Drains, Playgrounds, Pepco and Cats Are Topics for GHI and the Council

Storm water drainage, the replacement of water piping by the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission (WSSC), encroachment, playground improvements, roaming cats, Greenbelt's Green Team, work by Pepco, natural disaster aid, the GHI open house, unauthorized rentals and unoccupied houses were topics for discussion at the Greenbelt City Council annual stakeholder meeting with Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (GHI) on Wednesday, June 12.

Storm Water Drainage

The buildup of storm water in a city park area bounded by 56 Crescent Road, 33 Ridge Road and 1 Gardenway has been a problem throughout the history of GHI.

Although there are storm drains, water is unable to get to them. Sidewalks flood during heavy rainfall, with all the water flowing downhill to one location.

GHI Secretary Ed James noted that vegetation in cracks between the sidewalks contributes to puddles by blocking the water flow.

City Manager Michael McLaughlin and GHI General Manager Eldon Ralph have agreed to meet in order to discuss remedies.

WSSC Piping

Talks with the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission (WSSC) regarding the proposed replacement of the water piping in GHI masonry homes have come to a standstill.

GHI has inquired about the WSSC's long-term plans for both the masonry and frame homes in GHI but is still awaiting a response.

"Before meeting with WSSC, we feel that we should look at this from a holistic standpoint," Ralph said. "Anything we agree to with masonry homes can affect what happens to framework GHI is also waiting for answers to questions about repairs and meters. GHI wants WSSC to remove water meters from crawl spaces in order to make them more accessible. Currently meters go for too long without being read because they are hard to get to, Ralph said.

Once WSSC responds, a GHI task force will make a recommendation to the GHI board about the position the housing cooperative should take.

GHI wants a good understanding of what WSSC will do about frame homes, which make up 992 of GHI's 1,600 homes, before moving forward.

Piping was last replaced in the early 1980s, with the exception of piping on Ridge Road, replaced in 1951, and on Southway, which was replaced in 1960.

Mayor Judith Davis said council would be willing to participate in discussions with GHI and WSSC, noting that the impasse is affecting some repairs in the rest of the city.

Rights-of-Way

Four buildings on GHI property currently encroach on city rights-of-way. This came about due to the federal government dedicating the rights-of-way for city streets based upon design plans rather than field surveys of what actually was built and affected a number of GHI properties. The GHI board asked the city to re-designate the right-ofway at five locations and between 2009 and 2012 GHI and the city have worked on removing the encroachment on Crescent Road.

The main obstacle to remedy-

ing these encroachments is the amount of time it takes to complete the process of re-designating the right-of-way boundaries. In the case of Crescent Road, this has required three years.

"We are fully aware of the encroachment issue and also how long it takes," Davis said.

Ralph said there isn't much that can be done to streamline the inherently long process, although utility companies are often the slowest parties to approve the changes. It was agreed that the city will discuss the process with the utility companies in stakeholder meetings in an effort to ensure their reviews proceed as quickly as possible.

As GHI Board of Directors member Chuck Hess said, the city and GHI have an understanding of the process thanks to the Crescent Road project. Both parties are aware of the issue and are working to make progress.

Playground Improvement

GHI has requested plans from the city for future playground improvements so the cooperative can begin budgeting. Under a 2005 easement agreement, GHI must pay 25 percent of the total cost of new playground equipment and materials installed in playgrounds located on GHI property. In return, GHI then gives access to the public in exchange for city maintenance.

The current discussion regards the resurfacing of the Laurel Hill playground. An objection from a Greenbelt resident to the use of rubber mulch has interrupted

City's Emergency Fund Needs Community Help

In a letter last week to city religious, civic and community organizations, City Manager Michael McLaughlin alerted the organizations that the city's emergency eviction relief fund is nearly depleted. In the letter he noted a large number of requests in the past year and that there is a need for residents, faith communities and other Greenbelt organizations to contribute to the fund so Greenbelt residents in need can be helped.

The fund was established by the city in 1992 to provide relief for residents with temporary housing problems (e.g., the inability to pay one month of rent or a mortgage payment). The purpose of the fund is to help Greenbelters faced with homelessness and

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The funds are managed by Greenbelt's director of Social Services, who takes steps to verify the requests and authorizes disbursements from the emergency fund. No city funds are contributed and the fund relies entirely on the generosity of Greenbelt residents and organizations.

Open Forum on Health Care Held in Greenbelt at ERHS

District 22 Delegate Alonzo T. Washington, in conjunction with the Democratic Central Committee of Prince George's County, hosted a health care forum on Wednesday, June 12 at Eleanor Roosevelt High School in Greenbelt.

Joining Washington on the panel were Jonathan Kromm of the governor's Office of Health Care Reform; Dourakine Rosarion from the Department of Health and Human Services of Montgomery County; Joy Hatchette of the Maryland Insurance Administration; Maryland Delegate Melony G. Griffith; and Pamela Creekmur of the Prince George's County Department of

2020, Kromm said.

The Medicaid expansion will also include full Medicaid benefits for adults under 138 percent of the federal poverty level.

Kromm stressed that everyone currently uncovered should apply immediately for health care coverage during the next year.

Hatchette debunked a common myth of the ACA, that it is not destroying Medicare. Instead the ACA makes improvements to Medicare. Employees will still be able to be covered by their employers. In addition, individuals without an insurance plan now have a way to gain a health plan with better benefits and protections than would have been available before. "Be happy and be proud," Hatchette said in response to the effect she felt the ACA will bring to Maryland. She conceded that the cost of Medicare for the upcoming year is unknown at this time. The forum allowed each panelist to address the audience and ended with a question and answer session.

Kromm began the panel session with a lengthy presentation on the Affordable Care Act (ACA) – otherwise known as Obamacare. He discussed the four pillars of the ACA: stronger insurance coverage, expanded access to health insurance and care, making insurance coverage affordable and controlling costs while improving quality of insurance.

Kromm also shed light on the state's Medicaid expansion targets. By next year his department is striving to add new coverage for 128,000 currently uncovered Marylanders. The number will increase by 7,000 the next year and then to 187,000 newly covered Marylanders by

Wood Chips Make Sense

As a mother it just makes sense to have a playground that

is safe if your child falls and safe from cancer causing chemicals.

Huge mushrooms were growing at the Laurel Hill playground due to lack of maintenance and as I write this letter there is standing water filled with mosquito larvae. If the wood mulch were cared for properly, it would not get moldy or grow mushrooms. This is the issue being skirted around. In the city council meeting all agreed that proper maintenance would address the wood chip mold issue. How about putting in a rain garden, installing proper drainage to the area and replacing the wood chips as recommended. Why is it taking so long?

I detailed the significant science in my letters to the city council. Serious concerns about tires in children's playgrounds have been expressed by Environmental Health Doctors, Toxicologists and Water Safety Groups.

A Poured in Place surface contains the same chemicals and more as the shredded tire mulch surface. Both off-gas PAHs which are known carcinogens when inhaled. Both contain 30 hazardous chemicals according

the process. Currently the city is considering different types of playground surface materials.

Concerns about rubber mulch have to do with the potential for the rubber to emit gas fumes that some believe to be carcinogenic.

Both council and the GHI board have noted that research on the issue is inconclusive.

Wood carpet or engineered wood chips is an alternative favored by those who oppose rubber mulch. However, this material develops spores and mold when wet and would have to be raked and dried after rain, as well as be replaced more often, Davis said. It also does not absorb shock as well as rubber, making it less safe.

Council's favored option is poured-in-place rubber, which is more durable. In testing, it emitted less gas than rubber mulch, although "off-gassing" for both stayed in background levels.

Poured-in-place rubber is more expensive, and will raise the cost previously agreed to by GHI and the city.

The mayor said the discussion will continue at the city council meeting in July.

Playground projects are planned at Green Spring Park, a replacement of the existing city park in 2014, and a new city park at Belle Point, marked for 2015. Also slated for a playground is 8 Court Southway, but council said that may not happen until the 2016 fiscal year.

Roaming Cats

The city is working on attempting to stop companion animals such as cats from roaming in Greenbelt in an attempt to prevent disease, car accidents and bird and vole deaths. Complaints have come from GHI residents and others about roaming cats. It is against the city law to allow a cat to roam. If a complaint is filed about a roaming animal, the city Animal Control will put out a trap to capture the animal. If it is not claimed after being trapped, it will be put up for adoption. Young feral cats will be socialized before adoption. The City of Greenbelt does not euthanize trapped cats. It is not licensed to trap wild animals.

Green Team

The Green Team is the last step in Greenbelt's process to become a Sustainable Maryland Certified Community. The GHI board, which previously nomiing GreenACEs to help with the Green Team.

The aim was to unite members from a variety of categories, including the business community and apartment complexes, but the formation of the group has been met with little support from community members. Only three people so far have applied for the team.

Once the Green Team is created, the city will be able to apply for certification, which will allow it to apply for grants and funding that would not otherwise be available.

Pepco

The GHI board reported that they have been satisfied with Pepco's current work in the area. The utility company has been replacing poles and wires.

GHI is considering beautification plans in the affected areas, including replanting trees.

GHI credited the preplanning done by City Planner Celia Craze and the collaboration between the city and GHI with helping the project to go smoothly.

Pepco is prepared to wrap up work by August, they reported. **FEMA Aid**

Council followed up on the issue of disaster relief aid in GHI. The mayor had received a response from Senator Barbara Mikulski on the issue.

FEMA does not supply aid to condominiums or co-ops, so GHI would not be eligible for assistance in case of an emergency. However, residents would be able to apply for funds for the contents of their homes.

Senator Barbara Mikulski responded to a letter from Davis, confirming that FEMA would not assist the co-op and saying that she shared Greenbelt's concerns about expanding emergency assistance coverage.

GHI Open House

On Sunday, June 9 GHI held an open house showcasing 20 of 70 homes currently for sale. Based on anecdotes from participating realtors, the board said the open house was successful. The realtors noted that prices are stabilizing and that the housing market has seen an uptick in volume.

GHI plans to hold two open houses per year. The next is slated for the Sunday after Labor Day.

New Policies

GHI reported that it is worknated Director of Maintenance ing on curbing unauthorized rentals and subleasing. They also set up a smoke-free building policy. The organization is working on addressing the problem of unoccupied homes. Sometimes when residents die, marry or move unexpectedly, the homes continue to be paid for but are not lived in. GHI Board President Susan Ready said they are aware of the problem.

Not only is this a problem in they're not getting the proper treatment; it also is what is driving health care prices up, Griffith said.

to the EPA's own study. Both contain endocrine disrupting chemicals that can be absorbed through our skin. Both leach zinc into the water table at levels that can be "toxic to aquatic organisms." Frogs are the canaries in the coal mine. And if it hurts frogs (bad enough)

. . . then shouldn't we wonder what it is doing to our children?

The Consumer Protection Safety Commission says that it cannot regulate lead levels in play surfaces because they are used by citizens over 12 years old. Does this make sense to you? One seventh of the EPA study playground samples had high levels of lead which would recall a toy from our stores. Apparently it is OK to have lead in our playgrounds but not our toys? Kids use playgrounds. The sign at the new playground says the slides are for kids under 12 years old. Kids crawl on it, rub it and eat snacks on it. Playgrounds should not have lead dust. Seems like common sense to me.

The EPA did not show up at the worksession. Perhaps it is because they publicly have stated their study is "too small to apply" to all surfaces? Perhaps it's because they currently are under fire on the issue? I think you would be hard pressed to find any doctor that defends using tires or styrene, butadiene or ethylene propylene diene monomer in a playground. So far it is only the playground companies and rubber industry groups that say such chemicals in a play area are safe. The EPA never says anywhere that such fields are "safe."

Furthermore, I just read a recent study of 32 playgrounds surfaced in recycled tires and only 10 met that state's standard for "head impact safety" to reduce brain injury. In contrast, all surfaces made of wood chips met the safety standard.

Our government does not have the best track record on dealing with these health issues. Usually it takes years for action to be taken. Why wait? Research is showing that even at 77 degrees these tires off-gas dangerous fumes. If doctors are concerned and taking action, then shouldn't we parents be concerned? This just makes sense to me.

I never thought that my first letter would stall the playground from opening and I apologize to all the kids (including mine) who are waiting to play on it and, frankly, pretty upset. Why is this taking months? It seems sensible to put in a safe surface and care for it. No mushrooms. No mold. No chemicals.

Traffic Enforcement Gains Police Excellence Award

The Greenbelt Police Department was named the winner in its size category for a prestigious Maryland Law Enforcement Challenge Award. Co-sponsored by the Maryland Chiefs of Police Association, the Maryland Sheriff's Association and the Maryland Highway Safety Office, the Maryland Law Enforcement Challenge promotes increased enforcement among Maryland police agencies and both recognizes and honors those that excel in traffic safety enforcement.

The award is made for the best overall traffic enforcement programs in the State of Maryland in areas of concentration that include enforcement of traffic laws, education about occupant protection, impaired driving prevention and speeding enforcement. Agencies submit an application documenting their efforts and effectiveness in the areas. Winning safety programs are those combining officer training, public information and enforcement to reduce crashes and injuries within each competing jurisdiction.

A panel of traffic safety experts reviews each application and assigns points based on the program's criteria; then the scores are averaged and a final score assigned, establishing the ranks earned. The judges are members of the law enforcement or public safety community with demonstrated advanced knowledge of highway safety initiatives.




"New" Flag Is Flown In Prince Geroge's

As of last Friday, June 14 and Flag Day 2013, a special "new" but very old flag is flying at a number of Prince George's County locations - one with the 15 stars and 15 stripes - of the design in use during the War of 1812.

Next year, 2014, is the big celebration of the 200th anniversary of the end of that war in December 1814 and the county is planning a number of events that specially recognize Prince George's County's pivotal role in that war with much focus on the Battle of Bladensburg

The rollout started with Flag Dav in June, the month the 32-month war against Great Britain was declared, with the historic flags appearing at county office buildings, municipal buildings and 21 of them to be flown at National Harbor. Sponsors for the historic flag project include the Anacostia Trails Heritage Area, Inc.'s Maryland Milestones, the Battle of Bladensburg Task Force, the county executive's office and the Prince George's County Committee on the War of 1812. 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
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Crazy Quilt Brings Out a Crowd
