County Proposes Removing Paid Fire, EMT at Branchville Station

Branchville Volunteer Fire Department and Rescue Squad (BVFD&RS) Chief Richard Leizear has informed neighboring fire departments that the career (county-employed and paid) firefighters and emergency medical technicians (EMT) are slated for removal from the Branchville station on March 1. The firehouse is located at the intersection of Greenbelt Road and Rhode Island Avenue in College Park. Branchville provides "first due response" to Greenbelt West, including Franklin Park, Beltway Plaza and the Greenbelt Metro station.

Leizear and BVFD&RS President James Crisman were summoned to a meeting on December 28 with the Prince George's County Deputy Fire Chief Benjamin Barksdale and informed of

a proposed plan to remove the career firefighters currently staffing the station Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. until 3 p.m. Branchville is one of several in the county to be affected by the plan, which is scheduled to go into effect March 1.

According to Leizear, Barksdale said the Branchville department is close to other fire and EMS stations that could cover Branchville's area when volunteer staffing is not available. The change is due to county budgetary constraints, he said.

Leizear indicates March 1 also is the effective date for adding paid firefighters to county stations based on the collective bargaining agreement between the firefighters union and the county.

Branchville's chief noted that removal of career staff during daytime hours when volunteers are either at work or in school or otherwise not available could put Greenbelt West, the Branchville community and North College Park in jeopardy. If the plan goes into effect, he said, those business and residential areas likely will experience longer response times when callers in Branchville's "first due response" areas call 911 for a fire or rescue emergency.

The Greenbelt City Council and city manager, aware of the proposed plan, are discussing the issue with neighboring cities. The topic likely will be placed on council's meeting agenda for January 14. It could also be a topic at an upcoming Four Cities (Greenbelt, Berwyn Heights, College Park and New Carrollton) meeting scheduled on January 30.

A Dream Come True . . . The Forest Preserve at 10

This year marks the 10th Anniversary of the creation of the Greenbelt Forest Preserve. I feel compelled to celebrate this event with my fellow citizens in the thicket of our forest preserve. As president of the Committee to Save the Green Belt, I am delighted that the forest preserve is 10 years old.

On a patch of woodland not in the forest preserve but pretty much surrounded by it, I erect a tent in which I light candles and spread a small mat for sitting. My tent has four windows facing the four directions: north, south, east and west. I pull up to the north window and begin to document my findings.

Fatigue and hunger soon set in. I pull out my cooker and pan and toss in onions, green peppers and white beans. The smell of cooking gives energy so I continue to log in my observations.

I try to be like a scientist, eyes focused on capturing some provable fact about the current status of the forest. Yet this is

in the presence of such goodness! I am joyful and log in the northern view, which is serene and bountiful, then move to the south view where the darkness is spreading. A jubilant mist rises from the forest floor.

I ponder the history of our woods. We did a special thing. After many battles, here the forest stands in this soft night. What did it take to do this? How many fliers, bird walks, mushroom walks, meetings, phone calls, letters, Labor Day booths, jack o'lanterns and great ideas? How much struggling? How much help from so many people through five long decades?

I log the south view: "thoroughly rejuvenating." I move to the east where I hear an animal in the darkening woods.

"It took a bond to do all this," I think. If you went into these woods as a child in a heavy snowstorm, you were bonded forever to the forest. If you stepped past her gates on a spring morning, you were a goner - this

Editorial

Greenbelt's Loss

In December Greenbelt lost two lifetime activists for peace, justice, equal rights and fair housing - Bertram Donn and Robert Auerbach. Their advocacy spanned a period of more than 50 years in Greenbelt. Both were a part of a small group of city activists who worked and demonstrated for these issues at a time when most Greenbelters either opposed them or were willing to leave things as they were. As tolerant as Greenbelt is and was, Donn and Auerbach were often looked down upon, particularly by politicians who considered their views too far out and unpopular to be supported. They often were voices in the wilderness.

In particular, the 1960s and early 70s were a turbulent time with assassinations, riots and demonstrations in Washington and at the university, mule trains, the National Guard encamped on Braden Field, riot police assembled at Greenbelt Junior High, implementation of fair housing legislation and enforced school busing. It was a time when feelings ran high and those such as Auerbach and Donn were considered eccentric, and even hated by some.

Looking back now at those times and what Donn and Auerbach championed - peace, justice for all and equal opportunity - one can only wonder, "What was all the fuss about?"

We as a community must vigilantly assure that all those who disagree with the majority, who march to different drum beats, are never prevented from lawfully expressing themselves. Freedom of expression is a cornerstone of democratic government. Our thanks to Auerbach and Donn for asserting these rights.







They moved to Portland where Dr. Van Schoonhoven worked as director of Professional Standards for the Oregon Education Association. In the early '70s, he was hired by the National Education Association in Washington, D.C. as director of Student Programs where he also focused on changing the voting age to 18.

"Mr. Van," as he was known by students and staff, was then selected to serve as principal of Greenbelt Center Elementary School. The school became a model for providing after-school care to at-risk children. The school was selected by the U.S. Department of Education as a Blue Ribbon School, one of the top 200 public schools in the country. He retired in 1992 as plans for Greenbelt's new elementary school began to take shape, feeling that a new principal should be in charge from the

beginning. Dr. Van Schoonhoven is survived by his wife Louise and daughter Heidi. Their daughter Susan preceded him in death.



Family, friends, neighbors, colleagues and compatriots gathered in an overflowing congregation on Saturday, January 5, 2013, at the Paint Branch Unitarian Universalist Church to celebrate the life of Greenbelter Bert Donn.

Reverend Diane Teichert

officiated during a stirring ceremony highlighted by poetry readings, classical music, several eulogies, memories and prayer. As one would expect, the flow of the program focused on the dedication, total commitment and perseverance of Mr. Donn's lifelong service to the principles of peace, justice, fairness, brotherhood and racial harmony not only in Greenbelt, but in the larger community of Prince George's County and beyond.

The eulogy was given by Rabbi Binyamin Biber of the Washington Congregation for Secular Humanistic Judaism. Memories of Mr. Donn's life were provided by Lucy Duff, of the Prince George's Peace and Justice Coalition, which grew out of his organizing the Greenbelt Peace & Justice group. McArthur Bishop represented the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and related Mr. Donn's role in that organization. Other speakers remembered his participation in the Greenbelt Fair Housing Committee and his vital role in smoothing the way for desegregation efforts in Prince George's County and leading efforts to assure support for required busing of school children in Greenbelt

yet soothing."

I face west as candles flicker. "What was behind this effort to save the woods?" As a young lad, canvassing door to door, I recall an older gentleman who was delighted that a new generation had come forward. He invited me in and told me about the huge efforts of citizen intervention to save these woods before I was born.

A gentle wind stirs and something moves closer to the tent. The moon lumbers toward the horizon. I realize that whatever had stirred in the hearts of Greenbelters had saved these woods. Recalling how good a friend the woods had been to me, nourishing and enhancing my world, I wonder, "Who saved who?"

As the moon kisses the horizon, I see a deer foraging close by and get goose bumps. "What are the chances?" I think as he stands in silhouette in front of the moon. "Is he saying 'Thank you, Greenbelt?"" I try to wave off that superstition but, as if on cue, an owl calls from a nearby tree. Another owl answers from a distant hillside. Hoo-hoo, hoo-hoo or was it, thank you, thank you?

I ponder other questions. "What made citizens spend nearly half a century to save these woods?" Closing my eyes, I tilt my head back and give full attention to the owls and feel cradled in the arms of nature.

I wish every Greenbelter could feel this. Time seems to stop and the moment comes to stillness.

After a bit of nourishing calm, it seems right to hike out into the night forest. So in a zen-like manner I pack up everything and hoof away toward the creek.

"What of Greenbelt can be said?" I think, moving through the exhilarating night forest. I reach the end of a ridge which looks off into the valley and light a red lantern and hang it from a bough with ceremony. The great silence of the woods gathers around the rosy glow.

"Hello, Great Woods! This night finds me in good cheer and I hope you, too. People back in the village are preparing to celebrate 10 years of adopting vour once-orphaned self into the family of Greenbelt. They are making plans to commemorate the great occasion. They erected a Forest Preserve sign at the gates of your cathedral and I believe they really mean it. Do you think they know what a great thing they did, dear woods?" From the silence comes the faroff call of an owl and I whisper, "Do you think they know?"

I look back toward the village homes in the distance, their lights rimming the forest's edge and feel all my doubt and skepticism about humanity fall away. Standing in the night, looking at the lights of the village, I realize that a tender bond is what triumphs here. Here, at least here, love won the day. I sense the earth smiling down on Greenbelt and in the glow of the red lantern I pull out my camping stove to make some tea.

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
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


Pepco Infrastructure **Improvement Project Update**

Greenbelt residents and GHI members will soon be benefiting from infrastructure upgrades to the Pepco power distribution system in the form of new poles, transmission wires and transformers. Representatives from Pepco, the City of Greenbelt and GHI met throughout 2012 to prepare for what will be the largest power infrastructure upgrade that Greenbelt has seen for more than fifty years.

The first phase of the project - tree pruning in the vicinity of Pepco power lines by Pepco contractors – began in November and should be completed early in 2013. The second phase of the project – replacement of poles, lines and transformers -began in December and will take at least six months to complete.

Nearly every court in GHI will see some manner of upgrade work. Residents and members should be prepared for increased construction related traffic, parking restrictions and minor disruptions to power service as the project progresses.

Winter is here and with it is the need to be prepared for snow. Managing winter weather is a cooperative endeavor in GHI. Staff is responsible for plowing courts and clearing common sidewalks connecting homes, with priority given to courts and service side walkways. Once those have been cleared staff will turn to gardenside and common walkways. GHI snow removal efforts will begin once four inches of snow have accumulated.

Members are responsible for remov-

ing snow and ice from sidewalks within their yard boundaries, on both gardenside and serviceside. On shared walkways between individual units, responsibility is shared by adjacent neighbors. Members are encouraged to lend a helping hand to neighbors who may be physically or otherwise unable to clear sidewalks.

GHI members can help support snow removal efforts by avoiding piling snow on any portion of plowed streets or courts. Placing snow in these areas only hampers snow removal efforts, increases costs for all members, and creates a nuisance for other members or visitors to the court (including mail carriers and other service providers). When clearing off cars, please place snow toward the curb or common areas in the court.
