County Official Discusses Small Business Economic Opportunities

At a Greenbelt City Council worksession on June 24 President and CEO Kwasi Holman of the Prince George's County Economic Development Corporation (EDC) reviewed the current economic situation for small businesses in the county. By definition small businesses are those earning \$5 million or less per year. "Most are far smaller than that," Holman said.

Present at the meeting, besides members of the city council, were City Manager Michael McLaughlin and City Clerk Cindy Murray, as well as "Kap" Kapistan of Beltway Plaza. Other city merchants had been invited but none attended the meeting.

Holman said his agency provides assistance to area businesses, such as help with business plans and access to capital and other resources. For example, EDC can help put local entrepreneurs in touch with area lawyers, offer assistance in preparing bids or help them locate franchise opportunities.

EDC also provides technical assistance in analyzing the current market. "Does it also offer financial assistance?" asked Councilmember Edward Putens.

"Yes," Holman answered. His agency can offer micro-loans up to \$30,000. More importantly, it can provide access to technical services such as bonding and financing. In addition, the agency can provide "continuing support," he said, with two counselors on staff to offer this service.

Holman brought with him packets of literature assembled in multicolored folders to demonstrate the kinds of assistance his office provides under Director Charlotte Ducksworth – for example, with tax credits, site location, available IT (information technology) firms or bilingual assistance

A training calendar for 2009 lists scheduled events each month from January to December – many at no cost – for current and prospective entrepreneurs. Women business owners might be

targeted in one program; another program might address how to access a grant award process.

Printed in 2006, the brochure, with a forward by Holman, seemed more optimistic than today's business outlook, however. "Although Prince George's County has become one of the fastest-growing counties in Maryland," he writes, "we must take a balanced approach to development"

Transit-oriented

His statement refers to the county's "transit-oriented development" – a topic, as Greenbelters can attest, that in 2009 seems a good deal less optimistic.

On the local level, Holman said, his organization looks at what kind of businesses would best fit into your community. "We try to analyze each business and help them," he said. "We also try to have clients team up on some projects."

Councilmember Konrad Herling noted that three stores currently are vacant at Greenway

Kapistan pointed out as an advantage that EDC hosts a website where vacancies can be listed.

In fact, Holman said, his organization has a \$50,000 marketing budget. He is working on "branding" the county. He said merchants can put pictures on the EDC website. He added that the county needs more multi-story office buildings.

Area Students Collaborate On Scientific Experiments

For the past two weeks, 19 students from six area schools collaborated to perform experiments and solve mysteries such as what lurks in Greenbelt Lake, who stuck gum on the principal's desk and which classrooms were infected with a (mock) infectious strain of bacteria? They participated in a Science in the Summer evening program offered by St. Hugh's School.

Those who enjoy the beauty of Greenbelt Lake will be pleased to know that water quality tests performed by the students found the lake to contain adequate levels of oxygen, low levels of nitrate and phosphate, a healthy pH and tem-

perature and no detectable levels of pesticides.

As part of a lesson about fer-

As part of a lesson about fermentation, students made their own root beer and tasted foods that microbes helped to produce, such as sauerkraut, sourdough bread, idli, injera, yogurt and Gorgonzola cheese. The most favorite fermented food was chocolate. Fermentation of cacao beans, followed by roasting, gives chocolate its characteristic color and flavor.

Cars and Cupcakes

Coupled with other ecology and biology lessons, students

SADD Teens Earn Honors Fighting Underage Drinking

In the spring the Washington Regional Alcohol Program (WRAP) presented its 17th annual GEICO Student Awards to the Eleanor Roosevelt High School's (ERHS) SADD club and the clubs of three other local high schools. SADD stands for Students Against Destructive Decisions. Calling it recognition of high school students "doing the right thing," WRAP honored the schools for their efforts in fighting underage drinking.

This is the fifth year in a row that ERHS has been an award winner. The GEICO Student Awards were presented by WRAP to Washington metropolitan area high school student groups promoting alcohol and drug-free lifestyles to their peers. The awards, judged by members of the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments' (COG) Drug Prevention and Education Committee in tandem with WRAP, were presented to just one student group in each of the Greater Washington counties and cities served by WRAP. **Judging**

Student groups were judged on their leadership, effectiveness, innovation and involvement of both the student body and community in their efforts to prevent underage drinking. Joanne Read, the club's sponsor, stated that the ERHS SADD group initiated two new activities this school year.

First, they published several issues of a school SADD newsletter which the students distributed to all homerooms and to the entire staff to keep both the student body and staff informed of ongoing activities and campaigns. The second new project started this year was the "Teen Driver Safety Contest." The entire student body was invited to enter the contest. Contestants entered TV/video productions, creative writing pieces, posters and a song submitted and performed by a band student. All of the entries promoted safe driving and spoke

Rena Hull Puts Her Stamp On Greenbelt and Beyond

For the last nine years – that's one year after Rena Hull was named Greenbelt's Outstanding Citizen for 1999 – she and her husband Larry and I have met together twice a week for an hourlong exercise class in the Greenbelt Community Center. No, let me correct that statement: When Rena and Larry were not traveling – that is, when they were here in Greenbelt – they have been faithful members of our class.

Before that time, Rena had been far too busy to indulge herself in quiet workouts. She had been elected president of the Labor Day Festival from 1987 to 1989 and served as acting president in 1982, 1985 and 1986 when the elected incumbents suddenly resigned.

She had also been chair of the parents' committee for Grad Night at Eleanor Roosevelt High School in 1996, 1998 and 2000, when her three daughters, in turn, were graduating seniors. And besides those responsibilities, she held a fulltime job as a school nurse with the Prince George's County Public Schools, from which she retired in 2004.

Leisure Time

With their daughters grown, she and Larry have had leisure for travel – three times to Alaska in their motor home (besides twice before her retirement) and a trip to Hawaii. Then there were two weddings – daughter Rena's in 2005 and daughter Kateri's in 2007 – and Larry's triple bypass

surgery. And she's on the planning committee for the 50th anniversary of her graduating class from High Point High School.

Rena enjoys being active but no longer as chairman or president of whatever group she has joined. Let the younger folks take over, she says. She still sings in the church choir and heads the cole slaw committee for the Labor Day luncheon at the Community

Emergency Response

But there's something new in her life. Following her retirement she received training with CERT - that's the Community Emergency Response Team, sponsored by Homeland Security. She also participated in Metro's safety training course. Little did she know she would be called upon to head for Hardy, near New Orleans, following hurricane Katrina. She worked with a team there of some 100 Marylanders from the Maryland State Health Department serving for two weeks in seven medical clinics.

This spring she and Larry went back to see how the area was recovering and to visit the fire chief and his wife whom Rena had met there. She and Larry discovered that the heavily damaged local school near her clinic had been torn down and replaced with a temporary building and that a new school is being planned.

In March this year she and

The program provides immediate, customized feedback as well as the opportunity to schedule an appointment for further evaluation if necessary.

This also applies to students who may have attended private school or schools in other counties. Register now to avoid crowds later in the summer. Also required are: utility bill showing the parent's name and address, the student's birth certificate, shots record and withdrawal papers from the previous school. The parent or guardian must also have a photo ID of themselves.

Torey John Ferguson, 37, a talented musician and artist, died in his sleep in his home on Sunday, July 5, 2009.




Torey was a familiar person in Greenbelt. His great-grandmother, Miriam K. Cornelius, spent many years living in Greenbelt and was an active part of the community. Torey moved to Greenbelt before he was in first grade, and, in fact, moved into 10B Crescent Road, which is now the Greenbelt Museum. He lived in Greenbelt until after he graduated from Eleanor Roosevelt High School.

Torey played soccer with the Boys and Girls Club. He played as a beginner, on the blue team, the red team, the green team and the yellow team. He made so many wonderful friends during that time . . . many who are still good friends.

Torey had to stop playing soccer around age 11 when he lost his sight due to a hereditary disease. But he always amazed family and friends with his sense of humor and ability to live independently with enthusiasm, optimism and ease. Living in Greenbelt was so perfect for him . . . with his cane he could navigate through the underpasses and it was like the town was designed for him.

Torey moved to Upper Marlboro in the spring of 1994 and he worked hard to graduate from the University of Maryland with a B.A. in studio arts in 2000. He made beautiful bronze art pieces. He also was looking forward to



making new recordings with his band and a bright new future.



built solar cars, decorated cupcakes with candies to represent parts of cells and held millipedes, redworms and Sheila, a four-foot corn snake. Lessons in biochemistry and genetics involved isolating students' own DNA and performing agarose gel electrophoresis.

Many students said their favorite activity was the hike around the lake to observe wildlife and collect samples of pond water. Johnathan Schnurr, a 6th

grade participant, describes his experience: "We went along the lake path and got water and went back to the classroom. We put some water under the microscope . . . I saw a cell . . . it was awesome! I got so excited.'

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

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
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
