APB Report on Kenilworth Avenue

After studying for several months the seven alternatives for highway construction in the US 1/MD 201 corridor between the Capital Beltway and the new Intercounty Connector (ICC), the Advisory Planning Board (APB) recommended to the Greenbelt City Council that road expansion options that focus on improvements to US 1 provide the best utilization of resources by increasing capacity near new and existing population centers.

The report was presented to council at its November 24 meeting and acted upon by council at its December 8 meeting. Council agreed to relay the board's recommendations to the State Highway Administration (SHA) as the city's recommendation along with some additional comments of the council.

Alternatives

The US 1/MD 201 Corridor Study by the SHA considered seven alternatives including a "no build." Alternative 2 consists of undertaking various intersection improvements to improve the management of traffic. Alternative 3 involves widening US 1 Between Sunnyside Road (oppo-

site the main Beltsville Agricultural Research Center buildings) and Domer Road (Laurel Shopping Center) to six lanes.

Alternative 4 has two parts, East and West. Both involve widening MD 201, Kenilworth/Edmonston Road, to four lanes from Cherrywood Lane on the northern border of Greenbelt to Ammendale Road in Vannsville. The 4 West alternative then extends MD 201 across US 1 to intersect with the ICC in the vicinity of Virginia Manor Road and Van Dusen Road between I-95 and US 1. Alternative 5 also has an East and West part and is essentially combinations of Alternative 3 with Alternative 4 East and West.

Recommendations

The APB decided that it could not recommend one alternative above another as no single alternative met all of the study's project goals adequately. Instead, it decided to select the least objectionable alternative (3) and modify it as necessary to create the ideal plan.

The board did not like the proposal to extend MD 201 to the ICC as it would create a

"throughway" for traffic between I-95 at the ICC and I-95 in Greenbelt bypassing the congested I-95/I-495 interchange at College Park. Improving MD 201 in the East alternative just to Ammendale Road did nothing to improve US 1 or accommodate new traffic from the proposed massive Konterra Development south of Laurel.

Undertaking improvements only to US 1 provided for levels of service at intersections not much worse than if all proposed road improvements were undertaken, the board found. It liked the fact that the Alternative 3 proposal included a median which would improve public safety and provide for aesthetic improvements with street trees.

However, the board found unacceptable the failure of SHA to propose bicycle lanes meeting AASHTO standards on US 1 and proposed including a marked 5-foot lane next to a twelve-foot outer traffic lane. The APB also recommended a 6-foot wide sidewalk instead of the proposed 5-foot walk.

Greenbelt in Focus Asks Council For Group Status Recognition

Only a handful of people showed up for the Greenbelt City Council worksession held Monday, January 5 at one of the Academy Stadium Theaters in Beltway Plaza. The meeting's purpose was to consider a proposal by Greenbelt in Focus for recognition group status from the city.

Greenbelt in Focus (GIF) produces short video sequences concerning events involving Greenbelt and Greenbelters that are shown in the Academy theaters. The city's Advisory Planning Board had recommended that GIF be denied such status since the organization used facilities of Greenbelt Access Television (GATE), which is already city-funded and since GIF is not a membership group.

Topics

The meeting began with the showing of a series of videos produced by the organization. So far some 42 minutes of film have been produced, though only a few examples were shown at the Monday meeting.

Among various topics were a sequence about a Greenbelt yoga class, another on NASA's earlier plan not to repair the Hubble telescope, a Springfest event at the Springhill Lake Recreation Center and a sequence showing Mayor Judith Davis promoting

the city's plans for three days, called Visioning, in which citizens could participate in planning the city's future.

Members of GIF are Konrad Herling, president; "Kap" Kapistan, an owner of Beltway Plaza, vice president; Barbara Simon, secretary; and Angela Hughes, treasurer. According to Kapistan, each film produced is shown 100 to 120 times a month in the Academy theaters.

In fact, GIF is not an affiliate of GATE, said GATE's Malia Murray, who said the former group's equipment was kept in her home. As a courtesy, however, GATE allows GIF to use the latter's Community Center space for its monthly meetings.

Not a Business

"In no way is this a business," said Kapistan. He described GIF as incorporated as a nonprofit organization under a 501-C3 designation. Currently the group receives \$741 per month from Empirian Village, owners of the former Springhill Lake.

"We bring city activities to this side of town," said Kapistan. He described its functions as educating, creating an artistic production and meeting a community need.

"Is there any way to demonstrate the impact of GIF?" asked Councilmember Leta Mach.

Herling said the board had discussed "getting a survey" concerning the impact of the films. He reiterated about the enterprise that "This is art."

"Art is in the eye of the beholder," countered Davis.

She asked what it was like as an organization. It is like a nonprofit with a board of directors was the answer – almost like a CEO and board members. Board members are not paid, Kapistan said. The budget for summer 2007 was \$2,000 per month, he said, "to carry expenses." The

Greenbelt and Other Cities Join in Geocache Trail

Lace up those hiking boots. The Maryland Municipal League (MML) has announced the January 1 opening of a GeoTrail covering many cities and towns throughout the state. And yes, Greenbelt is set to get on board. MML created the Geocache Trail to promote awareness of and visits to Maryland's cities and towns, with the goal of helping to stimulate economic development in Maryland's municipalities. It is also a very good way to get some exercise and see historic and natural sites throughout the area. Kids to seniors are drawn to this sport.

A geocache trail is a series of geocaches tied together by a common theme. The theme of the Maryland Municipal League Geocache Trail is Celebrating Maryland's Cities and Towns. The trail is currently comprised of 78 city/town caches located in the 11 MML Districts throughout the state.

The City of Greenbelt currently

has about eight geocache sites with more planned for the future. Among the many interesting things people may find are trail maps, museum brochures, trinkets and more. Greenbelt was one of the first cities to sign up with the MML GeoTrail program. So was a neighbor to the south, Cottage City. A future article will provide more details on Greenbelt's program. However, the details below will allow residents to start to learn how to geocache.

What is a Geocache?

A geocache is a hidden box or treasure. Discovering a geocache, is very much like going on a treasure hunt using a hand-held GPS (Global Positioning System) unit to plot map coordinates to locate the treasure or "cache." The geocacher must access the official geocache website and download or manually enter the map coordinates for each cache on the

"Green" Means: Take the Bus!

Greenbelt, known for its greenness for decades, apparently is on the threshold of great embarrassment as it finds itself potentially threatened with loss of parts of its Metrobus service.

How could this be, with Greenbelters having campaigned for many years to increase this service? It's mainly because of low ridership.

Why won't local car owners use public transit? It seems to me that one of the reasons is that bus riding requires learning a new set of skills. One needs to learn public transit etiquette and bus schedules; how to plan trips, stay within transit system rules, operate farecard machines, get around Metrorail stations and signal bus operators; what to do if lost or having missed the last bus and how to communicate complaints and praise the system.

Complicated, huh, compared to just hopping in your car and zipping off? If you have the misfortune of waiting an hour for a late bus, that would be an ideal time to compare your experience with the experience of waiting for hours in a traffic jam or waiting for days to get your car fixed.

Whenever I ride the bus I may read, write, talk with friends, use a cell phone, sightsee or just stare mindlessly into space – all without endangering others or myself.

My purpose here is merely to ask that thoughtful Greenbelters plan long term to ride the C2 or R12 Metrobus once or twice per week at least to Beltway Plaza or Greenbelt Metro. Both of these, as well as the T16/17 pass through Greenbelt. There are bus schedules at the library.

Please consider the following additional perks to riding a Metrobus: No wear on your car, no risk of car breakdown or car-jacking, no parking fees, no need for a second or third car, increased opportunity for exercise and you will meet new friends.

Meanwhile I plan to continue carrying bus schedules, as well as New Deal Café entertainment schedules (and later lists of Greenbelt businesses) to the transportation rack at the Student Union building at the U of MD with the hope of stimulating both the Metrobus system as well as our small businesses.

Board of Ed Meetings On Search Next Week

The Prince George's County Board of Education will hold community-wide town hall-type meetings next week as part of its effort to obtain public input in the process of selecting a new superintendent for the county public school system.

The closest meeting to Greenbelt will be held at 7:30 p.m. next Wednesday, January 14 at High Point High School, 3601 Powder Mill Road in Beltsville in the Multi-purpose Room. Other meetings are on Tuesday, January 13 in Upper Marlboro and Oxon Hill and on Wednesday, January 14 in Capital Heights. This is an opportunity for the public to weigh in on the traits and characteristics they want in a new superintendent. Additional meetings will be held for the county association of student governments, teachers, administrators, staff, elected officials and community leaders.

Officials from the Maryland Association of Boards of Education will ask the community for thoughts on these three questions: what are the good things happening in the county; what are the skills, qualities and characteristics desired in the next superintendent; and any issues of which a new superintendent needs to be aware in order to be successful. Members of the community will not be asked to recommend names of candidates nor give their thoughts about specific candidates.

Md. College Savings Plan Session at GMS

On Thursday, January 22 at 7 p.m. a program will be held at Greenbelt Middle School (GMS) for parents on the Maryland College Savings Plan. Guest speaker John Trader will provide information on this state-sponsored college savings program to have a student's college education paid for by the time they graduate from high school. The session will provide help to parents in planning for their child or children's future and in getting an early start for the college years. The session will be held in the school's Multi-purpose Room.

GHI to Survey About Energy Use

"Is your home too cold in the winter or too hot in the summer? Are your energy bills too high?" That's the opening to a cover letter for a short survey every GHI member will receive during the week of January 12.

The survey, conducted by GHI's new Buildings Committee, is intended to help the committee draft a plan for heating system replacement and other home energy upgrades. The plan's goals are to maximize members' comfort in their homes and to minimize their energy costs in the most environmentally friendly and economically efficient way possible.

Members who complete and return the survey to GHI will be eligible to win one of three \$100 cash prizes. The survey should take about 10 minutes to complete.

The survey asks members to assess the degree of comfort in their homes, to identify energy-efficient investments they may already have undertaken and to evaluate their degree of satisfaction with those improvements.

The deadline for returning the survey is February 7. Members can mail it directly to the GHI administration building (1 Hamilton Place), place it in the mail slot of the building's front door or complete the survey at a workshop on home energy efficiency to be held on Saturday, February 7 from 2 to 4 p.m. at the Hamilton Place office. The workshop will offer tips on inexpensive ways to reduce home energy bills.

The drawing for the three cash prize winners will be made at the end of the workshop.

In late December 2008 the GHI Buildings Committee drafted a Request for Proposal (RFP) for an energy consultant to conduct analyses of GHI homes, suggest alternative types of replacement systems for the current electric baseboard heaters, recommend alternative ways of upgrading home insulation and estimate the costs and payback periods of the alternative heating systems and insulation strategies. The con-

Pearl M. Keeney

Former Greenbelter Pearl Marie Keeney, 89, died January 1, 2009, at Anne Arundel Medical Center after a year of declining health. She was a resident of Sunrise Independent and Assisted Living in Severna Park since 2004.



Born in Annapolis Junction on October 22, 1919, she graduated from Glen Burnie High School where she was captain of her basketball and field hockey teams. She later completed a secretarial program at Strayer College. Mrs. Keeney was employed as a secretary for the federal government at the Department of Agriculture and NASA.

She met her future husband, the late Kenneth Keeney, on a blind date in 1940. They later married during World War II prior to Mr. Keeney's being shipped overseas, where he served in the North African and Italian campaigns. Their wedding at the Baltimore Cathedral was delayed a day as a result of an 11-inch snowstorm on Palm Sunday, March 29, 1942, a date still recognized as one of the top five snowstorms in the Baltimore area.

After the war, with the help of Mrs. Keeney's father, a journeyman bricklayer, the couple built their home in Greenbelt where they lived for 55 years on Lakeside Drive.

During her marriage she enjoyed square dancing, sewing, gardening and church activities. Mrs. Keeney was an accomplished bowler, serving as president and secretary of her league. She previously was an active member of the women's sodality at St. Hugh's Catholic Church in Greenbelt. She was also an active member of the Greenbelt Golden Age Club. She prided herself on her manicured yard and landscaping of azaleas, dogwoods and Japanese maples.

Mrs. Keeney also enjoyed many family gatherings, community activities around Greenbelt Lake and vacation trips over the years to Myrtle Beach, S.C., and St. Petersburg, Fla.

The couple was honored in 2007 as the longest married couple (65 years) in the Archdiocese of Baltimore.

Her husband Kenneth Keeney died in October 2007.

She is survived by two daughters, Theresa Mae Romanek of Jefferson, Md. and Kendra Lynn Hurt of Arnold, Md.; four grandchildren; and four great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held on Thursday, January 8 at St. John's Catholic Church in Severna Park. Interment followed at the Maryland Veterans Cemetery in Crownsville.

GHI Plans to Compress Employees' Work Schedule

Like many companies, Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI) is faced with the challenges of increasing efficiencies of its operations and addressing work/life balances of employees in a sagging economy. With gasoline prices fluctuating and employees facing conflicts with family obligations and work/life balance issues, the cooperative found it necessary to explore different ways of conducting GHI business operations.

Developing a budget that assured no reduction of service to members yet keeping fee increases reasonable required creative thinking. As a result, GHI investigated alternate work schedules.

Although gasoline prices have lately decreased considerably, no one expects this situation to remain so. Congressman Steny Hoyer has said, "State and local governments across the nation, including New Mexico, Virginia and Utah, are implementing four-day work weeks to conserve energy, reduce fuel consumption and alleviate congestion."

GHI's investigation uncovered these and other possible benefits to employees and members alike. Because it is a small company, the board decided it was not practical to offer alternate work schedules to meet individual employee needs. Some positions exist for which an alternate work schedule is neither practical nor realistic.

The board also wanted to assure members that staff is avail-

able to serve them. Expanding daily service hours was seen as allowing for greater flexibility to members in both office hours and work performed within homes.

The GHI Board of Directors thus has endorsed a compressed work week option. Starting in February 2009, employees will work 80 hours in a nine-day, rather than 10-day pay cycle. The office will have extended hours Monday through Thursday and will operate eight hours one Friday and close one Friday within the pay cycle.

This new schedule will give members longer daily hours to access the Administration Building and to schedule maintenance work. When GHI is closed on the alternate Friday, emergency services will be provided, as is now the case on weekends.

The two-week pay period will remain at 80 hours with no loss of work time either for employees or maintenance service time for members.

GHI is eager to track the utility and other energy savings it anticipates as its carbon imprint is reduced. For at least two days a month, trucks and building utility costs will be minimized. Employees are anticipating benefits such as time and transportation savings. Some have said they especially look forward to being able to schedule doctor's visits and chores on the Fridays the office is closed.

Maryland Municipal League Geo Trail; then use the GPS to find the caches.

The program is a little high tech but don't let that scare you. You must have a GPS unit to participate but these are being used by more and more drivers and hikers. Then just access the official geocache website www.geocaching.com, go to the MML account and download or manually enter the map coordinates for each cache on the Maryland Municipal League GeoTrail; then use the GPS to find the caches.

Contest

A collectible, highly coveted geo coin will be given to the first 500 geocachers who locate a minimum of 22 city/town caches throughout the state. To be eligible for the coin, geocachers must pick up a passport at any participating visitor center, use the stamp in each cache on their passports and write in the cache code word. After at least two municipal caches in each of the 11 districts are discovered, geocachers may return to any one of the participating county visitor centers and have their passports validated to receive a collectible coin. Passports may continue to be used even after all coins have been claimed as a way for geocachers to keep track of their Maryland Municipal League Geocache Trail discoveries.

group had applied to area businesses for financial support.

The city could send letters of support, Davis suggested. "They would be helpful to have," said Simon.

The city can also support the group by allowing it to use city space "at no cost," Davis said, referring to groups like the Girl Scouts who hold meetings in the Community Center.

Kapistan described how the Lion's Club's annual project of providing Christmas gifts for underprivileged children had had "a tremendous response this year" from Beltway Plaza theater-goers after they saw the GIF film on the subject.

Simon wondered if the city might be able to add a line item to support the organization, with the city paying for "specific promotional items?"

Unfortunately "money is not in the budget now," said City Manager Michael McLaughlin. He mentioned there is only a small amount "for promotion, such as publishing of newsletters, etc."

Murray said currently the city funds video promotion for about eight events a year, working with Beverly Palau, the city's public information coordinator.

"You would have to come up with a proposal," Davis said, referring to specific topics the city might fund. "We're paying for the service," she suggested. "The budget for this year is going to be okay," she added, noting that will not be true "for the next several years."

As relates to MD 201, the APB proposed additional bicycle lane improvements. It did not like SHA proposals for right turn lanes on MD 201 considering them unsafe for pedestrians. Instead the board recommended the installation of roundabouts at Sunnyside, Powder Mill and Muirkirk Roads.

Lastly, the board recommended that transit options be considered for US 1. Possibilities were light rail in the median, an express bus lane or a designated right-of-way for the extension of Metro to Konterra.

On December 8 the City Council adopted the APB recommendation and agreed to transmit them to SHA as the city recommendations but to add stronger language urging that safe pedestrian and bicycle facilities be included in any improvement.

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Police "Customer" Surveys Offer Pleasing Results

"How are we doing?" It's not unusual for consumers to get a questionnaire asking that type of question after making a big purchase. It's more unusual to get such a questionnaire, though, after you've gotten a ticket from the police. But if you live in or near to the City of Greenbelt that could happen.

For the past four years the department has been sending out on a random basis about 20 questionnaires a month to persons who have had contact with the department either by being a victim of a crime or by being stopped for a minor traffic violation. Regularly performing such a survey is a requirement for becoming an accredited police department by the Commission on Accreditation of Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA). The Greenbelt Department has achieved accreditation.

Sergeant Carl Shinner who is the department's accreditation manager in the Office of Professional Standards praised CALEA for imposing such a requirement upon the department. He points out that the questionnaires are sent out to and the responses are from persons known to have had a contact with the department. "Our data is from people in real time," he noted.

Shinner is pleased with the survey results. While there is always room for improvement, he believes the results obtained proves that "we are a professional police department."

Chief James Craze also is pleased with the survey's results. "It shows that we are providing good service to the community and that people appreciate the good service we provide."

The survey results are posted at the police department website at www.greenbeltmd.gov/police. Craze notes that the city website also has a survey questionnaire that anyone can fill out although very few persons have done so. He believes the departmental survey is more valid because it is obtained from people with known police contacts.

Results

Police were particularly pleased that for the second year in a row

100 percent of those surveyed who had called the department for assistance said that their call was answered in a polite and timely manner. All respondents also found the officer responding to present a professional demeanor and 96 percent found the officer courteous and understanding. Officer response time varied from less than five minutes (33 percent), 10 to 15 minutes (43 percent) and 15 to 30 minutes (24 percent).

After an encounter with an officer 88 percent of the respondents were left with a positive opinion of the officer and 84 percent had a positive opinion of the police department. Nearly all respondents also rated the overall performance of the Greenbelt Police Department to be very good (72 percent) or good (24 percent). When it came to rating the competence of agency personnel, however, the ratings were somewhat lower with 63 percent believing that it was very good and 27 percent finding it good and 10 percent finding the personnel to be either average or poor.

Traffic Stops

Of those stopped 61 percent were issued warnings, 37 percent were issued citations and eight percent repair orders. Asked if the officer's appearance was professional in nature (dress, grooming and language) and if the officer was courteous and explained the reason why the person was stopped, 92 percent answered affirmatively. The same percentage of respondents also said that the officer explained the warning, citation or repair order, answered any questions asked and left the respondent with a positive opinion of the officer. However, only 77 percent were left with a positive opinion about the police department.

Combining the surveys for those citizens who requested service with those citizens being stopped by an officer, 87 percent of the respondents had a positive opinion of the officer involved. In 2006 this result was 93 percent. However, in 2006 only 63 percent of the combined respondents had a positive opinion of the police department as compared to 76 percent in 2008.

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College Park

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The Department is offering a reward of up to \$500 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of a suspect in any of the unsolved crimes reported in the blotter. 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Vehicle Hits Post Office Causing Structural Damage

On Sunday, January 4 at approximately 3:30 p.m., a woman driving a 1996 Nissan Pathfinder apparently mistakenly chose the wrong gear and drove through a window of the Greenbelt Post Office. The station was closed at the time and said to be empty of patrons. Police notified the postmaster.

An employee who lives nearby checked on the situation. She found glass fragments strewn throughout the lobby area near the postal boxes, some as far as 25 feet from the window that was demolished. The vehicle also hit

a corner of the wall opposite the window adjacent to the rows of postal boxes.

At first some patrons were unable to open their boxes because the supporting framework had been damaged but adjustments were made and boxes were accessible by Tuesday. There is evident structural damage to the building as well as the window frame. No one was reported hurt in the accident. There is not yet an estimate for repair costs, though a postal service employee said he thought the damage was "substantial."

a.m. Drivers and runners work from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Those who can work one day a week, once or twice a month or whenever they can are urged to help.

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


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


