Edmonston Terrace Apartments Blaze Causes Extensive Damage

A two-alarm fire at Franklin Park Apartments (formerly Springhill Lake Apartments) on December 26 routed some 24 residents from their units at 9131, 9133 and 9135 Edmonston Terrace. Damage to the building just north of the new Greenbelt Middle School on Breezewood Drive was extensive.

Fighting the blaze in stormy weather were firefighters from Greenbelt, Branchville, Berwyn

Heights and other nearby fire stations. According to Captain Thomas Kemp of the Greenbelt police, there were some harrowing moments when firefighters were commanded to leave their posts inside a burning building after a roof explosion.

Another hairy moment occurred when a firefighter inside a building called for assistance. Kemp explained the firefighter was rescued by his colleagues

and brought unhurt outside the building.

One resident also found himself trapped on the second floor but fire officials were able to get him to safety by ladder. According to another report, an individual who jumped from a second floor balcony was not seriously injured.

Preliminary investigation has

December 28 Fire on Laurel Hill Is Responsible for One Fatality

Betty Starry, 86, a Greenbelt woman, has died from injuries sustained in the fire at 2 Court Laurel Hill Road on Friday, December 28. Mrs. Starry's son and her caregiver were in the house. Both sustained serious but non-life threatening injuries.

The fire was reported just after 9 p.m. When firefighters arrived, they found heavy smoke showing from the front door and heavy fire in the rear. The fire started on the ground floor and burned through to the roof and on an adjacent roof.

Mark Brady, spokesperson for the Prince George's County Fire

Department, said while the cause of the fire has not yet been determined, no immediate signs suggested a suspicious origin of the fire. Firefighters found no smoke detectors in the house.

Homes on either side of the unit where the fire started sustained "minor smoke and water damage," according to Brady, who told Channel 9 News that the GHI homes are built extremely well and that, as a result, most damage was confined to the unit where the fire originated.

Three adults and two children

were displaced from adjacent units and were being assisted by the County Citizens Services Unit.

Multiple fire companies responded to the fire. The Greenbelt Fire Department was first on the scene and companies from Berwyn Heights, West Lanham Hills and other nearby companies also responded. The fire was brought under control within 25 minutes.

By 9:30 p.m. the Greenbelt Homes, Inc. clean up company, Prompt Restoration, Inc., had begun to arrive at the site and a full crew was at work by midnight.

Top Stories of 2012

City Celebrates

In a year-long story, the City of Greenbelt celebrated its 75th Anniversary. Following a year-and-a-half of planning by a special committee, the celebration kicked off January 8 with an Artful Afternoon of activities beginning with the dedication of the Faces of Greenbelt ceramic tiles placed in the Community Center showcase. April brought a two-day multi-disciplinary symposium on "Sustaining Greenbelt's Legacy" featuring a keynote talk by English planning historian Dr. Mervyn Miller. On Independence Day the city offered a spectacular electronically-fired, synchronized fireworks display to celebrate both the country's birth and the city's founding.

Between February and November there were four book and movie discussions featuring three novels of the time made into movies and the movie "Three Brave Men" which depicted a true incident involving Greenbelter Abe Chasanow who successfully fought his dismissal from the Navy Department for "communist sympathies" in the McCarthy era. Labor Day brought special floats with the anniversary committee's 75th Birthday Cake float being judged best theme float.

On September 22 James Roosevelt talked about his grandmother, Eleanor Roosevelt, to the delights of a large audience. Also that month, the Recreation Department featured two different performances of Treasure Hunt Cabaret featuring songs and movie clips of 1937-38, the city's founding year. October featured the city's 75th Anniversary Dinner Dance Gala attended by more than 400. A closing ceremony featuring the Greenbelt Concert Band playing the "Greenbelt March" concluded the eventful year.

Obituary

Peace and Justice Activist, Scientist Bert Donn Dies

Longtime Greenbelt resident Bertram D. Donn died on December 28, 2012, at the age of 93. He had coped for many years with a heart condition and hardening of the arteries of the brain. More recently he contracted a serious case of aspiration pneumonia due to problems with swallowing and coughing.

With degrees from Brooklyn College and Harvard University, Mr. Donn taught at Wayne State University, did research under Harold Urey at the University of Chicago and then came to NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center (GSFC) in 1959. He was head of the Astrochemistry Branch at Goddard in the 70s and a visiting professor at Cornell University in 1974-75. He received the GSFC Exceptional

Achievement Award in 1983 and 1988. He served on the Steering Committee for the International

Roads Need to Be Walker-Friendly

At the recent Greenbelt visioning session at Town Center the leader had pretty much gotten us organized when a lady from Greenbelt East showed up late and launched into a tirade about how dangerous it was to walk to Greenway Center and the post office. While I felt impatient about her spontaneously taking the floor for so long, she was tragically right and prescient, as we have now lost another Greenbelter, Bob Auerbach. One lady at the visioning session related that she used to drive her ERHS daughter for short distances because the local intersections were unsafe for walkers.

This tragedy draws our attention to a hazard at the modern and apparently well-designed intersection at Greenbelt Road and Hanover Parkway. I have biked and walked through that nine lane intersection about 100 times per year since 2005.

Shortly before the election I was holding a sign near that intersection and I observed a driver making a legal right-turn-on-red and, at the same time, I saw two pedestrians start crossing Greenbelt Road from the same side. Then the driver suddenly saw the

pedestrians and hit her brakes and did not hit them. Clearly horrified, she drove on. I have often seen walkers there not looking for right-turners-on-red when they see the "ok to cross" signal.

Perhaps five times I have walked across Hanover Parkway, right at the post office, about a block from the intersection with Rt. 193 and have found it scary getting across all six or seven lanes, with drivers not seeming to be expecting me to be there. There is no crosswalk. There is no traffic light. I should have gone out of my way and walked the extra block to the traffic light then walked back to the post office. But I suspect that few would be inclined to go out of their way like this.

My suggestions are: to place "no-turn-on-red" signs at the intersection or install flashing red "no-turn-on-red" signals which would operate only when a pedestrian crossing button has been pressed.

If we are to live Greenbelt's theme of walker-friendliness, then we will need for it to be atypically easy for locals, especially the elderly, to walk across large highways to the shopping centers.

Halley Watch that studied Comet Halley during its most recent appearance in 1986. After retiring from Goddard, he was appointed as visiting professor at the University of Virginia for several years. In 1995 the University of Virginia honored him with a symposium, in which colleagues presented papers related to his work on the composition, origin and structure of comets and interstellar grains.

Bert Donn helped to found the Greenbelt Fair Housing Committee, the Greenbelt Peace Committee, the Prince George's Peace and Justice Coalition, Maryland United for Peace and Justice and the Prince George's County chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU). As chair of the county ACLU, he supported the efforts of the African American community in police-community relations and advised those who brought the lawsuit to end school desegregation in the county.

In the early 60s he worked with a group called ACCESS (headquartered in Greenbelt), which picketed segregated apartment buildings every Saturday. He served for many years on the board of the county branch of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. He was also an active member of the Social Action Committee of his humanistic Jewish congregation, Machar.

After retiring as a scientist, he became more active in his many peace and justice activities, including teaching classes in conflict resolution and serving on the steering committee for the local Creative Response to Conflict.

His marriage to Mary Creason ended in divorce. In 1960 he married Marjory Maxwell. Survivors include his wife, sons Stephen and Arthur of Greenbelt, daughter Susan Owens (Albert) of Ventura, Cal., son Jeffrey (Cindy) of Beltsville and son Allen (Jenni) of Woodstock, Ga.; grandchildren Sarah Owens Pinkstaff, Nathan Owens, Julie, Erin, Lisa, Ian, Josiah and Kyle Donn; and great grandchild Owen Pinkstaff.

A memorial service will be held at Paint Branch Unitarian Universalist Church on Powder Mill Road in Adelphi on Saturday, January 5 at 2 p.m.

The family suggests in lieu of flowers that contributions may be made to the Center for Arms Control and Nonproliferation, the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum or the Union of Concerned Scientists.

Crime Drops

Not only did the number of crimes committed in Greenbelt drop to a five-year low in 2011, but a six-month report for 2012 indicated that the crime rate might go even lower. The 2011 crime drop occurred in all categories of major crimes except burglaries and took place in all areas of the city. Other good news was that there were fewer traffic accidents. Perhaps some of the reason for the declines were the significant increases in adult arrests made and traffic summons issued by the Greenbelt Police Department.

FBI Relocation

In February council received news about a strong interest on the part of the owners and county government to secure a potential relocation for a consolidated headquarters for the Federal Bureau of Investigation for the North Core portion of Greenbelt Station, the proposed development for the Greenbelt Metro Station property. The FBI currently employs over 11,000 persons. In a Letter to the Editor, two people stated, "If jobs, economic development, public safety and property values are the city's top priorities, then the FBI headquarters is a home run."

The pros and cons of the FBI as a North Core tenant were considered in March and April Sector Plan workshops. On December 3 the General Services Administration (GSA) issued a Request for Information (RFI) on the issue of providing for a new headquarters facility for the FBI. Officials representing jurisdictions in both Virginia and Maryland, as well as the District of Columbia, are pursuing this future facility for their locales.

Sector Plan

After nearly two years of meetings and community workshops the technical staff of the Prince George's County Planning Board in mid-July published a Preliminary Metro Area, Route 193 Corridor Sector Plan for public comment and scheduled a joint public hearing by the planning board and county council. Although the majority of comments and testimony on the Preliminary Sector Plan criticized the plan and called for it to be remanded back to technical staff, it appears by year's end only minor changes will be made. In mid-December, the planning board approved the plan and forwarded it to the county council for their review in early 2013 and approval.

Greenbelt's council expressed strong opposition to the Preliminary Plan and continued to urge remand to technical staff. Council declared the Sector Plan proposes a future for Greenbelt counter to the best interests of its residents and outlines a vision that would transform Greenbelt into a city defined by the roads that divide it and not by the planning elements and community vision that have defined it for 75 years.

New Middle School

Discarding plans to demolish and replace part of the original Greenbelt Middle School, the county School Board approved construction of a new school on Breezewood Drive. Over 1,000 students including sixth-graders from four nearby schools and about 270 TAG students from a wider area started school on August 20. Described as green, with a courtyard and rooftop garden, the \$56 million school offers culinary arts and an audiovisual station in addition to the academic program.

Derecho

Compared with much of the Washington metropolitan area, Greenbelt fared well in the wake of the June 29 turbulent derecho. The rare storm, characterized by its movement in one direction along a relatively straight swath, began at Lake Michigan and ended in Maryland. Many Greenbelt areas experienced erratic power outages, 10 to 15 trees were lost and traffic light outages caused delays. Overall, however, damage was minimal. Still, cleanup took several weeks.

Hurricane Sandy

In the face of a longtime forecasted storm described by media as unprecedented and utterly bizarre, a "Super Storm," Greenbelt again emerged relatively unscathed. Hurricane Sandy – a tropical vortex colliding with two mighty winter systems – swept through the Northeast in late October. Greenbelt Police and Public Works Departments leapt into defensive action. Many facilities were closed for two days while essential workers toiled to protect the city.

News Review 75th

The News Review, like the city, celebrated its 75th anniversary this year. And how this event stirred up memories! We celebrated gloriously with a special issue on November 15, complete with a front-page city proclamation and, folded inside, a historical News Review full of stories, photos, cartoons, letters and editorials we had run throughout these many decades. How young we all looked in a staff photo for our 25th anniversary issue and how sad that many then-colleagues have passed away. We have happily printed our own memories and those of our readers during the year. And then, of course, we had a party, a grand banquet with speeches recalling our past, present and looking to our future and, also, with a special tribute to Mary Lou Williamson, who for over 40 years has led us as our "Editor Extraordinaire."

Two GED Classes Offered by CARES

Springhill Lake Rec.

Greenbelt CARES will hold its winter 10-week GED course starting Monday, January 14 and continuing through Wednesday, April 10. Registration for the course will be on Monday, January 14 from 11 a.m. to noon. Students will be notified on January 14 of acceptance in the course. The first class will be on Wednesday, January 16, and then on every Monday and Wednesday in the Springhill Lake Recreation Center Clubhouse, 6101 Cherrywood Lane.

GED I and GED II is offered for all students. In this combined class students will review basic math, English and comprehension skills, algebra, geometry and GED test-taking skills. No one will be accepted into the class after Monday morning, January 14.

Municipal Building

A second winter 10-week GED course will start Tuesday, January 15 continuing through Thursday, April 11. Registration for the course will be on Tuesday, January 15 and students will be notified on January 15 of acceptance in the course. The first class will begin on Thursday, January 17 at the Municipal Building Conference Room at 25 Crescent Road.

GED I, from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., is for students who need review of basic math (addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, fractions, decimals, percentages and word problems) and English grammar skills.

GED II, from 1 to 3 p.m., is for students who have successfully completed GED I and/or are ready to learn algebra and geometry, English literature and writing skills and prepare to take the GED test.

Students are required to show proof of residency (i.e., current lease, phone or electric bill, driver's license or Motor Vehicle ID card).

There is no charge for Greenbelt residents. Nonresidents must pay a \$175 registration fee. All students are required to buy a copy of the GED textbook and a calculator that can be purchased from Greenbelt CARES.

Students do not have to be 16 years old to take the GED course and can take a free GED pre-test given at Greenbelt CARES. The actual GED test is given by the State of Maryland; students ready to take the test can obtain the application forms from Greenbelt CARES. Students who need more remediation will be referred to Prince George's County Pre-GED course.

"Cut" is an edgy new play by Crystal Skillman limning the personal lives and artistic challenges of its three protagonists as they produce a schlock-filled reality TV series, "Ladies of Malibu."

I have seen it only in rehearsal and was impressed; you, I suspect, will be much more impressed when you see it Friday or Saturday, January 4 or 5 at 8 p.m. or Saturday, January 5 at 2 p.m.

The central moral question for Rene (a woman, played by Vanessa Terzaghi), Danno (a man, played by Jeff Robert) and Collete (played by Kenny Hahn, a woman) is how much dreadful hack work can an aspiring artist do before she must admit she has prostituted herself? Or himself, of course.

Can filming the lives of hair pulling, substance-abusing, backstabbing dysfunctional divas ever be "a stepping stone to better things" asks Danno. "You choose who you are," he warns himself and Rene and Collete.

Can these educated, ambitious idealists shape the dreck they swim in, personally and professionally, into something artistically worthy and humane?

Blessedly, all of the soap operatic misery occurs off stage. A caveat though – my inner Mrs.

Grundy wishes to tell you that the "F" word is tossed about liberally.

A rehearsal lets the viewer see the play only through a glass darkly, but one aspect is very clear. The whole crew is really having fun putting on this show.

In one scene, Danno and Rene

kiss passionately and director Richard Starkweather urged them after they separated, "Please continue – have fun!" At which point lighting technician Tommy Zanner chipped in, "You must suffer for your art."

My advice? Take a chance, go see it, have fun.

identified a faulty furnace as the possible cause of the fire. By the time firefighting units from surrounding areas responded to the call, flames were breaking through the roof of the 9133 building. The fire was put out in about 30 minutes.

To accommodate tenants evacuated from all three buildings, city staff opened the Springhill Lake Recreation Center. Franklin Park management was able to place all those evacuated in either vacant units in the development or in nearby hotels. Building 9133 sustained greatest damage from the fire. However, tenants in the other two buildings are also scheduled for relocation.

Franklin Park staff also opened the development's leasing quarters for use by fire personnel, apartment staff, Red Cross and city staff, including code inspectors and others.

Kemp told the News Review that, while members of the force were present at the fire scene for traffic and pedestrian control, two officers remained throughout the night to prevent looting. He also noted that Master Police Officer Edward Holland may have been the first to spot the fire on Edmonston Terrace while patrolling the area. (Holland, assigned to patrol Franklin Park, is paid through a partnership between Franklin Park and the City of Greenbelt.)

Initial assessments were that all 30 units in the three buildings experienced damage. The potential cost of repairs has been estimated in excess of \$250,000. The next day, clean-up operations were well underway with Franklin Park security and contractors hired by Franklin Park management. It was not clear when the displaced residents would be able to re-enter their apartments.

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Pearl Harbor Survivor, Wounded Warrior Honored at Post 136

On the 71st anniversary of Pearl Harbor, the American Legion honored two men for their exemplary service in the midst war and conflict.

Dallas Jones is one of the few remaining survivors from the Japanese surprise attack on the island of Oahu. After having his legs amputated so far above his knees, Dan Berschinski is the nation's first military member to regain the ability to walk daily. Both men, separated by generations, showed great admiration for one another and spoke before a veteran-laden, distinguished crowd of Legionnaires during the Greenbelt post's annual national security forum.

"[Being here] has been the greatest feeling of patriotism I've felt in years," an emotional Jones said. Looking every bit the hero with his American flag tie, the North Carolina native was still able to recount vivid details of his experiences.

"I saw sailors dying," he recalled. "And I made them a promise that as long as I live [they] won't be forgotten. Dying for your country is not as bad as being forgotten."

Jones, 89, was a fresh-faced teenager finally living his dream of serving in the Navy, when the first wave of Imperial Japanese bombers attacked his location, the then recently-opened Kaneohe Naval Base.

"They attacked us about 10 minutes before Pearl Harbor," he said. "They wiped out all of our long-range planes before we knew what was happening."

During the chaos, Jones and a fellow crewmember manned a .50-caliber machine gun and opened fire on incoming enemy planes. He went on to serve in the Navy for 20 years, becoming a decorated bombardier who was a part of the Battle of Midway.

"I flew 14 hours a day for six days [during Midway]," the spry Jones said. "But everyone here should be honored [because] everybody here served. They're all heroes, as far as I'm concerned."

After the American Legion's Department of Maryland Commander J.D. Larson presented Jones with a plaque, Berschinski told his story of how he lost his limbs while trying to give his "young guy's perspective" to establish "a connection between the current war vets" and the experiences of the veteran attendees.

The West Point graduate served as a platoon leader in a deployment to Afghanistan. There, on Aug. 18, 2009, he lost one of his men to an improvised explosive device (IED) then both of his legs to another. He also shattered his left arm and broke

his jaw as a result of the blast.

"We both share that pain of losing comrades in action," Berschinski said to Jones.

After recovering from his injuries at the Walter Reed Medical Center, he became the founder and president of a small business, Two-Six Industries, that makes injection molded plastic components and employs veterans and wounded warriors. Berschinski, who also spoke to Post 136 members on Veteran's Day, has channeled his efforts into be-

ing an advocate for veteran and wounded warrior care and serving on the Board of Directors for the Amputee Coalition.

"This night is a further reminder of why I joined the Legion," Chaplain Mike Duggan said at the end of the program.

In concluding his speech and, effectively, the night, Berschinski looked at Jones once more and further fortified their bond birthed from war with his final words.

"I want you to know that you will never be forgotten."

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

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
