## Council Comments on Metro Plans; Opposes CSX Intermodal Site

The Greenbelt City Council agreed to comment on plans of the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) to build a facility to commission railcars and a parking garage for employees on Sunnyside Avenue at its current Greenbelt Service and Inspection Yard at its December 12 meeting.

The planned facility would include two tracks with inspection pits alongside to accommodate four two-car trains, a work area and offices for up to 200 employees. In addition, a 30- by 40-foot storage room and a room of equal size for traction power equipment would be built.

The facility is to be constructed in the southeast corner of WMATA's railyard on an existing parking lot. The garage will be located on the southwest corner

of the same property, also on an existing parking lot.

Last June the Department of Transportation, Federal Transit Administration declared the project a Documented Categorical Exclusion (DCE). It therefore requires neither an environmental assessment nor an environmental impact statement.

#### Council's Concerns

Staff recommended council send WMATA a letter taking no position on the DCE but presenting three concerns on the project's effect on water quality. Specifically, staff wants to review the construction's Erosion and Sediment Control Plan and the conceptual design and approval for its Stormwater Management Plan as soon as both become available.

Staff also recommends that

WMATA include pervious surfaces, consider using green roof technology on the commissioning facility and attempt to gain LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) certification if possible.

Councilmember Rodney Roberts shared concerns that the parking garage may be visible from the beltway and he said he was not pleased with the look of it

Mayor Judith Davis suggested that council's letter include a fourth comment asking WMATA to provide as much screening as possible. Councilmember Emmett Jordan's motion to send WMATA a letter covering the four points discussed was unanimously approved by all five

## War Changes Life in Greenbelt

As early as 1938, residents of the new town of Greenbelt were concerned about the growing political turmoil in Europe and Asia. The Greenbelt Citizens Association recommended against purchasing any goods from aggressor nations. Thus in 1939 Greenbelt stores refused to sell items made in Germany or Japan. Nevertheless, echoing isolationist sentiment prevalent throughout the country, Greenbelt residents opposed entering the conflict abroad.

Once the war began for the U.S., however, following the bombing of Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, scores of Greenbelt men joined or were drafted into the services. The median age of Greenbelt residents was 24.7 years old; thus an unusually

high percentage of husbands, fathers, sons and brothers left their homes for military service.

This prompted the designation of Greenbelt during the war years as a "Woman's Town." It also served to empower many women to secure full-time jobs outside the home to support their families. Before then, women were expected to stay home to raise the family's children.

By September 1942, 661 of the original 3,200 residents were gone, either serving in the military or having been transferred to jobs in other locations. The Cooperator (forerunner to the Greenbelt News Review) urged residents "to enlist to 'sweat, bleed and die' for democracy." At war's end, 13 young Greenbelt men had perished.



In April 1943, the General Federation of Woman's Clubs honored the Woman's Club of Greenbelt for being one of its most active chapters by painting its name on the side of a P-51 Mustang fighter plane.

In fall 1941, 52 men ages 18 to 64 who were not in the military enlisted in the Minute Men of Maryland, a local militia authorized by the state. They had uniforms, guns and ammunition. Members of the Greenbelt Gun Club gave rifle training.

#### Aircraft Spotting

Aircraft spotting was an important civil defense activity carried out by men in the evenings, housewives during the day and school children on weekends. These volunteers stood on the roof of the drug store (now Beijing Restaurant) trying to identify enemy aircraft.

The task was difficult because nearby Schrom Airport (whose runways now comprise part of Hanover Parkway) was a Civilian Air Pilot training site. Residents felt vulnerable to enemy attack because of the airport's proximity to Greenbelt, the "barracks" style housing which could be mistaken for military housing and, of course, the nearness to countless government facilities in Washington, D.C.

Air raid sirens on the roof of the fire station (now Domino's


## Greenbelt Icon Golden Joe Dies, Resident 47 Years

Joseph Natoli Sr., "Golden Joe" to many Greenbelters, died on December 12, 2011, at Washington Adventist Hospital. Nine days earlier he had suffered a severe stroke. He was a Greenbelt resident for 47 years.

Mr. Natoli was born in Georgetown in Washington D.C. on March 18, 1922, to Sicilian immigrant parents, Philip and Grace Natoli. After high school he joined the Navy in 1942 and served in the South Pacific Theater with the highly regarded "Little Beaver Squadron" under Captain Arleigh Burke, who later became Admiral Burke, Chief of Naval Operations. The unit was known for its aggressive and innovative tactics during its many battles. Byron "Whizzer" White, who later became a Supreme Court justice, also served on the ship. For his service Mr. Natoli was awarded the American Theater Ribbon, the Pacific Theater Ribbon with Five Stars and the Presidential Unit Citation with Bronze Star.

After the war he worked at the U.S. Navy Yard for a short while until he opened a grocery store with his brother on Florida Avenue in Northeast D.C. For 18 years he and his brother were a staple of the neighborhood offering credit to families who needed groceries. In May 1952 he married Barbara Lee Dawson in Takoma Park. They moved to

Greenbelt in 1964 and in 1966 opened a small deli and named it simply the Greenbelt Carryout. Mr. and Mrs. Natoli and two of his sisters worked together at the shop for many years.

In 1983 when his son Joe, Jr. got involved, they doubled its size and added a seating area, renaming it Generous Joe's Deli. While Joe Sr. took pride in the food he served, his real joy was talking with customers. He had lots of humorous sayings that made people laugh.

Through the years many customers came back to visit him at the store to relive their child-hood memories. They spoke

You never really understand how much we all rely on each other until something cataclysmic happens. Last March my family experienced such an event and it truly shook our world. My son Robert was rushed to Doctors Community Hospital with what turned out to be a life-threatening illness. After five days at Doctors, he was transferred to Johns Hopkins in Baltimore where teams of doctors worked around the clock to figure out what had gone wrong and how to fix it.

It turned out he has an autoimmune disease called Lupus, but it is far from a typical case. During the most critical time of his illness he received massive amounts of blood. I thought the six units he was given at Doctors was a lot, but before his case settled down he had received more than 30 units at Hopkins. Robert has responded very well to treatment and continues to receive excellent medical care as an outpatient.

I cannot express how profoundly grateful my family and I are not only to all the skilled medical people who took care of Robert, but also all those who supplied the blood he so desperately needed. We hardly ever thought about the blood supply till we needed it. Now I want to make up not only for what we used, but also to raise awareness of the need to have the supply maintained so that it is there for anyone who has the need.

The blood drive, sponsored jointly with the American Red Cross by the Greenbelt Lions Club and me is on Thursday, December 29 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Doctors Hospital.

People are encouraged to make

appointments.

I will be giving blood at Doctors Hospital on December 29 and am signed up as an organ donor. I hope that many of the people who sent me their good wishes and prayers during our time of crisis will join me now as I try to "pay it forward."



of his kindness and generosity when they were kids. Newer customers also liked to come in and talk to the funny old guy who had lots of personality. At age 89, he was still coming into the shop on a daily basis until the day before his stroke.

Mr. Natoli's favorite hobby was gardening and landscaping, spending many hours in his yard moving bricks and planting shrubs. From his boyhood days he loved baseball, re-

membering when he watched Babe Ruth play. He sponsored the Greenbelt Little League Indians for over 40 years. During the war he wrote the sports page for a Navy newsletter. His ashes will be scattered off the stern of a Navy ship.

Mr. Natoli is survived by his wife of 59 years, Barbara Lee Natoli, son Joseph Natoli Jr., daughter Deborah Campbell, daughter-in-law Sharon Natoli, four sisters and six grandchildren.

councilmembers present. (Councilmembers Edward Putens and Konrad Herling were absent.)

#### **CSX Rail Facility**

In April council sent a letter to Beverly Swaim-Staley, secretary of the Maryland Department of Transportation, voicing its opposition to a site east of the Camden Line and west of Edmonston Road between Sunnyside Avenue and Powder Mill Road for construction of a new rail intermodal facility. The facility's purpose is to enhance the ability of the Port of Baltimore to compete for increased shipping when the Panama Canal is enlarged. (See the News Review, April 28, 2011, page 1.)

The Beltsville site is among four under consideration for the intermodal facility and the mayor attended a public forum on the site selection process on November 21. She has been concerned that the Beltsville site may be a front runner in the site-selection process.

She proposed sending a new letter of opposition to MDOT along with an additional copy of the first letter. She wanted the letter to note that, as Councilmember Leta Mach had pointed out, the Beltsville site is the furthest away from the port of Baltimore, causing more air pollution, expense and traffic than would be the case with closer sites. The other three sites, two in Jessup and one in Hanover, Md. are much closer to the Baltimore harbor.

Davis also said she thought the traffic study done by CSX was flawed because she had learned that the study showed no traffic problems on Kenilworth Avenue/Edmonston Road at several key intersections where delays already occur during rush hours.

#### **Opposition Suggested**

Roberts suggested council oppose use of any of the four sites currently under consideration. He wants to know about all sites that had been looked at originally and why some had been rejected.

He suggested the site at Montvideo Road, adjacent to a large parking lot, could be used instead of destroying forested wetlands in Beltsville. Roberts also suggested the Greenbelt City Council should work with the other communities that could be affected, opposing construction of the intermodal facility and advocating for addressing the Howard Street tunnel issue.

The tunnel, too low to permit double stacking of railcars, is the impetus for construction of the intermodal facility. Davis said she feared there was not time for organizing a group opposition but she agreed the letter could include Roberts' other concerns.

Mach agreed with Roberts that fixing the tunnel would be the best solution but she pointed out that this is currently impractical. Mach wanted to include in council's letter that this would be the best option in the long term but if that is not possible, the facility should be located closer to the port. Davis said it could take 20 or 30 years to gather funding required to improve the tunnel.

Davis' motion to send another letter opposing use of the Beltsville site for the new intermodal facility, which would include the concerns raised at the meeting, was approved with no opposition.

Pizza) were tested weekly and sometimes sounded during evenings and early morning hours. Residents were told to turn out all lights and place blackout curtains over their windows. Air raid wardens patrolled the streets, being required to enter homes when they saw lights. Those who violated blackout rules faced fines of \$2 to \$100 and 10 to 90 days in jail.

Greenbelters supported the war effort with patriotic fervor. By April 1943, students at Greenbelt High School bought over \$900 worth of defense stamps. These were placed into books and when the books were filled, they were converted into Victory Bonds – enough to purchase a jeep. Elementary school kids purchased more than \$6,000 worth of bonds.

Countless bake sales were held at the Center Mall (now Roosevelt Center). Residents also collected emergency food and first aid supplies, raised money for polio victims and for the Russian Relief Fund.

Residents also helped to purchase fire fighting equipment and an auxiliary pump to siphon lake water in an emergency. Woman's Club members served in the Red Cross, organized salvage campaigns, collected clothing, sold war bonds and stamps and participated in entertainment programs for convalescent veterans.

#### Rationing at Co-op

Early on, the Greenbelt Co-op (Greenbelt Consumer Services) instituted its own form of rationing. In 1942, sugar was rationed and GCS appealed to residents to return sugar. About 375 pounds of sugar were thus returned and repurchased by the store and then re-allocated to residents on an "as needed" basis.

Meat rationing occurred in 1942, butter rationing in 1943 – before any nationwide program began. The cooperative adhered to a policy of fairness when every-day commodities became scarce. Gasoline, rubber tires, chlorine bleach, light bulbs, grease, metals of all kinds including cooking pots, leather shoes and fabric were all needed by the military.

The biggest impact on the town was construction by the federal government of 1,000 new homes begun in March 1941. Housing was scarce in Washington with thousands of wartime workers desperate for places for their families to live. With utilities already in place in Greenbelt, the government was quickly able to build the so-called war-time or defense housing to help satisfy this need.

At a total cost of \$4,481,023, the new frame homes included 148 one-bedroom apartments, 602 two-bedroom homes and 250 three-bedroom homes. These were sited on super blocks on Southway, along Ridge, Hillside, Laurel Hill, Research Roads and Plateau Place.

These new homes retained many design features of the original 885 dwellings. But, there were no funds for "amenities" and they lacked much of the interior walkway system.

#### Muddy Yards

Nor were there underpasses or playgrounds. Landscaping was lacking and residents complained about muddy yards until the government, six years later, finally installed trees and hedges.

There were no garage courts. Homes faced parking courts or the street itself, where children often played. The first child fatality in Greenbelt occurred during this period when a youngster was run over by a truck in a parking court.

With the increase of nearly 5,000 new residents, town services were severely strained. The town council had to borrow \$10,000 to provide basic public services such as fire and police protection and refuse collection.

Schools operated on double or triple shifts. The elementary school had 700 students and the kindergarten 175 children.

Residents thus petitioned the government for more facilities and a school for 200 kindergartners, first and second graders opened at 53 Ridge Road in six two-bedroom units. Not until 1945 were additional classrooms constructed – a 12-classroom North End Elementary School (where Greenbelt Elementary School now stands) and four classrooms, a science lab and an assembly room added to the high school (currently Greenbelt Middle School).

In 1943 citizens pleaded for a food store in the north end. In response the government designated a row of houses in 3 court of Laurel Hill to provide limited supplies of groceries, fresh produce and dairy products. A daycare center also opened in apartments at 14 Parkway to care for the children of 150 to 200 working mothers.

#### **Newcomers Resented**

Whether it was the more than doubling of the population, the strain on public services or an attitude of superiority by original residents, an undercurrent of resentment developed toward newcomers. Some people were angry that the government had abandoned its careful selection process, no longer balancing religion, family size, income, age and occupation. Only two selection criteria were used to approve new residents: that they were employed by the war or navy department and that their income was less than \$2,600 a year.

By the time the war ended in 1945 the community had changed in many ways. With fewer men available, some organizations, such as the Greenbelt Players, the Greenbelt Chamber Music Society, the Hobby Club, Better Buyers and the Men's Glee Club folded. The annual Town Fair, cancelled in 1942, did not resume until 1945 after much urging by the Cooperator.

In 1944 the Drop In Center, in the basement of the fire/police station (now the Step Club), opened to provide a positive outlet for boisterous teenagers.

Before the war residents had embraced the idea of an interfaith building to serve all religions. After the war, however, each major faith wanted its own building.

When the war ended over 200 Greenbelters participated in a Victory Day program. The band played John Philip Sousa's "Washington Post March," the glee club sang, Navy Wives Club filled the stage with red, white and blue flowers and taps was played for President Franklin Delano Roosevelt and the 13 local war dead.

Then men began returning home. That is when Greenbelt residents began to worry about what would happen if the federal government sold the Greenbelt towns, as many members of Congress began to urge.

#### Reminiscences

War-time recollections from Looking Back, compiled by the late Dorothy Lauber during the City of Greenbelt's 50th Anniversary celebration in 1987.

I was drafted in 1944 – we had two boys. I went down to the rental office and notified them that I was being drafted. They changed my rent on the two bedroom house at 1-B Eastway from about \$80 a month to \$32 a month. My wife was able to stay in Greenbelt with the two boys until I returned 14 months later.

J. Walsh Barcus
On the night of December
7 when the war began, Johnnie
Bolton and I were sent to guard
the water tower because there
were rumors that Germans or
sympathizers might try to poison
the water supply . . . . All during the war we had a very active
civil defense unit and a lookout
post over the drug store.

Robert Dove
I recall what a big happening it would be when there would be an air-raid practice and we would go to the adjoining basements and black curtains hung at every window; our fathers were out in the streets with their white hats and flashlights . . . . [The day the war ended] we piled in the car with pots and pans and any noisemaker we could find and rode all around the streets of Greenbelt yelling and singing.

Patricia Dunbar Gray The air raid wardens would walk throughout Greenbelt and . . if they saw any lights, they had to knock on the door and get them turned off. At one time my sister-in-law, her daughter and baby came to stay with us and so I had to get black material and make curtains so we could feed the baby at night during air raids. Even then, we had to use flashlights while we heated the milk . . . . We would put our daughter, our niece, my sister-in-law and her baby in the big closet under the stairs because it was safest there. Most of the air raids were just alerts but some were the real thing.

Lucille Howell
During the war we purchased war bonds with every pennywe could get together . . . . As a school we were able to purchase at least four jeeps with the bond money. One day the army brought the jeeps to the school grounds and all of the children assembled outside to examine

Louise Steinle Winker
In the 1940s, gas was rationed, everyone walked to the Center to do their shopping and carried their groceries home.
People whose children had wagons used them to help get the groceries home.

Cassie Mae Stone Snow The building of the defense houses was a blow. We thought it was such a downgrading of the town that this would ruin it. But we were soothed by being told that they were temporary, it was just during the war and they would be torn down. And they look fine today but we considered it really practically slum housing . . . . We felt the people in the defense houses were just sort of camping there for the duration of the war.

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




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


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#### CASA Holds Volunteer Recruitment Session

On Thursday, January 5 the Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) program will hold a volunteer recruitment session from 6 to 7:30 p.m. at the Hyattsville Municipal Building, 4310 Gallatin Street.

CASA volunteers spend about 10 hours per month with a child in foster care and help advocate for his or her proper care and placement in a safe, permanent home. No special experience is needed. Training will be provided in nine required classes to be held from January 24 through February 23 from 6 to 9 p.m. plus one 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. day of courtroom observation. A light

dinner is served during each evening training session. Volunteers must be 21 or older, submit an application and complete phone and in-person interviews prior to training.

CASA Executive Director Ann Marie Binsner says, "There are more than 600 children living in foster care in Prince George's County today and we currently have only enough volunteers to serve less than 100. Our goal is to provide an advocate for every child who needs one."
