Tuesday's Statewide Primary Will Determine Significant Races

Greenbelters who watched the Labor Day parade will know that a gubernatorial primary election is coming up next Tuesday, September 14. Some candidates for various posts remained in their vehicles, smiling and waving; others preferred walking along the parade route and shaking hands.

Only registered Democrats and Republicans are eligible to vote in the primary. Those registered with other parties or who are unaffiliated must wait until the general election on Tuesday, November 2 to cast their votes.

For Greenbelters, there will only be a few offices for which their votes will affect the outcome in Tuesday's primary. Yet these offices are important ones.

For Democrats the main contested race of interest is for Prince George's county executive. But the offices of state's attorney and sheriff are also up for grabs.

No Republicans have filed to run for any of these three offices or for the offices of clerk of the circuit court or register of wills in this heavily Democratic county. With no Republican opposition and no third-party or unaffiliated candidates running for these offices in the general election, the winners will effectively be decided by Democratic voters on Tuesday.

For Republicans the main primary contest of interest is selection of an opponent to run against incumbent Democratic Senator Barbara Mikulski in November, since she is expected to easily overcome her primary challengers on Tuesday.

Governor

Topping each party's ballot will be the race for governor and lieutenant governor. Two slates, headed by perennial candidate Ralph Jaffe of Baltimore County and by J.P. Cusick of Holly- tive blogger. wood, are challenging incumbent Governor Martin O'Malley and Lt. Governor Anthony G. Brown. Neither challenger is well known.

On the Republican ballot for-

mer Governor Robert L. Ehrlich, Jr., running with his former Secretary of State Mary Kane, is being challenged by little-known Brian Murphy, a Bethesda utility company executive who has received something of a boost from an endorsement by Sarah Palin, former governor of Alaska and conservative Republican Tea

The slates led by O'Malley and Ehrlich are expected to prevail easily to become their party's candidates in the November general election. This predictable gubernatorial primary will likely be replaced by a more compelling November race as O'Malley and Ehrlich face each other in addition to several Green, Libertarian and Constitution party slates.

Attorney General

Maryland Attorney General Douglas F. Gansler is seeking nomination for reelection unopposed on the Democratic ballot. Republicans failed to nominate any candidates for this office.

Comptroller

Although incumbent comptroller Peter Franchot faces no opposition on the Democratic primary ballot, three Republicans are competing for their party's nomination to run against him in the general election.

William H. Campbell, of Columbia, has served as chief financial officer for a number of federal agencies, was Amtrak's CFO from 2007-2009 and has recently been endorsed by candidate and former Governor Robert Ehrlich.

Armand Girard, a retired Baltimore City school teacher who has run for office previously, would as comptroller, promote slot machines to enhance education funding. Brendan Madigan, an 18-year-old from northern Baltimore County, is active with the Tea Party and as a conserva-

U.S. Congress

For U.S. Senate, incumbent Senator Barbara Mikulski is seeking election to her fifth term. She is expected to win handily over her six relatively unknown primary opponents: Christopher J. Garner, Annapolis; Theresa C. Scaldaferri, Mt. Rainier; Sanquetta Taylor, Baltimore County; Blaine Taylor, Towson; A. Billy Bob Jaworski, Montgomery County; and Lih Young, Montgomery County.

Republican candidates seeking to be their party's nominee in the November election are also little known. Of the group, Dr. Eric Wargotz, a Queen Anne's County physician and county commissioner, appears to be the best funded for the campaign. Other candidates are Joseph Alexander, Silver Spring; Barry Asbury, Baltimore County; Dr. Neil Cohen, a Potomac dentist; Stephens Dempsey, Frederick County; Samuel R. Graham, Sr., a retired ironworker and business owner from Bowie; John Kimble, a frequent candidate from Montgomery County; Gregory Kump, a former Marine from Towson; Daniel McAndrew, Harford County; Jim Rutledge, a Harford County attorney; and Eddie Vendetti, an Olney engineer.

Steny H. Hoyer is seeking his 15th full term in the U.S. House of Representatives representing the Fifth Congressional District, which includes portions of Prince George's and Anne Arundel counties, as well as all of Charles, St. Mary's and Calvert Counties. Hoyer is now the House majority leader, the second ranking position in the House. He has two little-known Democratic primary challengers. Sylvanus Bent of Accokeek holds a doctorate in ministry and is a former Department of Defense budget analyst. A former Americorps VISTA volunteer, Andrew Gall of College Park is now a graduate student at American University.

Four Republican primary candidates also are seeking the congressional seat. Collins A. Bailey, a member of the Charles County Board of Education and Hoyer's Republican challenger in the 2008 general election, is

That fact had nothing to do with him - but with our family's situation. We moved to Africa for a two-year stint with the Agency for International Development. Returning, we settled into new housing in the Lakeside development and have lived here

During our time away, Giese had found GHI housing near where we used to live; a few years later he moved in across the street from us. For something like 40 years, we have been neighbors.

That city job of course had nothing to do with Giese's being named Outstanding Citizen for 2010. Instead it could have been a disqualification. This honor is

Crane will speak about the people, places, history and coastal environments of this land of extremes from a temperate rain forest in the south to a frozen permafrost in the north and alpine zones among the mountain ranges crossing the central part of the state. Alaska abounds with mining, fur trading, fishing and oil development, while thousands of visitors explore parks and coastal

Important events in history include European discovery, U.S. territory, Japanese invasion and statehood. While the Alaska Current sweeps the Gulf of Alaska, seasonal sea ice in the Bering Sea and Arctic Ocean waters define offshore marine habitats.

At Pool this Weekend

The traditional Greenbelt outdoor pool post-closing pooch plunges will be held by Animal Control and the city Recreation Department this weekend, rain or shine. From 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on both Saturday and Sunday a splash party will be held for socialized dogs and their handlers at the outdoor pool.

There is a nominal fee and each dog must have a handler. The rules for the pooch plunge include that handlers must pick up and properly dispose of feces; handlers must render first-aid if their dog is injured and notify other handlers if their dog inflicts injury; handlers must come dressed to swim if they plan to enter the pool with dog; no glass containers; and all participating dogs must be licensed and vaccinated.

The following are not permitted: dog treats or training treats; aggressive dogs; dogs in heat; dogs under four months of age; any animals other than dogs; or any injured or sick dogs. The Kiddie Pool will be available for small dogs.







with each other. This activity caused the officers to disperse the groups.

Once a group was dispersed, however, the persons involved would then regroup elsewhere within or near the festival grounds and continue fighting. As a result of one such fight one juvenile was arrested for assault and two other persons were detained while reports were completed.

Fights Reported

According to police officials the first fight was reported at 9:22 p.m. and a second report came in at 9:42 p.m. Shortly after the latter incident, where an arrest was made, the Greenbelt Police Department's Special Operations Division Commander, Captain Thomas Kemp, met with the carnival operator and the Festival chair to consider options. It was agreed that closing the festival grounds early would be the most prudent.

Once the decision was made, festival rides and attractions

were incrementally shut down and completed about 10:35 p.m. Bingo on the Community Center lawn had just started the "blackout" fill-the-card game, which was done by 11 p.m. By midnight Roosevelt Center was completely empty and secure.

Captain Kemp noted that a few minor scuffles occurred in the area of Crescent Road and Gardenway following the closing as festival goers departed. The only police action at that stage was to continue the peaceful dispersal of the crowd.



Teen Driving Program Held in Sykesville

In a joint program sponsored by the Maryland State Highway Administration and Ford Motor Company Driving Skills for Life, a half-day free safe driving program for teens will be offered at the Maryland State Police training facility in Sykesville on Saturday, October 16 and Sunday, October 17. Voter Registration Is Up Since Presidential Election

In Greenbelt, voter registration has risen about 3 percent since November 2008 to 11,494 registered voters. However, about 1 out of 5 are not eligible to vote next Tuesday – those who are not registered as Democrats or Republicans. Only the two major parties will be participating in the primary election. Greenbelters will vote for a school board representative, a nonpartisan position, at the November election.

All Greenbelt precincts showed some increase in registration, with the exception of Greenbelt Center which had a slight decrease. Greenbelt has traditionally had a much higher percentage of registered Democrats, ranging from the mid-60 percent range in Center and North End precincts to the low- to mid-70 percent range in Greenbelt East and West.

Seventy-seven percent of those registered in Greenbelt West (Springhill Lake Elementary School) are registered Democrats, traditionally the highest percentage in the city. However, that precinct also traditionally has the

lowest voter turnout.

Although almost three-quarters (74 percent) of voters registered in the whole city are Democrats, Prince George's County as a whole has an even higher percentage (78 percent). This compares to State of Maryland in which 56 percent are registered Democrats, the same percentage as in 2008.

Twenty-seven percent of statewide registrants are Republicans compared with 8 percent in the city.

Although they are not eligible to vote in the primary, the number of Greenbelt registered voters in other parties has changed little in the two year period. The Green party has seen its small number of registrants drop from 77 to 75 in 2010. The Libertarians have seen their numbers increase from 25 in 2008 to 31 in 2010, a relatively large percent increase on a very small number of people. Registrants who are unaffiliated with any party have seen their numbers increase by almost 20 percent - from 1,141

Primary Voting

Primary election day is Tuesday, September 14. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. The Prince George's County Board of Elections reports that voters can expect delays at the polls after 5 p.m. due to after-work voting. Voters can avoid delays by voting between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m.

Five precincts serve Greenbelt:

Only registered Democrats and Republicans may vote in the primary next Tuesday. Greenbelters who have declined affiliation with the two major parties will vote only in the November general election.

All voters eligible to vote in the primary should have recently received a sample ballot from the Board of Elections. The individual's voting location is shown in the top left corner of the back of the brochure. Those needing more information can contact the Board of Elections office at 301-430-8020.

seeking another shot. Charles Lollar of Charles County, a major in the Marine Reserves, is a business manager in Prince George's County.

Little information is available on the other two candidates: Chris Chaffee and Chris Robins, of Calvert and Anne Arundel Counties respectively.

Legislature

All incumbent delegates to the Maryland General Assembly from the 22nd Legislative District seek reelection. All four are unopposed in the Democratic primary; nor will they face Republican or other challengers in November. They are Senator Paul G. Pinsky and Delegates Tawanna Gaines, Anne Healey and Justin Ross.

County Executive

Five Democratic candidates are vying for the office of county executive: former Delegate Rushern L. Baker, III; County Councilmember Samuel H. Dean; Sheriff Michael A. Jackson; Delegate Gerron Levi; and businessman and retired Army Lt. Col. Henry C. Turner, Jr. The incumbent, Jack Johnson, is prevented by term limits from seeking reelection.

Most county political observers have considered this to be a tight, two-person race between Baker and Jackson, with some thinking that Baker may have the edge in the days leading up to the election. Baker's first, unsuccessful, race against Johnson took place in 2002. In 2006 Baker lost by only about 5,000 votes countywide. He carried Greenbelt, capturing 67 percent of the city's vote and all precincts except Springhill Lake, which gave the nod to Johnson. Baker is now endorsed by five of the seven Prince George's State Senators who have named a favorite, as well as by State's Attorney Glenn Ivey, former County Executive Wayne Curry, the local Gazette and the Washington Post.

Michael Jackson has received backing from a number of unions representing county and other workers, including the Prince George's County Educators' Association, American Postal Workers Union Local 140 and the Prince George's County Volunteer Fire & Rescue Association Political Action Committee. Many of Johnson's supporters are also actively working in Jackson's campaign, although the county executive himself has remained silent on endorsement.

Baker has promised dramatic change in how the county executive's office does business and interacts with Annapolis. While defining himself as his own man with his own plans for the office, Jackson is generally supportive of the record of the Johnson administration.

Neither of the two front-runners has escaped criticism in areas relevant to their capabilities to manage the county. Baker has been challenged on his oversight of the 2005-2007 financial reporting of a nonprofit educational organization he headed. He was also criticized for a delay in revealing financing to his campaign from a large owner of rental properties in the county, a mistake he has admitted and corrected.

For his share, Jackson has received ongoing criticism for incidents involving his deputies and for appearing to defend the actions of his staff which brought the policies and procedures of the department under scrutiny.

Most noted of these was the SWAT team raid on Berwyn Heights Mayor Cheye Calvo's home in 2008 in which the family dogs were shot and killed. More recently, two deputies, one of whom had been serving as Jackson's campaign treasurer, were indicted on embezzlement charges and, in another case, due to the misplacement of an arrest warrant, a man remained free and shot his girlfriend, who later died of the wounds.

County Council

The incumbent member of the County Council from District 4, which includes Greenbelt, is Ingrid Turner. She is unopposed in the Democratic primary. Running unopposed in the Republican primary is Fiona Moodie of Bowie, an 18-year-old student at Anne Arundel Community College.

Also unopposed but appearing on both parties' primary ballots, are four judges of the Seventh Judicial Circuit. They are Leo E. Green, Jr., C. Philip Nichols, Jr., Michael R. Pearson and Beverly J. Woodward.

State's Attorney

A five-person race exists among Democrats for the open office of Prince George's County state's attorney, incumbent Glenn Ivey having opted not to run for reelection. The five are Angela Alsobrooks, executive director of the county Revenue Authority and a former prosecutor in the state's attorney's office; County Council Chairman Thomas E. Dernoga, a local attorney; Clerk of the Circuit Court Peggy Magee, a former prosecutor; County Police Department Inspector General Mark Spencer, also a former deputy state's attorney and Joseph L. Wright, currently deputy director of the District Court Division in the state's attorney's office. The race could be wide open. Dernoga appears to be spending the most money while Alsobrooks has been endorsed by the Washington Post and State's Attorney Ivey. Magee is also well known from her past election to office.

Sheriff

In a seven-man race for sheriff, only three seem to be serious contenders. Of these Rafael Hylton, currently a deputy sheriff and retired county police officer, seems to have garnered the most endorsements from other politicos, including one from Upper Marlboro Police Chief Michael T. Gonnella, another candidate for the office. Hylton is the brother of Roberto Hylton, the current county police chief.

Darryl L. Morgan, a retired Maryland trooper and former deputy chief of the D.C. Protective Service Police, has also garnered some support. Melvin C. High, the previous county police chief, past Norfolk chief and retired Metropolitan police officer, has strong qualifications but lacks the county political connections the others have.

Also running are Edward R. Cheeks, a former Metropolitan police officer currently performing private security work; Daniel "Danny" Hall, assistant bureau chief of field operations and 30-year veteran of the sheriff's office and Louis M. Wood, Jr., who is unknown.

Other County Offices

Running for clerk of the circuit court are Marilynn Bland, former school board and county councilmember; Gary C. Clark, retired from Verizon, who served as deputy clerk under the two prior clerks of the circuit court; Flora Ann Fortune, retired from the clerk's office, who ran unsuccessfully against Peggy Magee for the office in 2006; Adrion J. Howell, a former legislative liaison to Jack Johnson; Joyce Starks, a WSSC Commissioner and business officer for the NIH; and Linda Thornton Thomas, who recently resigned from the school board in order to run.

Two men and two women are challenging incumbent Cereta A. Lee on the Democratic ballot for the office of register of wills. Since they are not well known, Lee will probably get the party nomination. They are Ronald Sterling Blackwell, once a deputy sheriff; Carla McClinton, a legal assistant and licensed realtor; Kyle Okonah, an unknown; and Julia Williams, a volunteer teacher and tutor.

Seeking to be judges of the orphan's court on the Democratic ballot are Gary Byrd, Wendy A. Cartwright, Pamela Cherry, Athena Malloy Groves and Vicky

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Central Committee

There are several races for atlarge election to the Democratic Central Committee in addition to other unchallenged races. In District 21, Jerry Anzulovic and Sylvia Bolivar compete. In District 26 the candidates are Nathaniel Bryant and Veronica L. DavilaSteele and in District 47 they are Janelle J. Jordan and Oliver Ortiz. Competing for two openings on the committee from District 22, Greenbelt's district, are Robin Barnes-Shell, Denise Riley and James Thomas Wilkinson.

Two seats are open on the Republican Central Committee but only one candidate, Thomas J. Slezak.

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
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Beekeepers Present Honey Festival

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

position in 1989 and almost at once joined the staff of the Greenbelt News Review where he has become a valued - nay, indispensable - colleague. During all these years he has been a tireless reporter, a valued copy editor, a long-time board member and, for much of this time, our president. One invaluable quality he has brought to our operation is his background in municipal affairs and knowledge of the larger metropolitan area in which we live.

Add to these contributions his devotion to the Greenbelt Museum, where he has served as docent and museum guide. He has served also as usher and greeter at the Greenbelt Community Church; and if you attend a program at the Greenbelt Arts Center, you may also find him selling tickets at the box office.

Outstanding in Spades

For more years than most of us can remember. Giese served as well on the very committee that makes these awards - the Outstanding Citizen Selection Committee. That's where other committee members learned to value his tireless work, his general knowledge of the community, his affability and his general good judgment.

But of course committee members cannot nominate one of their own. What changed this year had been his resignation as he contemplated a move away from Greenbelt, to senior citizen housing elsewhere. As committee chair Bob Zugby said to the crowd, "He has had no idea of this year's selection. Well, until the last few seconds anyway." Laughing, Zugby then announced Giese's name, as the latter was called to the podium.

Throughout all his years as Greenbelt's city manager, Giese had been a bachelor. But 10 years ago - well into his retirement - all that changed when he and fellow News Review volunteer, the widowed Bernina (Bernie) McGee, married in the Community Church that both attended. With this marriage came two step-daughters and a ready-made extended family of step-grandchildren.

Two days after receiving his award came another surprise for this year's Outstanding Citizen - a sumptuous gala luncheon after the Sunday church service for the honored guest and a crowd of his well-wishers and from all of them an extensive round of applause reverberating throughout the room - not only for his well-deserved award but to commemorate as well his 80th birthday.
