center. STEREO, her current major mission, stands for Solar TErritorial RElations Observatory. The mission involves two space-based observatories that were launched in 2006 and are in orbit around the sun in such a way that the pictures they send of the sun from space can form a three-dimensional view for scientists to use in their research. Contrary to what non-scientists might think, Kucera commented

that she spends much of her day in front of a computer, not with a telescope scanning the skies.

While working on a different mission - SOHO - Kucera was part of a panel discussion on National Public Radio's Science Friday. "New Explorations of the Solar System" was the topic and she discussed her mission SOHO – the SOlar and Heliospheric Observatory. With both missions she was involved with prelaunch activities. Now that all spacecraft are operational, she can concentrate on studying the pictures and data that are being transmitted back to earth.

She has had a chance to work with scientists from a number of countries and has visited Japan as well as several European countries to work on space projects. Kucera described her most recent trip. "The last place I went was Bern, Switzerland. That's the former home of Albert Einstein, so like a good bunch of physicists, most of us trooped out to see his old apartment which is now a museum."

Kucera is involved with Solar Week (http://solarweek.org/), which is a group effort to encourage students, especially middleschool students and especially girls, to get interested in science. On the site are brief biographies of a number of scientists including Kucera. The next Solar Week is March 17 through 21 and students and teachers can participate interactively through the website. Topics include the sun as a star, solar close-ups and

3-Day Event Commemorates Heritage of the New Deal

"America's New Deal Heritage" is the theme for the 75th commemoration of the New Deal accomplishments of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt's administration. Under that title the Library of Congress (LOC) and the National New Deal Preservation Association (NNDPA) are co-sponsoring a three-day event March 12 to 14 to celebrate a historical period that transformed our country following the Great Depression in the early 1930s when less than half the workforce was employed full-time.

President Roosevelt's New Deal programs in 1933 created the economic stimulus that focused on jobs and the nation's infrastructure. It began with a three-month-long special congressional session known as the "Hundred Days." Legislation passed during this time addressed plummeting agricultural prices, chaos in the banking and financial industries, mortgage foreclosures, and unemployment.

The latter brought forth the famous New Deal programs of the Civilian Conservation Corps, the National Recovery Administration and the Public Works Administration. The resulting public institutions – schools, libraries, post offices, parks, murals and public art – are a lasting legacy of the New Deal.

Later, a second spate of legislation brought forth union protec-Act and programs to aid tenant farmers and migrant workers. Although the goal of the New Deal was to use the power of the federal government to lift the country out of the Depression, the long-term effect was to set a precedent for Washington's involvement in the economic and social affairs of the nation.

Greenbelt is one of three greentowns" constructed by FDR's New Deal administration. The building of Greenbelt served to create jobs for thousands of unemployed workers and provided much-needed housing for lowand moderate-income families. The 1.600 homes that comprise Greenbelt Homes, Inc., as well as the walkways, underpasses, Roosevelt Center and the Community Center, are all a living legacy of the New Deal.

On Wednesday, March 12 the NNDPA is sponsoring a bus tour which will begin in Washington, D.C., with a stop at the Department of the Interior to view New Deal murals and the FDR Memorial; the tour will then proceed to Beltsville for a historical overview of the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center. The trip will end in Greenbelt for tours of the Greenbelt Museum and its surroundings.

On the afternoon of March 13 the LOC will host a series of workshops on the unique, primary documentation created by New Deal programs. LOC staff will discuss and display a selection

City Council Moves Quickly Through a Light Agenda

In a sort of "calm before the storm" atmosphere, the Greenbelt City Council went quickly through a fairly light agenda at its regular meeting on Monday, February 25. Most of the meeting time of just over an hour and a half was about equally divided between three topics: a visit from Verizon FiOS representatives with an update on construction of their fiber optic system in Greenbelt East neighborhoods, state and county legislation and administrative reports from individual councilmembers and the city manager on activities since the last meeting. (Councilmember Konrad Herling, recovering from minor surgery, was unable to attend the meeting.)

With hardly any discussion, council quickly disposed of two items of business on the formal agenda. The first was unanimous approval of a resolution authorizing acceptance of bond bill funds amounting to \$300,000 from the state legislature toward renovation of the historic Old Greenbelt Theatre. A provision of the bond bill requires that the city grant the Maryland Historical Trust a perpetual easement on the theater building before the city becomes eligible to receive the grant funds. Approval of the resolution allows the city staff to work with the trust in drafting an easement agreement for later council review.

City Manager Michael McLaughlin explained this scenario has been followed successfully with previous state-supported grant funding for renovations for such Greenbelt facilities as the Community Center and the Mother and Child statue in Roosevelt Center.

Also dispensed with quickly was a staff recommendation that





Grand National Jump Rope to costly fees of entering and Champion, sees the sport of jump rope as not only a great way to build good health practices but also as a unique way to build confidence and inspire dedication.

According to the team's website, the "goal is to offer a positive activity that teaches and develops rope jumping skills while promoting fitness, teamwork, building self-esteem, developing confidence and leadership skills, encouraging good sportsmanship while helping to advance the sport of Jump Rope."

"It's a good feeling to bring my love for the sport to the kids," Bradshaw said. She currently coaches 40 jumpers ranging from 6 to 50 years old.

The team attends at least five competitions a year; however, this is sometimes limited due traveling to and from competitions. Bradshaw plans to send qualifying jumpers to the regional tournament in Dumfries, Va., in April and the National Jump Rope Championships in Orlando, Fla., in June.

Jumpers compete in several styles of jump rope, including double-dutch, single-rope freestyle and routines as well as speed jumping.

After 17 years of coaching the Stars, Bradshaw may retire from coaching in three years so she can lend her support to her two sons, ages 7 and 12, who are becoming more interested in other sports as they get older.





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

of materials from their New Deal holdings including rare collections and under-utilized treasures.

Complementing the LOC programs on March 13 will be a panel discussion, "Electing FDR: The New Deal Campaign of 1932," at 7 p.m. at the National Archives and Records Administration in College Park.

On Friday, March 14 the LOC is sponsoring a free all-day symposium, "Art, Culture and Government." Scholars from around the country will present recent research on New Deal materials, primarily case studies that focus on the legacy of New Deal programs and its impact on American culture today. Registration is available on line on a first-come, first-served basis, at www.loc.gov/folklife/newdeal/index.html.

On Saturday, March 15 the National Archives in College Park is hosting a day-long free festival of films, "For a Better America: The New Deal on Film." Rare government-produced period documentary films catalog the thinking that went into many of the New Deal programs. Renowned filmmakers such as Pare Lorentz are featured. The Archives website at www.archives.gov.nae/news contains a list of films and times for showings.

"Many of the important public buildings constructed 75 years ago by the Public Works Administration are still being used today," commented Dr. Leighninger. "We need to remind people of the contributions of the New Deal and put public works back on the national agenda."

"We have reaped the benefits of the New Deal for 75 years,"

In celebrating the New Deal, the LOC points to the hallmarks of FDR's first 100 days in office - innovation, compassion, empowerment and the courage to change. "This nation asks for action," said FDR, "and action now. Our greatest primary task is to put people to work."

solar careers.

On the site Kucera describes how she became interested in space when she was 8 years old and can remember when the spacecraft Voyager passed Jupiter when she was in high school. She completed her undergraduate degree in physics at Carleton College in Northfield, Minn. Kucera obtained her Ph.D. in Astrophysical, Planetary and Atmospheric Sciences from the University of Colorado at Boulder.

"My actual thesis was centered on radio observations of solar flares. I was using data from ground-based radio telescopes like the Very Large Array in New Mexico. One of the reasons I decided to go into solar physics rather than 'night-time' astronomy was so I would not have to stay up all night observing!" It was while she was in school in Boulder that she took up bicycling.

Kucera, who lives in the historic part of Greenbelt, came to Goddard and the city in 1993 - almost 15 years ago. A friend who worked at Goddard told her she could bicycle to work if she lived in the city and that was all she needed to know. She can be found pedaling through town and down Greenbelt Road to Goddard most days. She met Jeff Travis, now her husband, in the Greenbelt Bicycle Coalition. He is an engineer, also at Goddard. Kucera finds time to practice her

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mandolin and volunteers at the New Deal Café. She likes to read and is happy she lives close to the library. Kucera enjoys cooking and is looking forward to the possibility of a farmers' market in Roosevelt Center this summer.

council authorize the city manager to sign an amendment to the city's deferred compensation plan with the International City Managers Association (ICMA) Retirement Corporation (RC) that would eliminate its management fee for the plan, currently amounting to approximately 0.29 percent of each employee participant's assets.

According to McLaughlin the action would achieve more than \$50,000 in savings for those participating in the plan. In return the agreement would commit the city to remain with the ICMA-RC plan for at least the next five years. A supporting memo noted that the city has been with ICMA-RC for 25 years.

Verizon FiOS Update

Concerns were raised during the petitions and requests portion of the council meeting of February 11 by Greenbelt East homeowners about construction work being done in their neighborhoods by Verizon contractors for their new fiber optic based FiOS system that includes high speed internet, telephone and entertainment services. Representatives of Verizon had been invited to provide an update on the project and to address residents' concerns.

Tara Potter, a Verizon consumer affairs representative, and Shawn Tittley, a Verizon technical representative for the project, reported on the project status and responded to questions. Potter expressed regret about the uneven start of the work by the contractor in Greenbelt East. She apologized for the lack of notice to the community regarding the project.

The affected homeowner associations (HOAs) were supposed to have received letters either from Verizon or the contractors; individual homeowners were supposed to have information door hangers distributed before construction began. This had not been done in a satisfactory manner.

Potter also advised council that an unfortunate incident also occurred during recent activities in the area when a COMCAST cable was accidentally severed by the contractor. She again apologized. She noted that in such cases the owner of the damaged line should have been notified immediately so that the owner could repair the line and be fully reimbursed by Verizon.

In this instance, she noted, the location of the COMCAST cable had been poorly marked. The Verizon representatives also expressed appreciation for getting an up-to-date listing of Greenbelt East from Greenbelt's Communications Director, Beverly Palau.

Members of council expressed appreciation for the update report from Verizon. They emphasized the importance of good communication with the HOAs and hoped that as the project proceeds Verizon would assure improved and timely communications. Council specifically urged that a community forum be scheduled on the project.

Sheldon Goldberg, a representative of the Windsor Green HOA, noted that he and others are also interested in the programming menu and the pricing ranges that would be available for FiOS. Potter indicated that residents could get information on programming by visiting www.verizon.com/fios. She noted that the project is now in the first phase to provide the necessary neighborhood infrastructure.

The second phase will be tak-

ing the cable service to individual homeowners. Verizon expects the project to take at least a year for all of Greenbelt; the work will progress from one neighborhood to the next as the infrastructure work proceeds.

To order service residents can call 888-553-1555 and for customer service, call 888-550-2244. Tittley assured Goldberg and council that Verizon and the contractors would restore any disturbed areas and will return to assure complete restoration.

Councilmember Leta Mach and others urged the Verizon representatives to make sure they contact Greenbelt Homes, Inc. before the work proceeds into Greenbelt Center because of the shared responsibility among the cooperative members and the GHI Corporation itself for work done within the cooperative. Council also noted an item that arose during the city's recent visioning process dealing with cooperation by utilities in coordinating work when areas are being disturbed so that the land involved might need to be disturbed only once.

State/County Legislation

With the Maryland general assembly in the middle of their 90-day session, council considered and took unanimous action in support of several pieces of state legislation.

Council first considered HB 927, a Prince George's County local bill dealing with zoning appeals. If passed, the bill would more tightly define who would be eligible to file an appeal of a final District Council zoning decision to the Circuit Court.

Current law allows "any person or taxpayer in Prince George's County" to file such an appeal. HB 927 would add the requirement that an individual or taxpayer be an "aggrieved party." Feeling that such legislation would unduly restrict affected Prince George's County residents to challenge bad zoning decisions, council voted unanimously to oppose the bill.

Although concerned about the potential impact on fund raising by local volunteer fire departments, council gave unanimous support for HB 1010/SB 685 that would prohibit a person from standing in a highway to solicit money or donations or to advertise a message.

Council also supported HB 682/SB 874, supported by the Community Associations Institute, that would make both the owner of a home foreclosed upon and the new owner jointly and severally liable for up to six months of condominium and homeowner association fees.

Council supported two bills recently introduced that could impact the progress of the Intercounty Connector (ICC). HB 1471 would amend the transportation section of the state budget by prohibiting the State Department of Transportation and the Maryland Transportation Authority from financing the ICC.

In addition council gave unanimous support to HB 1416, which would require the Maryland Department of Transportation and the Department of the Environment to conduct a study on the impact of the ICC project on greenhouse gas emissions, requiring the study to quantify specific costs attributable to the project, requiring a specified public comment period and making financing of the project contingent on the publication

and submission of the study to the governor and the General Assembly

These two bills and a possible third bill calling for a full assessment of the public health impacts of air pollution resulting from increased traffic generated by the ICC are being pushed by a coalition of environmental organizations. They have been introduced by Maryland delegates from various regions of the state.

Council also gave unanimous support to HB 712/SB 309 which would set ambitious goals for Maryland reduction in greenhouse gas emissions through 2050 in order to moderate the effects of climate change. The bill is similar to one supported by council last year. The legislation's main sponsor is Senator Paul Pinsky who represents Greenbelt in the Maryland Senate.

Council also gave unanimous support to a proposed County Bill 3-2008 that would create a new program to provide grants to nonprofit organizations or foundations, political subdivisions or individuals for the purpose of acquiring, preserving, restoring or rehabilitating historic properties. The program would provide grants up to \$100,000 and require at least a 10 percent match by the recipient. Council requested staff to propose an amendment to the

bill that would allow such grants to be awarded to cooperative organizations

Indian Creek

Council also took action on two items that were added to the agenda. Mayor Judith Davis introduced a topic relating to recently observed sedimentation affecting Indian Creek. She requested that council support a letter to the Maryland Department of the Environment describing significant new sediment pollution that may result from increased construction activity in the upper reaches of the Indian Creek watershed, specifically in the Beltsville/Laurel areas where new development is taking place. Council viewed a short film showing the introduction of sedimentation to the stream and agreed to send the letter to state officials.

Councilmember Edward Putens added a follow-up item dealing with recent concerns that the federal government seems to be pulling back support for the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC) and reducing needed funding for upkeep of the facilities and programs on the facility.

Council agreed with his suggestion that the city direct a letter to Congressman Steny Hoyer and other congressional representatives, urging them to assure funding that

would preserve the integrity of BARC and its important scientific mission.

In the absence of Councilmember Konrad Herling, the city's representative to the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments, McLaughlin noted that MWCOG has approved a Greenbelt grant request to provide funding for a Greenbelt area study on local transportation system needs. Davis noted that this item had been suggested by and championed by Herling. She congratulated him in absentia on the announcement of the MWCOG grant award.

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
