Volunteers are being sought as greeters on the day of the event. These are not Census Bureau positions and no training is required. Volunteers are also sought who are willing to have their photograph taken by U. S.

Eleanor Roosevelt Teacher Named Agnes Meyer Outstanding Teacher

Kenneth Bernstein, a Local, State and National Government and Advanced Placement U.S. Government teacher at Eleanor Roosevelt High School, has been selected to receive The Washington Post's 2010 Agnes Meyer Outstanding Teacher Award for Prince George's County. The Agnes Meyer Award is presented annually to one teacher from each Washington metropolitan area school district.

"Mr. Bernstein understands the individual needs of students, encourages their talents and fosters their self-esteem," said Eleanor Roosevelt Principal Reginald

"He demonstrates a true understanding of how students develop and learn and challenges his students with his creative lessons."

Bernstein has been teaching at Eleanor Roosevelt High School for the past 11 years. He started working for Prince George's County Public Schools as an American History, English and Reading teacher at Kettering Middle School in January 1995.

Bernstein earned a Bachelor of Arts in Music from Haverford College, a Master of Arts in Religious Studies from Saint Charles Seminary and a Master of Arts in Teaching from Johns Hopkins University in Secondary Social Studies. He earned National Board Certification in

Social Studies in November 2005, the highest level of certification a teacher can receive. Prior to teaching, his career focused on data processing, programming and analysis.

New Civil Discourse Group Holds Organizational Meeting

The initial gathering of a new Northern Prince George's County branch of the Coffee Party was held in Greenbelt on Sunday, March 28 with the inaugural meeting taking place at the New Deal Café. The newly-constituted Coffee Party's ultimate aim is to return civility to political discourse.

Participants made tentative decisions at the organizational meeting about the group's purposes and actions. Those present, whatever their political affiliation, expressed dismay at the increasingly rancorous nature of political discussion and the 10 people at the meeting saw the group's purpose as informational.

Various members contributed suggestions about how to accomplish that goal. Several, for example, recommended letterwriting to local newspapers urging moderation and a focus on facts. Also proposed was a group visit to elected officials representing Prince George's County to support their civil discussion of issues. Others volunteered to investigate providing information

booths at local festivities such as Greenbelt's Labor Day Festival.

Seeing demonization of one's political opponents and their viewpoints as a distraction from scrutiny of the real issues, members of the Coffee Party seek to redirect attention from name-calling to the issues. Participants said the heated rhetoric on the airwaves and on the internet distracts public attention from facts meriting serious discussion.

The club decided to hold its next meeting in early April at a time and place to be determined.







Volunteers are being sought as greeters on the day of the event. These are not Census Bureau positions, so no training is required. We are also seeking volunteers willing to have their photograph taken by US Census and media as part of the 3 p.m. March to the Mailbox. Please contact Pam Lambird, Greenbelt event coordinator, at (301)345-5417 if you would like to help.

SPECIAL INFORMATION FOR GHI RESIDENTS: Starting in early May, every dwelling unit in GHI will be visited by a Census enumerator. in GHI will be visited by an enumerator. The enumerators will collect information from every housing unit to verify that all information received is accurate and to further ensure that every unit is counted. This includes units/residences for which mailed questionnaires were returned and/or residents completed and returned a replacement questionnaire.

This means every residence in GHI will be visited even if a questionnaire was returned to make sure every unit and every resident is counted. It is not necessary for residents in GHI to complete a mailed questionnaire or to submit a replacement questionnaire, as the census will canvass all units in GHI.

While it is not necessary for GHI residents to fill out a new questionnaire at a Be Counted site, they may still choose to do so. The new Be Counted site at the library is the closest for most GHI residents.

Greenbriar, Others

Many Greenbriar residents did not receive questionnaires in the mail. A resident of any household that did not receive a questionnaire or which received an incorrectly addressed or incompletely addressed questionnaire may go to one of the Be Counted sites (see box on page 1) to get a questionnaire to complete and mail. After April 12 residents may call the U.S. Census at 1-866-872-6868 to provide information. A third choice for residents is to attend one of the many upcoming census events in order to be counted.

Door-to-Door

Beginning in May census enumerators will be sent out to any address for which a questionnaire has not been returned by mail.

GCAN Meets, Hears Four Energy Speakers

Shaine Griffin from the Baltimore Neighborhood Energy Challenge will talk about the challenge, a 9-month pilot program to help households in eight neighborhoods reduce energy use, save money and build a more sustainable Baltimore.

Terrence Laney and Chii-San SunOwen of Weatherize DC will talk about the program launched last September for home energy efficiency while creating good green jobs. The program weatherized 200 homes by March, generating seven green jobs and saving homeowners up to 30 percent on energy bills as well as offsetting 3,645 metric tons of carbon.

Amanda Duzak of Clean Currents will talk about the Green Neighborhood Effect in which 75 local neighborhoods are signing residents up for residential wind energy. Clean Currents donates \$10 per enrolled household to use toward a green project.

CHEARS Gardeners Prepare for Spring Plantings

Greenbelt homeowners aren't the only people in town inspired by the recent warm weather to get out to the garden. The Chesapeake Education, Arts and Research Society's (CHEARS) Three Sisters Demonstration Project in Greenbelt, funded by the Greenbelt Community Foundation, is making progress in establishing three gardens in different sections of the city.

Margaret Cahalan of CHEARS reports that four garden boxes were constructed at a workshop held on Sunday, March 28. Plans are to establish raised beds in three areas of the city: near the flagpole by the Community Center, at Schrom Hills Park and near the Springhill Lake Community Building.

Native Roots

The project's concept is based on the historical gardening style of some Native Americans, who planted beans, corn and squash together in the same bed with the knowledge that each plant type contributed to the success of the whole garden. Such practices are continued by some gardeners to this day. The corn provides support for the climbing beans, which feed the soil through nitrogenfixing bacteria associated with their roots. The squash provides shade that keeps the soil cool and moist and its spreading habit helps deter weeds. Cahalan uses the Three Sisters Garden concept as a metaphor for different neighborhoods of Greenbelt each contributing something to the city. She said the idea is to plant the beds with vegetables, which may include beans, squash and corn. While the area has cer-

tainly had a preview of summer lately, the chance for frost still exists, making it risky to plant vegetables yet. Meanwhile, the group has planted four fruit trees near the Community Cen-

Cahalan plans also to draw on the principles of square foot gardening, where planting is done in blocks rather than rows and gardeners usually reach into the raised beds to garden, rather than walking on and, thus, compacting the soil.

Three more workshops are planned with the next one being held on Sunday, April 25 at the Springhill Lake Recreation Center. More information about that workshop will be available within the next two weeks. Most likely, a pot luck meal will be part of it. All are invited.



A Preview

New GAC Drama Portrays Bonds of War, Friendship

"Fred & Frieda," a new drama by playwright Nicole Burton, will have its beginning run starting Thursday, April 15 at the Greenbelt Arts Center. The author describes how for years she kept a tattered newspaper obituary of an African-American soldier from north Georgia who had taken part in liberating a concentration camp at the end of World War II.

She describes how one day she felt compelled to write a play based on that old story. The play became "Fred & Frieda" which, after public readings at the Kennedy Center, Metro Stage and other venues in the Washington metropolitan area, will have its premiere performance at the Greenbelt Arts Center. The play explores the injustices of segregation as compared with the horrors of the Nazi genocide.

Burton spent months researching survivor narratives at the U.S. Holocaust Museum and interviewing Jewish friends who had escaped Germany. For the soldier Fred's story, she found William Keyes, a veteran of the all-black 761st Tank Battalion, in Annapolis. When the now-88-year-old Keyes told her how the black soldiers had helped to liberate the concentration camps, his story ignited her passion to tell these almost-forgotten stories.

In Burton's play, Fred rescues a 16-year-old German-Jewish girl when his all-black battalion stumbles on the Ohrdruf concentration camp. Fred and Frieda remain in touch for the next 50 years, although Frieda denies being a survivor until her grandfather's ghost orders her to return to Berlin.

She then begs Fred to describe the day the "Black Angels" broke through the Ohrdruf fence and saved her. Fred, however, is facing his own demons.

Author

Nicole J. Burton is the author of 17 award-winning dramas and comedies. Her screen treatment for "Southwest Remembered," a film about urban renewal in Washington, D.C., won the CINE Golden Eagle.

"Fred & Frieda" will be presented with matinees on Thursday, April 15 and Friday, April 16 at 10 a.m. and Sunday, April 18 at 2 p.m. Evening performances will be held on Friday and Saturday, April 16 and 17 at 8 p.m.

The weekday matinees will be attended by students from Eleanor Roosevelt, DuVal and DeMatha high schools and residents from the Leisure World and Riderwood retirement communities. These shows are also open to the public.

Following the matinees, Burton will be joined for a post-show discussion by liberator William Keyes on April 15, Romanian concentration camp survivor George Joseph on April 16 and German concentration camp survivors Lotte Doloff and Ruth Horlick on April 18.
