Kelly Ivy, Sr. Is the Ninth Candidate To File for Greenbelt City Council

Kelly Ivy, Sr. is the ninth candidate to file in the forthcoming Greenbelt City Council election. He joins incumbents Ed Putens, Leta Mach, Judith Davis, Rodney Roberts and Konrad Herling and challengers Emmett Jordan, Silke Pope and Che Sayles.

Ivy is a longtime Greenbelt resident who has demonstrated his commitment to public service through decades of volunteerism and by running two previous City Council campaigns.

Ivy was born in San Angelo, Texas in 1955. When he was five, his father passed away and his mother packed up Kelly and his six brothers and sisters and moved to be near her brother and mother, who were in the Washington area. In 1968, the family moved to Greenbelt. When he was 14, he attended a Valentine's Day dance at Greenbelt Junior High School, where he met and fell in love with his wife, Linda. Four years later, they were married and recently celebrated their 37th wedding anniversary.

It is said that successful people have the ability to develop relationships that last, and three decades later, "I feel very successful," Ivy says. "I believe that a happy, thriving marriage of 37 years speaks volumes as to my ability to communicate, cooperate, listen and have a sense of humor."

He and his wife are best friends and were blessed to have four terrific, beautiful children who were raised in Greenbelt. He couldn't be more proud of them. The oldest, Kelly, Jr., a journeyman electrician with the IBEW, is married to Elizabeth and they have three adorable little girls. Jamie is a paramedic in Anne Arundel County. Amanda teaches at St. Jerome's in Hyattsville and the youngest, Emily, is a paramedic.

His life has been filled with diverse experiences and through that he has gained an extensive view of the world. He has been employed at Amtrak for 34 years where he is Supervisor of Locomotive Power at Union Station. He has been responsible for up to 500 employees and has managed a budget of \$7 million. His commendations include on-time performance and safety. For the past eight years, he has been a member of the Park and Recreation Advisory Board (PRAB). He has volunteered for many Greenbelt organizations: he served as president of Greenbelt Little League, vice president of Greenbelt Boys and Girls Club, baseball and softball commissioner for Boys and Girls Club, vice president of Greenbelt Babe Ruth and vice president of Lakeside Association; he is entertainment chair for the Greenbelt Labor Day Festival. He attends church at St. Hugh's every Sunday and is a proud member of the Fraternal Order of Police.

His style is to listen and learn. Being married for 37 years and raising four children has taught him those two important qualities: find the best solutions available and then call it like he sees it.

Greenbelt's diversity is a great resource and he believes Greenbelt citizens have the answers to some of the vitally important questions and issues. He will sit down and talk to them, ask their opinions, treat them with respect and find out what they think the community needs in order for it to work best for all residents.

What Goes On

Candidates Explain Goals In First of Four Questions

In last week's paper we posed four questions to the nine candidates seeking election to the Greenbelt City Council on November 3. The responses were limited to 300 words. The order in which the responses are published was determined by lot. This week we publish their answers to our first question as submitted:

Why do you seek this office and why do you think you are well qualified to be a city councilmember?

Since moving to Greenbelt in 1974, I have been actively involved in the community. Six years ago, people I respect encouraged me to run for Council. I decided to do so to continue my service to the community.

The work on Council has been rewarding and a lot more time consuming than anticipated. Fortunately, I am retired and able to devote the necessary time to city business. My Council experience has given me a depth of knowledge on city issues as well as our relationships in the county, state and federal arenas. In the challenging years ahead, knowledge and experience will be needed to maintain and protect Greenbelt's quality of life.

I know our issues and opportunities from years of service. I have been nursery school treasurer; PTA President; GHI Audit Committee chair; secretary of the Greenbelt Consumer Cooperative; 50th anniversary Oral History Committee chair; and News Review and Labor Day Festival volunteer.

On Council, I have expanded my knowledge by serving on local and national committees to represent the city including the National League of Cities Human Development Steering Committee and the Maryland Municipal League Communications Committee. At the Washington Council of Governments, I am Maryland Vice Chair of the Metropolitan Washington Air Quality Committee.

I have proven to be alert to opportunities. For example, I brought the KaBoom Playful City program and playground grant money to Greenbelt.

I am knowledgeable about educational issues and cooperatives. I have helped guide the development of Advisory Committee on Education programs that benefit Greenbelt's schools. As former director of communications and cooperative education at the National Cooperative Business Association, I am familiar with cooperative models that could improve our quality of life.

I believe in listening, learning and working hard. I am a graduate of the Academy for Excellence in Local Governance.

I seek to serve on Council because I feel compelled to address the major issues facing our community. My everyday and past experiences qualify me as a candidate with a broad and varied perspective. It was quite challenging to come to the United States from Europe and basically start all over. But that experience and my work in local schools, I believe, has made me a stronger person and a better candidate.

In my daily interaction with Greenbelt residents from many backgrounds and all neighborhoods, I've had the opportunity to get to know the issues and concerns of a diverse spectrum of neighbors. Universal concerns include a clean and healthy environment, quality schools, safe neighborhoods, and ample community services. Quality of life issues affect us all. I've dedicated myself to many Greenbelt organizations. I became involved with our local schools, including Springhill Lake Elementary when my child was there. I've helped to lead both the Legion Auxiliary and my homeowners' association as president, St. Hugh as a volunteer, and the Public Safety Advisory Committee as chair for six years. I advocate for our local schools, open spaces, and public safety; and I believe when development is appropriate, it must be managed with care. As a naturalized citizen, I've voted in every election I could. So I'll work to increase participation and confirm my strong belief: Greenbelt's elections are fair and inclusive. My candidacy is proof. As a member of the City Council, I will bring additional ideas and a new perspective to issues that Greenbelt is facing right now. Greenbelt Co-ops to Hold Events for Co-op Month

In recognition of National Co-op Month, the Greenbelt Cooperative Alliance will begin a month-long focus on cooperatives by sponsoring a table at the Greenbelt Farmers Market on Sunday, October 4 where people can find information about the cooperative movement in general and Greenbelt's cooperatives specifically. Those stopping by the table will be able to learn about core cooperative principles, get a list of local co-ops and discover how to join the participating organizations. Several Greenbelt co-ops are planning special events of their own during the month of October. GHI will host a membership picnic on Sunday, October 4 from 1 to 3 p.m. They will also hold a community-wide Open House on Sunday, October 18 from 12:30 to 4 p.m. The Greenbelt Federal Credit Union will hold a membership drive October 13 through 16, which is also Credit Union Week. New members will receive special promotional items and be entered into a drawing for a \$50 gift card. Refreshments will be served in the Credit Union lobby throughout the week. In addition the Credit Union will sponsor a Shredding Day on October 10, from 9 a.m. to noon when a shredding truck will be behind

the Credit Union from 9 a.m. to noon to shred Greenbelters' personal papers.

The News Review, another Greenbelt cooperative, will hold its annual membership meeting and election on Sunday, October 25.

The Greenbelt Consumer Cooperative, also known as the Coop, will focus on member education and appreciation throughout the month. There will be a shop healthy food demonstration on October 28 and a new display highlighting Co-operative Principles in the Consumer Corner. A special meat sale in the store will take place on October 7 and Patronage Appreciation Day will be October 28. Information about the upcoming Annual Meeting on Saturday, November 7 will also be available at the store.

Throughout the month visitors to the Greenbelt Library will find a large display on the ground floor highlighting some of Greenbelt's longstanding coops with some historical items and memorabilia. There will also be information about the various types of cooperatives and the benefits of cooperative activity.

City to Hold Health Events in October **Depression Screening**

October, Depression Screening Month, will be recognized by a number of Greenbelt events. Tuesday, October 6 from 5 to 8 p.m. there will be a free depression screening at the Beltway Plaza Giant Pharmacy, 6000 Greenbelt Road. The Greenbelt Assistance in Living (GAIL) program staff will be present and invites everyone to come for a free mental health assessment for depression, anxiety, posttraumatic stress syndrome and bipolar disorder.

Participants will have a chance to meet with a mental health professional on the spot, receive referral information or to just drop by to pick up information and resources. Screenings are also available in Spanish.

<u>A Review</u> "Bus Stop" Gears Up at GAC

"Bus Stop," one of William Inge's landmark plays, got off to a good start at the Greenbelt Arts Center last weekend. Performances continue weekends through October 17.

As Act I opens, a snowstorm has stranded four passengers and their long-distance bus driver at 1 a.m. in a rural Kansas diner. They're greeted by the owner (Barbara Ying) and her young waitress (Ashley Jones); soon the sheriff (Bill Brekke) looks in. Cherie, "a chanteuse" (Cassie Youhouse) says she's been strongarmed onto the bus by young cowboy Bo Decker (Matt Baker), who wants her to marry him and live on his ranch in Montana. An older ranch hand (Bob Kleinberg) is of mixed mind about these proceedings; the last passenger, a former college professor (Bill Jones), takes to the bottle as he reminisces and makes a play for the waitress; the bus driver sidles up to the owner.

By Act III - 5 a.m. on the wall clock of the well-lit, evocative set, complete with period magazines - veteran director Randy Barth's comment in the program echoes: "A lot can happen in a single night." Love is sought, battles fought, loneliness lurks. The professor's final pronouncement resonates: "Yes, I'm terribly smart. Wouldn't it be nice to be intelligent?"

The actors - most have acted at the Arts Center before - are up to the play's challenges. Matt Baker and Cassie Youhouse lead the way as the star-crossed young couple; Bill Jones (who adapted and directed the recent "Othello" at GAC) readily conveys the prof's philosophical bent, highlighted in a rousing "Romeo & Juliet" uptake. Malca Giblin coordinated matters as producer. "Bus Stop," like Inge plays such as "Picnic" and "Come Back, Little Sheba," was a hit on Broadway and as film.
