Council Adopts FY 2013 Budget Deals with Breezewood, Signage

With most of the June 4 meeting used for final review and adoption of the city's Fiscal Year 2013 budget, the Greenbelt City Council used the time left to consider three action requests from staff. They first dealt with a report on new signs directing visitors to historic Greenbelt. Other action requests were a proposed LED sign for the CVS store in Greenway Center and an update on Breezewood Drive improvements related to the new Greenbelt Middle School.

Heritage Signs

After nearly 50 years of Greenbelt opposition to the outer Beltway or as it's known now the Intercounty Connector (ICC), the city will finally receive some benefit from the project. Part of the ICC project has allocated funds to improve signage in cities and towns of the Anacostia Trails Heritage Area (ATHA).

In Greenbelt's case, wayfinding signs will be placed on Kenilworth Aveue and Greenbelt Road to direct visitors traveling on these state highways to historic Greenbelt.

Steve Hollie of the Maryland State Highway Administration and Aaron Marcavitch, ATHA executive director, described locations and rationale for the signage. In addition to highway signs saying "Historic Greenbelt" and "Local Info," directional signs will be placed on Crescent and Southway leading visitors to the Community Center.

Hollie and Marcavitch explained that signage regulations require an identifiable facility or location that is generally open, staffed and has restroom facilities. The city had selected the Community Center as such a location where visitors can be provided with information and perhaps handouts. They noted the location is desirable even when the Community Center is closed because of the nearby self-guided trail posts for visitors.

Councilmember Leta Mach moved and council unanimously approved the project.

CVS LED Sign

The second agenda item was an Advisory Planning Board (APB) report and staff recommendation that council not oppose installation of a monumentstyle sign approximately 6'4" high by 7'9-1/2" wide. The Light Emitting Diode (LED) sign would be subject to the following conditions: (1) It must meet all applicable Prince George's County sign requirements. (2) The applicant must submit a landscaping plan incorporating a mix of perennial and annual plants for city review and approval. (3) The applicant must obtain the required Prince George's County and City of Greenbelt sign and electrical permits.

Since the city has no covenant agreement with Greenway Center granting the city review and approval authority on signs, the city has only an advisory role to the county. As a result of staff concerns, CVS

Music Enhances Education At Co-op Nursery School

Last June as most teachers and a concentrated amount of time children said goodbye to school for the summer and made the mental transition from classroom to swimming pool, Lisa Meyer, Greenbelt Nursery School's director and teacher, learned some welcome news: GNS had been selected to receive a substantial grant to invigorate the school's music program. The grant, bestowed by the Greenbelt Community Foundation (GCF), would allow GNS to hire an outside music teacher to provide weekly classes to the nursery school students.

As an essential part of its mission, GCF provides financial support to local cooperatives that they believe "enrich our quality of life and that build upon the legacy and best ideals of Greenbelt, now and for future generations." Given GNS' standing as one of the oldest co-ops in Greenbelt and its established reputation as an exceptional educational institution for young children, collaboration between the two organizations makes perfect sense. Says Meyer: "We are so appreciative that [GCF] has invested in the music education of the children.'

with an educator who specializes in music has provided a unique supplement to the basic curriculum. GNS used the grant money to hire local musician Penny Russell to teach a 30-minute music segment to each of GNS' five classes weekly.

Children, particularly young children, are easily stimulated by music but capturing and maintaining the attention of groups of 2- through 5-year-olds can be challenging. With more than 20 years of experience teaching young children, Russell met the challenge head-on.

In addition to customizing her lessons for each age group and coordinating weekly with the teachers to design lessons that support the current curriculum, she aims to excite the students with

ERHS Chapter of SADD Again Awarded First Place in Region

The Eleanor Roosevelt High School (ERHS) Students Against Destructive Decisions (SADD) chapter has done it again. On April 27 the group received first place in GEICO's Washington Regional Alcohol Program (WRAP) Awards. For the past eight years,

the ERHS chapter has had this prestige, winning first place every year since the program began ranking the entries.

The recognition does not come without hard work and attentive planning. Started in fall 2002 by sponsor Joanne Read, the group

has grown from its original 10 to over 30 members. They also play an active role in their community by participating in the Lewisdale Elementary School Health Fair to instill safe and hygienic habits in youth starting at a young age.

At Eleanor Roosevelt, the group holds a variety of monthly campaigns, such as Dances and Hugs, where ERHS students sign a pledge to remain drug- and alcohol-free during Homecoming Week, for which they receive a Hershey's Hug. The message "Dances and Hugs are Better Than Alcohol and Drugs" is the imprint SADD hopes to leave in everyone's mind. The climax of the year's activities occurs at the end of the year with an "Every 15 Minutes" Mock Car Crash instilling in seniors and others the dangers of drunk driving and substance abuse. With the help of the Greenbelt Police and the Greenbelt and Berwyn Heights Fire Departments, SADD reenacts a car crash in front of the student body. At the end of the day, they hold an assembly where prominent speakers, such as Prince George's County School Board

Music was already integrated into the teaching plan of each GNS class on a daily basis, but new experiences.

For example, rather than focusing exclusively on traditional American children's songs, she emphasizes music from other cultures including Ghana, Japan and Scotland. While the songs aren't immediately familiar to most of the students, they are all drawn into what Russell refers to as the "shared community of music."

Smart Meters Safer Than Cell Phones

The smart power meters installed by Pepco will be using the ZigBee standard.

Zigbee is a specification for a suite of high level communication protocols using small, low-power digital radios based on an IEEE 802 standard for wireless personal area networks (WPANs). Applications include light switches, electrical meters with in-home-displays and other consumer and industrial equipment that requires shortrange wireless transfer of data at relatively low rates. The technology defined by the ZigBee specification is intended to be simpler and less expensive than other WPANs, such as Bluetooth. ZigBee is targeted at radio-frequency (RF) applications

that require a low data rate, long battery life and secure networking. ZigBee is best suited for periodic or intermittent data or a single signal transmission from a sensor or input device. The name refers to the waggle dance of honey bees after their return to the beehive.

The output power of the PEP-CO radios is generally 1 milliwatt (mW) or .0001 watts. The distance between a person in a home and a Smart Meter is much greater than from a cell phone. As radio waves leave a transmitter, signals are dispersed and the power level is much lower. [Bluetooth devices are extremely low powered, typically about 2.5mW which is less than a cordless phone and approximately 100 times less than the maximum power of a mobile phone.] A mobile phone's peak power output from the handset is limited to a maximum of 2 watts or 2,000 mW which, transmitted in only one of eight time slots, averages to 250 mW of continuous power.

The power of Pepco Smart Meters is much less than cell phones, baby monitors and microwave ovens. Thus, since cell phones are held close to your brain, if you want to worry about anything stop using your cell phone. Its radiation intensity is much higher than a power Smart Meter -2,000 times higher. The range of the radio spectrum that the smart power meter sends out is in the microwave range.

The News Review article stated "high frequency" which is inaccurate – high frequency communication is in the range of 1,800 kilohertz to 30 Megahertz (1,000 cycles/sec or 1 million cycles/second). Please get your scientific and technical facts straight.

I am qualified to make these statements based on my ham radio and engineering backgrounds. If radio waves were hazardous to my health, I would have had a brain tumor or died years ago. I have been a ham radio operator since age 14 and I am now 53 years old.

Clarification





Obituaries

James D. Morgan, Sr.

James D. Morgan, Sr., 95, a retired assistant director of personnel at the University of Maryland, died June 2, 2012, at

Emeritis Assisted Living in Port Orange, Fla., where he had resided since 2004. He lived in Greenbelt and Berwyn Heights before moving to Laurel, then to Titusville, Fla.

Mr. Morgan was born in Pittsburgh and raised in Eckhart Mines, Md. He served in the U.S. Army during World War II as a military policeman. Following the war, he attended the University of Maryland and received both bachelors and masters degrees in business administration. Mr. Morgan was the assistant director of personnel at the University of Maryland for over 30 years.

During his tenure at the University of Maryland, Mr. Morgan was also the public address announcer for the athletic department. He announced most of the major sporting events for over 25 years. Many Maryland fans knew him as the "Voice of the Terrapins." In March 2001 he was honored for his service to Maryland athletics during halftime of the final basketball game played at Cole Field House.

Mr. Morgan was an active member of St. Andrews United Methodist Church in Titusville from 1980 to 2004 and served on many church committees. In Greenbelt he attended Mowatt Memorial United Methodist Church.

His wife Betty Stemple Morgan, whom he married in 1941, died in 2000.

Survivors include daughter Eleana Brooks of Greenbelt; sons Gary Morgan of Port Orange, Fla., and James Morgan, Jr., of Frederick, Md.; six grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

No local service or viewing will be held. Mr. Morgan will be buried in Eckhart Mines at a later date.



On Monday, June 18 at 7 p.m. the next event in the Reel & Meal at the New Deal monthly series is focused on Peace Month with the showing of "Why We Fight." Why We Fight examines the influence of the military-industrial complex on a series of American wars since World War II. Some approve of how wars helped America emerge as the world's sole superpower while others see the "overgrown military establishment" as destructive to democracy. The film goes on to question how the fighting impacts others and how it ultimately affects the U.S. and its identity as a democracy.

Following 9/11, George W. Bush asserted unprecedented executive power and preemptive military power to wage a War on Terror, re-interpreting the Constitution, U.S. law and international treaties. It is not the first time in U.S. history the constitutional balance of power was disrupted in wartime but the War on Terror poses a special dilemma due to the elusive nature of its enemy (no national capital to conquer, no leader to overthrow and no single enemy who can surrender) and its unlimited duration and scope. The War on Terror does not provide a natural moment for a peacetime restoration of constitutional protections.

<u>A Review</u> Christmas Celebrations Are a Key to Life's Events

Amie Shafer, star of the onewoman show "Divine Intervention" now playing at the Greenbelt Arts Center, greets audience members with mugs of hot chocolate and popcorn balls. So begins this emotional rollercoaster of a play.

Shafer, playwright of the piece, plays Noelle Devine. Noelle begins the play by completing Christmas decorations on the set and planning a perfect Christmas celebration. Reminiscing about Christmases from her childhood, she engages the audience in a high-spirited and hilarious Christmas trivia game with candy cane rewards for correct answers.

Soon Noelle's memories of Christmases became not as pleasant, however, and the allusion of perfect family and perfect holiday celebrations vanish. Shafer, a talented actress, portrays scenes from Noelle's life when she was as young as five years old that are spot-on and touching. The story of Noelle's life, touched by incest, divorce and alcoholism cascades to a startling ending.

Transitions Theater, producer of the play, has as its mission "to move all participants to think, feel and understand life events from a new perspective." "Divine Intervention" fulfills that mission without seeming "preachy."

had revised its original proposal for a 25-foot pole-mounted sign and agreed to a monument-style sign.

Most council comments focused on the LED technology and concerns that motorists may become distracted by the programmed messaging. Mayor Judith Davis worried that the messaging itself might not be G-rated.

A sign company representative assured council the messages would not distract drivers and would meet all requirements. He was not able to address the mayor's concern about content.

At the mayor's suggestion, council unanimously agreed not to take a position on the sign. They will, however, agree to send a letter to CVS management requesting that they consider a bicycle rack at their facility, improve pedestrian access to the store and consider making the LED messaging sign available for community-related announcements.

The APB also suggested sending a written request to the Prince George's County Planning Department to consider landscaping and sign requirements as part of the Greenbelt Road Corridor Sector Plan update. Council approved sending the letters.

Breezewood Improvements

The last agenda item was a report to council on plans by the Prince George's County Public School System (PGCPS) for pedestrian safety and accessibility along Breezewood Drive frontage associated with the new Greenbelt Middle School (GMS) site. Greenbelt's Assistant Planning Director Terri Hruby described several improvements underway in preparation for the new GMS, including raised crosswalks, ADA-compliant curb ramps and extended no-parking zones on the school side of Breezewood Drive.

Other requirements are a school flashing speed-limit beacon, new sidewalks, improved lighting and school zone signs. Additional crosswalks also are proposed at the Springhill Lane intersection with Breezewood Drive.

In response to staff and APB comments, PGCPS staff had revised the plans to improve signage, increase connectivity to the existing playground just east of the new school and add additional crosswalks to improve pedestrian safety at the Springhill Drive intersection. Crossing guards will be placed at the Breezewood crossings and the Greenbelt Road crossing near the bus lot would link to an existing path to reach the new school. Hruby advised council that the proposed improvements had input from the Greenbelt Police and Public Works Departments.

Miss Penny, as the children call her, also uses interactive props such as puppets and gives each child a hands-on opportunity to play a musical instrument during each lesson. "The students always enjoy it when [Russell] plays or allows them to play her drum from Pakistan called a dumbek," says GNS teacher Pamela Hamlin. The effectiveness of Russell's teaching strategy is evident from the children's response.

"I like the class because I really like music and I love to play the instruments. It's really, really fun!" says four-year-old Beatrice Marcavitch.

While the children see the music class as fun, music education has been found to have links to cognitive de-

velopment. Russell notes that "simple exercises such as keeping a steady beat support the development of math skills. Learning pitch can influence reading fluency and natural phrasing."

"Music for music's sake is enough," says Russell, but the fact that the class supports the intellectual development of the students makes GCF's support all the more worthwhile.



Light Fixtures Save **Energy and Money**

The city has installed new environmentally friendly and economically prudent outdoor lighting in several areas throughout the city. Greenbelt was awarded \$93,000 in Energy Efficiency Conservation Block Grant (EECBG) funds as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act. These funds were allocated through the Maryland Energy Administration (MEA).

Fifty-six (56) LED light fixtures have been installed at the Municipal Building, Roosevelt Center, Community Center, Youth Center and Schrom Hills Park parking lots and 24 induction light fixtures, all made in the USA, have been installed along the Braden Field and Lakewood Stream Valley paths at a total cost of \$103,561 using both EECBG and city funds.

LED light fixtures installed at Schrom Hills park use motion sensor technology. When this parking lot is not being used (i.e., late at night) the lights dim. When someone enters the lot, the lights immediately brighten to full intensity, which should result in further energy savings.

June 23-24 Is Field Day For Radio Operators


