Former Greenbelt Mayor Alan Anthony Kistler Dies

Former Greenbelt Mayor Alan Anthony Kistler, 87, died on Saturday, May 10, 2008, at his home in Silver Spring of congestive heart failure. He was a career AFL-CIO official.

Mr. Kistler, a native of Pittsburgh, Pa., joined the union movement as a 17-year-old volunteer picketer in Pittsburgh. He worked as a laborer in a steel mill in Pittsburgh, as a reporter for International News Service, a teletype operator for United Press, hotel elevator operator and as CIO staff representative and business agent for a local union in Chicago. He was a CIO delegate to the Chicago Conference of Christians and Jews.

During World War II he served three and a half years with the Army Medical Department. Returning to the United States he attended the University of Chicago under the G.I. bill.

He earned a master's degree in social sciences specializing in industrial relations. He received teacher's certificates from the states of Illinois and Pennsylvania.

He married Marie Connolly of Pittsburgh in 1948. In the early 50s they moved to Greenbelt.

In Greenbelt he was a member of St. Hugh's parish where he organized the St. Hugh's teen club. He served as a member of the Parents' Advisory Council of that group. During the 1954-55 organizational year he was program director for the local Holy Name Society.

Mr. Kistler was a member and past vice president of the Greenbelt Democratic Club, was a member of the Greenbelt Lions Club, Twin Pines and the Greenbelt Garden Club.

Safety Concerns for Double Dutch Squad Discussed at Worksession

The Greenbelt City Council listened to disquieting parental concerns about the safety of participants in the Greenbelt Sity Stars double dutch squad at the Springhill Lake Recreation Center. One parent described overhearing a recent shooting that took place outside the center.

Normally a routine budget worksession, the May 14 meeting was to hear from city nonprofit groups seeking financial support from the city by inclusion of the funds in the Fiscal Year 2009 city budget. Besides all councilmembers, City Manager

Michael Mc Laughlin and Recreation and Sports Coordinator Andrew Phelan attended to hear presentations from city arts and music groups, festival planners and sports leagues.

Sity Stars

In a plea to the mayor and city council, parents of participants in the Sity Stars squad described the parking lot and walkway of the squad's practice space at the Springhill Lake Recreation Center as populated by a gauntlet of troublemakers who routinely harass passers by and openly use drugs and alcohol. The mothers

also cited incidents of derogatory comments toward mothers and young girls and a lack of police presence.

The mothers spoke of feeling unsafe on a regular basis at the recreation center and a sense that they were not getting the help they needed.

"It's getting to the point where it's not worth it," Nicole Thezard said of attending practice. Thezard is a Bowie resident and mother of one of the double dutch participants.

Watch Group Training to Be Held For Both New and Old Members

The Old Greenbelt Neighborhood Watch (OGNW) is celebrating its second anniversary and will hold a training session next Thursday for new members.

Two years ago, a group of Greenbelters met in the New Deal Cafe to discuss a spate of vandalisms and thefts. Out of that initial meeting, the Old Greenbelt Neighborhood Watch was formed. It has grown to an organization with over 30 members, of whom about 14 are very active.

"The group does an excellent job of being the 'eyes and ears' of the police department, helping us more effectively direct our resources," says MPO George Mathews, the Public Relations and Crime Control officer for the Greenbelt Police, who is the main liaison with the OGNW group. "In my opinion, the group is extremely well-orgainzed and very professional." Mathews also helps train new recruits to the group and advises them on procedures and activities.

"I joined this group because I fell in love with Greenbelt," says Jessame Ferguson, a relative newcomer to Greenbelt who works as a librarian at UMBC. "I want the town to remain safe enough for all of us to feel comfortable walking to the store or the movies or coming home after an evening event at the New Deal Café."

Patrols are usually low-key events. "Our job is to observe and report," says Ed James, a retired physicist. "It is not our job

to interfere or give orders but if we see anything of note, we call the police." From a few patrols in the summer months of the first year, the number of patrols has increased to several a week. Most patrols are done on foot but sometimes vehicles are used. In order to be an official patrol, at least two trained members need to participate, although non-members are welcome to come along. "There is still room and need for more members," says James.

Drug Sale

Not all patrols are uneventful. During last year's Labor Day festival, a group of OGNW patrollers happened upon a suspected drug sale. "They saw us,

Roosevelt's Wind Ensemble To Perform in Beijing, China

Several area musical groups will participate next month in a special "Salute to the Olympic Games" in "Harmony and Olympic Spirit" presented in Beijing, China. The Massed Band Concert in Beijing's Forbidden City Concert Hall is one of several musical events leading up to the XXIX Olympic Games in China this August. The concert will feature Prince George's County groups including the Eleanor Roosevelt High School Wind Ensemble, Sally Wagner, conductor; the Oxon Hill High School Symphonic Band, Walter Harley, conductor; and the Maryland Community Band, John Wakefield, conductor.

The 184-member Massed Band program will be led by Prof. John E. Wakefield, Director of Bands Emeritus at the University of Maryland and will also include participants from the Hampton Roads Academy in Newport News, Va.; Palos Verdes High School in Palos Verdes Estates, Calif. and a small group from

Coppin State University in Baltimore. Each participating group will also play individual concerts and exchange performances with Chinese bands during the 12 days in Xi'an, Beijing and Shanghai.

Wind Ensemble

The Wind Ensemble from ERHS traveling to China consists of 44 students, which includes Greenbelters Angelisa Plane, Nirvan Sengupta, and Dina Goldberg-Strassler and 10 members of the ERHS Class of 2007. The students have held 11 major fundraisers this school year in addition to their monthly fruit sales. Fundraising began at the 2007 Greenbelt Labor Day Festival, where students dressed as Chinese soldiers roamed the midway collecting donations and staffed their booth that displayed the Great Wall of China. "We sold anything we could get our hands on," says Wagner, a.k.a. "Madame Ming," who told fortunes at the Labor Day Booth.

Sewer & Water Project Timetable

Contrary to widespread reports, work is not slated to start this summer on a major pending sewer and water project in Greenbelt. The News Review reported on May 8 that the design of the project is 70 percent complete, with bidding scheduled for January 2009 and construction possibly starting later next year in parts of GHI. The project was discussed April 25 at a meeting of the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission, GHI and the city.

News Review Office Closed Memorial Day

Joint Meetings Postponed On City Electoral Reform

The May 20 forum on electoral reform sponsored by the ACLU of Maryland, FairVote and the Prince George's County Branch of the NAACP was cancelled on Monday. Scheduled to be held at the Greenbelt Library, the meeting conflicted with an earlier scheduled meeting sponsored by the Friends of the Greenbelt Museum. The sponsors indicate that they are in the process of rescheduling the forum to a larger venue at a future date.

The forum was to discuss the Voting Rights Act, previous electoral reform in Maryland, and how various possible electoral remedies, such as proportional representation, could increase local representation and diversity and enhance voter choice in the City of Greenbelt.

Also, Deborah Jeon of the ACLU notified Greenbelt City Solicitor Robert Manzi that the ACLU requested postponement of the scheduled May 28 city council worksession, according to City Manager Michael McLaughlin. This meeting, open to the public, was set to meet with representatives of the ACLU concerning that organization's request for the city to change its election process to enable minority representation on the Greenbelt City Council. ACLU representatives were not available for that date, Manzi was advised. Tentatively, subject to City Council approval, that meeting will be rescheduled to June 30.

A May 21 executive meeting of the city council, closed to the public, was still scheduled to be

Saturday, May 24 from 7:30 a.m. to approximately 10:30 will be the inaugural bird walk at the new Luther Goldman Birding Trail at Lake Artemesia's Natural Area Park. In case of rain the walk will be held on Sunday, May 25.

The trail commemorates the life of local resident Luther Goldman, national wildlife refuge manager and renowned wildlife photographer, who died at age 95 in 2005. The 2.2-mile paved walk loops around the lake and through varied habitat. Look for wood duck, green heron and a variety of woodland and songbirds. The birdwalk is sponsored by the Prince George's Audubon Society and Patuxent Bird Club.


He was a compassionate man



"The community really stepped up with donations," says Wagner, "and we received grants from the Greenbelt Community Foundation and from County Councilmember Ingrid Turner's office," but with the rising cost of gas and the dollar's plunge against the RMB, more donations are appreciated. Currently, the ensemble is looking for a sponsor to pay for 60 shirts that the group can wear while on the trip.

Song Selection

The ensemble plans to perform "Disney at the Movies," arranged by John Higgins, "American Variations," arranged by Jerry Bilik, "The Mambo," from Leonard Bernstein's "West Side Story," "Tempered Steel," arranged by Charles Young and "Amazing Grace," arranged by Luis Muldonado, among others. The song selections had to be approved by the Chinese government and if it were not for the fact that it will be performed instrumentally, Wagner says "Amazing Grace' probably would not have been approved." The music of the massed band also highlights American composers.

There are four entire families making the trip, one of which includes a native speaker. In addition, one of the ERHS students is the son of Dr. Richmond Sparks of the Maryland Community Band who is also Wakefield's assistant

The event is being coordinated by Kingsway International which has been organizing tours to China for over 30 years. "Our music will showcase what humanity shares as the world turns its spotlight on China. This trip offers an once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to perform during this most significant transformational year for all of China," states Wakefield. The "Salute" will also be presented in the Opera Theatre of the Oriental Arts Centre in Shanghai. The groups leave for China around June 19 and will depart on July 1.

"We are as prepared as we can be and we will be as careful as we can be," says Wagner. "These kids are very smart and well raised and my respect for them is unmatched," she adds and fondly remembers a concert in England in April 2002 when a performing ERHS band received unsolicited letters from English citizens after returning home to the United States. In that frightening post-9/11 time, it was comforting and enlightening to read in one letter "there is nothing you can do to kill the American spirit."

The ERHS band will return to Greenbelt very early in the morning on July 3.

He served three terms on the city council, from 1955 to 1961, serving as mayor in his last term.

After recruitment by the Steelworkers president Phil Murray to the programming staff of the old CIO in 1952, he later joined the staff of the recently merged AFL-CIO in its Organizational Department. He served as its Director of Organization and Field Service from 1973 to 1986. He was so widely trusted throughout the AFL-CIO that after he retired in 1986 he was asked to serve as an umpire mediating jurisdictional disputes between unions. He also served as president of the Human Resources Development Institute, where he led the AFL-CIO's job training efforts for unskilled and disadvantaged workers.

Mr. Kistler believed not only in contributing to his church and community but was influenced by the Catholic Worker Movement created during the New Deal and worked closely with its founder Dorothy Day.

On the Council in Greenbelt his hardest fight came in a decision by the city to use the strike-bound theater for a safety program. When the theater manager cancelled this program, the former council over-rode the decision to emphasize its desire to remain neutral. Mr. Kistler asserted at that time that he would continue to use all his influence to negotiate the settlement of the strike and to keep city functions from using the theater's facilities as long as other places were available.

Mr. Kistler's wife preceded him in death. They were married over 50 years.

He is survived by son Kevin A. Kistler, Bethesda; daughters Mary Anne Winter and Margaret Kistler Brown, Silver Spring; grandchildren Alan P. and Kevin A. Kistler, Jr., Emma M K and Ceili A. Geiger, Andrew Joseph Brown, Catherine A. and Jacqueline M. and Gary Winters; and brother Michael T. Kistler.

A Mass of Christian Burial was held at St. Andrew Apostle Church, Silver Spring on Thursday, May 15. Interment was at Gate of Heaven cemetery.

O'Malley Signs Co-op **Housing Loans Bill**

Governor Martin O'Mallev signed into law HB74 to provide housing assistance program loans to housing cooperative members. "This is a huge win for Greenbelt Homes, Inc.," said lead sponsor Delegate Anne Healey.

Prior to the bill's passage, members of housing cooperatives were unable to take advantage of Department of Housing and Community Development housing assistance program loans. The bill allows the department to make loans through the Maryland Housing Rehabilitation Program and gives it the authority to enter into an agreement with a cooperative housing corporation and make loans to members.

Participation in these state loan programs would facilitate improvements to accommodate senior and disabled residents, helping them to remain in their homes.

Other Business

In old business, on a report about the charrette or community visioning process last September and other activities of the Greener Greenbelt Initiative and the Green Ribbon Task Force, Jim Cohen articulated the principles of "livability, affordability, preservation and sustainability."

Cohen also presented the board's new business, centered on the replacement plan and building maintenance. He reported on a study by EMO Energy Solutions that showed 75 percent of comparably sized homes use less energy than a GHI frame unit, 85 percent of comparably sized homes use less energy than the blocks and 67 percent use less than the brick GHI homes. Cohen announced formation of a new Energy Committee in July and urged members to get involved.



Thezard was on the front lines of a shooting at the Springhill Lake Recreation Center when she overheard a nearby shooting that occurred Wednesday, May 7.

"I heard, 'I'm gonna kill all you,' and then three shots," she said. The gunfire came from behind her as she was entering the complex.

"It's scary when it's behind you," she said of the shots.

She described grabbing her youngest son and running to the doors to the center with other people who were outside of the complex at the time of the shoot-

Both the mayor and members of council acknowledged that they were aware of the shooting but not how it had affected the Double Dutch squad. The mayor and council also expressed surprise at the extent of the harassment.

'This is very disturbing, [it's] an unsafe situation," said Mayor Judith Davis.

In fielding questions from the City Council, Kim Bradshaw, the head coach of the Greenbelt Sity Stars squad admitted that the squad's profile in Greenbelt was low, citing difficulty in securing facilities able to provide space for practice and fundraising in Greenbelt.

"We're not trying to exclude Greenbelt but just trying to get what we can get," she said.

"Not many people know you are a Greenbelt city group," said Davis noting that a planned training workshop and regional competition would not be held in the

The council was also disturbed by the report from parents that the Beltway Plaza Shopping Center had told them through email that the plaza was now charging groups a fee to perform there.

Council members were upset at the revelation, citing a lack of cooperation and dialogue between Beltway Plaza, the city council and community groups. Councilmember Edward Putens asked for a copy of the email that stated fees have been associated with performing at the plaza.

Both men expressed concern to council about a large mound of dirt that is in the middle of the base path on Braden field. According to the men, the mound of dirt was threatening the baseball season as the field is being scheduled for games. The two men offered to clear the dirt themselves but Council assured them that the mound of dirt would be cleared.

Other recipients of funds from the recreation budget include the Greenbelt Boys and Girls Club, the Senior Softball League, the Greenbelt Aquatic Boosters and the Greenbelt Concert Band.

Notice of Charter Amendment Resolution No. 2008-1

At its regular meeting of May 12, 2008, the City Council adopted a resolution to amend the City Charter. As required by state law, this resolution will be posted in its entirety for 40 days, until June 21, at the Municipal Building, as well as on the City's Web site at www.greenbeltmd.gov. A copy may also be requested of the City Clerk. The charter amendment will be effective on July 1, 2008, unless a proper petition to submit the amendment to the voters on a referendum is filed as permitted by law. This notice is given to provide a fair summary of the resolution, as also required by state law.

A Resolution . . . to Amend the Charter of the City of Greenbelt . . . by Amending Paragraph (d), "Powers," of Section 12, Titled "Employee Relations Board" to Provide that the Employee Relations Board be Empowered to Hear Grievances Arising out of Collective Bargaining Agreements: Subsequent to a referendum question on the ballot of the 2005 City election, the City Council amended the City Code to include a Labor Code for the purpose of recognizing the right of certain police officers to organize and bargain collectively. The Labor Code requires that all collective bargaining agreements (CBAs) must include a grievance procedure containing a provision for binding decision by the City's Employee Relations Board (ERB). Since the existing powers of the ERB in grievance procedures were limited to making recommendations to the City Council, it was necessary to amend the charter to enable the ERB to address grievances arising out of CBAs as required by the Labor Code.

Bike Equipment

"Saddles – the saddle (seat) is perhaps the most important contact point between the rider and the bicycle. Wide saddles are not always more comfortable. More often than not, when the saddle height is correct, a narrower saddle feels much better. It may take some experimentation with different types but riders should select a saddle that offers support, is comfortable and does not cause numbness.

"Pedal Retention Devices – the primary purpose of a pedal retention system is to allow cyclists to keep their feet on the pedals when going up and over obstacles. A secondary benefit is improved pedaling efficiency. Pedal retention enables a rider to both pull up and push down on the pedals, exerting nearly equal force throughout the pedal revolution.

"Headlamps – any bicycle operated on a highway during low light conditions should be equipped with a lamp on the front that emits a white light and a rear red reflector.

"Bell – a bicycle shall be equipped with a bell or other device capable of giving an audible signal for a distance of at least 100 feet.

"Remember to wear a helmet."

stared at our T-shirts with the Neighborhood Watch logo emblazoned across them for about three seconds and took off," says Bill Cornett, who was patrolling along with about seven other members that night. "One of our members found evidence of drug activity at the scene and a report was made to the police."

Laura Kressler is a longtime Greenbelt resident who was concerned about crimes that were occurring in her neighborhood on Plateau Place. "Instead of just complaining, I decided to get involved and do something to improve the situation. I have enjoyed meeting and working with my fellow Greenbelters and the social aspects of the group are great. All the members try hard to make patrolling, training and meetings fun."

Training Session

The OGNW has participated in several events besides patrols, holding a cook-out in Roosevelt Center for "National Night Out" and staffing information tables at the Labor Day Festival.

They have also gotten new

shirts which identify them as Neighborhood Watch members. "People have told us the shirts have given them retinal burn because of the intense safety yellow color and the orange and black lettering," says Kressler. "We wanted to make sure our members were easily seen and recognized."

The OGNW is holding a training session for new members on Thursday, May 29 at 7 p.m., in the meeting room at the Greenbelt Police station. Any Greenbelter who is interested in helping keep the neighborhood safe is welcome to join and be trained for patrol. The training session is short and will be followed by the regular monthly meeting, after which members usually go out for a patrol.

"Any group that assists in addressing crime and quality of life issues is a huge benefit to the community, says Mathews. "Having a civic group that actively participates in their own neighborhood and works to keep their community safe can make all the difference in the world."



WSSC Budget Raises Rates by 8 Percent

In a joint session on May 8 the Montgomery and Prince George's County Councils voted to approve a \$913.7 million budget for Fiscal Year 2009 that addresses WSSC's increasing operational costs. The budget calls for an 8 percent rate increase to pay for escalating prices of necessities such as power, chemicals and fuel, as well as the replacement of 27 miles of water mains and 51 miles of sewer mains.

The rate increase will add approximately \$3.75 per month or \$11.25 per quarter to the average residential customer's bill.

The new budget and rates will take effect on July 1, 2008.


