Washington Post Picks Up F.B.I. Relocation Story

The Washington Post has picked up on and expanded a story first reported by Mary Willis Clarke in the April 29 issue of this paper. Clarke had reported on papers filed in a lawsuit against the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) by Greenbelt Ventures, LLC which suggest that WMATA and Greenbelt Metroland, LLC, prospective developer of Greenbelt Metro Station property, had met with representatives of the Federal Bureau of Investigation about using the land adjacent to the Metro Station for a possible FBI relocation, a major change from already approved concept plans.

In its May 16 Metro section article, Ovetta Wiggins reported that the revelation about plans to relocate the FBI headquarters are buried in a 118-page response to a motion by Metro to dismiss the lawsuit and credits the Greenbelt News Review for first reporting the information. FBI spokesperson Bill Carter had said that there had been preliminary discussions "before the economy tanked" to move the headquarters from the J Edgar Hoover Building on Pennsylvania Avenue. He also indicated that many sites were under consideration, Wiggins reported. Carter also credited Senator Barbara A. Mikulski with pushing for the relocation to Maryland, according to Wiggins. While not aware of the Greenbelt site being under consideration, Carter mentioned consideration being given to a site at National Harbor, according to the Post article. Carter also was reported to indicate that there was no imminent plan to relocate

Wiggins contacted Jon Petersen, senior vice president and owner of Petersen Cos., the developer of National Harbor south of the Woodrow Wilson Bridge on the Potomac River. He said that a bid had been submitted to

Two Staff Cuts and Reduction Within Public Works Budget

With Councilmembers Leta Mach and Silke Pope unable to attend, a five-member Greenbelt City Council was present on Wednesday, May 5 to review the Public Works Department budget. Public Works Director Kenny Hall, Assistant Director of Operations Carolyn Clemens, Recycling Coordinator Louisa Robles and Assistant Director of Parks Lesley Riddle, along with City Manager Michael McLaughlin, Assistant City Manager David Moran and City Treasurer Jeff Williams were on hand to discuss the department's proposed budget issues and challenges for Fiscal Year 2011.

Choosing to forego any introductory remarks, the Public Works officials instead provided a three to four minute slide show that was a montage of selected scenes around town that said more in pictures than words could to describe the department's operations. The show closed with a photo of the department's landscaping handiwork.

The only introductory remarks offered were that the proposed FY11 departmental budget eliminated two positions in street maintenance and special operations, saving the department about \$160,000.

Taking a cue from the mayor, other councilmembers asked about various lists that provide additional budget related information they are used to receiving during budget reviews. Some such lists were at hand for the worksession and council was assured others would be made available.

One initial question to the director was whether the staff reduction would adversely affect the department's operations. Hall assured council that, "in spite of the loss of the two positions, the department will be able to maintain the crews at a good level and reduce overtime."

Riddle was asked about the progress of the Three Sisters Garden Project and it was reported that the garden at the Community Center was well underway and sites in Greenbelt West and in Greenbelt East were still under consideration. For Greenbelt East, Councilmember Edward Putens suggested a site on Hanover Parkway near the approach

to Good Luck Road. Storm Aftermath

Council was also interested in the status of the so-called "After Storm Report" that the Federal Emergency Management Administration issues following snow storms that warrant reimbursements to local governments for their snow removal costs. Hall said the report would not be issued until sometime this summer; nevertheless, the FY11 budget projects a federal payment of \$65,000. Other concerns included the Crescent Road crosswalk at St. Hugh's School, the condition of the ballfields at Schrom Hills Park, drainage at the Little League field and city recycling issues. Whether or not a school remains at the St. Hugh's location, the staff believe that crosswalk will continue to be used by students making their way to Greenbelt Elementary School and must be maintained.

The staff also was aware of the ballfield issues, which were addressed in time for the season opening. The Little League field

Recreation Budget Proposes Cuts In Pool Hours, New Year Program

On Wednesday, May 12 the Greenbelt City Council reviewed the Fiscal Year 2011 Recreation Department Budget. During the nearly 4-hour discussion there were a few tense moments mostly regarding the proposed cuts in pool hours and the Greenbelt New Year celebration.

City Manager Michael McLaughlin's proposed budget calls for a 3 percent cut in spending on recreation and parks from the Fiscal Year 2010 budget. However, the proposed amount is nearly identical to the estimated FY10 spending. The parks budget was discussed during a prior meeting with Public Works staff. The May 12 discussion focused solely on recreation issues. Under McLaughlin's proposal, recreation and parks spending would total \$5.1 million, accounting for 20 percent of total city expenditures. This compares with the current year's adopted budget of \$5.3 million and estimated expenditures of \$5.1 million. Parks expenditures account for \$1.1 million of that total leaving \$4.1 million for recreation, which would be a 3.4 percent drop from the FY10 adopted budget and a 0.3 percent increase from FY10 estimated expenditures. Most of the worksession was

a discussion of the accomplishments and issues, budget or otherwise, facing the department. A number of departmental staffers were present to discuss their areas of responsibility. Since the retirement of long-time director Hank Irving at the end of last year, the recreation department has been led by two "co-acting directors" Julie McHale and Joe trances steadily decline during the evening hours with 651 between 5 and 6, 556 from 6 to 7, 482 from 7 to 8, 331 from 8 to 9, 107 from 9 to 10 and 3 after 10 p.m. on weekdays. Weekend evening entrances are even lower, with just 14 people arriving after 9 p.m.

Clement Lau urged council ot to close the pool early. arrival information must be interpreted carefully, he said, people who arrived earlier are still using the facility. Lau noted that the door is closed at 10:15. According to information handed out by Supervisor Stephen Parks, the reduction in hours is estimated to save nearly \$10,500. Mayor Judith Davis told Lau that the city has to economize. Council has been accused, she said, of giving in to everyone. "We're not going to do that this time." In the most heated discussion of the evening, Davis appeared incredulous when Lau suggested that the city could keep the current hours if it furloughed city staff. He noted that as a state employee he has taken 10 furlough days this fiscal year. While no one joined Lau's call for furloughs, the idea of

McNeal. The budget provides for hiring a new director.

The goals for the department outlined by McNeal and McHale include expanding the "Get Active Greenbelt" program, expanding the youth sports program beyond soccer, expanding arts outreach to other schools serving Greenbelt and expanding the "Get Wii Active for Seniors" program. McNeal stated that the cost reductions imposed by the budget will not significantly affect services.

Thanks for a Happy Lost Cat Ending

I walk a lot in Greenbelt with my dogs and I take notice when I see a "Lost Pet" sign. I sometimes walk a different route if I think I might be able to help find a missing dog or cat. I know which animals make it back to the safety of home and which ones do not. Sometimes I see strays come up out of the Agriculture Center looking for food - such as the big red dog, now named Tarzan, who roamed Greenbelt a few years ago. We are fortunate to have a tight-knit animal-caring community - and the resources of the Greenbelt Animal Shelter.

Last week my indoor cat got lost outside. After a sleepless night looking for him, I went to the Greenbelt Animal Shelter to report him missing. The volunteer there showed me all the cats to see if one might be mine. When Susie Root, the Animal Control Officer, came in she gave me several tips to help locate him. She also said that Old Greenbelt was a safe place for him to be lost because neighbors look out for lost companion animals. She made me believe that I might see my elderly cat again.

With renewed hope I put out signs and spent another night sitting waiting to see if he appeared. On Saturday afternoon a gentleman called to say he had seen my sand-colored cat almost a quarter of a mile from the house. I went there with a blanket and treats a couple times. Just as it was getting dark, my cat appeared, meowing away and looking quite ready to come home.

I know we were very fortunate. I looked in enough storm drains and sewers to know that a frightened cat can find all kinds of places to hide. A frightened cat doesn't always answer back when you call them.

I thank the folks who took down my phone number and said that they would call. I thank my neighbor Midge who also searched and kept an eye out. And I especially thank the man who called to say "I just saw your cat" and gave me very detailed information so that I was able to search in the right place. And a special thanks to the Greenbelt Animal Shelter folks who deal with missing animals all the time.

I hope someone goes to look at the large buff cat at the shelter "who has been there a long time." He could use a home too!

in, I discovered that Old Greenbelt has stayed predominately white while newer parts of the city are majority African American. Over the past couple years, I've been talking to people about this pattern and the issues underlying it. I've heard or read in this paper stories of African American people being questioned by the police for simply carrying out the daily acts of living – driving through Old Greenbelt, stopping to talk with friends and changing a license plate (in this case the woman's neighbor called the police about suspicious activity). One young African American man employed at a local car dealership told someone I know that he'd love to live somewhere like Old Greenbelt but after being stopped by police while driving in the community he didn't feel he belonged here. My friend's cousin was also stopped while driving through Old Greenbelt.

On Sunday I was at Roosevelt Center and witnessed two white, middle-aged women exchange


Clarifications




Council Opts for .4-cent Tax Hike

At its final budget worksession on May 19 council discussed several minor changes to the manager's proposed budget that resulted in a difference of +\$81,900 in the final budget. In a straw vote on whether to use the additional funds to reduce the .4-cent increase in the tax rate, council by a 4 to 3 margin opted to retain the

.4-cent tax increase and add to city reserves.

With continued discussion Councilmember Konrad Herling changed his vote to retain the increase with only Mayor Judith Davis and Councilmember Rodney Roberts voting for no tax increase. Council will officially set the tax rate when it adopts the budget on June 7.







drainage issue is due to its low location in that area and a total solution would require a costly drainage project.

Concerning electronic recycling efforts, Robles noted that the city is receiving more items but that the weight of returned electronics is down. She added that recycling efforts are increasing within the city and within the city's buildings. Problems continue, however, with styrofoam food container packaging, which is not recyclable. She urged that such products not be used for city-catered events.

City Contractors

In response to previous council concerns regarding the city's use of contractors to perform maintenance and repair activities for the department and for city facilities, staff had prepared and handed out a comprehensive report. The listing totaled \$131,787.41 for building operations contracts during Fiscal Year 2010.

Contracted services included maintenance of fire alarm systems, water treatment, pest control, testing services, floor finishing and cleaning material rental. Not included in the list were the landscape and lawn maintenance and facility cleaning contracts.

level of contract services was appropriate and that contracts are mainly for services where city employees have no particular expertise.

In the case of contracts, staff pointed out that mowing and other landscaping contracts constitute a savings for the city, which would otherwise require hiring two or three full-time employees and additional equipment. Cleaning work at the Aquatic and Fitness Center is necessarily done after hours. Having city employees do this work would require overtime.

Councilmembers praised staff for the excellent refitting of the council dais to accommodate the two new members comfortably and Public Works officials thanked the city for funding snow blowers, that were helpful to have during "Snowmaggeddon."

Budget Lower

For the department's responsibilities overall, the Public Works Administration budget for FY11 is \$3.041.800 - \$224.200 less than the estimated transactions for FY10 and \$83,400 less than what was budgeted last year. The budget for Maintenance of Multi-Purpose Equipment is proposed at \$279 200 for FY11 a decrease

The Street Landscaping budget portion for FY11 is \$33,500, nearly a 50 percent decrease from what was budgeted last year. Hall advised council that the \$33,500 could go higher by the end of FY11.

On the revenue side, the Streets budget is constrained for the second year by a cut in state shared highway taxes. The annual contribution in "state shared revenues," based upon the miles of roads in a community, peaked for Greenbelt at \$639,687 in FY08. In FY09 that contribution from highway taxes was \$556,635 and it dropped to \$51,000 in FY10 and will continue at that level for FY11.

That situation and a similar reduction in expected Police Aid from the state is a significant hit for the City of Greenbelt's budget. In spite of sharp reductions in the State Highway Users Revenue, however, city officials indicate they will not be cutting back on planned street maintenance for the coming fiscal year.

The Waste Collection budget is nearly flat at \$771,300 for FY11. This is just \$9,800 more than last year's expected costs but lower by about \$12,000 than the FY10 budget amount. The Waste Collection fees for residents are proposed to be increased by \$3 to \$63 per quarter. Finally Hall delivered a bit of bad news that settlement problems had caused damage to sanitary sewer lines at the new Public Works facility and the piping is being replaced. Costs for the replacement will be borne by the contractor but the needed repairs have been disruptive and annoying to the Public Works employees.

The proposed FY11 budget includes \$100,000 for Traffic Control, \$24,600 less than the amount budgeted last year. The FY11 budget for Street Maintenance is \$729,800, about \$70,000 less than last year's budgeted amount but \$223,600 less than what was actually expended last year (\$953,400).

money and a packet. Although that area is under camera surveillance, no police officers arrived to question the women. I wonder if any officers had been present whether they would've stopped the women (although I know one was simply selling a pair of earrings to another). If we are going to subject one group of residents to a standard of interrogation, we should subject everyone to it.

Police behavior is not the only issue we need to examine. We also need to look at how city services are concentrated in the whitest part of town and how many residents in Greenbelt East and West are not aware of the city services their tax dollars fund. And I remain disturbed by the racist graffiti and the level of anger that was directed at the African American city council candidate from Greenbelt West, Che Sayles. A lot of issues were at play in that situation but there seemed to be a labeling of him as an "outsider" who did not embrace the Greenbelt way. I wonder if he would've been treated the same way if he had been a white candidate from Old Greenbelt.

I am not pointing blame at any one institution or group of people in Greenbelt. This is an issue for all of us and requires thought and action. I think it's time to look at what needs to be done today. Several of us have been meeting to talk about how to address racism and classism in Greenbelt and potentially about holding an event during the 75th anniversary in 2012. the FBI for 100.000 to 200.000 square feet of office space, not for the entire headquarters, she reported.

At Senator Mikulski's office, Rachael MacKnight told Wiggins that the senator is aware that the FBI building "is literally crumbling around them and cannot support the high-tech needs of the bureau." At the senator's request, the Government Accountability Office was asked to review the FBI facilities and assess the benefits of a consolidated headquarters and is now doing so, Wiggins reported MacKnight as saying. Such a move to Prince George's County would be a boost for the county in the eyes of many county officials.

Wiggins also reported that a National Center for Smart Growth Research and Education and University of Maryland Real Estate Development Program study found that the county received only four percent of this region's federal leasing dollars even though it had 33 percent of the region's land area and 23 percent of the population.

more aggressively marketing the pool was one already raised by several councilmembers. Emmett Jordan noted that the number of nonresidents and corporate passholders has dropped and urged more marketing outside of Greenbelt. Councilmember Edward Putens disagreed, saying that city taxpayers paid to build the pool. While it is nice to have nonresidents help cover the costs, he did not want to see a situation, as happened at the outdoor pool on weekends, where nonresidents crowded out residents.

Councilmember Rodney Roberts asked what it would take for the Aquatic and Fitness Center to pay for itself. Parks responded that no public facility has ever been completely self-sustaining. McNeal noted at its peak the Center recouped about 90 percent of its costs. Since then, however, other public facilities opened, competing with Greenbelt for customers and utility costs have increased significantly. Davis added that new safety requirements regarding pool drains and the number of lifeguards on duty have also driven up costs. When Davis asked Roberts if he was suggesting that pass rates be raised, Roberts said he was asking staff for their opinions as to how to better manage the facility to increase revenues. We can do better than 60 percent of expenditures, he said, "it's a great facility." McLaughlin said that would require a different business model and fee structure. He agreed to add it as a management objective for the coming year and report back to council.

volunteers will organize to resurrect it.

Recreation Brochure

Another cost savings proposal is to switch to electronic distribution of the quarterly recreation brochure. Instead, postcards will be sent to the addresses that now receive the brochure telling residents how to get the brochure. The options include visiting the city's website and calling the city and to request a brochure by mail.

McHale said that the department has been asking registrants where they learned of the programs and few cited the brochure. More people learn of the city's programs through school or through the city's email blasts. Davis agreed, noting that when she is speaking to groups and shows the brochure, most people say they've never seen it.

Scholarships

Last year the city introduced a recreation scholarship program with a budget of \$10,000. Current year expenditures are estimated at \$5,000, so McLaughlin budgeted that amount for the coming year. Councilmember Leta Mach questioned this, saying that in tough economic times the city should help those who need it most. The budget notes state that this program has subsidized art classes at Springhill Lake Elementary and special events at Empirian Village. Arts Coordinator Nicole De-Wald noted that other funds are also available to support the arts and senior activities such as the Mary P. Geiger Fund. McNeal added that the Lions and Golden Age Clubs also provide support and promised that no one who needs help will go without. If he and McHale cannot find a way to help, they will inform the city manager, he said.

Together these programs served an estimated 38,640 participants in the current year (ending June 30). The city is projecting a slight increase in participation this year, however, camp registration is slow.

When asked why the Teen Treks program's participation numbers had dropped, from 119 in 2009 to just 50 this year, Recreation Supervisor Greg Varda told council that the most popular program, snow tubing, was cancelled this year due to the blizzard. Not all the blame can be placed on the overabundance of white stuff, however, as the number of teen treks fell from eight in 2009 to just two in the current year.

The "Leisure and Fitness" (or as Councilmember Emmett Jordan suggested the "Fitness and Leisure") budget establishes a management objective to create a program to provide education about city parks. Sports and Recreation Coordinator Andrew Phelan said the goal is to introduce a Park Ranger program at Buddy Attick Park to provide educational tours of city parks. Or, as McNeal said, to use parks as outdoor classrooms.

Davis, supported by Mach, suggested eliminating the annual Pet Expo, retaining only the rabies clinic.

Revised Rezoning Sought For Beltway Plaza Mall

GB Mall Limited Partnership has submitted a revised conceptual site plan for the rear portion of its property, Beltway Plaza. The proposal calls for adding new construction to the rear side of the mall facing Empirian Village - 700 residential units and approximately 22,000 square feet of new retail shops on approximately 15.4 acres. It would be necessary for Prince George's County to rezone this property to the MUI (Mixed Use Infill) zone before this additional construction could be accomplished.

The Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission referred the proposal to the City of Greenbelt in early March with response due by April 1. However, Planning and Community Development Director Celia Craze said that city staff has not yet undertaken a review of the proposal because it is incomplete. She does not expect the matter to be referred to the city's Advisory Planning Board until sometime this summer.

Previously, Beltway Plaza owners submitted a request to rezone the entire shopping center property of 54.39 acres to the MUI zone. This was at a time when the owners of Springhill Lake apartments (now Empirian Village) were proposing to tear down and replace all existing apartments with denser development varying from elevator luxury apartments to townhouses, with most of the new structures being rental. At the same time, Metroland Developers were proposing extensive mixed-use development for the Greenbelt Metro Station property and the former A. H. Smith property to the south. Also, real estate construction was booming. All these plans and proposals were either dropped or went into limbo when the real estate market crashed.

Original Proposal

The original proposal called for adding 1,400 residential units to the existing 800,000 square feet of additional retail space. A concept plan submitted called for the extension of Springhill Lane in Empirian Village south to Greenbelt Road, eliminating a portion of the existing mall through which the road would run. The mall was to be converted into a town center type of development rather than an enclosed mall.

The owners now propose adding 700 dwelling units between the existing retail buildings and Breezewood Drive, consisting of 450 rental units, 150 owner-occupied units and 100 age-restricted units, although the specific number of each could change until final approval is rendered for a detailed site plan. For 700 units, the density would be 45.5 dwelling units per acre.

The applicant justifies the MUI rezoning on the basis that the property is adjacent to Empirian Village, already zoned MUI and non-residential development (Beltway Plaza) with a floor area ratio in excess of 0.15, the minimum required by law. The area to be rezoned is that part of the mall property nearest to the Metro Station and directly across the street from Empirian Village.

The proposal would provide quality development within a safe and effective multimodal transit system that balances transit, bicycle, pedestrian and automobile circulation, according to the applicant. Its location as relates to existing development will all combine to create a sense of community identity and place. The development is also expected to provide for the revitalization and enhancement of Beltway Plaza, which is consistent with the land use concept of the Sector Plan for this area.

The applicant further contends that the proposed addition to the shopping center will "transform the area from a largely unused parking lot to a vibrant development" that will provide integration between the new construction and existing development within proximity of the Greenbelt Metro Station.

Craze expressed concern that the new proposal just added on to the back of Beltway Plaza and ignored the front area of the shopping center. "They are not looking at revitalization of Beltway Plaza, but just adding to it," she said.

Greenbelt New Year

There was relatively little dispute about McLaughlin's proposal to eliminate the city's support of the New Year celebration. Even Larry Hilliard, one of the program's founders, did not object, although he urged maintaining other arts programs. McNeal, also involved in the program's birth, suggested that the program may simply have run its course, as have many "first night" programs.

Davis said that it may be time to let the program "lie fallow" and hope that a new group of
