Senior Advocate Leonie Penney Is 2008 Outstanding Citizen

The year 2008 marks a period of accolades for the woman chosen Friday night as Greenbelt's Outstanding Citizen at the opening ceremony for the city's Labor Day Festival. She is longtime resident Leonie Penney.

Among her other awards this year have been recognition by GIVES (Greenbelt Intergenerational Volunteer Exchange Service) for her outstanding service, by GAIL (Greenbelt Assistance in Living) for its 2008 Volunteer Award of Excellence and by Prince George's County for Excellence in Leadership. In the language commemorating this last award, Leonie Penney was recognized for "outstanding advocacy on behalf of older adults and commitment to developing livable communities."

Now 90 years old, and looking out over the large crowd clapping enthusiastically, Penney recalled her earliest days in America after World War II when she arrived from war-torn Europe, knowing only one other person, as she

said, in the United States. Later, as a young wife, she and her late husband Walter Penney located in Greenbelt. They bought one of the first houses then under construction in the Woodland Way community. She has lived there ever since.

"Life is a two-way street,"

Penney said, noting that she has "received so much from Greenbelt." She spoke about how lucky she and her husband had been to have found this community of friendly and active people. "Greenbelt is a family," she said,

Poor Peoples March Arrives Here

Below is the second in a series of articles on the local impact of the 1968 Poor Peoples March.

On April 21, 1968, the Greenbelt News Review reported that the membership of Greenbelt Community Church and its pastor the Reverend Dale Stover had agreed to support the Poor People's Campaign and join with St. Hugh's Catholic Church in hosting a lunch for the Northeastern contingent of marchers.

Nothing further was reported until May 16, the day before the event. Since most readers did not get their paper until Friday or Saturday, the information arrived too late.

Poverty Marchers Registered, Welcomed by Local Churches

About 700 members of the Northeastern contingent of the Poor People's Campaign arrived in Greenbelt at about 12:30 p.m. last Friday and were welcomed by volunteer workers at two local churches. Approximately half went to St. Hugh's Catholic Church and half to Community Church. The campaigners pulled into town on 25 buses, 15 cars and a truck, having spent the previous night in Baltimore and stayed in Greenbelt about seven hours. The travelers had been expected, and the detailed preparations made at joint sessions of church representatives, worked without notable hitch. Lunch was ready in the church auditoriums and was served at once to shifts of 100 people at a time; meanwhile registration and issuance of an identification bracelet for each member of the group was begun. The weather cooperated, too, and after lunch many spent their time resting outdoors on the shady lawns or under awnings, or talking, playing badminton, baseball, cards and singing.

praise of their guests and no confusion was reported. The guests spoke warmly about their hosts and it was apparent they were enjoying their hours in Greenbelt.

The lack of confusion was in the main due to the many marshals - older teen-age campaigners wearing blue denim jackets with their rank marked in red on the sleeve. They handled problems, guided and helped members of their respective groups. City and county officials also worked, on and behind the scenes, to assure the comfort and safety of the marchers. In charge of the contingent was the Reverend James Orange of Philadelphia, an officer of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference which is leading caravans of poor people from all parts of the country to Resurrection City near the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C. This particular group came from Boston, Philadelphia, New York, Wilmington, Connecticut and Baltimore. Orange, a strapping, impressive man in blue overalls, said "Morale is high; the people have stayed together and have been magnificent. Their only complaints are lost baggage and not

Graduate Students Present Study Results, Seek Input

Greenbelt has changed dramatically in recent decades. Major roadways have divided the city into three distinct parts: Greenbelt East, Old Greenbelt and Greenbelt West/Springhill Lake (now Empirian Village). Each part has its own demographic and socioeconomic profile and community concerns.

As a result, some issues unite Greenbelters, while others divide. This has become particularly clear with the ongoing questioning of the fairness of Greenbelt's political representation by the ACLU, the NAACP and FairVote.

On Tuesday, September 9 at Greenbelt City Council chambers at 7:30 p.m., a team of nine University of Maryland graduate planning students will present the results of a summer-long study of some issues that unite and divide Greenbelters. In addition to reviewing a variety of data sources, the students interviewed dozens of residents in Greenbelt East, Old Greenbelt and Greenbelt West; analyzed the survey responses; identified key issues; and developed recommendations for strengthening the connections between the three sections of the city.

Greenbelt Crime Report Through June 2008

The number of crimes committed in Greenbelt was higher in the first six months of this year than for the previous year by 22 percent and 6.7 percent higher than the average for the first six months of the past four years. The increases do not necessarily indicate a trend toward increased crime for the city but rather normal fluctuation. At this time last year the number of reported crimes was significantly lower than usual. In the second six months of 2007 the number of crimes committed increased sharply so that the year ended closer to a typical year.

For each of the seven categories of crimes committed known as Class I crimes or the more serious offenses, the number committed in one of the previous four years has been greater than for this year with one exception. Larceny, the felonious taking of property without force, accounted for more than half of all crimes reported in the city during the Motor vehicle thefts, which had shown a downward trend during the past four years, increased above the previous year by 24 percent. With 144 thefts reported, this is the second highest crime category for number committed. While higher than that of the past three years, the number is still well below the 209 committed in 2004.

Robberies, at 66, were 65 percent greater than during the first six months of 2007. The number recorded in that period was lower than normal. This year's count is still well below the 88 committed in 2006.

Arrests

Adult arrests, 386, are significantly higher than they were in the first six months of 2007 but not as high as in 2004 and 2005 when over 400 arrests were made. Juvenile arrests this year were also more than for 2007 but well below the number of arrests in the previous three years with the highest number being recorded in 2004 at 213 arrests. As city manager, I was quoted in an article without a byline as stating that there would "positively be no planned use of [public] facilities outside city streets. All activities are to be conducted at St. Hugh's and Greenbelt Community churches" who were to host the luncheon. City Will Expand List Of Items to Recycle

"We can handle virtually any type you generate" – that is the promise of WM Recycle America, the company that provides recycling service to Greenbelt. Called Recycle America for short, the company recently sent out an expanded list of what is now being accepted.

There were some surprises on the list – plastic buckets with metal handles and plastic laundry baskets, as well as plastic flower pots, plastic cups and glasses, plastic five-gallon water bottles and plastic toys. The one caveat is that such items must be contained in the city-distributed recycling bins.

The company will also accept aluminum foil and aluminum pie pans. They will take wide-mouth plastic containers, as for peanut butter, yogurt, mayonnaise, sour cream and margarine tubs. A big surprise is empty aerosol cans.

Among articles made of fiber are telephone books and even textbooks and hardbacks. Nonmetallic wrapping paper is also on the list. So are gable-top milk and juice cartons.

Plastic grocery bags are already recycled at grocery stores but Recycle America will take stretch film and shrink-wrap as long as it is contained within one bag.

This month a new brochure will be distributed to city residents describing the expanded list of recyclables. Eventually – when the logistics are worked out – even such items as discarded plastic lawn furniture will be on the list.





"And it replaced what I lost during the war." She herself also soon became active – like many young parents, first with the cooperative nursery school.

Then, as her children grew – Walter, Olga and Bernard – she became an active parent volunteer with the Greenbelt Municipal Swim Team. From that involvement she later became an early advocate for an indoor swimming pool.

Penney served in various civic and municipal organizations as well, such as Save Our Community Committee, which opposed the use of a tract of forest land on Ridge Road for a three-school complex, and later, the city's Refuse and Recycling Committee. She was also a founding member of GIVES.

Following two life-changing events – the death of her husband in 2000 and the accidental death of her son Walter two years later when the bicycle he was riding was hit by a speeding car – she took on two other major involvements – as co-facilitator for the Patuxent Widowed Persons Services Bereavement Support Group and citizen activities to strengthen state laws against aggressive driving.

In her most recent years Penney has been a strong advocate for community support for senior citizens. Besides her work with founding GIVES, she has been a member for some 20 years of the Senior Citizen Advisory Committee, which was influential in the city's development of the Greenbelt Assistance in Living program (GAIL) and the hiring of a Community Resource Advocate. Penney then led the formation of a support group, Friends of the Resource Advocate, to recruit and organize volunteers.

Only briefly mentioned at the program opening the Labor Day Festival and introducing this year's Outstanding Citizen was Penney's work for this newspaper. She has handled all records concerning our subscription customers. As a former employee of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Beltsville Agricultural Research Center, she dealt regularly with computers and earned a master's degree in computer science. Penney has given invaluable assistance to the News Review with the computer work related to our advertising operations. Earlier, she had also encouraged her husband to proofread for the News Review because she knew his excellent qualifications for the job.

Lap Belt Safety Tips For Pregnant Drivers

On a three-point safety belt, position the lap belt portion as low on the abdomen as possible. Remove or adjust coats to make sure they don't interfere with low placement of the lap belt. The shoulder belt should be routed over the sternum.

Leave the air bag(s) operational. Drive a vehicle that allows the most clearance between the steering wheel and abdomen. Position the steering wheel to maximize abdomen-to-wheel clearance, while aiming it more toward the chest than the head. When possible ride as a passenger rather than drive to avoid potential contact with the wheel.

Minimize driving in hazardous conditions.

Impaired Driving

To avoid getting a DUI citation, follow these safety tips. Don't think about driving after drinking. Call a taxi, use mass transit or get a sober friend or family member to come and drive. If able, stay put and sleep until sober.

If hosting a party, make sure guests do not drive intoxicated. "Friends don't let other friends drive drunk" is not just a cliché. It is a responsibility to potentially avoid a serious accident. Keep memories safe.

been more aggressive this year in issuing traffic summonses. The 2,552 total for the first six months well exceeds that for the same period in each of the past four years. Parking tickets issued were also at a five year high at 548. Warning tickets and equipment repair orders issued also exceeded that of previous years except for 2004.

There were more traffic accidents this year during the first six months than occurred for the same period last year. However the 562 accidents fell below the numbers occurring in 2004, 2005 and 2006.

At 659 hours, there were more than three times as many hours spent on bicycle patrol in the first six months of this year than in the same period last year. The number of hours of foot patrolling also increased somewhat over the previous year. However, the number of calls for the K-9 units was somewhat less.





getting in bed early enough. Quite at Community Church. a few of the people are tired, some have walked about three miles each day. Some have been on the road since May 9th." He spoke of plans for teaching sessions and workshops on the doctrine of nonviolence. He said, "Some of the children have learned more in these few days on the road than in all their lives so far."

Anxious to Get to DC

It appeared that many of the delegation were disappointed when they were told to take their valises off the buses on arrival in Greenbelt. They thought their stay would be a short one here and that they would board buses for Washington the same day. Actually, most of them were to spend the next two days in the county, the guests of various churches. This was because of lack of accommodations at Resurrection City.

Some persons wanted to walk into Washington and a few asked where the bus stops were. According to a later story in the Washington Post, at least 100 made their way downtown that evening. The welcoming spirit in the churches was shown in handlettered posters on the walls, such as "You are among friends," and, "We will be praying for your safe journey."

Each church provided a nursery for the young ones with toys, play pens, diaper-changing table and cribs. First-aid stations were staffed by doctors and nurses; about 85 people were seen who had minor ailments and two were taken to the hospital, treated and released. A medical team worked through the night at St. Hugh's.

Students from the Holy Trinity Missionary Seminary of Silver Spring came to entertain the people in the St. Hugh's School Auditorium. The tables were turned when some talented young teens associated with the Poor People's Campaign put on a show. They were a real swinging group.

At St. Hugh's Church, about 56 women and 25 men worked as volunteers during the day and evening. They registered 350 people of all ages and served them 1,600 sandwiches, 36 gallons of chicken soup, five cases of apples, seven pounds of coffee, 24 gallons of punch and milk and cookies. Similar statistics prevailed

Profile of Marchers

The ages of those participating in the Poor People's Campaign ranged from the very young to those who were grandparents. The majority were Negro. There were a few barefoot hippies, most of them white. Among the younger set, there was an underfiver, Christopher was his name, who captured the hearts of all Greenbelters who watched over him. He'd look at you with a "try and catch me" smile and then take off with a Sister from St. Hugh's or a volunteer worker chasing after him.

Sitting on the grass in the late afternoon outside of St. Hugh's Grenoble Hall was a grandmother from Philadelphia who said, "I'm here for the sake of my greatgrandchildren." She told us that she had no thought whatsoever of joining in the Poor People's Campaign, but came to an onthe-spot decision while watching the group at a rally in Indepen-
