The Greenbelt City Council has rescheduled its Empirian Village worksession to Wednesday, March 17 at 8 p.m. in the Greenbelt Community Center at 15 Crescent Road. The worksession is open to the public.

Originally scheduled for February 24, the meeting was rescheduled because of the illness of Frederic Brinn, a senior vice president of the Empirian Village management company. The agenda prepared for the original meeting date includes an opportunity for tenants to discuss their issues. James Sterling, Greenbelt assistant director for Community Development, will review the power outages and other recent events. Other agenda items include crime/security matters and future plans for Empirian Village.

Belanger will use images from the Radio & Television Museum, located in nearby Bowie, to remind participants how radio and TV broadcasting have changed everyone's lives.

Women's History Month Profile

Marge Owens: A Social Worker With Early Commitment to Justice

Listen to the stories of Marge Owens of Northway and you'll travel a path of history more vivid and complex than mainstream textbook tales - about her grandmother's memory of little-known race riots in Owens' hometown of East St. Louis, Ill., and the Orangeburg Massacre in South Carolina in 1968.

Owens can tell you about the days, not so long ago, when Landover Road was a country byway where a decaying plantation house was overrun with hungry hogs. And about the time when only white people lived in Greenbelt and how some of them joined the push for fair housing and public accommodations for those whose rights had been

"It seems so long ago now," said Owens, now retired from a career in social work, recalling her 1960 move with her husband, Lowell, to Greenbelt. The city, she said, "was built to be exclusive. This was before the city had expanded with developments like Springhill Lake [Empirian Village].

"I can remember marching up and down Sheriff Road, where a developer was putting up houses that were being marketed only to white families. We were a goodnatured crowd and somebody came out and sprayed us with a garden hose. Luckily for us it was a hot day," she said.


Roots of Commitment

Marge Owens' commitment to justice is rooted in her family history in East St. Louis. "When I was growing up there, it was about half white and half black and totally segregated," she said. In 1919, her grandmother had hidden an African American cook and her daughters during a vicious race riot in East St. Louis.

"The riot ended with 300 young men being rounded up and taken to the 'car barn,' where streetcars were turned around." she said. "They put these young men in the barn and set the building on fire. All of them died. It was a story I could never for-

Owens attended high school in the early 1950s, before the U.S. Supreme Court ruling on desegregation of public schools. Even so, the school board in East St. Louis had brought in a small number of black students. "They wanted to try it, which was unusual. But they only admitted kids who were outstanding athletes or students."

As an undergraduate at the University of Illinois, she got to know Lowell Owens through their membership in the university branch of the NAACP. They fell in love and married

"Another thing that really bothered me happened with my dentist. When a friend talked to me about his bad toothache, I recommended my dentist, who then told for an up-and-coming newcomthis young man that he 'didn't do treatments for Negroes.'

"I went to see the dentist the next day and the waiting room was full. I told the receptionist I wanted my x-rays. The dentist came out and said, 'Are you moving?' I told him why I was going to find a different dentist - but my hands were sweating, because he was an authority figure for me."

She began a master's program in social work. The arrival of their first child, however, interrupted her studies but gave her more time to run off and distribute leaflets, baby Bronwyn

"Sometimes you get lucky breaks," she says about moving to Greenbelt with Lowell and joining the nearby Unitarian Church. They chose Greenbelt

because he worked at the Department of Agriculture in Beltsville and "the price was right," she said. Their church supported the fight for public accommodations for people of all races.

With two young daughters by then, Marge and Lowell attended public meetings; in the early 1960s, a political effort

in Prince George's County and Montgomery County led to the ouster of segregationist leaders. It was the first political success er in Prince George's County, young Steny Hoyer.

Marge did encounter scenes that made her wonder where on earth they had moved. After enrolling at Howard University to complete her master's degree in social work, she drove to the old Sugar Hill community near Upper Marlboro on a field assignment. She became lost from confusing directions and spotted a beautiful old white house with a wrap-around veranda.

"It was an old plantation house and I decided to stop and ask directions," she said. "When I got out and shut the car door, the entire house erupted in pigs! They were squealing and grunting and running out of the house and up to the fence where I stood!" Apparently the sound

AAUW Program Is Rescheduled

Rescheduled following February's massive snowfall, a program highlighting the Gordon W. Prange collection of printed material from post-World War II Japan will take place at 10 a.m. on Saturday, March 13 at the Old Parish House, 4711 Knox Road in College Park. The program, which is open to the public, is sponsored by the College Park Branch of the American Association of University Women (AAUW).

Prange, who was a professor of history at the University of Maryland, served in Japan under General Douglas MacArthur as a member of a censorship board who screened all Japanese publications during the Occupation. At the end of his period of service in 1949, Prange requested, and was given permission, to bring back to the university copies of all these works - from ephemeral items such as club documents and organizational papers to children's and adult books, newspapers, maps and posters.

The collection now constitutes the most complete record of printed material from post-war Japan that exists in the world. Curator of the collection, Eiko Sakaguchi, and its manager, Amy Wasserstrom, will show a short film and discuss the collection and its history.

Greenbelter Virginia Beauchamp, who served with the American Red Cross in northern Japan in 1946-47 will share photographs of her time there as well.



The specificity of that training led to a desire to open up to color, shape and fluidity. Recently, she began to notice the ubiquity of intersections in nature and the physical environment, as well as daily intersections with others. Five

of the works in the show are the beginnings of her interest in capturing those intersections in paintings. The remainder are experiments in color and shape.


She has had two shows of paintings at the Yellow Barn in Glen Echo, most recently with a group of abstract artists. In addition, she has participated in the annual Labor Day Art Show at Glen Echo, as well as in the Labor Day Festival Art Show in Greenbelt. 
One of Allison Smith's folk paintings that will be on display in the Café until May $\bf 3$.

March Films

Learning from the forest, he believes that a permaculture system can help avoid "the laying waste to the planet" of modern agricultural practices and supply peoples' needs while embracing and enriching nature.

The video "Forest Gardens" features Robert Hart in his pioneering forest garden and includes a tour of a tiny garden in a GHIsize yard behind a maisonette in Hertfordshire, England. For as little as two hours work a week, the family finds they can supply much of their produce for six months of the year.

"Suburban Permaculture" provides a tour of Janet Barocco and Richard Heinberg's California home for an example of what is possible in suburbia and "Creating a Suburban Food Shed" looks at Owen Dell's concept of neighbors working together to grow food in their yards as a way of both producing food and creating com-

Discussion after these films will feature Lesley Riddle, Greenbelt assistant director for Parks and Grounds, sharing some of her ongoing efforts to promote eco-friendly landscaping here. Maggie Cahalan will discuss a volunteer opportunity to help with planning and implementing the Three Sisters Garden Project to establish diverse co-learning demonstration gardens on public lands in each of the three areas of Greenbelt (center, west and east). 



of the car door was their dinner

Social Justice

The community organizing for social justice continued in Greenbelt in the early and mid-1960s and Lowell was heavily involved with the public accommodations and other campaigns.

"Greenbelt was very ripe for anyone who was interested in those issues and a lot of people got involved in voter registration and other campaigns," she said. By the early 1970s she was working for the federal Office of Economic Opportunity as a social worker, getting grants and launching programs. "I loved it," she said. She and Lowell had three daughters by then – Bronwyn, Lucia and Caitlin.

The early 1970s, though, took them south when Lowell got a two-year assignment to Orangeburg, S.C., to help faculty at a historically black state university activate federal research funds they had finally received after years of neglect and to assist in launching Ph.D. programs.

"That's where I learned about the Orangeburg Massacre, which pre-dated the Kent State and Jackson State shootings. It had occurred just a few years before we moved there," she said.

On February 8, 1968, students at the college had protested segregation at the local bowling alley. The governor ordered more than 60 state police into Orangeburg, tanks rolled through the street and police shot into the crowd. Four died and more than 30 were injured in the violence.

Greenbelt, Part Two

When they returned to Greenbelt in the mid-1970s, another social movement was brewing – the women's movement. Former local resident Dorothy Sucher had begun holding "consciousness-raising groups," where Marge met local activist Esther Webb.

"What a firebrand! She was considerably older than us and I'd finished graduate school and was working." Marge recalled. "I was fortunate to have a boss – male, of course – who believed that women absolutely should speak up and get the job done, just like a man. I even survived doing budgets."

Her own consciousness was

raised in a group of Greenbelters planning a public meeting for Bruce Bowman, a liberal Greenbelter running for county council. "They said, 'Who can chair the meeting?" I suggested a woman. And everybody – I was the only woman in the room – said, 'No, we need a man or we won't be taken seriously.'

"I said, 'Well, I see that's how things are going to go here but the next revolution is going to be for women's rights.""

The room exploded with laughter – "white men, black men, they were all laughing, but I think it was nervous laughter," she said. Then she added, "But it took all the air out of me. I just went home and talked to Lowell."

She also faced her first jobrelated crisis after they returned. "Nixon had eliminated all the jobs I was hoping for," she said.

"I was unemployed and underemployed. Now I am very sympathetic about the effects of long-term unemployment."

Eventually she was hired by the State of Maryland to travel to every county to train caregivers of people with mental illness to help the caregivers learn new skills and empower them in their role.

Looking Ahead

What does she think of the world today in terms of civil rights and women's rights?

"We've made progress in both areas – but not enough," she says. "Current research is showing that our unemployment problems are going to hurt the younger generation for years to come. I get downhearted sometimes because I see too many people who don't find meaning in their work. Sometimes you hit a rough patch but it's worth trying to find projects within your job that you really enjoy."

What brings her the most joy now are her three grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. Two of their three daughters – Bronwyn Zurla, a travel agent; and Caitlin Phillips, a school nurse – live in Greenbelt. "We were so surprised – when Lowell and I were young adults, we didn't live anywhere near relatives."

For Marge, it's just another benefit of living in Greenbelt.

Make Plans Now for a Safer St. Patrick's Day Celebration


Police are urging St. Patrick's Day revelers to plan ahead for a safe celebration and to designate a sober driver before the party begins. And, if urging doesn't help, they remind everyone they will have extra officers on the road looking for impaired drivers

National Highway Traffic Safety Administration statistics show that 37 percent of drivers and motorcyclists involved in fatal St. Patrick's Day crashes in 2008 had a blood alcohol content (BAC) of .08 or above. There were 134 crash fatalities that day and of those, 50 people were killed in crashes involving at least one driver or motorcyclist with a BAC of .08 or higher.

In addition to designating a sober driver and leaving the keys at home, police suggest that partiers plan a safe way home before the festivities begin; take a taxi, public transportation or call a sober friend or family member. They also encourage use of the Sober Ride program – a local taxi service sponsored by the Washington Regional Alcohol Program that allows impaired drivers a free taxi ride (\$50 value) if they are 21 or older. Police urge anyone who sees a drunk driver on the road to make a possibly life-saving call to law enforcement.

Remember, police say, that friends don't let friends drive drunk – so those who know someone about to drive or ride with an impaired driver should take the keys and help them make other arrangement to get where they are going safely. More information is available at www.stopimpaireddriving.org.

GAIL Announces Accessiblilty Grants

The Greenbelt Assistance in Living (GAIL) Program has announced the Accessible Greenbelt grants program for 2010. To further fair housing, Greenbelt has been awarded funds to offer qualified city residents a number of home accessibility modifications to enable seniors and disabled adults in need to remain in their homes as long as possible. Examples include railings, grab bars, portable metal ramps, shower chairs and more.

Eligibility

This program is open to Greenbelt residents age 62 years and older or disabled (as determined by a Social Security disability Award or Disability Pension Award) with an annual income below \$44,800 for a single person household or \$51,200 for a two person household. Proof of assets and monthly income will be required.

Applications

Applications will be evaluated based on financial and demonstrated needs. The equipment awarded to each household will be determined based on the number of applicants, funds available, priority and individual need. Applications will be considered on a first come, first served basis.

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Free Sustainable **Landscaping Class**
