Budget 2009

Recreation Staff Presents Plan For Extensive, Varied Program

On May 7 the Greenbelt City Council met with the city manager and his staff from the Recreation Department to discuss the departmental budget. The entire city council was in attendance as well as members of the Recreation staff: Director Hank Irving, Assistant Director of Operations Joe McNeal, Assistant Director of Programs Julia McHale, Aquatic Center Director Steve Parks, Greenbelt Kids Supervisor Greg Varda, Arts Supervisor Nicole DeWald, Community Center Supervisor Di Quynn-Reno and Therapeutic Recreation Supervisor Karen Haseley. City Treasurer Jeff Williams and Assistant City Manager David Moran also were present.

The atmosphere was congenial as mostly the mayor and occasionally Councilmember Leta Mach lauded the Recreation Department for doing a wonderful job with the \$4,774,100 budgeted for Fiscal Year 2008. It was generally agreed that Greenbelt has a "top-notch" recreation department – likely one of the best in the state, offering extensive and varied programs.

Community Center

Each department was given a chance to review their accomplishments for the year and general plans for next year. The discussion began concerning the Community Center. Mayor Judith Davis wanted to know how many churches were holding meetings at the Community Center. The answer is three, with one Bible study group also meeting on Friday night. Councilmember Konrad Herling wondered if more time could be allotted in the Community Center for arts organizations.

In general council was curious to know whether it is possible to generate more revenue from rental of the Community Center space. It was agreed that certain space - specifically the kitchen rooms rental - could be increased. It was also agreed that Christmas Day and Thanksgiving Day should be evaluated to determine if usage warrants keeping the center open on those days.

The RecTrac Pass management system that has been used for years at the Youth and Community Center is migrating to the Aquatic and Fitness Center, which will help staff better serve users of these facilities and simplify registration. A web-based system is being implemented to allow users to go online and register for classes and events.

The budget manual provides an analysis of revenues and expenses of each department and the number of users. The adopted budget for 2008 for the Community Center saw the facil-

The Teacher of the Year Committee chair congratulated Case and commented that her nomination "served as a testament to the high degree of dedication and professionalism that you bring to your job."

Patrick Young of ERHS Is Posse Scholar for 2008

Because of a student who said he never would have dropped out of college if he had had his posse with him, a woman named Deborah Bial created "Posse," a program that identifies, recruits and trains dynamic urban public high school students. It then sends them to elite colleges and universities in multicultural teams or "posses."

Posse Scholars are awarded full-tuition, four-year scholarships from Posse partner colleges and universities. Such a student is Patrick Young, a senior at Eleanor Roosevelt High School (ERHS). As a 2008 Posse Scholar, he will be a freshman at Grinnell College

Young is one of 11 students from the D.C. metropolitan area who will attend Grinnell, the fourth "posse" to attend this liberal arts college in central Iowa. Posses from the D.C. area also attend Bucknell (Lewisburg, Penna.), Lafayette (Easton, Penna.) and Sewanee (Sewanee, Tenn.).

Young chose Grinnell because it has a SADD program and he is the current president of the ERHS chapter of this student-run organization. (SADD is "Students Against Destructive Decisions," formerly "Students Against Drunk Driving.")

In fact, Young's application essay for the Posse Foundation was entitled "How SADD Had an Effect on My Life," which he confesses he wrote that day. A member of SADD since the 9th grade, it's no wonder Young was able to write his piece so quickly and well.

Application Process

The Posse Foundation scholarship application process began for Young in the fall of 2007 when he found himself in a room with approximately 100 people and was told that they had to build a tower out of straws. The group

FairVote, ACLU and NAACP Set Forum Here on May 20

FairVote, the ACLU and the NAACP have called a community forum on "The Prospects and Promises of Electoral Reform in the City of Greenbelt" to be held on Tuesday, May 20 at 7 p.m., in the meeting room at the Greenbelt Library.

Deborah Jeon, legal director of the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) of Maryland, will discuss the Voting Rights Act and electoral reform in Maryland. Rob Richie, executive director of FairVote, will discuss the choice voting method of proportional representation. Earl Adams, Jr., first vice president of the Prince George's County branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), will discuss single member districts versus atlarge districts.

Mayor Judith Davis has been

The ACLU of Maryland, on behalf of the Prince George's County NAACP, has offered to collaborate with the City of Greenbelt to make the city's current at-large municipal election in their words "more fair and inclusive." 2000 Census data reveal that African Americans comprised 41.3 percent of Greenbelt's overall population and 37.9 percent of its voting age population. Asians comprised 12.9 percent and Latinos 5.7 percent of the voting age population, giving the city a voting age population that is at least 56.5 percent non-white.

This demographic shift reflects a noticeable increase in the city's racial diversity over the decade from 1990 to 2000. However, the city council remains an allwhite body. In order for city government to keep pace with its changing population, serve its residents and meet its obligations under the federal Voting Rights Act, the ACLU and NAACP believe Greenbelt should consider changing its election system. The participating organizations have partnered with FairVote for this forum to outline some options for achieving a more representative election system in Greenbelt.

The City of Greenbelt, in coordination with representatives of the ACLU and NAACP, has scheduled an open worksession for 7 p.m., Wednesday, May 28 in the Community Center. This first joint meeting is in response to the letter received earlier this spring from the same groups asking for such a meeting.


I will remember her for her positiveness, laughter and quick

Ms. MacQuillan was a member of St. Hugh's Catholic Church.


Her mother Mary MacQuillan

broke into teams for this activity and then teams regrouped as different tasks were introduced. The students were observed for qualities that the Posse Foundation looks for: leadership and the ability to work well with others while standing out as an individual.

According to Young, about half of the participating students were called back for personal interviews with "Posse Trainers" from the Foundation. Currently, for the scholarship recipients, meetings with these "trainers" are held every Tuesday in the Foundation's D.C. office. Young recalls that in his interview he was asked, "Would you rather sit on a pillow or a chair?" to which he answered, "a chair with a pillow."

In addition to his wit that clearly impressed the interviewers, Young is proficient in three foreign languages. In fact, on the way to the interview, he translated a poem into Russian and then recited it at the interview, providing its meaning to the interviewers. Afterward Young was called back for a third and final interview.

Grinnell College

In the final interview, a representative from the student's chosen college gets involved. For Young's interview, Grinnell's director of admissions attended, and although the Foundation makes the decision on who gets the scholarships, college representatives provide input on the students and their applications.

With 15-20 students left in the scholarship application pool, Young knew that a decision was in the making. "If you prepare too much, though," he said, "you get stressed out."

This composure, which enables him to be quick-witted and confident, was certainly evident to the people making a decision on his college career. "I appreciated being able to meet and talk with people who have dedicated their lives working for Grinnell."

Not everyone interviews with the Director of Admissions when applying for colleges; Grinnell must have seen something in Young even before a face-to-face interview was held.

Hectic Schedule

If Young's schedule as a high school senior now is foreshadowing his schedule as a college student he's going to be a very busy man. He takes six Advanced Placement classes and there is something on his calendar every night of the week. He tries to balance having a girlfriend with SADD meetings, Posse meetings, calculus tutoring, physics tutoring and being active in the Gay-Straight Alliance club at school.

Young is passionate about recycling and calls this "community service on a daily basis." He gets his inspiration from many people and his sources change daily. For example, on the day of this interview, Young had gotten inspiration from Greenbelt's Chef Lou.

When asked how he manages his time, Young said, "You have to think about how you're going to use your time because you don't have enough. He recommends that busy seniors "break their weeks into each day, think about what needs to get done that

day and then make sure there is free time during the day in case something comes up."

Goals

Young leaves for Grinnell mid-August and is planning for a career in global development studies. This is a concentration, not a major, but Grinnell allows its students to design their own majors.

This interdisciplinary study introduces students to diverse perspectives on change in the developing world. In addition to completing required courses,

Young also has an interest in environmental science and hopes to combine the two areas. His goal is to visit developing countries and teach people about sustainable agriculture.

For "creative, fun individuals," Young recommends applying for a Posse scholarship. "Even if you don't make it," he says, "it's a blast.'

The "Dynamic Application Process" of the Posse Foundation uses non-traditional forums to evaluate its students and there is a lot of fun in the application process. In addition to being challenged to "run around clucking like chickens," Young's group of applicants were told they had to do a newscast on a current issue. "They try to make you do things you might resist doing," he says.

The Posse Foundation isn't your everyday college application process. But then again, Patrick Young isn't your everyday high school senior.

program fees, grants and tenants.

The Community Center, built in 1937, has been designated a historic site by Prince George's County. Besides being the home of many Greenbelt institutions, like the Co-op Nursery School and the Greenbelt News Review, the Community Center acts as a hub for gatherings, events and various art-related activities.

Aquatic Center

The Aquatic and Fitness Center, along with its administration, has the largest budget within the department. The Center was able to cover about 60 percent of its expenditures through fees. It processed about 400 visitors a day over the past year, the majority of whom in a survey described themselves as happy with the level of services provided.

Therapeutic Recreation

The Therapeutic Recreation Department provides recreational opportunities for the elderly and disabled. Greenbelt is the only suburban municipal recreation department in Maryland with a full-time recreation specialist dedicated to this group. The adopted budget for Fiscal Year 2008 was \$158,200 with offsetting revenue sources amounting to \$33,100.

Arts Department

The Arts Department offers a vast array of educational programs in the arts as well as workshops, school field trips, group art activities, open studio programs and collaborative public art projects. In addition, the department administers monthly

artful afternoons, an annual arts and craft fair, ongoing exhibitions and the Community Center artist-in-residence program.

The arts staff coordinates performances, installations and hands- on activities in conjunction with annual special events. They do all this for \$175,700 and bring another \$68,100 for the city of Greenbelt, considered a very good value for the city and its citizens.

Greenbelt Kids

Greenbelt Kids provides numerous recreation and cultural activities for the youth of Greenbelt such as day camps, after-school activities, trips and children's classes. Between Fiscal Year 2006 and Fiscal Year 2007 performance measures increased by 5,000 participants, while maintaining the high quality of the programs.

A large part of the increase was in the area of the performing arts. Greenbelt Kids now offers an array of dance classes at the Greenbelt Dance studio including ballet, jazz, music theater and creative movement.

A total of 12 classes serve students between the ages of 3 and 17. Greenbelt Kids programs are a mainstay of the Recreation Department.

According to staff, Greenbelt's Recreation Department seeks to improve ways to provide recreational services to the citizens of Greenbelt. They have also implemented a "Be happy, Be healthy" wellness program for full-time employees.

During board meetings, participants may speak three minutes on a topic of their choice. They must register by 10:30 a.m. the day of the meeting by calling 301-952-6308.

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


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

Factory Farms Are Focus Of "Feed-in" at the Library

On May 5 a hungry and curious crowd gathered in the community room of the Greenbelt Library to hear author Erin Williams discuss her new book "Animals Matter." The event was organized and co-sponsored by Greenbelter Cam McQueen and Compassion over Killing (CoK). Some were also there for the free vegan food, what CoK refers to as a "feed-in," macaroni uncheese and sautéed dandelions, along with some interesting vegan desserts that were snatched up by the 40 or so in attendance. Animal Matters focuses on factory farming, the effect it has on the environment, the nine billion animals that are killed annually for human consumption and how a meat diet affects human lives.

Williams is a dynamic speaker who started off by explaining how she came to the Humane Society of the United States, where she is the communication director. Growing up on a dairy farm in Illinois she was the only child of fifth-generation farmers. As a 4-H kid she developed relationships with farm animals and found they had distinct personalities and intelligence equal to those of her domestic pets. She related the story of her prize cow Zelda who would come thundering across the field to see her at the fence. Zelda was killed because she could not produce milk.

Williams' presentation focused on factory farming and the negative impact it has on the environment, human health and of course the lives of animals. Factory/corporate farming has nearly obliterated the family farm, she noted. The idea that a farm is nice place for a cow to live for a few years before being turned

Cast your vote for GHI Board of Directors and Audit Committee Members on May 15 & 16. into hamburger is a myth that is skillfully maintained by the owners of factory farms, she said.

Williams related some disturbing facts. More than one billion tons of manure are produced each year by factory farms, much of this untreated. Seventy percent of all grain grown and 50 percent of the water consumed in the U.S. are used by the meat industry.

Some of the attendees explained how they had come to a vegan diet. James Patrick, 84, of College Park has been a vegetarian for 35 years. Standing straight and slim he looked more like 64. He made the transition gradually to vegan "to be healthier."

Noelle Callahan, 40, of Takoma Park with a physique of an 20-year-old decided to go vegan in part because she has always been a big animal lover and wanted everyone to know it's "easy to go vegan and delicious as well."

The event raised \$1,340 from the sales of Williams' book, all of which she donated to CoK, an organization that promotes healthy vegetarian living and compassionate treatment of animals.

Reel and Meal At New Deal

The film "This Black Soil" will be shown at the New Deal Café on Monday, May 19 at 7 p.m. It is sponsored by the Reel and Meal at the New Deal, a monthly film series that explores vital environmental and social issues, sponsored by a consortium of Greenbelt organizations. There is no charge for admission.

"This Black Soil" chronicles the successful struggle of Bayview, Va., a small rural African-American community, to pursue a new vision of prosperity. Catalyzed by the defeat of a state plan to build a maximumsecurity prison in their backyard, the women leaders and residents proceeded to build a new community from the ground up. Under the women's leadership, this new rural village challenges all conventional ideas of community development to include not only improved and affordable housing but a sustainable economic base to earn a living wage.

There will be a talk and discussion after the film facilitated by Maurice Cox, former mayor of Charlottsville, Va., who was a catalyst for social change in the rural community of Bayview.
