### City Council Supports Relocating FBI HQ to Greenbelt Station Site

The Greenbelt City Council at its January 14 meeting discussed and approved a letter written to support relocating the FBI to the North Core site at the Greenbelt Metro Station, the development proposed to be constructed at the current parking lot for the station. The letter will be sent to County Executive Rushern Baker and Congressman Steny Hoyer.

Council had previously discussed the topic at a worksession attended by Garth Beall, who represented the developers of the North Core. At the January 14 meeting Beall updated council on his firm's response to the RFI. He said the city's concerns, expressed in previous worksessions, would be incorporated in their response.

It has been widely reported in various news media, including the News Review (February 9, 2012; January 17, 2013) that the General Services Administration (GSA) is considering relocating the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). Local and state officials in Maryland and Virginia have responded with proposed sites and in December the GSA issued a Request for Information (RFI), due March 4.

Beall said the response would show flexibility in meeting the government's needs while also accommodating the interests of others involved, including Greenbelt.

Mayor Judith Davis mentioned the competition from Northern Virginia interests. She said she had read that officials and business leaders there were presenting a team effort to GSA. She wondered if the North Core developer planned something

### **Seeks Support**

Beall said it is important to GSA that local municipalities support the project. He has reached out to the City of College Park already, he said, and would be doing the same to Berwyn Heights soon. He hoped to garner Greenbelt's support that night.

He said he believes his group is in a good position to move forward. They are putting together a packet that illustrates the attributes of the Greenbelt Metro

site. They are presenting the site not only for the FBI replacement facility but also for mixed use around it.

He described a mixed-use area to be located adjacent to the Metro Station with the FBI campus of four or five buildings to be located toward the eastern boundary of the property.

Councilmember Leta Mach said she was pleased to hear that part of the property that is environmentally sensitive would be left vacant as a buffer for security. Beall told council the minimum construction standard required by GSA now is LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) gold and that the building could possibly be built at the higher LEED platinum level.

### **Council Discussion**

Councilmember Emmett Jordan, away on business, had communicated support for the letter as drafted, Davis said.

Councilmember Rodney Roberts wanted to modify the letter

### Council Okays New Truck And Treadmill Purchases

At its first meeting of the New Year on Monday, January 14 the Greenbelt City Council authorized two large purchases. A replacement truck with aerial lift for the Public Works Department was approved with the adoption of a resolution introduced at council's last 2012 meeting. Five new treadmills for the Aquatic and Fitness Center were also approved for purchase through a bid negotiated by the University of Maryland.

### **Truck Purchase**

The city began leasing a 2007 Ford aerial lift truck in September to replace a 23-year-old vehicle that had not passed state inspection. The lease allowed for 80 percent of the rental payment to go toward the future purchase of the truck, if the city decided it met its needs. Public Works staff has been satisfied with the

truck's performance and thus recommended that the city follow through on purchase of the

The purchase cost, after deduction of applied rents in the amount of \$4,680, is \$34,595. The Fiscal Year 2012 budget provides \$35,000 for purchase of a new truck. In addition the City of College Park has agreed to pay 20 percent of the cost (\$7,855), since the truck will be used in the hanging of banners in College Park.

### **Old Truck**

The value of the old truck is estimated at between \$5,000 and \$6,500. City Manager Michael McLaughlin said the city has not tried to negotiate a trade-in because staff considers it likely that a market can be found for


### Greenbelt Hosts New Geocaching Trail Kick-off Event and Activities

On Saturday, January 5 Greenbelt played host to one of three Geotrail 2013 Kick-off events held in the state. City staff joined forces with the Maryland Municipal League and the Maryland Geocaching Society to host the event, which celebrated the launch of the new 2013 Maryland Municipal League Geotrail.

The new trail, labeled the Discovering Maryland Geotrail, includes caches in 49 different Maryland towns and cities. Geocaching, essentially a real-world treasure hunting game where participants (geocachers) use GPS devices to locate boxes (caches) hidden at specific GPS coordinates, is becoming an increasingly popular activity. The caches are traditionally filled with small items related to the location where they are found. The City of Greenbelt is home to two caches, one of which is on the Municipal League's new Geotrail. Participation in the trail has many benefits for municipalities, most importantly the potential economic boost provided by tourists visiting a town while they are geocaching.

Over 100 people attended the kickoff event, from Greenbelt residents to some traveling from

Attendees ranged from those interested in learning about geocaching to veteran geocachers who eagerly awaited the coordinates of the caches along the new Maryland Geotrail. There were numerous information booths for neighboring municipalities included in the trail, businesses selling Geocaching equipment and other local organizations. A special Geocaching 101 session was presented by Maryland Geocaching Society for those new to the activity. For those bringing the family, arts and crafts projects were provided for children by

### Reel & Meal at the New Deal Film Is on Gun Violence

Monday, January 28 at 7 p.m. Biden. is the monthly Reel & Meal at the New Deal featuring "Living for 32." It is an account of the 2007 Virginia Tech mass shootings and the steps it inspired Colin Goddard, who survived with four gunshot wounds, to take toward strengthening national gun control laws, long before the Newtown, Conn. tragedy. Preceding the film a special vegan buffet will be available for purchase at 6:30

The 2010 film was directed by Kevin Breslin, produced by Maria Cuomo Cole; it was selected for the 2011 Sundance Film Festival. Goddard, his parents and his classmates tell of the terrifying morning at Blacksburg. Goddard follows with his efforts as a volunteer with the Brady Commission to expose the lax availability of weapons at gun shows. The film covers related issues prominent since Newtown: the toll of gunfire, inadequate mental health care and risks attendant to open carrying of weapons in public places. Goddard recently testified at the gun violence panel led by Vice President

The discussion following the film will be led by guest speakers Lisa Miller Delity, president of the board of CeaseFire-Maryland (formerly Marylanders Against HandgunAbuse), whose brother, FBI agent Michael John Miller, was murdered in 1994 at D.C. police headquarters; and Elizabeth Ross, mother of Marckel Ross, a county student shot and killed last September while walking to Central High School.

Discussion will include how local residents can influence proposed new national and state gun control legislation. More information is available at www. livingfor32.com.





### ASG Jan. 31 Meeting to Be at H.B. Owens

On Thursday, January 31 at 7:30 p.m. the Astronomical Society of Greenbelt (ASG) will hold its monthly meeting at H.B. Owens Science

Center, featuring a presentation by Dr. Keith Strong on "What has Happened to the Solar Cycle?" All are welcome; there is no fee.

The sun is the origin of the energy that powers Earth's weather and climate; the solar cycle is the periodic change in its activity and appearance. The duration of solar cycles is about 11 years, with Earth currently near a high point in solar activity.

Dr. Strong received his bachelor's degree in astronomy at University College, London, and his doctorate in astrophysical X-ray spectroscopy from Mullard Space Science Laboratory, moving to the U.S. in 1976 as a student after an unsuccessful attempt to become Great Britain's first astronaut. He worked for Lockheed Martin for 32 years as a science data analyst on NASA's Solar Maximum Mission, ending as direc-

tor of Space Sciences at Palo Alto Research Labs. He has published over 200 papers and chaired several NASA committees including the 2000 Sun-Earth Connection Roadmap that put the Living With A Star initiative in place. Strong retired about five years ago and has an emeritus position at the Goddard Heliophysics Division. His current interests include predicting the solar cycle, the sun's role in global warming, origins of flares and coronal mass ejections, space weather, education and public outreach.



the old truck as is.

Councilmember Rodney Roberts asked Assistant Director of Public Works Lesley Riddle about problems with the old truck. When she described them, he said he considered them minor. In fact, he thought the old truck was better equipment than the new one, he said. He questioned if sufficient maintenance is being done.

Riddle said an estimate on one repair had been \$4,000 and that there were a number of Category 2 deficiencies as well as three Category 1 failures that kept the truck out of service. The main problems are with the hydraulics for the boom, Riddle said. She assured Roberts the decision to purchase a new truck had not been made without careful consideration and investigation into the feasibility and cost of repairs to the old one.

The resolution for purchase of the truck was introduced for second reading and adoption by Councilmember Silke Pope and passed unanimously by the five members of council present. (Councilmembers Edward Putens and Emmett Jordan were absent.)

Before moving on to the next agenda topic, Councilmember Konrad Herling asked Riddle how the city was moving toward replacing its fleet with alternativefuel vehicles. She confirmed that it is moving in that direction.

Councilmember Leta Mach suggested that the City of College Park receive thanks for contributing to the truck purchase. She noted as well that if other municipalities want to use the truck, they should be charged rent.

### New Treadmills

The city's current budget provides \$28,000 for the purchase of five new treadmills for the Aquatic and Fitness Center. After soliciting bids in August 2012, however, the city was unable to find equipment that met the city's needs and therefore did not move forward with a purchase.

Since then, city staff learned that the University of Maryland has awarded a bid for Cybex 770T treadmills to Gymsource of Frederick, Md., at a cost per treadmill of \$4,995. The staff reports the manufacturer to be a national company with a good reputation. The treadmill model is a new commercial grade unit and the company offers a three-year parts and labor warranty. The City of Greenbelt would be able to piggyback on the University of Maryland bid.

After meeting with Gymsource representatives and seeing a demonstration of the treadmill, Recreation Department staff recommended the city take advantage of this opportunity and purchase five units at a total cost of \$24,975.

Recreation Department Assistant Director Joe McNeal, who was at the meeting, told council he was excited about the new machines and thought users would like them. He said they are an improvement over the old machines

An information sheet on the product describes patented ARMZ-stabilizers that reach further than conventional ones and provide additional safety. Users can set up an exercise program, charge an iPod or iPhone, scroll through playlists, podcasts and more.

Users can "easily personalize their workout experience with a perfect balance of Exercise/Entertainment/Escape," the brochure says. The deck is described as "soft at landing, firm in the middle and rigid at toe-off" to match the body mechanics of running. Sounds like even Goldilocks would find it comfortable.

All five members of council present voted in favor of the motion to approve the purchase as described. McNeal said the paperwork would be signed the next day and that delivery could be expected within four to six weeks

### Greenbelt Wins Extreme Website Makeover Contest



to say the city opposes using a site on the campus of the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC) for this project. He told Beall he hoped they would consider the South Core as a potential site.

Davis pointed out that the developer of the North Core does not own the South Core. Roberts wanted to have the letter refer to the Greenbelt Metro Station in general, rather than specifying the North Core.

Mach opposed using the South Core for the FBI. She said this would defeat the benefit of employees being able to walk directly from the Metro Station to their office.

After more discussion Mach moved to send the letter as written and later said she would not amend her motion to remove language on the North Core or to oppose locating the FBI at BARC. She accepted a modification offered by Davis, however, to change the wording to make a stronger case against a BARC site without specifically mentioning it. The final wording she accepted was "no other site in or near Greenbelt is similarly

suited" for the project.

Marc "Kap" Kapistan of Beltway Plaza management, also present, showed council a newspaper article saying the Virginia team would unite behind a particular site after GSA clarifies its needs for the project.

He said it was important for the Greenbelt area to "speak" with one voice. He advocated a simple, direct, unequivocal and compelling letter. He understood that Capital Office Park would also be submitting a letter of support.

When the motion was brought to a vote, all five councilmembers present voted for it, including Roberts, who said he still had concerns but was pushing them down the line. Councilmember Edward Putens was not at the meeting.

### Pepco Tree Work

Early in the meeting, Windsor Green resident Edith Beauchamp came before council to ask for city assistance in limiting the tree work Pepco was preparing to do along some areas that she said were private or city property. Beauchamp said she wanted Pepco to be more responsible in

maintaining good service and that she did not consider this a case of "tree hugging." A number of trees had been marked for removal, she said.

Davis said the city had held worksessions with Pepco about city rights of way and that she was not aware that Greenbelt lacked authority for the areas in question along Md. Route 193. She asked Assistant Director of Public Works Lesley Riddle to look into the matter.

Roberts called Pepco's proposal a "scorched earth policy." He thought the amount of trimming planned was unnecessary for a residential area. He said the electrical wires in the questioned area were higher than normal and that the trees probably would not grow up to them. He thought this case called for some "tree hugging," he said.

Beauchamp's report to council also mentioned Pepco's planned use of pesticides on the stumps after tree removal. Davis asked Riddle to also discuss this subject with Pepco subcontractors in light of the city's stance on avoiding such chemical use.

### GCAN Legislative Agenda Draws Large, Engaged Crowd

The screech of metal chairs on linoleum filled the room as extra seats were added to accommodate the crowd at the first Greenbelt Climate Action Network (GCAN) meeting of the new year. More than 30 people, many of them new to GCAN, gathered at the Community Center on Tuesday, January 22 to discuss the 2013 environmental agenda for the Maryland legislature.

Slides of frogs, families and farmers flashed across the screen as Dannielle Lipinski from the Maryland League of Conservation Voters explained that protecting water quality and the Chesapeake Bay will continue to be a top priority for environmental groups. Campaigns will include keeping closer tabs on pesticides through a reporting database, placing a fee on plastic and paper bags and passing a bottle bill deposit law. The groups will also be working to ensure proper funding and implementation for water quality measures passed last year.

### Wind Power

Prospects look good for an offshore wind power bill that passed the Maryland House but has been stalled in the Senate. According to Lipinski, the project is "the only serious manufacturing program for Maryland" and will "look like a toothpick" some 10 to 12 miles off the coast of Ocean City. Tactics for advancing a solar energy bill were also discussed.

The audience had questions, comments or strategic suggestions on every issue, so Lipinski breezed through her presentation, noting, "You people really know this stuff."

### Fracking

The liveliest discussion centered around the issue of fracking, a controversial drilling method used to extract natural gas from shale rock deep underground. Mayor Judith Davis opened the conversation with a report on the challenges she faced trying to pass "even a very watered down" fracking resolution through the National League of Cities. She warned her constituents that "the going will be tough" because Maryland's diverse geography encompasses "the same differing interests and opinions" she had confronted at the national

Maryland Delegate Heather Mizeur, known in the halls of the statehouse as "the fracking woman," had people on the edge of their seats as she described the political wrangling in Annapolis surrounding a fracking moratorium. She explained oil and gas industry tactics to "snooker landowners" into allowing fracking on their property with no protection for health, land or water.

She condemned a 2005 Dick Cheney and Halliburton scheme that exempted fracking from federal water protection laws. "We are the only state that sits on shale gas rock that isn't already drilling," said Mizeur.

### Water on Fire

She described other states as experiencing well water catching fire, increased seismic activity and livestock and horses dropping dead. She promised to continue leading the fight to keep a moratorium on fracking until health and environmental studies have been completed and fully analyzed. Senator Paul Pinsky is a lead cosponsor on a bill to legislate a moratorium.

"No studies, no fracking," Mizeur said. Lawmakers close to the oil and gas industry have blocked funding for the studies but Governor Martin O'Malley's new budget includes more than \$1.5 million to begin studying the issue. "Your sustained engagement is what will help us succeed," Delegate Mizeur told the group.

As the crowd broke up, people signed petitions and postcards to their lawmakers and arranged carpooling to several upcoming rallies in Annapolis and Washington.

A perplexing conflict arose, however, between a Polar Bear Plunge to call attention to climate change and a celebratory winter walk in the woods to honor the 10-year anniversary of Greenbelt's Forest Preserve, both scheduled for January 26. It seems there will be plenty to keep environmentalists busy in 2013.

### Low-cost Cat Spaying Program Is Available

A joint promotion of PetSmart Charities, Last Chance Animal Rescue and the new Prince George's SPCA-affiliated county Animal Shelter, The Spay Spot, at 8210 D'Arcy Road in Forestville will make low-cost cat spaying available through the month of February.

This is a chance to curb cat reproduction in advance of the usual heat cycle, preventing unwanted litters from being born. Animal shelters refer to spring time as "kitten season" because that is when they receive the largest influx numbers of unwanted litters, making them hard to adopt. A special "Beat the Heat" promotion will spay female cats for a special rate of \$20. A maximum of 500 sterilizations is covered in the "Beat the Heat" program.

Spaying and neutering is safe for kittens as young as eight to 10 weeks old, according to the American Veterinary Medical Association. Spaying a female cat before its first heat cycle can be beneficial, because the procedure is also known to improve the health of the pet and reduce risks for certain reproductive cancers and infections. Female cats can have as many as three litters a year; kittens can breed as young as four months old.

To schedule an appointment, county residents (Prince George's and Charles County) should call 301-254-8151 and mention the "Beat the Heat" promotion.
