Bennigan's Closes Here

"Closed for Business." That is all the information provided by a sign on the front door of Bennigan's Grill and Bar restaurant located at Beltway Plaza. On Tuesday, July 29 the Greenbelt restaurant and some 150 other Bennigan's restaurants closed their doors when the owner S&A Restaurant Corporation filed for Chapter 7, Title 11, United States Code (liquidation) bankruptcy, according to Wikipedia, the free internet encyclopedia. Nearly as many Bennigan's restaurants that are franchise owned remain open for business, however, throughout the U.S. and in other countries. S&A Restaurant Corporation also closed down the Steak and Ale chain of restaurants that it owns.

According to the August 4 issue of the Orlando Business Journal, two New York-based financial firms are taking over the management of the Bennigan's system according to an August 1 report in Nation's Restaurant News. They are Atalaya Capital Management LP and CRG Partners, who reportedly told an Orlandobased Bennigan's franchise that the firms plan to keep the franchise system's infrastructure intact.

On August 5 the Fort Worth Star-Telegram reported in an article by Barry Schlachter that William Snyder, a Southlake, Texas turnaround specialist, said that the Bennigan's concept is not dead. He is working with franchise holders across the country to put together a joint bid to purchase about half of the shuttered restaurants. Snyder was hired by Atalaya Capital Management which bought the debt liens and voting rights of the Plano, Texas based Metromedia Restaurant Group that owned the Bennigan's franchise operating company.

No information is available as to the future of the Greenbelt franchise.

According to Wikipedia, Bennigan's was established in 1976 in Atlanta, Ga. It was a part of Pillsbury's restaurant division when it was acquired by Grand Metropolitan in 1989 but that company was later forced to liquidate Bennigan's from its Pillsbury assets because as a liquor distributor it was prohibited from owning liquor retailers.

Bennigan's was forced to take cost-cutting measures in the 1990's which reportedly lowered the quality of their food. In 2006 the company closed most of its New England franchises.

Camp Fire USA, Museum Win Foundation Grants

Students in the program will participate in activities that encourage personal development, reinforce academic learning, encourage community service and teach leadership.

In accepting the award, Pezzuto expressed her excitement about the partnership Camp Fire USA is creating with the community to provide quality programming for the children and families at Springhill Lake. One of their partners is the Greenbelt Police Department. Officer Jonathon Lowndes, the community policing officer for Springhill Lake, and Greenbelt Police Chief James

Craze were both in attendance at the presentation.

Accepting the award for the Friends of the Greenbelt Museum were President Jen Ruffner, Curator Jill St. John and Education/Volunteer Coordinator Megan Searing Young. The grant will help to enable the Greenbelt Museum to remake its orientation film, which is shown to all visitors.

The film will be updated and issues such as racial segregation and women's roles in the creation of Greenbelt will be included. The new film will include the experiences of contemporary residents and their reflections on the legacy of the town's planning and

In her remarks, Sylvia Lewis, chair of the advisory board for the Greenbelt Community Foundation, reported that the Foundation, to date, has awarded \$34,765 to 14 organizations for projects that enrich the quality of life in Greenbelt. The Foundation's grants are made possible by donations from individuals,

Greenbelt Selected as One Of Nine Great Places to Live

The cities of Greenbelt; Ames, Iowa; and Berea, Kentucky, are three of some nine municipalities called "9 Great Places You've Never Heard Of" in the current issue of the periodical Mother Earth News. Others in their list are Bethel, Maine; Viroqua, Wisconsin; Moscow, Idaho; San Luis Obispo, California; Traverse City, Michigan; and Bisbee, Arizona. According to the come-on below the headline, these nine towns were chosen because they 'demonstrate civic energy sustainability in action."

In the case of Greenbelt, the magazine cites "Cooperative efforts to restore original Greenbelt homes in an energy-efficient way; restoration of local lake; civic commitment to frugal lifestyle with a rich public life that makes large houses unnecessary." Also noted is "the proximity of Greenbelt National Park."

The article begins with a brief history of the founding of the city by the federal government as a

"model for an affordable, planned community with a high quality of life." It describes the super blocks, the semicircular lay-out and pedestrian walkways and the city's proximity to the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center.

Also noted are the co-op grocery store, the nursery school, the credit union, this newspaper and "even the local New Deal Café" as operating with a "shared benefits/ shared responsibility approach." The article goes on to quote Mayor 'When there's a Judith Davis: need in the community, you can bet that a team will self-assemble to take care of it."

Included is a photograph of the sign at the Southway entrance describing the city and a view of the Labor Day parade with Councilmembers Konrad Herling, Edward Putens and Mayor Judith Davis in an antique fire engine and Councilmember Leta Mach walking on one side while Councilmember Rodney Roberts walks on the other.







Aggressive Drivers

Get out of the way and stay clear of aggressive drivers on the road; stay relaxed. Remember that the goal is to reach one's destination safely and calmly. Don't challenge the aggressive driver, avoid eye contact, ignore rude gestures and refuse to return rude gestures. Don't block the passing lane, especially if driving slower than most traffic; move to the right lane. Dial #77 on a cell phone to report aggressive drivers or call the police when able.

To avoid being an aggressive driver, allow more time to get to a destination to reduce stress. Come to a full stop at red lights and stop signs; never run yellow lights. Let other drivers merge with you, obey posted speed limits and don't follow too closely. Concentrate on driving, not on a cellphone, stereo or passengers. Remember that one can't control traffic but only oneself, one's driving and one's emotions.




