A Large Turnout Explores Memorial Day Ceremony Pays New Uses for Middle School Tribute to Those Who Served

After disappointing turnouts at its first two public hearings in Greenbelt East and Greenbelt Center, the Greenbelt Middle School (GMS) Task Force sent out over 1,000 flyers announcing its third hearing, in Greenbelt West on May 19 at Springhill Lake Elementary School. The three task force leaders, Chair David Lange, Vice Chair Beatrice Rogers and David Whaples, must have been impressed by the near-capacity turnout of over 100 in the school multipurpose room.

However, a show of hands later in the evening revealed that by far most parents and children present - nearly all non-Greenbelt residents - had been brought out by Paul Shackelford, chair of Turning Point Academy (TPA) charter school now located on Good Luck Road in Greenbelt. Turning Point is interested in getting use of the old Greenbelt Middle School facility.

This structure is soon to be abandoned as a new middle school is constructed elsewhere on the site. Turning Point would use the building for an expanded academy eventually serving kindergarten through high school.

Nevertheless, the 20 to 25 Greenbelt West and other Greenbelt residents who attended far exceeded the turnouts in the prior hearings.

Many audience questions dealt with how TPA could obtain use of GMS. The answer was that TPA could lease the school from the Board of Education (BOE).

If, on the other hand, part of the structure were to be used for city purposes, the BOE could declare the building surplus. In this case it would be turned over to the county and the county, in turn, could sell it to the city for a nominal amount.

In this latter case, TPA could lease part of the building for its use and share with the city other parts of the building, such as its gym, and still other parts could be dedicated for city uses. Shackelford has expressed interest in using the entire facility but he notes that TPA lacks funds to undertake major renovations.

While attendees stood, many with their hands over their hearts, members of the Air Force Junior ROTC of Eleanor Roosevelt High School presented the flag as "The Star Spangled Banner" was played. All recited the Pledge of Allegiance and Sam Hoffberg, the Post's chaplain, offered a prayer.

Mayor Davis spoke and in her remarks read selections from Lincoln's Gettysburg Address, reminding those in attendance of the familiar yet powerful words and ended with " . . . so that they have not died in vain." All councilmembers rose as she read a city proclamation expressing the sentiment that all citizens

New GHI Board Organizes, Elects T. Boswell President

When the newly reconstituted Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI) board of directors met for the first time following the annual meeting, the directors elected officers, discussed ethics and meeting procedures and went on to schedule summer board meetings, a board retreat and board training.

Other significant matters included a report from the transition team, an overview of the GHI marketing plan and vandalism to lighting in the common area of 14/16 Ridge Road. Results of the annual election held May 18 and 19 were certified by Kathleen Gallagher, chair of the Nominations and Elections Committee, and the new board of directors and Audit Committee were seated. Beginning two-year terms on the board are Bill Jones (144 votes) and Chuck Hess (130). Re-elected are incumbents Tokey Boswell (148), Patricia Novinski (139) and Laura Moore (132), all also for two-year terms. Current directors with one year left to serve are Ed James, Diana McFadden, David Morse and Irv Wartel. Re-elected to the audit committee are Dianne Wilkerson (155 votes) and Debbie Cooley (148), joined by newly elected Bill Edwards (149).

Election of Officers

Tokey Boswell was unanimously elected president. Nominees for vice president were Bill Jones, Laura Moore and Patricia Novinski, with Moore elected by secret ballot. Bill Jones and Chuck Hess were nominated for treasurer. Following two 4-4 ties using secret ballots (with one board member absent) and considerable discussion about applicable bylaws and options, Jones

Taking Deer Hunting Discovery Seriously

I read last week's article in the News Review about the discovery of a "tree-mounted hunting stand and remains of several deer" in the woods near the Greenbelt Community Gardens. The article credits this discovery to Cam MacQueen, a member of the GHI Companion Animal Committee.

Ms. MacQueen did the right thing by bringing the discovery to the attention of both the Greenbelt Public Works Department and the Maryland Department of Natural Resources Police. The discovery suggests that there has been hunting in the woods around Greenbelt.

In my opinion hunting is a cruel activity but this isn't about the rightness or wrongness of hunting. It's about criminal activity in Greenbelt. The Director of Planning and Development, Celia Craze, makes it clear in the article that hunting animals of any kind in Greenbelt is illegal.

I think it is important that this discovery be taken seriously by the city. As promised in the article, a Public Works crew did remove the hunting stand. However, I encourage Celia Craze to make available resources to inspect the woods for more hunting stands and, if any are found, have them quickly torn down as well. Also the use of "No Hunting" signs should be explored so that those who participate in this criminal activity can be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law.

It is tragic that these beautiful creatures were more than likely killed as a result of criminal activity in Greenbelt.

New Deal Programs Status Clarifications

In the May 26 issue of the Greenbelt News Review (page 11) there were several inaccurate statements made by a member of the audience at the City Council budget hearing on May 21 regarding the New Deal Café and the Friends of New Deal Café Arts (FONDCA). This letter is an attempt to correct those misunderstandings.

The Friends of New Deal Café Arts is a nonprofit organization dedicated to supporting arts programs at Roosevelt Center and the New Deal Café, especially the free outdoor concert series in Roosevelt Center and the art exhibit program at the Café. All of the concerts and art exhibit programs are free and open to the public. These events are produced by Friends of the New Deal Café by volunteers who put in many hours every year to make them happen. In many communities this time spent in producing free art events would be done by paid employees or government staff.

Since FONDCA provides the funds for these arts programs, most of our efforts go into fundraising, including grant-writing. The City of Greenbelt has awarded us grants every year since we received our IRS nonprofit status in 2003. 100 percent of our arts funding from the city goes to support the free outdoor concert series. Each year we submit a proposal and budget to the city for the new fiscal year and we have to defend our proposal to the Arts Advisory Board and the City Council. In the past, FONDCA's proposals have not always been fully funded and we do not receive any special consideration from the City Council.

Our proposals must meet the goals and objectives of the city. In addition to the city's grants, we also have won competitive grants from the Prince George's Arts Council, Prince George's County, the Greenbelt Community Foundation and the Jim Cassels Service Award from the Greenbelt Co-op Supermarket. The largest single source of our funds is individuals who generously respond to our annual donation drive and thereby demonstrate strong support from the community for the programs we sponsor.

The New Deal Café and the Friends of New Deal Café Arts are two distinct organizations. FONDCA's funds are kept completely separate from those of the New Deal Café, as per IRS guidelines. Donations to FONDCA are tax-deductible, whereas donations to the Café are not. We have separate governing boards with different people. To coordinate activities, the FOND-CA board has one non-voting representative from the Café board. This member serves as a liaison to the Café board and this bylaw provision helps coordinate event planning with the Café.

The past few years have been difficult ones for most arts nonprofits in our nation. FONDCA is proud of the fact that we have been successful in funding the arts at our past levels and have expanded to include support for new programs such as the Eileen Peterson Youth Music Series. We feel confident that with continued support, we will be able to continue to support free, high-quality arts programming to Roosevelt Center and the New Deal Café. Barbara Simon

minutes should record how individual directors had voted on issues. Boswell said that, as president, he will follow the general practice of former president Suzette Agans in not voting on issues, except in the case of a tie vote. James replied that "with a small organization the president should vote."

Three member complaint panels, each with three representatives from the board and one from the audit committee, were set up: (1) David Morse, Ed James, Laura Moore and Dianne Wilkerson; (2) Tokey Boswell, Diana McFadden, Chuck Hess and Bill Edwards; (3) Patricia Novinski, Bill Jones, Irv Wartel and Debbie Cooley.

Summer board meetings will be held once a month, June 23, July 14 and August 18 at 7 p.m. Special meetings will be held on June 6 to discuss the transitioning to a new general manager and to vote on contracts and on July 7, also for contracts.

A training session will be scheduled with an attorney to discuss fiduciary responsibilities and legal duties of the board.

Transition

Dianne Wilkerson reported that the application of Eldon Ralph and associated documents for the general manager position have been submitted. Ralph, currently assistant general manager, is the only candidate being considered for the position. The salary survey for the position will be available next week. Wilkerson reminded the board, "You might want to consider making up interview questions."

Marketing Plan

A one-page summary of the marketing plan was presented by Wartel. It included a task list, a description of how and what GHI markets as well as general principles about what is being done in the community. Several ideas and suggestions for expanding the plan were suggested.

Wartel found himself repeating several times that these items are included in the fourpage document but he was instructed to submit only a onepage summary. The full report will be circulated and discussed at the next board meeting.

The board then dealt with an issue of vandalism. Five bollard light fixtures near the entrance to 16 Court Ridge have

Financial Outlays

The board approved for second reading and final passage two contracts with B&P Utilities. The first is for repairs of underground sewage and storm drain utilities at 23 sites at the bid of \$220,090 plus 10 percent, not to exceed \$242,099.

The second contract is for drainage system improvements at two locations, 10A-F Plateau and 10A-D Southway, at the bid of \$40,530 plus 10 percent for contingencies, not to exceed \$44.583.

Also approved for second reading and final passage is a contract with Greenbelt Builders, Inc. to make repairs to a home on Laurel Hill Road at the bid of \$11,750 plus 10 percent, not to exceed \$12,925.

For first reading a contract with B&P Utilities was approved for parking lot repairs in multiple locations not to exceed \$69,715, including 10 percent for contingencies.

While the school board has budgeted \$6 million toward building repairs, a school architect had once estimated a \$15 million cost to rehabilitate the building.

Other Uses

The task force has been trying to identify unmet needs that might be housed in the old school. Some possible uses, it has found, are already located in the Franklin Park area of Greenbelt West or have no identified sources of financing programs. Some possible county services for the Franklin Park area could also be housed in the old school.

The committee believes, however, that raising \$9 million or more in city funds to rehabilitate the entire building is not feasible. It is, therefore, considering proposals to expand existing shuttle bus service in Franklin Park to enable residents to reach existing services more easily and to utilize only part of the school, including its "historic" original structure of 1937-8.

The committee is under a tight

schedule as the school will be vacated in another year. The school board has asked council to present by this summer its proposals for future use. The task force is to provide an interim report in June and a final report in September. The task force is also grappling with the lack of good cost information.

Assistant Recreation Director Joe McNeal has estimated that due to the need to rehabilitate the building, the old school would

not be available for use, at the earliest, until 2014.

Lois Browne, a resident of Springhill Lake/Empirian Village/ Franklin Park for 12 years, told the task force of the difficulty of children there getting to Greenbelt Center to use city facilities. She noted in particular the city's indoor pool and expanded recreational opportunities beyond those offered in the Springhill Lake Recreation Center, as well as the lack of parks in Greenbelt West.



Temporary Solutions for Dental Emergencies

It is important to have routine dental hygiene care and a dental exam at least every six months. It is also valuable to select a dentist who provides same day emergency dental treatment. When a dental emergency is causing pain or prevents you from going out in public, your dentist should ask, "How soon can you get to our dental office?"

Pain, swelling, broken teeth and a lost crown are the most common dental emergencies. Sometimes dental emergencies happen when you are traveling or when you just can't get to a dental office. Here are some short term remedies you can try if you are not able to see your dentist immediately.

Tips for a Lost Crown, Veneer or Permanent Bridge - If your crown, veneer or bridge has come loose, the primary short term goal is: Do NOT swallow or lose it!

If there is any risk of swallowing or losing your crown, veneer or bridge, keep it out of your mouth, store it in a safe place and make an appointment as soon as possible!

What To Do When a Permanent **Tooth Is Knocked Out**

Gently pick up the tooth by the chewing surface being careful to not touch the root of the tooth. If dirty, gently rinse the tooth in water or milk. Do not use soap and do not scrub the tooth or wrap it in a tissue. Try to reposition the tooth in its socket immediately - do not use excessive force. The sooner the tooth is replaced the greater the likelihood it will survive. If you cannot get the tooth back into its socket, keep it moist either by carrying the tooth in cool milk or in your mouth

- do not swallow the tooth! sible and ideally within 30 minutes. gums to decrease pain and bleeding.

recently been severely damaged by vandals. Options are not to supply light to the area, to replace the five bollards (again) or to install two lights on 10foot poles.

Potential liability for lack of lighting was discussed. GHI had consulted an attorney several years ago, asking if the cooperative could be held liable for injuries to members in common areas where there was improper lighting. The attorney had cited the case of Hemmings vs. Pelham Wood, LLP, wherein the Court of Appeals had found that a landlord can be found negligent for maintaining or failing to correct a known defect such as lighting in common areas.

Options for lighting will be discussed at a later date after more information is obtained for both bollards and pole lighting.

Hint: a clear sandwich bag or medicine vial is much safer than wrapping it in a tissue or paper towel - tissues, napkins and paper towels are often accidently thrown away or simply disappear.

• Sometimes a patient can reseat a crown and have it "snap" into place.

· Another temporary solution is to use Vaseline or an FDA approved denture adhesive as a temporary glue. DO NOT use super glue or any other type of permanent glue to hold your crown, veneer or permanent bridge into place!

Emergency Care for a Broken Tooth - Does cold air or water cause pain? If so, you should schedule a visit with your dentist as soon as possible. Do not chew with that tooth. If your sensitivity is caused by a cracked tooth, chewing hard objects can make the crack expand. Early treatment can prevent further damage.

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June Is Peace Month, Its Theme Is Mend the World

Again this year the City of Greenbelt has declared June its official Peace Month. Several local groups are sponsoring events to point out social problems, promote solutions or celebrate the spirit and work that advance a more peaceful, just and diverse society.

Through most of June one of these observances - a free exhibition of paper quilt books called Quilt: Art to Mend the World - will pull together these interrelated themes.

Rendered in a patchwork-like mosaic via language and graphic arts, Quilt will be on display from Friday, June 3 through Sunday, June 5 at the Greenbelt Community Center.

Making one's own paper quilt page will be the focus of a hands-on activity during Artful Afternoon on Sunday, June 5. After that weekend some parts of Quilt will be hosted by the Greenbelt library and the Community Church during their regular hours with guides to interpret the exhibit during some time periods.

The creator of Quilt, artist and educator Kate Ransohoff, whose website is www.krquilt.com, summarizes her work in these words: "Each quilt panel focuses on a single topic of conflict, injustice or inequality and honors all cultures, world experiences and differing perspectives. It supports human rights, women's empowerment and healthy economics. Quilt invites public participation, conversation and communication."

The exhibit consists of hanging panels accompanied by booklets of prose and poetry. Each set can stand alone in expressing an individual theme: "Voices from the Common" to honor those unrecognized by the world; "A Letter to Women" to elicit their unrealized power; "A Letter to Artists" to join folk, fine and craft arts; "Money: Contradictions and Conundrums" to share diverse attitudes toward money; "About the World" to shift perspectives toward disparate cultures; "Sign of the Ribbons" to end violence against women

and build friendship networks; "Pearls" to show the beauty, strength and courage of violated women; "Haves and Have Nots" to reveal how the rich deny and ignore the poor.

The Greenbelt exhibit is coordinated by Karen Rowe, Quilt's community relations and program director for this region, and the Prince George's County Peace and Justice Coalition. Quilt can be seen at the Community Center Friday from 6 to 10 p.m., Saturday, June 4 from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. and Sunday from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. On Sunday Rowe will lead guided tours from 1 to 4 p.m.
