Greenbelt Pictorial History Precedes City's 75th Anniversary Celebration

In early years after the founding of Greenbelt, reproducing photographs for print was difficult and expensive. Mirror images had to be incised into metal, called cuts, attached to wooden blocks and then placed face-down on the printing press. Early issues of the News Review show few pictures and only occasional Izzy Parker cartoons.

With modern offset printing all that has changed. Now a new book, *Images of America: Greenbelt*, appears in anticipation of the celebration of the 75th anniversary of the city. Designed and edited by staff members Jill Parsons St. John and Megan Searing Young on behalf of the Greenbelt Museum, the work is a collection of pictures recording the city's history.

Extensive captions, however, and one-page introductions for each chapter provide contexts and explanatory information. As a historical volume, the work re-

produces many pictures seen in the earlier hard-cover history of 1987 and 1997 supplement, *Greenbelt: History of a New Town*.

But the new work, in its final chapter, "The 1980s and Beyond," brings the story up to date. New pictures as well – some from private collections or historical prints held by the Library of Congress – help to complete the historical record.

Among developments since the earlier works has been construction of the U.S. District Court House, the opening of Eleanor Roosevelt High School and the dedication of the Greenbelt Museum itself, which had been established in a GHI townhouse on Crescent Road. Long-time City Manager James



K. Giese had also retired, the former Greenbelt Elementary School had been converted into the Greenbelt Community Center and a new elementary school had been constructed on the site of the razed former North End School.

New as well is a picture of the Greenbelt Theater with its new marquee, now owned by the city, and a photograph of the current Greenbelt City Council. And in honor of history itself, a group photo is included of visiting residents of sister-city Greendale, Wisconsin.

The book is available for sale at the Greenbelt Museum and the Greenbelt Co-op and online through a variety of booksellers.

Council Approves Refurbishing Southway Entrance Map Sign

Refurbishing the Southway city entrance sign and holding a community-wide visionary exercise in 2012 were two items considered by the Greenbelt City Council at its December 12 regular meeting.

Council in the past has approved a design for gateway signs and discussed possible locations. Now in the fiscal year's capital projects budget is \$20,000 for installation of signs.

Staff has recommended upgrading the existing sign on Southway rather than its replacement. Recent vandalism has rendered the sign illegible.

Staff recommended improving

landscaping near the sign, cleaning the masonry, painting or replacing the lettering, replacing the frame, making sidewalk improvements and replacing the outdated map. The Public Works staff will perform necessary carpentry, landscaping and masonry work.

Councilmember Leta Mach noted sun damage as well on some signs. She asked City Planner Terry Hruby about the projected life of new signage.

Hruby replied that staff will look at what types of signs have worked elsewhere and will try to use state-of-the-art technology while staying within the amount of funds budgeted. She mentioned the possibility of using technology to provide links to the city's website.

Council agreed to have staff move forward with work on the Southway sign and to schedule a worksession on city signage. Council also wanted to address other city signage soon. In the interim they asked that the Southway sign be taken down.

Visioning Event

At the same meeting, council discussed holding a community-wide visioning exercise, such as a forum, leading council to discuss holding another one soon. Mayor Judith Davis said a visioning exercise to consider where the city

should be after 100 years could tie in with Greenbelt's 75th anniversary. It could be one of the steps also toward achieving Sustainable Maryland Certified Green Team status. Holding the exercise early in 2012, she said, would enable council to use information gained to set goals for the 2013 budget.

Councilmember Rodney Roberts thought the visioning process should be held only once every five years or so. He said there is still a backlog of things to do from the last visioning process.

Other councilmembers preferred holding the exercise, or something similar, more frequently. Mach pointed out that the last visioning report was for 2009-2012, which she interpreted to mean the process would be held again in 2012. Councilmember Emmett Jordan favored separating goal-setting from the budget process, saying it is important to prioritize goals. The city will never have enough money to do all it would like to do, he said. The budget would be used as a reality check for these ideas.

Process Time Frame

Councilmembers struggled to come up with a workable time

January Artful Afternoon, 75th Anniversary Launch

The dedication begins at 2:45 p.m., followed by remarks from Mayor Judith Davis on the 75th Anniversary of Greenbelt at 3 p.m. in the gym. Limited edition commemorative tiles showing four iconic Greenbelt scenes on 6 x 6 glazed Art Deco tiles will make their debut at the ceremony.

Shortly after 3 p.m. at the conclusion of the mayor's remarks, the Bel Cantanti Opera offers an exciting sneak preview performance of their new show *The Impresario* (Der Schauspiel-direktor). Mozart's one-act farce

about operatic auditions transports the audience to New York of the 1940s, where two primadonnas fight for the attention of an agent who is desperately trying to get rid of them both.

From 1 to 3 p.m. make a wrist cuff with Artist-in-residence Celestine Ranney-Howes. There are sizes and styles for boys and girls, women and men. No experience is needed.

Sneaker Seeker Crowd Overruns Beltway Plaza

People attempting to make a quick early morning run to the Beltway Plaza Giant Food store before 8:15 a.m. on Friday, December 23 either stopped in their tracks or quickly retreated and left.

More than 30 police cruisers from six jurisdictions lined both sides of the main through-lanes, from the Cherrywood Lane entrance next to Giant to the Sears Home Store at the end of the block. On-scene law enforcement officers included Greenbelt, Berwyn Heights and Prince George's County police departments, Maryland State Police, U.S. Park Police and Beltway Plaza security. Some wore what appeared to be SWAT team uniforms, although without shields

and face masks.

A throng of mostly males in their teens or 20s surrounding the outside of the mall entrance near Baskin-Robbins was alternately loud and quiet. Police officers repeatedly told the crowd to "stand back from the doors."

Despite their injunction, other people young and old, male and female, seemed to be entering and exiting the mall at will.

City Seeks Change In Redistricting Plan

On Friday, December 16, the Governor's Redistricting Advisory Committee (GRAC) submitted its proposed Legislative Redistricting Plan to Governor Martin O'Malley. Under the proposed plan, all of Greenbelt would be in District 22 except for the area known as the "south core," which is in District 21.

The GRAC held a public hearing on this plan on December 22 in Annapolis, for which city staff submitted written comments online stressing Greenbelt's long-standing position that the city be kept whole and requesting that the "south core" be moved from District 21 to District 22. The same comments were transmitted to the city's State Delegation.

The south core is a small area located east of the CSX railroad tracks, west of Indian Creek, north of Branchville Rd. and south of the Greenbelt Metro Station.

Under Maryland's Constitution, the governor must present a Legislative Redistricting plan to the General Assembly by the first day of the 2012 Session. By the 45th day of the session, the General Assembly must either adopt a redistricting plan or the governor's plan becomes law.



Shooting Victim Dies of Injuries

On Christmas the Greenbelt Police Department was notified of the death of shooting victim Damon Washington, 31.

Washington, of New Carrollton, was shot in the neck a year ago on December 22 while in his car in the 9100 block of Edmonston Court, with the car coming to rest near the Beltway Plaza theaters entrance. He had been receiving treatment in a specialty care facility in Laurel since February. When the crime was originally reported in the December 30, 2010, issue "Man Shot December 22 In Greenbelt West," Washington was in critical condition in the Shock Trauma Center in Baltimore.

On December 27 the police were informed by the state Medical Examiner's Office that the cause of death is to be classified as a homicide, caused by complications related to the gunshot wound.

Investigation of the crime is ongoing. Anyone with information related to the case is asked to call the Criminal Investigations Unit at 240-542-2133. A cash reward is being offered for any information leading to the arrest and conviction of the suspect(s).

frame for the process. Finally, they settled on a Saturday afternoon in January for holding a worksession to review the city's current vision. Community involvement would be scheduled for later in the year, they agreed.

Council then debated the proposal to use an outside facilitator at the worksession. Roberts spoke against the idea and resident Bill Orleans questioned the expenditure of \$25,000 for a facilitator. City Manager Michael McLaughlin and the mayor spoke in favor of having a facilitator, however, with McLaughlin suggesting that the expense would probably fall considerably under \$25,000 and could even be negligible. He agreed with Davis that a facilitator would help keep the worksession focused.

With Councilmembers Edward Putens and Konrad Herling absent, there was general agreement among those present that a facilitator should be also used for the community-involved process to be held later in the year.

were first offered to the public in 1995-1996. Today's cost is \$190.79, including tax, for adult sizes.

Savvy shoppers knew Foot Locker and Sports Zone had the coveted shoes, to be sold on a first-come, first-served basis beginning at 8 a.m. Mall anchor Giant Food, between both stores, unwittingly became a player in this competition for shoes.

"A crowd began to form inside the mall the night before, around 10 p.m.," said Barry Jones, non-perishables manager for Giant. When they closed at midnight, so did the mall, forcing the crowd to move outside.

The opening of Giant at 6 a.m. the next morning signaled the opening of entrances to the mall. Sneaker shoppers entered along with mall-walkers and Giant customers, congregating and jockeying for position at Foot Locker and Sports Zone doors for the two-hour wait.

According to Jones, when told to move on, they gravitated to the entrance of Giant under the guise of being patrons there in order to stay in the mall. Police were alerted when the size of the crowd blocked the Giant entrance.

Foot Locker opened for business at 8 a.m., selling out of their allotted 12 pair of Retro Jordans by 8:27 a.m.

Sports Zone manager Jason Chapman, who opened his store at 8 a.m., likewise sold out of his allotted "size run" in less than 30 minutes. (A size run consists of 12 pair of shoes in various adult sizes.)

Some lucky youngsters were not forgotten. Both Baby Foot Locker and Foot Locker sold out of their Retro 11s in sizes for babies (\$45), infants (\$55), preschoolers (\$75) and grade schoolers (\$120).

His enthusiasm and effort then encouraged others.

After several emails debating dates, a mid-November work date was scheduled. Families and friends arrived with rakes, clippers and good spirits to work on the playground and in the woods. The efforts of these adults and children produced good results.

Many families and many children helped to fix the playground. Helping children included Raina, Amber, Sophie, Devin, Zane, Leah and Emily.

The playground project is a work in progress and another work day is being planned. Simple maintenance can be done by parents and children. However, mulch, sand and erosion issues will have to be handled by PGCPS or other organizations with access to materials and machinery. 
PGCMLS currently has over 6,800 eBook compatible titles in its collection. The eBooks expire at the end of the patron's lending period.
