Tree Replacements Planned For Empirian Village Section

Greenbelt – Tree City USA – will be true to its special title as plans are carried out to remove damaged trees in Empirian Village over the next few years and replace them with new, smaller varieties.

At the Greenbelt City Council meeting on February 22, councilmembers listened as Lesley Riddle, assistant director of public works for parks and grounds, narrated a computerized presentation about tree work to be done along Springhill Drive and Breezewood Drive within Empirian Village.

The goal of the work, Riddle said, is to improve lighting, remove stressed trees, improve area aesthetics and reduce the monoculture of plants that exists there.

She explained that 10 percent of the canopy would be removed this year through pruning of lower limbs and crown reduction. The trees are in distress due to age and severe pruning by Pepco.

The cost of the pruning work would be covered by part of a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG; total grant value, \$100,000) that the city must spend by the end of next June.

Six trees along one side of Springhill Drive would be removed and the stumps ground to remove tripping hazards and for aesthetic reasons, Riddle said. Tree removal and re-planting would be repeated annually for the next four to five years.

Plans are to install three single-stemmed crape myrtle and three single-stemmed hedge

Greenbelt resident Carol Shaw is director of Field Management for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, a national organization that raises money to fund research on an illness that afflicts 30,000 people in this country alone. Cystic fibrosis (CF) is an inherited chronic disease that affects the lungs and digestive system. It produces a thick, sticky mucous that clogs lungs and leads inevitably to an early death.

In 1955, when the organization was founded, most cystic fibrosisaffected children did not live long enough to attend elementary school. Medical advances achieved primarily through the Foundation have increased the average survival age to 37.

Shaw maintains that an optimistic attitude, combined with a dogged persistence and intense passion for one's work, are the essential ingredients to become an effective fund raiser in the nonprofit arena. "Our mission is incredibly compelling," she states. "A fund raiser is basically a sales person. But, we are not selling a

product, we are selling a vision," she says. For Shaw, this high pressure "sales" job is her way of giving meaning to her life.

She supervises eight of the Foundation's national chapters and 13 offices with a combined staff of 40 and a \$5 million budget. Her job is to transmit her passion and work ethic to each of the executive directors. She sees herself as the master puppeteer who assembles the right people to organize the special events that raise the money for the organization. Each chapter chooses its signature event – a walk, a gala, a golf tournament. This coming year, bike tours have been added to the mix of possible events. "People look at the fund raiser as the magician who is able to turn straw into gold," she muses, "and get frustrated when they raise less than expected."

There is Money

But even in these tough financial times, Shaw believes there is money out there. She just needs to find the right chemistry of people who share her passion to motivate others to give. "When the heart is touched, people will give you money," is her creed. "I deal with the best part of people," she affirms, "their idealism and compassion."

The Foundation is the only national organization pursuing a cure for CF by funding research facilities and care centers throughout the country. In addition to

McLaughlin Advises Council

on February 17 City Manager Michael McLaughlin provided council with the latest report from the State of Maryland Department of Assessments and Taxation on Greenbelt assessments for the current year and for Fiscal Year 2011.

Michael Stevens, at Age 12, Is Breaking Records in Backstroke

Greenbelt's Michael Stevens, 12, has more in common with U.S. Olympian Michael Phelps than just his name: Stevens, too, has dreams of swimming for Team USA at a future Olympic Games.

Stevens, a member of the Fairland Aquatics Swim Team (FAST), will compete with several other teammates in the upcoming Potomac Valley Swimming (PVS) Short Course 14 and Under Junior Olympic Championships at the Fairland Aquatics Center in Laurel, to be held March 18 to 21. PVS is the National Capital Area's division of USA Swimming, the national organization for competitive swimming. The Junior Olympic Championships are treated like an Olympic event, Stevens said. "It's a big deal." If he wins all of his events, Stevens could receive six medals and a chance to compete in zone competitions. In zones Stevens will compete in Webster, N.Y., this spring against swimmers from East Coast states north of Virginia. From zones, swimmers compete in sectional competitions and, finally, nationals where the fastest swimmers not only hope to score times on par with Olympians but also to secure a spot on the Olympic swim team.

male swimmer ever to make the U.S. Olympic team. At age 15, he competed in the 2000 Summer Olympic Games in Sydney, Australia. "It's extremely rare to qualify for the Olympics when you're so young," Sabine Hentrich, Stevens' mother, said.

Record Breaker

But Stevens is already breaking local records. As a member of the FAST year-round swim team, Stevens broke two team records in August and three team records in December, competing at the 11- to 12-year-old level at a competition held at George Mason University. After that event, Stevens held the fastest time in the country in the 50-yard backstroke in his age

group. It has since been broken.

Last summer, Stevens broke five boys' team records with the Greenbelt Municipal Swim Team summer league – some that have been on the books for a number of years.

Not a Natural

Hentrich first enrolled her son in private swimming lessons at age 5. "He was afraid to put his face or feet in the water," she said.

At age 6 Stevens joined the Greenbelt Municipal Swim Team and began competing. At that time a member of the team, Kyle Daniels, senior at the University

Co-op to Host Two Food Demo Events

Over the next week there will be two free tasting and food demonstration events at the Co-op.

There will be a Twin Oaks Community Foods Tofu Tasting from noon to 3 p.m. on Saturday, March 6. Twin Oaks, of Louisa, Va., will be offering samples of their tasty, premium soy products, which are certified kosher and organic. They use Virginia-grown, non-GMO organic soybeans for their tofus, vegetarian sausage, pate and chorizo.

Wednesday, March 10 at 7 p.m. is the next in the Co-op's Shop Healthy Series and will feature a program called "The Skinny on Healthy Fats." Fat is a building and warming food for the body and helps people absorb fat-soluble nutrients. The session will cover the importance of fats, the right types of fats and a few common myths surrounding fat in the diet. Of course there will be samples!

For Chris Cherry, the production represents an additional milestone. It is his 10th annual youth musical. "Hidden Lands" was also his first. "I originally wrote 'Hidden Lands' for a wonderful group of nine- and 10-year-olds, who were so bright and such fun that I kept raising the age for subsequent productions so I could keep working with them. They're all in college now," he said.

Over the past decade, the youth musical program has helped several participants find their calling in the performing arts. Ian Brown-Gorrell, who choreographed this year's show, performed in seven Greenbelt youth musicals and is now a freshman at Point Park Conservatory of the Performing Arts.

Scott Kincaid, who plays Prince Charming in "Hidden Lands" (his eighth Greenbelt musical), also designed the lights for the show. He will head to college in the fall to study lighting design and other technical aspects of theater.

caring for people with illness, the facilities perform clinical research and education of health care professionals. Shaw is excited that the FDA recently approved a new inhaler, Cayston, developed through the Foundation's research. This drug promises to offer great relief to those with the lung disease, she stated.

Shaw is very proud of the fact that for every \$1.00 her organization raises, 90 cents is funneled into research. Her motivational techniques involve showering her executive directors with praise and recognition. She also does a lot of hand holding, traveling from Florida to Wisconsin, imbuing her staff with optimism, hiring good people and sometimes firing ineffective ones. Every long day is a challenge and there are frequent crises that leave her emotionally drained by the week's end.

Yet Shaw is energized by her mission that one of the 30 drugs now in the pipeline – supported by funds she has helped raise – will be the breakthrough that will cause the lungs to function normally and ensure that people born with CF will achieve a normal life expectancy. Yes, she states with conviction, "there will be a cure in our lifetime."

Idealism

She attributes her idealism to growing up in the 1960s and 70s with the belief that choices you make can change the world. She was drawn to Woodstock in 1969, a year after graduating from high school. She attended Simpson College in Iowa studying theater for two years, then took four years off, working for two years as a letter carrier for the post office and briefly on the line at Chrysler. She visited a number of communes one summer and received credit for independent study when she returned to college, this time graduating from the University of Delaware in 1979.

She has honed her skills through a variety of jobs in the nonprofit world. She began her career with the Muscular Dystrophy Society and then the Epilepsy Foundation.

Climbing up the career ladder, she became director of the Physicians Assisted Foundation. This job was less satisfying to her because it was more membership-oriented. Rather than spending money on ordinary people, she viewed the organization as enriching its own members with high-end dinners and entertainment. Disillusioned, she quit to become a private consultant for a few years but found that job to be too isolating. She enjoys being part of a team working for a cause. More recently she created the job of director of development for the local Audubon Naturalist Society.

Although she prefers working on a national level, she has lent her skills to two Greenbelt organizations in the past few years. She developed the fundraising plan for the Friends of the Greenbelt Museum's quest for \$100,000 in matching funds for its National Endowment for the Humanities grant. Over three years Shaw guided the museum to not only reach its goal but to surpass it. She went on to become a founding member of the Greenbelt Community Foundation. She imported the fundraising model she deems most effective – emotional testimonials from Greenbelt residents with a passion for their cause who transmit that passion to others. The Foundation has been successful in providing grants up to \$3,000 (recently increased to \$5,000) to community organizations for a variety of projects benefiting people of all ages.

In the past year, Shaw married Chuck Spruell and moved from her Hillside Road home to Boxwood Village. She loves living in Greenbelt which provides stability and calm in her highpressure world. She draws her inspiration from the vision that she is helping to create a better world for the people she serves.

maples whenever the Bradford pears are removed. Riddle said the single-stemmed varieties have been chosen because multistemmed varieties can create a traffic hazard.

The density of the multi-stems can make it hard to see through or around them. Replacement species were selected for aesthetic reasons and because of their relatively small mature size.

Councilmember Rodney Roberts objected to the choice, saying he wanted trees that would shade the pavement. Riddle said the pin oaks nearby provide shade but she would be happy to consider other trees. She agreed to provide council with more options.

In a subsequent interview, Riddle said she had suggested as other choices serviceberry, green hawthorn and hop hornbeam, all small trees with species native to Maryland.

Council approved the use of \$50,000 from the CDBG to have the tree work done by Care of Trees of Gaithersburg.

Snow Emergency

The city has recently received suggestions about the handling of snowstorms, including one to establish a task force to evaluate the city's response to the weather emergencies. Mayor Judith Davis said she hoped no one would consider such action a criticism of the Public Works Department. noting that this has been an historic winter. Though staff had done the best job possible, she said, emergency plans had been more geared toward terrorism and should be revisited to include other extreme situations, including weather. She added she hoped people did not expect the city to invest in equipment to prepare for a hundred-year event.

City staff will be conducting an after-action review, council was informed, so they agreed to wait for this report before deciding about establishing a task force. Councilmember Leta Mach suggested that the after-action report include what citizens can do to help employees.

City Manager Michael McLaughlin said cleanup operations are ongoing. He noted that the city is not responsible for many of the sidewalks and does not have the resources to clear them all. He said he would request a section in the February financial report on the costs of snow removal, including a breakout for police overtime.

Mixed-Use Zoning The Prince George's County Council will hold a public hearing on March 9 on several bills to amend the county code to include a new mixed-use zone. On January 11 the Greenbelt City Council had submitted comments to the county Planning and Zoning Community Development Committee but only one of the city's concerns had been addressed. The legislation has since been revised to require that municipalities and other defined, interested parties receive notice when a preapplication conference is scheduled. City staff thinks clarification is needed about whether the revised language will guarantee that municipalities are allowed to participate in the pre-application conference. Staff recommended council take a neutral position on the legislation, noting that urban design standards it proposes will "assist in creating a sense of place" in the county.

Staff also considers it beneficial that the proposed legislation includes the up-front approval of a regulatory plan and detailed design regulations. This will allow greater public involvement in important planning and design issues early in the process, staff believes. council agreed to send another letter to the county council summarizing its concerns and stressing the need for the county to review the legislation after it has been applied as a test in one sub-region so that necessary revisions can be made before countywide implementation.

"I have a lot of eleventh place ribbons somewhere in my room," Stevens said.

Also a coach with FAST, Daniels encouraged 11-year-old Stevens to join the full-time team, despite the time-consuming practice schedule – three early morning and four afternoon practices a week.

"I remember saying to one of the coaches: People will look at [Stevens] and think they can get good at swimming overnight," Daniels said.

In Stevens' family, swimming is not a spectator sport. His nine-year-old brother, Anthony Stevens, also swims competitively for Greenbelt and FAST. Last year, his mother became a competition judge. His father, Mike Stevens, is a competition time-keeper.

"We don't just drive [to practices], we get wet, too," Hentrich said.

14-year-old age group. He'll be up against older swimmers with more adult-size bodies.

According to Daniels, this will only have a short effect on Stevens' success. "He'll be competitive for years," he said. "If he keeps growing and if he keeps working, [the Olympics are] definitely a possibility."

Because he believes his backstroke is his best stroke, Stevens admires three-time U.S. Olympian and backstroke world record holder, Aaron Peirsol. Although Stevens keeps the Olympics in mind as a long-term goal, he knows he has a way to go before going for the gold.

I'm focusing on the short-term goals: making it to the next practice, competing in the next meet, Stevens said. After all, like any 12-year-old, Stevens, who is a seventh-grade student at Robert Goddard Montessori School, still has homework.

Parents and coaches are not allowed in the studio during the match. They are placed in a separate room watching on closed circuit TV as the children answer the science quiz questions.
