Manager of Franklin Park Shares Background, Plans

So how do you become the public face of a 2,877unit prominent but troubled apartment complex? Debbie Dillon, executive vice president of Fieldstone Properties and senior executive located full-time onsite at Franklin Park at Greenbelt Station (formerly Empirian

Village/Springhill Lake), appears to have been preparing for the job during her whole career.

In 1986 Dillon began as property manager for 100 apartment units. She went on to spend 10 years in Dallas, Texas, working as a real estate pension fund advisor helping large pension funds to invest in multi-family properties. She then transitioned from hands-on property management to the investment/financial side of a company responsible for

35 properties with 40,000 units.

As an investment manager she became acquainted with the principals of Fieldstone Properties. Fieldstone Properties sought financial backing from pension funds advised by her company to acquire eight projects with 2,300 units in

Tampa, Fla.

In overseeing her clients' investment in the Fieldstone complexes, Dillon got to know the people behind Fieldstone. She was impressed with the Fieldstone executives. "Joe and Ralph (Kazarnovsky and Reider, principals of the firm) are men of such integrity," she says. She describes them as long-term investors whose approach included

Art Crafts

From 1 to 2:30 p.m. there will be a word art project led by Artist-in-residence Kathy Karlson. A painter and poet, Karlson will help participants create visual art works integrating written language. Even children who don't yet write can have fun collaborating with a parent in this activity.

Dance

At 2:30 p.m. Greenbelt choreographer Angella Foster and Alight Dance Theater will share with the Greenbelt community the new production "Speechless," which was commissioned for performances by the Kennedy Center. Weaving together dance, gesture, text and live music. Speechless explores the struggle of parents of special needs children with communication issues to care for and understand their silent child in an increasingly noisy world. Inspired by her niece, Foster uncovered during her research that "the ability to communicate is in itself a 'most basic need." Alight Dance Theater creates performance events which celebrate the power of story and inspire others to be compassionate viewer-participants in their communities. After the performance, those present will be invited to join in fun dance activities with the company.

About the premiere of Speechless at the Kennedy Center, Foster says, "It went really well. And we're excited about giving (it) a new life at Greenbelt on November 7." Foster moved to Greenbelt just before Christmas 2007. She established Alight Dance Theater in January this year. The dance company rehearses at the Greenbelt Community Center and is a city recognition group. Foster met mixed-media artist Jessica Braiterman, who created sculptures for use in Speechless

Local Democrats True to Form; Give Most Candidates 85 to 87%

If Greenbelters were turned off by incumbents this year as is supposed to be the case in much of the country, they didn't show it by voting for opponents. Unofficial election results for the five Greenbelt precincts indicate that Governor Martin O'Malley defeated his opponent, former Governor Robert Ehrlich, by a greater margin than he did four years ago. In fact, he obtained more votes than before even though voter turnout at the polling places was slightly less. Senator Barbara Mikulski defeated her opponent by a greater margin than Senator Benjamin

Cardin defeated his opponent four years ago. State Comptroller Peter Franchot also defeated his opponent by a greater margin than the last time. The one exception was Congressman Steny Hoyer who did slightly less well than in the past two elections, percentagewise, but still garnered a whopping 86 percent against this year's oppo-

County Councilmember Ingrid Turner did not have an opponent four years ago and did this year. While challenger Fiona Moodie did garner 13 percent of the vote, Turner still received a higher percentage in Greenbelt than any other challenged candidate.

School Board

In the only non-partisan election on the ballot, Greenbelt school board candidate Peggy Higgins handily beat challenger Mark Cook, gaining 69 percent of the Greenbelt vote. Interestingly. Cook obtained 24 more votes than Higgins at Springhill Lake Elementary School (Franklin Park). A flyer distributed late in the campaign indicated that Cook had received an endorsement from the Democratic Party, which was not the case. Early Wednesday county tallies indicated that Higgins was winning the district by a two-to-one margin.

While Greenbelt voter registration is not available, turnout on Tuesday was slightly down from the last gubernatorial election. However, with more liberal absentee voting requirements and the introduction of early voting this year, the drop at the polls might be due to more Greenbelters voting early. Using 2008 unofficial registration numbers as a base figure, voter turnout at the polls this year was 39 percent, 78 percent for the presidential election and 43 percent for 2006.

County vs. City

As Greenbelt went, so did the county, more or less. O'Malley garnered a slightly higher percentage county-wide as did Franchot and Mikulski. Hoyer did appear to have done better in Greenbelt as did Turner. Throughout the councilmanic district Moodie gained more than 20 percent of the vote, while in Greenbelt she achieved only 13

GCAN to View "Home," Discuss Wind on Wed.

The next Greenbelt Climate Action Network (GCAN) meeting will be held on Wednesday, November 10 at 7 p.m. in Room 114 at the Greenbelt Community Center and will include a showing of the video "Home," beginning promptly at 7 p.m., followed by a presentation about the future of wind energy in Maryland.

"Home," with aerial footage from 54 countries, depicts how the Earth's problems are interlinked. Scientists say there are only 10 years left to change the way people live, avert the depletion of natural resources and the catastrophic evolution of Earth's climate. The Chesapeake Climate Action Network and others including Environment Maryland, the Maryland League of Conservation Voters, Sierra Club and the National Wildlife Federation are spearheading a campaign to pass an offshore wind bill in the 2011 Maryland General Assembly that would bring offshore wind to the state by 2015.

The presentation will cover all basic questions about the benefits and challenges of bringing offshore wind to Maryland, as well as what people can do to help plug the state into this resource. 

Facing Up & Double Trouble

Two new films split the week starting Friday, November 5 at Old Greenbelt Theatre. Running through Tuesday is "The Social Network"; on Wednesday and Thursday "Morning Glory" debuts.

"Network" is a docudrama that tracks the recent birth and vertiginous growth of the Internet's Facebook, via which a halfbillion "friends" around the globe now can message one another electronically. Writer Aaron Sorkin and director David Fincher, drawing on the book "The Accidental Billionaires," whip along from 19-year-old Harvard sophomore Mark Zuckerberg (Jesse Eisenberg) who got it all going to the wide-ranging buildup and fallout that has followed – and what it signifies.

"Morning Glory" features newly-hired producer Becky Fuller (Rachel McAdams) taking on a pair of feuding morning TV talk show hosts (Harrison Ford and Diane Keaton). Director Roger Michell stirs the comedic p(l)ot with Jeff Goldblum as network honcho and Patrick Wilson as Becky's beset boyfriend.

Exploring Cold War Thaw in Antarctica

On Friday, November 12 the theme for Explorations Unlimited will be Antarctic sailors, scientists and a Cold War thaw 50 years ago, as historian Dian Olson Belanger shares the story of how pioneering scientists from 12 nations in the late 1950s began a systematic probe of the secrets of Antarctica's ice. Sailors braving Earth's most hostile, unknown environment built and maintained a complex infrastructure to make the science possible.

Together, their scientific, logistical and political success in the depths of the Cold War led to the Antarctic Treaty of 1959, which dedicated the entire polar continent to peace and the cooperative pursuit of science. Fifty years later, it still does.

After an illustrated talk, Belanger will be available to sign copies of her "Deep Freeze," now in paperback. ("Deep Freeze: The United States, the International Geophysical Year and the Origins of Antarctica's Age of Science," University Press of Colorado, 2006). Belanger is an independent historian. Her first book, "Managing American Wildlife" (University of Massachusetts, 1988), won The Wildlife Society's national book award in 1990.

Her second, "Enabling American Innovation: Engineering and the National Science Foundation" (Purdue University, 1998), opened the door to her passion for Antarctica.







The City of Greenbelt will accept bids from General Contractors for the Greenhill Road Stream Stabilization Project until 2:30 PM on Wednesday, December 8, 2010 at which time the bids will be publicly opened and read at the Greenbelt Department of Planning and Community Development located at 15 Crescent Road, Suite 200, Greenbelt, Maryland 20770. The project includes the installation of a drop structure, grading stream banks, the installation of a coastal plain outfall, a series of stop pools, two bed sills, removal of a failing culvert at an existing pedestrian bridge path crossing, extensive tree planting and construction of a pedestrian bridge. The project is being partially funded through the Chesapeake and Atlantic Coastal Bays 2010 Trust and Non Point Source Fund, and is subject to certain State procurement standards.

altruism as well as financial acu-

She says she was attracted by the opportunity to improve peoples' quality of life and knew that if the right project came along with Kazarnovsky and Reider, she wanted to be part of it. When the call came asking her to come to Greenbelt for the newly named Franklin Park at Greenbelt Station, she left the job she had held for 10 years, as well as her horses and her Dallas ranch. She moved her family here for the position, which will require turning around a challenging project and upgrading conditions. She must manage the financial side as well.

Discoveries Here

After five months here, preparing since June for the Fieldstone takeover of Empirian Village, Dillon talked about pleasant surprises and disappointments. She is delighted with the massive Greenbelt property's beauty in its layout and stands of trees.

She is also excited about the services and support available through the City of Greenbelt. She describes Celia Craze, Greenbelt director of Planning and Community Development, as "wonderful to work with" and not at all as described by the previous owners' management team.

However, at the end of every day Dillon feels disappointed, she says, that she has not been able to accomplish more.

Dillon says Fieldstone wants to build a portfolio of rental properties in the Washington area. Their business plan involves buying basic apartments and upgrading them to provide clean, safe, affordable and "nice" housing for working families.

Fieldstone's Mill Run project in Union, N.J., has just been recognized, she says, as the Garden State 2010 Best Managed Property by an industry group.

Dillon wants to assure residents that there is a new game in town. In addition to new signage, planting areas throughout the complex have been beautified with thousands of blooming pansies. Both flowers and signs were in place on the first full day under the new ownership.

Management will not overinvest in fancy externals, she says, but will spend on capital improvements to mechanical systems and roofs. Security lighting, cameras and emergency call boxes will also be installed.

Future plans include a new state-of-the-art fitness center, improvement of swimming pools and the lake area beautified. Renovations are planned for common areas such as entrances, stairwells and breezeway/hallways.

Interior Facelifts

Franklin Park has renovated two model apartments to show the planned upgrade of kitchens and bathrooms. In the kitchens maple cabinets look like those in IKEA model kitchens. Appliances are very nice - not the lowest builders' grade - and the granite countertops gleam in light reflected from under-counter lighting.

The bathroom vanity counter is also granite and granite tiles surround the new bathtubs. Wood parquet floors in the models have been refinished to a beautiful shine - an impressive testament to the original quality of the almost 50-yearold flooring.

The apartments still have the large closets from the original floor plans and large windows still look out onto wooded common areas. But common areas leading to the models are somewhat tired and worn out but, as mentioned above, are part of the planned renovations throughout the project.

Dillon says the first units to be renovated will be the boardedup, chain-link-fencing-surrounded apartments gutted by an October 2009 fire. She hopes to have construction finished by December 1. Construction documents are ready, she says, and there is a building permit for the work and bids are out. No construction has begun yet, however.

Last Words

When asked what message she would like to send to Franklin Park tenants, Dillon wanted residents to know that the new management will try their very best in managing the property. In a complex the age of Franklin Park, "Things will happen but we will do the right thing," she says.

GAC Restroom Mission Seeks Community Support

The campaign to renovate the restrooms in the Greenbelt Arts Center (GAC) has reached \$19,000 out of an overall goal of \$50,000. For its members and friends the goal was set at

Of that sum, \$6,000 has already been donated by people who value the theater's close-tohome offerings and its reasonable prices – \$15 for adults and \$12 for seniors and students for nonmusical events. GAC is grateful for the help of the following Greenbelt supporters: Prince George's County Councilwoman Ingrid Turner, District 4 Fund (\$2,500); Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (\$500); and Greenbelt Community Foundation (\$5,000).

The condition of the restrooms is such that the theater's board of directors concluded that their complete reconstruction was necessary to insure the theater's continued existence. More than renovation the project's goal is to make the rooms accessible.

Greenbelt's disabled residents and visitors can thus both attend and participate. They can be actors, artists, costumers, directors, producers, sound and lighting designers, box office volunteers and, of course, members of the audience.

Now in its 31st season of varied live-theater offerings, rotating exhibits of art by local artists in its lobby and concerts by musical groups, such as The Chromatics from Goddard Space Flight Center and the Celtic Ceilidh Band, GAC has a history of quality entertainment. GAC also hosts a youth theater camp and has been a site for the Utopia Film Festival. It also participates in the Labor Day Festival and the Festival of Lights by staffing food booths supplied by goodies created by Chef Lou Parker.

Because GAC's mailing list cannot reach everybody in Greenbelt who has an interest in the theater, the Restroom Rescue Committee has hopes to reach the city's whole population, seeking its support in securing the remaining \$4,000 of the \$10,000 goal set for members and friends.

Programs like this can be scheduled for a private group by calling the museum at 301-864-6025.

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
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Greenbelt's Skate Park Used for Training

When someone gets hurt, we take for granted those rescuing them will know quickly and precisely what to do.

If someone becomes injured in the deep bowl at the Greenbelt Skate Park - how will rescue teams get them out?

On Friday, October 29 from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., seven fire and rescue units - Greenbelt, Beltsville, Branchville, College Park, Laurel, Calverton and Hyattsville - participated in a "Steep Angle Rescue" drill at Greenbelt Skate Park preparing for such an event.

But why Greenbelt in particular?

Recreation Department Director Joe McNeal summed it up this way: "Skate parks are like golf courses; every one of them has unique features skaters like to explore."

Greenbelt's advanced bowl. designed by skateboarder Tony Hawk's architect, is known and used by skate boarders across the country. Its design allows skaters to soar 4 ½ feet over the top of the bowl when performing maneuvers

To avoid liability, skaters using the park have to register and sign a waiver agreeing to follow park rules, skate within their ability level and have proper equipment when using the facility. Supported by recreation and police department enforcement, no major injuries have happened since the skate park opened.

If an accident does occur, the steep-angle rescue allows paramedics to access, stabilize, immobilize and remove the patient from the park within "the golden hour" the point from which the person is injured to the time they receive surgery. When injured patients



receive care within the first hour, their chances for full recovery go up considerably.

The steep-angle rescue involves immobilizing the injured person by strapping him onto a Miller Board (a 1-foot by 7-foot by 2-inch thick plastic board with slots cut into it) and strapping him either into a wire basket or a Sked stretcher - which looks like a giant orange toboggan with shoelaces. The basket or Sked stretcher is tied with a rope, then slid up a ladder to the rescue crews.

Why Training?

Sounds simple - why the need for training?

In reality the process is highly technical. The drill allows rescue teams both to master technique and practice the "what ifs" in the field. They focus on practicing and checking proper knot-tying techniques to counterbalance shifting; combining ropes, pulleys and





knots to maximize leverage and minimize the weight each person pulls; and checking the proper ladder angle to allow for the smoothest transition possible. They also work with differing scenarios to prepare for the realities of the

Should a skater become injured, fire and rescue teams in this vicinity are ready to go. Those present at an injury can also help by remembering never to move an injured person: keep them still, inform the recreation staff and call
