Presidential Primary to Be Held Tuesday, April 3 Here

In 2008 Maryland, Virginia and the District of Columbia all held their primary elections on February 12 in order to create a "Potomac Primary" that would have an earlier and bigger regional impact on the nomination of candidates for U.S. President. That grouping didn't last long. In part because of agreement by the national political parties to hold primaries a little later in the year, Maryland changed its date to the first Tuesday in April, this year sharing April 3 with D.C. and Wisconsin. Only 19 states will remain to hold primaries after April 3.

Closed Primaries

Maryland's presidential primary is defined as a major party primary, with the result that only those who were registered to vote in the Republican or Democratic parties by March 13 are permitted to vote in the primary election. Democrats and Republicans have separate ballots. In areas holding nonpartisan school board elections, which this year does not include Greenbelt, people registered to vote in other parties or who decline to select a party may vote a separate school board ballot.

Primary Races

In addition to candidates for President of the United States, the Greenbelt ballots of both parties include candidates for U.S. Senator, U.S. Representative in Congress (District 5), five Judges of the Circuit Court for Prince George's County (Judicial Circuit 7) and delegates to the respective parties' national conventions.

President

The party ballots will list the names of all individuals who filed to appear as candidates for U.S. President in Maryland even though by the time of the primary many of them will either officially or effectively have withdrawn from the race. Supporters may still vote for them. The vote may also determine for which candidates the delegates are pledged to vote at the convention.

Democrats

Born in Honolulu, incumbent Barack Obama, 50, is the 44th President of the United States. He was a civil rights attorney and law professor before pursuing a political career, first as Illinois

Many Candidates Running, Little Competition in 2012

The focus of this year's primary election in Maryland is on the race for a Republican party presidential nominee as the only event bringing any real drama to the ballot. Nonetheless, the ballots for both parties include races for nominees for U.S. Senator, U.S. Representative in Congress (5th District), and delegates to the parties' national conventions. Also on the ballot for election are five circuit court judges from Prince George's County for the 7th Circuit, which includes Greenbelt.

Only Greenbelt voters who are registered Democrat or Republican can vote in the 2012 primary. Even though the judges do not run for office representing political parties, the state does not classify their election as non-partisan (see Circuit Judges below).

Information on the candidates has been drawn from various sources. Their websites are identified below wherever possible as sources of additional information.

U.S. Senate

Eight Democrats are challenging incumbent Ben Cardin, who is completing his first term. Cardin, who lives in Baltimore County, was a member of the U.S. House of Representatives from 1986 until being elected to

the U.S. Senate in 2006. He had served in the Maryland House of Delegates from 1967 until being elected to Congress. He has said his highest priority is increasing and protecting jobs by investing in America. Protecting healthcare programs and reform, reducing dependency on foreign oil and improving water quality are also high priorities. (bencardin.com)

Cardin's most serious challenger is C. Anthony Muse, Maryland State Senator from District 26 since 2007 and a resident of Fort Washington. Muse served in the Maryland House of Delegates from 1995-1999. A minister with a doctor of divinity degree from Howard University, he is senior pastor at Ark of Safety Christian Church in Upper Marlboro. His foremost legislative priority is to shift investment from Wall Street to Main Street in order to stabilize the economy by creating jobs, saving family homes and building up . . . local infrastructures, while maintaining adequate support for seniors, veterans and children. (muse-for-maryland.com)

With nearly 8 percent of the vote, Chris Garner, Anne Arundel County, was the runner-up in the senatorial primary in 2010. He

Melissa Ehrenreich's Niche Is Program Effectiveness in Life

"I am the worker bee," Melissa Ehrenreich, director of Program Effectiveness, Senior Staff Member at the Ocean Conservancy, tells me. "My husband takes care of our three kids (two, four and nine years old)." She certainly is a worker bee. Ehrenreich, in addition to working for the Ocean Conservancy, volunteers at Greenbelt Elementary School and Transit Riders United. This month she is being honored here as part of Women's History Month.

Ehrenreich, originally from Takoma Park, Md., moved to Greenbelt in 2001. Here she found simplicity and, "an accessible community where residents have the economic ability to own a home and be a part of a community, like my childhood community in Takoma Park."

"There is a crazy consumption in America and people are in over their heads," Ehrenreich says.

In 2002 Ehrenreich graduated from the University of Maryland with a degree in Biology with an emphasis in Marine Biology. Through her career as a Marine Biologist she has gained a professional background in grant writing. She volunteers her grant writing experience to write grants for Greenbelt Elementary School to gain access to arts and physical education programs. The first grant proposal she wrote received funding from the Washington Post to create the mural that is inside the school building made by students and parents. She also was successful with a grant proposal for industrial Wii machines for the school. "Lots of kids were obese and we wanted to use the Wii to motivate them." Another grant she wrote provided funds from the Prince George's Art Council and the Maryland Arts Council to work with Green-

belt Elementary to bring in local artists to assist with art curriculum needs and behavioral needs in the classroom. As part of that program the "DishiBen Dance Company came in for a couple of weeks to teach the kids to dance and then the kids performed what they learned. Grant writing for Greenbelt Elementary has been a really great experience - it's also nice when your grants are successful." She says with a smile.

Ehrenreich also worked as a mentor in the classroom at Greenbelt Elementary. "I enjoyed working with students but I really enjoyed working with the teachers, especially once they realized I could help with anything (even mundane tasks). I liked supporting them."

In 2009 Ehrenreich worked with the newly formed Transit Riders United (TRU-G) a volunteer run organization. "It was easy to get people fired up then because they were about to yank a bunch of transit services in Greenbelt. We started talking with WMATA and the city council. We had so many people in our group that we were a great sounding board for them. We were disappointed we lost the C-2 bus." TRU-G helped shape the way the new bus routes were made and advocated for the current "Time Transfer" system in Old Greenbelt that allows riders to transfer to a different bus line within about five minutes. "The group did a fantastic job getting the word out when things changed. We helped riders with the new routes. It was a great

Upstream, from U.K. to Yemen

One can get hooked by “Salmon Fishing in the Yemen,” starting at the Old Greenbelt Theatre on Friday, March 30. Backed by bring-it-on-at-any-cost British officialdom, deep-pocket Sheik Muhammed seeks to ensnare – in these parlous times – an extremely reluctant expert (the adept Ewan McGregor) to bring salmon fly fishing to his rugged Middle Eastern redoubt. Trade Center III Sold, To Be Remodeled

Trammell Crow Company and its joint venture partner Rubenstein Partners have announced they completed the purchase of Greenbelt's Maryland Trade Center III on February 22.
 Originally developed in 1989 the 184,000 square foot building is just 40 percent leased following Northrop Grumman's departure from the top four floors in 2009. MTC Investors, LLD will refurbish the property, redesigning lobbies, elevators, common areas and restrooms with wood-finished walls and stone floors and will add a fitness center and upgraded mechanical systems.

outreach effort.” TRU-G also advocated for and supports the city and WMATA in their new quarterly review process that keeps the transit system on track and identifies strengths and areas that may need improvement. This quarterly review is unique to Greenbelt. TRU-G is currently working toward Sunday bus service, extended service and more frequent bus service.

“Riding the bus is the best part of my day. I found a different kind of community on the bus that you can’t find on the Metro. You are not on the bus long so people chat. I found a lot of friends on the bus,” Ehrenreich says.

I asked Ehrenreich what her hope is for Greenbelt, she said, “Good transit is about having a community where people don’t rely on cars. They bus, bike, walk and Metro together. It builds community. It is people watching out for each other and it is making resources accessible for each other. Good transit means a safer community, more people watching the sidewalks. Good safe transit and good local schools are good community values.” She hopes the transit service in Greenbelt will continue to grow, because it is “something people value.”

“The transit system needs to be good for people who want it and it definitely needs to work for people who need it.”

is an engineer and includes in his priorities reindustrializing the U.S., ending NAFTA, reducing health care costs, setting term limits and managing or even eliminating immigration. (garnerforsenate.com)

Four of the remaining six candidates have run unsuccessfully in multiple primary elections in the past. J.P. Cusick, St. Mary's County, is running on a platform to reform the child support and custody laws (votejp.webs.com). Ralph Jaffe, Baltimore County, places high priority on balancing the budget and ending corruption in government (no web site). Blaine Taylor, Baltimore County, wants to restore federal Constitutional government and the rule of law, abolish foreign aid and balance the budget (no website). Lih Young, Montgomery County, has run in many primary elections (no website).

Newcomers to the Democratic primary include Raymond L. Blagmon, Prince George's County, whose priorities are jobs, immigration and health care reform and foreign policy. He works as a CPA and holds an MBA. He is also a member of the U.S. Navy Reserves (blagmon.com). Ed Tinus, Worcester County, is running on a platform to reduce government and provide for more direct impact on government by the people. (no website)

Republicans

Ten Republican candidates are running for nomination for U.S. Senate.

Joseph Alexander, Harford County, is an attorney who also ran in the 2010 senatorial primary. His priorities are healthcare, tax and housing reform (no website).

Daniel J. Bongino is a former secret service agent and small businessman from Anne Arundel County. Priorities include quality job production, real tax reform, domestic energy production and a balanced budget amendment. (bongino.com)

Robert "Bro" Broadus of Clinton is a Constitutional conservative whose priorities are to keep healthcare voluntary, end the personal income tax and the IRS and protect marriage as a union between a man and a woman. Broadus is the owner of a political action committee (PAC) called Protect Marriage Maryland, which Greenbelters will recall as having marched in the 2011 Labor Day Parade. He has previously run in primaries for U.S. Congress. (www.votebro.com)

William T. Capps, Jr., Anne Arundel County. Little information is available about Capps. (williamcappsforsenate.com)

Richard Douglas, College Park, is an attorney, veteran, former U.S. Senate staffer and the owner of Ocean Safari Strategies, LLC. His priorities include modernizing the economy, preserving American jobs and defending U.S. borders and interests. (douglasforsenate2012.com)

Rick Hoover, Anne Arundel County, describes himself as a pastor by trade who works in the construction industry. He is a fiscal conservative who favors a balanced budget, lower taxes and limitations on lobbyists. (rick-hoover.org)

David Jones, a carpenter from Baltimore County, is running to represent the average worker. His priorities are the economy, how the U.S. does business in the world market, energy policy and

controlling immigration. (davidjonesforsenate.com)

John B. Kimble, Montgomery County, was the Republican nominee for U.S. Congress from the 4th District from 1996 through 2002 and has run on state ballots every two years since then. He is a behavioral scientist whose diverse priorities include removing ethanol from fuel, requiring equality in hate crime legislation, lowering property taxes on the elderly and disabled and restricting visas to protect American workers. (kimbleforsenate.com)

Brian Vaeth, Baltimore County, is a former firefighter who says that he was injured and disabled in the line of duty. His priorities are to institute a Firefighter's Bill of Rights for members of the public safety sectors, fix the Medicaid and Medicare programs and restrict the entitlements given to corporations. (vaeth4senator.com)

Corrogan Vaughn, Baltimore County, is a former employee of U.S. Airways who serves as a deacon and lay leader at the Sharon Baptist Church in Baltimore. Among his many priorities are limited government, a stronger national defense, a stronger economy, traditional family values, energy independence and a government that demonstrates fiscal responsibility. (vaughn4maryland.com)

U.S. Representative

Only two candidates are running on the Democratic ballot and three on the Republican.

Democrats

Steny Hoyer is seeking reelection as U.S. Representative from the 5th Congressional District, which includes Calvert, Charles and St. Mary's Counties, as well as parts of Prince George's and Anne Arundel Counties. Hoyer lives in Mechanicsville. Currently holding the office of House minority whip, he has served in Congress since 1981. He lists as his top priorities jobs creation, long-term deficit reduction and protection of the federal facilities in the 5th District. (hoyerforcongress.com)

Hoyer's sole challenger in the primary is Cathy Johnson Pendleton of North Laurel. According to her website, Pendleton grew up in Washington, DC during the 1960s and has a bachelor's degree from Cornell College in Iowa. She has worked on many political campaigns over the years and is the founder of a small press for new artists called Gam-Jam Publishing. She opposes the death penalty and supports jobs creation, incentives for small business owners and national health care. (cathyjohnsonpendletonforcongress.com)

Republicans

Tony O'Donnell is the only Republican candidate for Congress who has held or run for elected office. Currently minority leader in the Maryland House of Delegates, he has served in the House since 1995. He lives in Lusby. His list of priorities includes reforming the tax code, passing a balanced budget amendment, enacting a national energy policy and repealing the Affordable Care Act. (odonnellforcongress.com)

David Hill of Bowie is a graduate of Ohio State University who has held a variety of jobs and is now certified as a motorcycle technician. His primary interests are in balancing the federal budget, initiating a flat tax, growing jobs and investment through the private sector and reducing immigration. (hill4congress.com)

Glenn Morton lives in Bowie

and is president of Taylor, Levi and Associates, an insurance brokerage firm. He is a combat veteran of Desert Storm. His priorities are on improving the economy and creating jobs, increasing the impact of voters in government and repealing the Affordable Care Act. (glennmortonforcongress.com)

Circuit Judges

When the governor appoints judges to the appellate or circuit courts in Maryland, they must then stand for election at the first statewide general election that occurs at least one year after the vacancy they were appointed to fill. Unlike appellate judges, however, circuit court judges must also file to appear on the ballots of all political parties holding primary elections that year. They may be opposed by any qualified members of the bar who file to run. Those who go on to win in the November general election will be elected to 15-year terms, after which they may run again.

Five circuit court judges are running from Prince George's County in the 7th Circuit and appear on Greenbelt's Democratic and Republican ballots. Sherrie Krauser is running for re-election, having originally been appointed in 1995. Governor O'Malley appointed four new judges in 2011 who have filed for their first election. Krystal Alves, DaNeeka V. Cotton, and Hassan A. El-Amin were serving as district court judges at the time of appointment. John Davey is an attorney who has been practicing in Prince George's County for 21 years and from 1991 to 2003 served as a

county representative to the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority.

The political affiliations of candidates for judgeships, if any, are not designated on any ballot, nor do they run as candidates of a political party. Because state law requires that circuit court judges run on the ballots of all political party primaries, however, these elections are not classified as non-partisan by the state. With mind-breaking logic, the state deems actual elections conducted from a primary ballot to be non-partisan. The result is that no separate ballot for judge primary elections is provided to voters whose parties are not holding primaries, as would be the case in a school board election.

Convention Delegates

Also on the ballot are the names of candidates running to serve as delegates and alternates to the Democratic and Republican national conventions. Democrats and Republicans select delegates somewhat differently, including those on the ballot.

Democrats

Democratic voters will choose no more than six of the following nine women running for delegate and alternate. Committed to Barack Obama are Kisha Brown, Lafonda Fenwick, Jessy Mejia, Denise Riley, Beth Swoap and Nicole Williams. Uncommitted candidates are Eloise Evans, Bernadette James and Gwen McCall.

Democrats will choose no more than five of the seven men running for delegate. Committed to Obama are Timothy Adams,

Ismael V. Canales, Lewis Powell and 22nd District Maryland Delegate Justin Ross. Uncommitted candidates are Norris McDonald and Julius L. West, III.

Republicans

Republican voters will vote for no more than three of the following 23 candidates running for delegate. Committed to Newt Gingrich are Charles Deegan, Toni Jarboe-Duley, Edward Reilly. To Ron Paul: Collins Bailey, Steve Krukar, Gary Rumsey. To Rick Perry: Michelle Corkadel, Samuel Corkadel, Catie Ravenscroft James. To Mitt Romney: Kevin Igoe, Charles Lollar, R. Christopher Rosenthal. To Rick Santorum: J. T. Crawford, Joe Crawford, Deborah Rey. Uncommitted candidates are: Tom Angelis, Robin Bissett, Robert "Bro" Broadus, Jim Crawford, Lee Havis, Christian Meyers, Glenn Morton, Steven Willing.

Republican voters will also vote for no more than three of the following 13 candidates to serve as alternate delegates: Committed to Gingrich is David Schwartz. To Paul: Azar P. State Senator (1997-2004) and then as U.S. Senator (2005-2008). He is running unopposed on the Democratic ballot.

Republicans

Eight candidates filed to run for the office of U.S. President in Maryland and appear on the ballot. As of this writing, the four still running actively are Newt Gingrich, Ron Paul, Mitt Romney and Rick Santorum.

Newt Gingrich, 68, is originally from Harrisburg and served as a representative from Georgia to the U.S. House of Representatives from 1979-1999. As author of the "Contract with America," he is best known as a leader of the anti-Clinton wave at the 1994 mid-term elections, after which he became the first Republican Speaker of the House in 40 years. Since leaving the House, he has remained active as a political consultant.

Raised in Pittsburgh, Ron Paul, 76, is a physician who has served as a U.S. Congressman from Texas over several

periods since 1976. He has run for president previously as both a Republican and a Libertarian. Described as both a libertarian and conservative, he speaks for limited constitutional government.

Mitt Romney, 65, son of former Michigan governor George Romney, founded the investment firm Bain Capital. He unsuccessfully challenged Edward Kennedy for U.S. Senate but stepped into the national spotlight in 1999 when he took over as president of the Salt Lake Organizing Committee and helped save the 2002 Winter Olympics from financial and ethical woes. He was then elected governor of Massachusetts in 2003, an office he held until 2007. Romney has held the title of "frontrunner" nearly since the onset of the race, yet he has had to look over his shoulder most of the time, initially to spot Gingrich and more recently Rick Santorum.

Rick Santorum, 53, is an attorney who served as a U.S. Senator from Pennsylvania from 1995

until 2007. He has run on platforms of social and economic conservatism, supporting a balanced budget. Running in the lower tier of the Republican candidates early on, he has won recent caucuses and primaries, as well as rising to the top of national polls. Since leaving the Senate, he has been in private practice and has worked as a consultant.

Jon Huntsman, former ambassador to China and former governor of Utah, suspended his campaign and threw his support to Romney. Californian Fred Karger, a political consultant and former actor is still in the race. Governor Rick Perry of Texas dropped out of the race and endorsed Newt Gingrich. Charles "Buddy" Roemer, former Governor of Louisiana, withdrew as a candidate for the Republican nomination but is still seeking possible third-party nomination. Neither Karger nor Roemer was invited to participate in any of the 20 debates that have so far been held.

FY13 Budget Proposal – No Tax Increase

As required by the Greenbelt City Charter, City Manager Michael McLaughlin presented his proposed budget for Fiscal Year 2013 to council at the beginning of the March 26 regular meeting. His budget plan for the new fiscal year beginning July 1 is projected to raise \$25,542,700 in total revenue and to spend \$25,010,500 in departmental and other expenditures. He told council he is recommending no change to the present real estate property tax rate and if the expected surplus of \$532,200 is realized those funds would be added to the city's fund balance which would be projected to total \$3,418,530 at the end of the Fiscal Year 2013 (June 30, 2013).

McLaughlin used two circumstances as a backdrop for his preparation of the next year's budget. First he noted as the city's celebration of its 75th Anniversary begins that the 75-year-old city continues to thrive and provide outstanding services for its citizens. Second he stressed that although Greenbelt's fiscal situation continues to be subject to the difficult national economic climate that has adversely affected the city since Fiscal Year 2010 Greenbelt has managed those impacts well. He predicted, however, "... the difficult economics will continue through Fiscal Year 2016." He painted a picture showing little or no help from the state and the prospect of residential and commercial real estate being reassessed during Fiscal Year 2012 while market values are still low and the likelihood that those values will apply through Fiscal Years 2014-16.

Focus Areas

Three areas of focus for his proposed budget are: deal with the probability of little or no growth for the next four years;

continue to provide city services at a quality level expected by Greenbelt residents; and develop city's work plan around city council goals, as revised at their goals session on March 3, 2012.

He noted that his proposed budget expenditures for FY13 are lower than actual expenditures during FY10 and nearly 2.0 percent lower than FY12. The budget funds 1.3 new positions. One position will be added to the Police Department as a Speed Camera Officer, required by state law as part of a municipal speed camera program. The one-third position will help expand the hours for Greenbelt CARES and undertake new initiatives following the retirement of a long time CARES staff member. Overall McLaughlin stressed that every budget for the city's operational areas is set lower than last year. This is in spite of justifiable workload and staffing needs for nearly every operational area, according to the manager's presentation.

The proposed budget does not call for increases in the city's waste collection fee or for inspection fees. It does propose a three percent increase in the Aquatic and Fitness Center pass rate. Also the proposed budget relies on \$500,000 in revenue assuming the city's speed camera program gets underway at the beginning of the fiscal year. That program was planned to start in FY12 but has been delayed. In his presentation McLaughlin noted that, based on experience, that level of fine revenues drops off after drivers get used to the camera and begin to comply with the speed limits.

In the area of employee compensation the proposed budget provides for \$200,000 for a "pay adjustment." McLaughlin's budget presentation noted that the city has not provided any cost of living increases since FY10.

In FY11 there was a provision for performance or merit and in FY12 there was an across the board one percent increase. He also added that during those years there were reductions such as for leave buy back, deferred compensation contributions and increased employee share of health insurance. He does not propose any reductions for FY13.

According to the manager's crystal ball the outlook is mixed. He sees the economic concerns continuing through FY16 and any positive impacts for Greenbelt will be slow due to the city's reliance on the property tax (just over 65 percent of revenue) and the poor likelihood of state help. He sees a glimmer of hope in recent upticks in revenue from Business and Corporate Property tax (up 3.5 percent from FY10), Greenbelt's share of income taxes (up slightly from Fiscal Year 2009) and Hotel/Motel taxes (up 8 percent from FY10).

Council Reaction

Following the presentation there were brief comments by members of council. Mayor Judith Davis felt the proposed budget was, "Better than I expected." Councilmember Leta Mach effused, "it will be a joy to work with." Councilmember Konrad Herling reinforced the mayor's statement contrasting the rigorous Greenbelt budget process with other municipal jurisdictions and Councilmember Emmett Jordan gave kudos to the manager and staff for the proactive vision in the face of a very poor economic climate.

There will be 10 council budget worksessions beginning with the first one held Wednesday, March 28 and ending with a final budget review worksession on May 21. Public hearings on the proposed budget will be held on April 23 and May 29. Council will need to adopt the budget at its regular meeting on June 4.

Election

Almost 9,000 Greenbelt Residents Eligible to Vote Here in Primary Election

In next Tuesday's primary election, the 7,727 Greenbelt residents who are registered Democrats and the 1,150 residents who are registered Republicans may vote for their presidential preference. (See table at right.) Registered Democrats and Republicans will mark their choices on separate party ballots, which will also include their party's candidates for U.S. Senate, Representative in Congress from the Fifth Congressional District and Judge of the Circuit Court. Both ballots will also list delegates to the parties' conventions this summer.

Although a total of 10,869 residents are registered in Greenbelt, those registered as Unaffiliated/Others, Green or Libertarian must wait to vote until the General Election on Tuesday, November 4 when one ballot will be available to all.

In other words, all voters registered in Greenbelt at the time of the General Election will be eligible to vote for president. The

number of registered Greenbelt voters has remained flat between 2008 and 2012, though they had increased by 30 percent between 2004 and 2008.

Party Preferences

Of Greenbelt's total active registered voters, 71 percent are Democrats, 11 percent are Republicans and less than one percent each are registered as belonging to the Green party or to the Libertarian party, the two other parties reported separately by the county.

Almost 1,900 residents are registered as unaffiliated with any political party or as a member of another political party (17 percent). Active registered voters are those who have voted in at least one of the last two presidential elections.

Greenbelt is divided geographically. Greenbelt Center has two precincts, which represent 45 percent of registered voters. Greenbelt East, also now with two precincts, comprises 41 percent; and Greenbelt West (Franklin Park) has 13 percent of registered voters.
