Other Hurdles

APB members recognized several additional hurdles that the developers and Craftstar would have to overcome to secure the city's approval of the project, including the potential operation of Greenbelt's obligations under the Tax Incremental Financing (TIF) agreement entered into with the developers that would provide city financing of the proposed north-south connector road from Greenbelt Road to the South Core project.

Since the projected Craftstar sales prices for their 151 town homes are estimated in the \$300,000 to \$350,000 range, as opposed to the Pulte-proposed project estimated in the \$600,000 range, the city will have to assess the projected revenue from the sale of homes at their new price levels to assure that the projected

tax revenue can support the projected infrastructure costs for the project.

The TIF process allows for municipal/county financing for infrastructure in which the projected added property tax revenues from the project pay for the financing, presumably with no net cost to existing city taxpayers. This TIF and infrastructure issue is further complicated by the failure (up to now) of Prince George's County to fulfill their TIF commitments.

Fulfillment of these commitments would be needed for completion of the north-south connector road to the Metro, the proposed Metro parking structure to replace the existing Metro surface parking and the proposed new Beltway access ramp to the Metroland project from the east.

In addition, several developer commitments are included in a 2006 agreement between the city and the developers that are tied to the South Core. These include \$25,000 for design of a recreational facility serving the South Core residents; a deed/transfer to the city of land from the developers for the proposed "town green" that would extend eastward from the townhome project toward the state-owned conservation area adjacent to Cherrywood Lane and a developer commitment to assist in

This proposed project is one of several incremental improvements the city has been making to improve overall water quality for the Lake. This item has been on council's agenda for the past three years.

In September 2007 council unanimously voted to support concept plans prepared by Environmental Systems Analysis, Inc. (ESA) for the stream restoration project and directed staff to proceed with final design and printing. Hruby's presentation updated council on the progress of the project and described changes in the design elements.

She noted the addition of a proposed Coastal Plain Outfall, a relatively new technique providing infiltration capabilities to the overall strategy, lessening flows to the lake. She also noted a slight redesign of the stream bank slopes in certain areas to reduce the impact on trees in the See STREAM, page 6

project area.

The tree impacts had been noted during a February 2009 council tour of the project area. City staff recognized these tree impacts but feel that when the overall environmental value of the project is weighed against the loss of the trees, the project as proposed is worthy of implementation.

Nearby residents had been invited to a walk of the project area in April and though some residents expressed concern about the tree loss, the overall tone of the walk was positive. According to the project documents, up to 51 trees may be lost. Of these 51, three trees may be able to be saved.

Project Elements

Hruby described the elements of the project as a series of engineering techniques along the stream course that include stabilization of the banks and construction of an improved outfall and a plunge pool, part of the coastal plain outfall. Concrete rubble would be removed and so-called step pools would moderate the energy of the stream flow.

Middle School Construction Set to Begin January 2010

Construction on the new Greenbelt Middle School (GMS) is expected to start January 2010, Prince Georges County Public Schools (PGCPS) officials announced at a public hearing Monday, August 10 in the GMS gymnasium.

The plans and schematics for the new school were displayed and distributed to the 50 people

Lake, Paint Branch, Magnolia and Hollywood. Only Springhill Lake Elementary sends sixth graders to GMS.

When asked about future capacity to deal with planned housing growth in Greenbelt West, Mitchell pointed out that the new school will already be a big school. "Schools of over 1,000 are not good schools," he said, so GMS should not be expanded to meet future enrollment. Rather PGCPS would need to come up with other solutions, such as building more schools.

For the first time the city electorate will choose a seven-member council instead of the traditional five-member council, the policymaking body of Greenbelt. The deadline for filing nomination petitions is Monday, September 21 at 5 p.m. The increase from five to seven councilmembers was the result of an election change generated by an October 2008 letter to the city from the American Civil Liberties Union and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. The organizations threatened legal action unless the city addressed the lack of minority representation on existing councils. In response the city scheduled some 10 public forums in various sections of the Greenbelt community. As a result the current council enacted a charter amendment enlarging the size of the

The city has mailed out an election newsletter to residents which can also be found on the city's website, www.greenbeltmd. gov. The site also contains a chart of important election deadlines and dates as well as the candidate's packet and other information.

Beginning with the 2009 election, the City of Greenbelt will elect a seven-member council every other year. The mayor and mayor pro tem are chosen by the city council at the organizational meeting following the election. Members of council are elected at large, "with the highest votegetter traditionally being selected as mayor and the second highest as mayor pro tem."

and school officials fielded questions about capacity, appropriate environmental considerations, access and the schedule of the building construction.

The new building is expected to be a replacement building, with the capacity to house 990 students. Current GMS enrollment is 820.

According to Derek Mitchell, executive director of the New and Charter Schools Office, the new middle school will not be expected to have the capacity to accept sixth grade students from any of its feeder schools that are not already sending sixth graders.

Currently the elementary feeder schools for GMS are Greenbelt, Berwyn Heights, Springhill

The New Building

The new building will be on the land already owned by the school system. The current building is located at the corner of Greenbelt and Edmonston Roads. The new one will front on Breezewood Drive in what is now a wooded part of the property.

The plan is to build the new school while the old school is still in place. Once the new building is completed, the nonhistoric part of the old building will be torn down, leaving the gym, music rooms and a few classrooms of the original building.

Buddy Attick Funds Approved by State

The State Board of Public Works has approved the City of Greenbelt's request for \$225,000 in Program Open Space funds for Buddy Attick Park Master Plan improvements. Projected work includes redesign of the current parking lot, park signage, landscaping and bioretention areas. Use of innovative materials, such as rain gardens and native plantings aims to minimize environmental impact. No date has been set to proceed.

B-W Parkway Plans Include Repaving

In an August 21 letter to Greenbelt City Councilmember Leta Mach, Greenbelt Park Manager Fred Cunningham described future plans for the Baltimore-Washington Parkway. That portion of the Parkway between the Route 50 exchange near the District of Columbia line and Maryland Route 175, south of Baltimore, is under National Park Service jurisdiction.

Cunningham refers to two rumors concerning future development of the Parkway - the desire of the State of Maryland to increase the number of lanes and a suggestion to make the Parkway a toll road. Neither is "something that we could support," Cunningham said.

"We work with the Federal Highway Administration when planning any major rehabilitation or repair projects on the Parkway," Cunningham's letter says. He refers to plans to repave the entire federal portion of the roadway as well as to remove and replace chain link fencing both northbound and southbound near Greenbelt.

Currently guardrails are being installed in the median in certain areas of the Parkway following a safety study that showed a number of crossover traffic injuries and fatalities with vehicles leaving one side of the Parkway and striking others in the opposite lanes.

the funding of a proposed roundabout traffic circle at Cherrywood Lane and Metro Access Drive.

This last commitment is currently in default as of May 2009. Garth Buehl, representing the Metroland developers, assured the APB that he had sent a letter to the city on August 19 covering those commitments. Buehl promised at earlier meetings with APB to update the city by letter.

Storm Water Plan

Another complicating factor was added at the August 19 meeting with the announcement by the developer's representative and Craftstar that the storm water management plan (SWMP) for the project approved at the time of the Detailed Site Plan (DSP) approval in 2006 may be superseded by new county legislation that goes into effect in May 2010.

Some APB members felt this might have been a wedge issue on the part of the developers to urge quicker action on the proposed revision to the DSP. Other members saw this SWMP as a possible improvement from a storm water management and environmental standpoint.

was making offers to meet the staff and APB design issues.

Craftstar representative Ken Mergenser tried to convince APB members that their redesigned project was actually superior to the Pulte design. He said their product should not be viewed as "low-end" as far as the current market is concerned.

He also noted that in their experience about 60 percent or more of Craftstar purchasers opt for upgrades that could raise the selling price of units to the \$375,000 to \$425,000 range.

At meeting's end, five of the seven APB members (Keith Chernikoff, Sheldon Goldberg, Jim Cohen, Emmett Jordan and Chairman George Branyan) were sufficiently persuaded that the design features were getting close enough to the original DSP requirements that they would recommend to council that the city consider modifying the covenants to allow the Craftstar project to go forward.

APB members Sandra Lange and Brian Gibbons disagreed. They were not sufficiently convinced that granting approval for only the 151 Craftstar homes was the appropriate policy to pursue. They noted the infrastructure problems and that the potential for departure from the higher-priced Pulte design could set the tone for any future development in the area. They opposed going forward in view of all of the uncertainties concerning ultimate developments in Greenbelt West. The APB agreed that the chairman would draft a proposed report encompassing the recommendation for approval of the design modifications. That report would be considered for final approval and transmission to council at APB's next meeting scheduled

was looking further upstream in GHI neighborhoods for mitigation of the outfall, such as with rain gardens and rain barrels.

The city has been awarded \$137,425 in grant funding for the project and staff also noted that Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI) has provided \$35,000 in additional funding because a portion of the project area is located on their property. The planning staff recommend that council approve the so-called final plans for the project dated October 13, 2008, so the project can proceed with actual final design, acquisition of permissions this winter and possible construction beginning in spring 2010.

Councilmember Rodney Roberts has objected to the expected tree loss from the project. At the August 10 meeting he repeated concerns he had made earlier that there needed to be more attention devoted to the catchment area in the vicinity of Laurel Hill, Hillside and Greenhill Roads to divert much of the stream flow that has been causing deterioration of the stream banks downstream. Hruby discussed an ESA report evaluating the possible location of a bio-retention facility in that area addressing Roberts' concerns.

Their report concluded that while installation there of a bioretention device would help to improve water quality and attenuate runoff, ESA does not believe that the device alone would result in a stable stream channel downstream, because that part of the drainage area represents only about 6 percent of the overall drainage area.

Roberts also lamented the number of trees to be sacrificed for the project, which he said he could not support. In the final vote the project design was approved four to one.

The bus depot, which is next to the middle school, temporarily will lose some land during construction. Delmar pointed out how the school meets many environmental criteria to make it a LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) building. The classrooms will face southeast to make effective use of the sunlight. The soccer field will cover a geothermal pump that will help heat the building. And the courtyard allows for natural light in all rooms.

School officials invited members of the public to see the effectiveness of the LEED architecture by visiting public events at other new schools in the area, including Vansville Elementary in Beltsville.

Access to the School

Access to the school was called into question by several people, including Ann Davis, a representative of Berwyn Heights Advisory Committee on Education. She asked about a safer system to get to school for students who need to cross Greenbelt Road.

Lawrence Fryer, chief operating officer of Support Services, answered that it was only recently that the school system, not the Department of Transportation, had the responsibility for such crossings. However, the new building does not have a budget for an overpass. Such an overpass would cost on the order of \$1 million, according to Mayor Judith Davis. Davis agreed that Greenbelt should also be working for safer crossing, potentially looking at an overpass.

The new building has been approved for design by the state and is still on schedule for a 2010 opening. The next large hurdle will come in December, when the state is to allocate the money currently earmarked for this project.

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AirFair to Celebrate 100 Years of Flight

In celebration of 100 years of flight at the College Park Airport, AirFair 100 will be presented on Saturday, August 29 from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. This air show for all ages will feature aerobatic performances, helicopter and airplane rides, aircraft displays, children's activities, vendors, entertainment and refreshments.

This celebration of 100 years of service makes the College Park Airport the oldest continually operating airport in the world. The airport has a field of firsts including the first military aviation school, first U.S. Postal Air Mail Service and first radio-navigated aids developed and tested by the Bureau of Standards.

A reproduction 1909 Wright Military Flyer will be unveiled at the AirFair. The Wright Experience of Warrenton, Va., with support from the Discovery of Flight Foundation, re-created the machine used to train the first military officers to fly. The flyer will roar to life, returning sights and sounds to College Park that have not been seen or heard in 100 years. The reproduction Military Flyer will make its permanent home at the College Park Aviation Museum and will become a permanent, interactive teaching tool. Visitors may bring an envelope or postcard and get a special airmail cancellation commemorating 100 years of aviation history.

The afternoon air show includes the Misty Blues Skydiving Team; Greg Koontz, the Flying Farmer and Decathlon Aerobatics; Kevin Russo, T-6 Texan; Otto the Helicopter; Bob Essell, the Ultralight Wingwalker; and Dan Buchanan, Hanglider Routine.

The airport is located at 1909 Corporal Frank Scott Drive in College Park. Parking is free. There is a fee, which is reduced for children age 2 to 17. Library Hours to Be Cut, Renovation Set for Winter

The Greenbelt Public Library will lose nine hours weekly beginning Monday, October 4 as cutbacks throughout the Prince George's County Library system seek to reduce a \$2.4 million budget gap. At the same time, a six-month-long, \$640,000 renovation of the Greenbelt branch is set to begin by early winter. New hours from October 4 are 1 to 9 p.m. Monday and Tuesday, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Wednesday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday.

Sunday Hours

From Sunday, September 13 the Bowie, Hyattsville and Oxon Hill branches will be open yearround on Sundays from 1 to 5 p.m. All branches will be closed Monday, October 12; Thursday, December 24 through Sunday, January 3, 2010; and Monday, June 7, 2010.

A hiring freeze started last year within the library system will continue. In addition, purchases of books and materials and regular equipment maintenance budgets will be

reduced. Bridget Warren, chief of library public relations, sees two "upsides" for Greenbelt, however: 1) a switch from double staff shifts to a single shift that will provide better service and 2) the forthcoming renovation.

Renovation

Among changes taking place with the renovation, new wifi and computer stations for public use will be added and energy-efficient lighting, painting and "a completely spruced-up" meeting room will brighten the public space. Funding includes a matching grant from the state.

"Unfortunately," said a library statement, "the decreased funding comes during an unprecedented increase in the demand for services such as job search info and public computer use." Many library services, it was noted, can be found at www.pgcmls. These include online tutoring, downloadable audio books, e-books, language learning service, SAT prep and almost 60 reference databases.

GES Teachers Immerse Themselves in the Arts

While students enjoyed their summer holiday, Greenbelt Elementary teachers have helped poise the school to take a giant step towards an arts-integrated curriculum. In July, five teachers and the principal attended the intensive Maryland Artist-Teacher Institute (MATI) program. Teachers volunteered an unpaid week of their summer vacation, spending 15-hour days to develop lesson plans, make contacts and attend workshops that focus on bringing a range of arts - puppetry, poetry, drama, dance, visual arts and music - into the classroom. Principal Kimberly Seidel and teachers Dara Case, Beth Novick, Robin Godfrey, Juanita Malone and Lynne Maydag represented the school.

"At MATI," noted Seidel, "the teachers immersed themselves in five days and evenings of arts workshops based on our Maryland Voluntary State Curriculum. Many inspiring ideas were presented to challenge and engage all students - to transform learning into 'hard fun.'"

"The PTA is grateful our faculty members sacrificed a portion of their summer vacation to be part of this," said Mimi Noorani, PTA president. "I am impressed at how energized the teachers sound."

Arts Education

MATI is part of a burgeoning statewide and national movement to increase arts in education. Research increasingly points to the importance of this initiative. According to the Kennedy Center Changing Education through the Arts partnership, the proven benefits of an arts-integrated curriculum are higher test scores, improved student behavior with less disciplinary referrals and higher attendance.

"Integrating arts into the curriculum goes beyond developing children's artistic abilities," said music teacher Dara Case. "All children learn differently. Arts provide a well-rounded way to appeal to children's different learning styles - to 'show what they know' in a way that crosses language borders, cognitive abilities and even physical challenges."

MATI attendee Lynne Maydag spoke of her previous teaching experience at an arts integration school in Bowie. "Integrating arts into the lesson was an opening to fully engage lower at GES. performing students while pro-

viding a deeper experience for the higher performing students," Maydag said. "I was impressed by the level of thinking it stimulated, what the students were able to produce and how much they enjoyed doing it."

"The transformation this initiative has had on other schools is incredible," said kindergarten teacher Robin Godfrey. "Not only in terms of the school becoming a more beautiful, artfilled space but also in the joy and engagement it brought the students - and teachers."

Artists-in-Residence

Two artists-in-residence are planned at the school next year: Dishebaum, an African drumming troupe and InterAct Story Theatre, a drama group discovered at the MATI conference.

"InterAct Story Theatre's use of drama to richly enhance literacy was very appealing," said teacher Juanita Malone. "They had a magical way of getting children to express themselves and identify with characters in a story. In addition the program recognizes a child's need to move which should resonate well, particularly with our more kinesthetic learners."

Contributions Needed

The PTA is hoping to support these efforts by establishing and raising money for an arts fund. In addition, it is seeking contributions of clean fabric, buttons, felt, construction paper, scrapbooking paper and other quality art papers. Donations are also being sought for rhythm instruments such as shakers, triangles, bells, xylophones, washboards and other instruments. Donated art materials and instruments will enhance classroom lessons. All items can be dropped off at the school front office during regular hours.

"This is going to be an exciting year for learning at GES," said Noorani. "Parental and community support will be critical in reaching our goals but I strongly believe the results will be worth it. When our school thrives, evervone benefits."

"As teachers we are always looking for students to enjoy coming to school and to enjoy learning, to fully engage them," said sixth grade teacher Beth Novick. "I think this program – like each of our students – has great potential."
