

City Advisory Groups Nix Curfew, Discuss Windsor Green's Concerns

Based on an April 2012 letter from the Windsor Green Board of Directors that petitioned council to reconsider adopting a youth curfew law for Greenbelt, the issue was referred to the Community Relations Board, Youth Advisory Committee and the Public Safety Advisory Board and sought advice from City Solicitor Robert Manzi, who also advises the Police Department. Their reports were considered by the Greenbelt City Council at its August 19 worksession.

The Windsor Green community discussion began in 2011 based on concerns about increased crime in their neighborhoods and teenagers, particularly nonresidents, congregating in the vicinity of Canning Terrace and Mandan Road in the evening. Windsor Green was not satisfied with initial responses from the City. Of concern to the city is its lack of ability to enforce Prince George's County curfew regulations.

The three city advisory boards have provided their recommenda-

tions to council and additional history was provided by the police. Joining the council and Assistant City Manager David Moran at the worksession were police Captain Carl Schinner; Matt Inzeo, Dr. Laura Kressler and Stan Zerkin of the Public Safety Advisory Board; Lola Skolnik from the Park and Recreation Advisory Board; and Windsor Green community resident Edith Beauchamp.

Following introductions and a brief history of the issues by the mayor, Beauchamp described the issues raised by the Windsor Green community as a general concern with vandalism, loitering and people congregating where they should not be. She indicated that a city curfew may not be the only solution but the community is looking for a "real" solution to address their concerns. She also said the Windsor Green community at the edge of Greenbelt's eastern boundary and their recreation facilities were attractive gathering places in the

evening and later at night for nonresidents.

Advisory Committee

The Youth Advisory Committee completed its review in October 2012 and unanimously advised council it did not see a need for a city-wide curfew law. The committee's reasons were:

- Potential [that] a curfew would increase tensions between youth not engaged in illegal activity, Greenbelt police and city officials.

- Equitable enforcement and profiling of youth not engaged in illegal activity and concern about how consistently the curfew would be enforced in each part of Greenbelt.

- Need for exploring alternative options that would provide city youth a positive outlet such as a sponsored movie night.

- Research offered little data regarding a curfew's effect on youth psychosocial development.

It's Never Too Early to Register To Vote in 2013 City Election

Don't be left on the sidelines! Filing to run for city council, signing a petition for a candidate for city council or voting in the election require being registered to vote in Prince George's County at a residence address within the corporate limits of the City of Greenbelt. For those not registered, the deadline is Monday, October 7 for registering to vote in the November 5 Greenbelt City Council election.

Registrations must be received by the Prince George's County Board of Elections no later than 4:30 p.m. at 16201 Trade Zone Avenue in Upper Marlboro. Would-be voters are advised not to wait until the last minute.

Verify Registration

All those newly registered can call the county Board of Elections at 301-430-8020 if they have not received a voter notification card within three weeks of registering and others also can check their registration online on the website for the Board of Elections in the county (princegeorgescountymd.gov) or state (elections.state.md.us).

While this information will confirm the voter's residence address users should be aware that the polling place listed on these sites will be those used for state and county elections, not for city

elections. The only exception for those living in Precinct 3, who vote at the Greenbelt Community Center for all elections.

Eligibility to Register

Besides residing at an address within the city limits at the time of registration, a potential voter wishing to register for the 2013 Greenbelt election must be a U.S. citizen whose birthdate is no later than November 5, 1995. If a court rules persons incapable of voting by reason of mental disability, they are not eligible to register.

Also, no one is allowed to register who has been convicted of buying or selling votes. Persons may register who have been convicted of other felonies if they have completed their court-ordered sentence of imprisonment, including required parole or probation.

How to Register

There are many ways to register to vote in Maryland – online, by mail or in person.

Register online at the state Board of Elections site using Maryland's Online Voter Registration System (OLVR) which requires a name, date of birth and identification number matching information on file with the Maryland Motor Vehicles Administration (MVA). The signature

on file at the MVA will become the official voter registration signature.

Anyone who has neither a valid Maryland driver's license nor a substitute MVA-issued ID card must complete a paper registration form and either mail it to the county Board of Elections or deliver it in person to the office of the county board in Upper

GreenACES Aims Toward Greenest Festival Possible

Greenbelters currently recycle more than half of their waste material. That's pretty awesome but GreenACES is challenging fairgoers to keep improving. One way to educate and encourage recycling is to raise awareness during the Labor Day Festival.

The Greenbelt Advisory Committee on Environmental Sustainability (GreenACES) and Public Works are working together to make the festival as green as possible. Trash and recycling bins will be placed side by side. Food vendors will provide mostly recyclable dinnerware. Volunteers wearing a little green turtle or frog pendant (and maybe green face paint) will encourage people to put recycling and refuse in the correct bin and will be available for questions and suggestions.

If one's waste is recyclable – and most will be – discard it into a recycling bin, not the trash can, but only recyclables. The chart on the recycling bins will show recyclable items in green and the few that can't be in red. Some things are recyclable in one community and not others.

We are charged \$59 per ton to send trash to the landfill, while we are getting money back from

our recyclables. If we save money on trash collection by recycling, we can use the savings for other city programs and activities.

Festival vendors are going greener too. With styrofoam banned this year at the festival and city-sponsored events, vendors have turned to more environmentally friendly materials to serve food and drinks. Fairgoers should thank the vendors for their "green" efforts.

GreenACES is trying a couple of new things this year. One is the "Catch You Recycling!" game with random winners announced. GreenACES also is working with the Outstanding Citizen Committee to provide reusable plates and cups for its reception. Some food vendors will separate out food preparation scraps – a small group of volunteers will collect the scraps each day and compost them in Greenbelt.

Recycling Volunteers

GreenACES still needs volunteers to stand near recycling and trash bins to encourage people to "recycle the recyclables" and "trash the trash." Other creative approaches are welcome. We encourage people to wear green.

Celebrating Labor Day

As we celebrate Greenbelt's biggest festival of the year this weekend, let's not forget the origins of Labor Day. The national holiday, first recognized in 1894, took decades to establish as a day to recognize the contributions of American workers to a prosperous economy and their role in the struggle for workplace justice.

One of labor's biggest battles in the late 19th century was for the eight-hour workday, an effort that was born in the aftermath of the Civil War when workers saw evidence of employers enjoying large profits from wartime production and slicing wages to the bone. People fought and died in the eight-hour day movement, which reached a tragic climax at Haymarket in Chicago in 1886. Workers finally won the eight-hour day in 1919.

In 1963 in the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom, industrial unions like the United Auto Workers and the United Steel Workers gave critical support to the march and Walter Reuther of the AFL-CIO was invited to speak at the event.

With an eye to the past and the awareness of the continuing need for jobs at a living wage for all workers, here's hoping we keep the "Labor" in Labor Day.

Loud Band Season

Shortly we will be enjoying our annual Labor Day Festival but will be revisiting the problem of band loudness.

"So, who cares if the Labor Day Festival bands are kind of loud – you can just leave if you don't like it." "If you think it's too loud just use some earplugs." "What are you, some kind of sound wimp or something?" "But I enjoy it really loud – especially when it shakes the tables!" Such is what we complainers tend to hear.

But does science say that extreme sound levels damage hearing? Yes, just do a search on "NIOSH safe hearing levels" for example.

But how can I judge when the sound level might be damaging?

1. When it sounds loud 25 feet or more away from the speakers.
2. When it is difficult to talk with others.
3. When person(s) are holding hands over their ears.
4. When one feels ear pain.
5. When one has temporary or longer-lasting ringing in the ears or poorer hearing after an event.

However, if you do have a sound-level meter and it is averaging a reading about 87 deci-

bels then you can listen safely for up to four hours. But if it's reading 100 decibels, then that reduces to only 15 minutes. And for a younger child, that would be only 5 to 10 minutes due to incomplete development of their hearing organs. Unfortunately some bands are playing almost continuously for up to four hours averaging 100 decibels or more, depending on where one is seated.

Noise levels above 140 dB are not considered safe for even less than 1 second duration. And for children the World Health Organization recommends NO exposure above 120 dB. But when there is speaker feedback, pops or static due to a dropped microphone, bad wiring, etc., the sound level near the speaker will sometimes exceed 120 decibels for a few seconds or less. I have met one person who has had his hearing permanently damaged by such an incident.

If you feel that any band's volume level is too high, let the sound man, venue manager, event arranger and anyone else in charge know.

As for just wearing earplugs, that piece of "wisdom" is not the caring for each other that Greenbelt is built upon.

Obituaries

Miles Doan

Former Lakecrest Drive resident Miles Doan died at Charlotte Hall Veterans Home on August 14, 2013.

He was born to Thomas and Marion Doan on June 1, 1923, in Berwick, Pa.

He lived in Greenbelt from 2001 until moving to Charlotte Hall Veterans Home in 2009.

Mr. Doan was a printer's apprentice before joining the Army in February 1941 and had falsified his birth date by six months in order to join. He trained in Indiantown Gap Military Reservation in Pennsylvania and was assigned to the 28th Division 291st Refrig unit. He was sent to Wales in August 1943 and reassigned to the 109th Infantry, participating in the opening waves of Higgins boats landing on Omaha Beach for the D-Day invasion. He was also involved in campaigns in Normandy (Omaha Beach), France (Battle of the Bulge) and central Europe (three other campaigns) and received a Silver Star, two Bronze Stars, a Purple Heart, five major campaign ribbons, the French Croix de Guerre and the combat infantry badge, of which he was very proud.

At his discharge from the Army in December 1945 he went to work as a carpenter's apprentice and became a master carpenter working for the State Department and the White House. Mr. Doan built the under-desk drawer that President Nixon used to record the Watergate conversations.

Raymond J. Hibbs

Former Greenbelter Raymond J. Hibbs, an electrical engineer who retired from NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center, died Sunday, August 18, 2013. It was the day after his 87th birthday and three days before he and his wife Shirley would have celebrated their 65th wedding anniversary.

Ray and Shirley moved to Greenbelt in October 1964 from Haddon Heights, N.J., with their six children. He was born in Collingswood, N.J., on August 17, 1926. He and Shirley met after his service with the Navy in World War II. They married on August 21, 1948.

While working with General Electric in Philadelphia, he received his engineering degree from Drexel Institute of Technology (now Drexel University) in

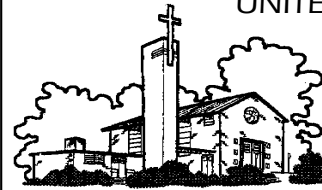

In early 2013 the Public Safety Advisory Committee advised council it did not feel a curfew law would improve the way the police department deals with potential juvenile offenders at this time and recommended against the adoption of such a law or ordinance. The committee also reviewed all of the information gathered during the 1999-2001 consideration for the application of curfews in Greenbelt made by the Windsor Green community.

The Community Relations Advisory Board told council that it found that curfew laws have been generally overturned by the courts. Also, a curfew law would apply to juveniles (under age 17) while some of the public safety problems experienced in Greenbelt are caused by adults. They also noted that the Prince George's County State's Attorney's Office does not prosecute under the county's existing curfew law.

The committee listed other strategies that could be implemented to address the Windsor Green concerns, including:

- Revitalize Neighbor Watch Program
- Encourage residents to call police and report suspicious activity
- Conduct police saturation patrols and traffic stops
- Post/improve signage at playgrounds and park areas stating rules and expectations
- Improve/upgrade outdoor lighting
- Continue periodic meetings between Windsor Green, Chelsea Woods, Greenbelt police and county police
- Consider removing the basketball court at Mandan Field and trimming some of the trees to make the area more visible

Police Review, Experience

In addition to the advisory committee reports, the worksession packet contained a history of the 1999-2001 community discussions on applying a curfew in Greenbelt. Much of that information was compiled by Schinner and the Police Department staff. The history showed that applying an age-related curfew in Greenbelt was problematical from

a legal standpoint. In addition, Schinner indicated that, based on their experience in responding to Windsor Green calls, the department is not seeing activity that would warrant a curfew approach. Later in the meeting Schinner reiterated that most individuals the police arrest are not residents of Greenbelt. For the Windsor Green area there have been six calls since April 2012 and they are not aware of any increase in call volume in Greenbelt East. However, the police are working on improvements to help them research call histories in Greenbelt neighborhoods.

Schinner also indicated the department could improve its patrol strategies in neighborhoods where suspicious activities are reported, such as advising patrols responding to reports to park their vehicle and approach the area on foot to get a better sense of the activity taking place. He would also look at other patrol strategies. Council discussion reflected much of the history and the more recent activities focused on Greenbelt East neighborhoods. There was support for improved lighting and signage at the recreation areas and for improved reporting on patrol activity and reports by the Police Department back to the neighborhood associations.

Further collaboration between Windsor Green and the neighboring Chelsea Woods community along with the Greenbelt and county police was encouraged. Schinner also emphasized that Windsor Green has authorized the Greenbelt Police to act as agents for their community, which can be an effective deterrent for criminal activity when it is posted.

Encouraging the development of other activities directed to youth that would provide more positive outcomes was discussed. The Youth Advisory Committee idea of alternative outlets such as a sponsored movie night was also supported by some.

Davis indicated council action on the issue will be scheduled at a future regular meeting and the groups will be advised. She also noted there were no "information items."

Marlboro by the October 7 deadline. This form cannot be faxed or emailed because it requires an original signature.

Voter registration forms may be downloaded and printed from the state Board of Elections site. Hard copies are also available at City Clerk Cindy Murray's office in the Municipal Building at 25 Crescent Road, as well as at the Greenbelt Library at 11 Crescent Road.

If picking up a form is not possible, call the county Board of Elections office at 301-430-8020 and ask for one by mail. In addition to the county Board of Elections office, voter registration forms may also be completed and submitted at any full-service MVA office.

Registration Changes

Registered Maryland voters are no longer required to re-register if they move to a new address within the state, even if they are crossing county lines. Address or name updates to existing registrations can be made using the same methods used for registering.

Changes may be made online using the OLV system at the state Board of Elections site if one has a Maryland driver's license or MVA identification card. Changes also may be made using a voter registration form mailed to the county Board of Elec-

tions or submitted in person by October 7.

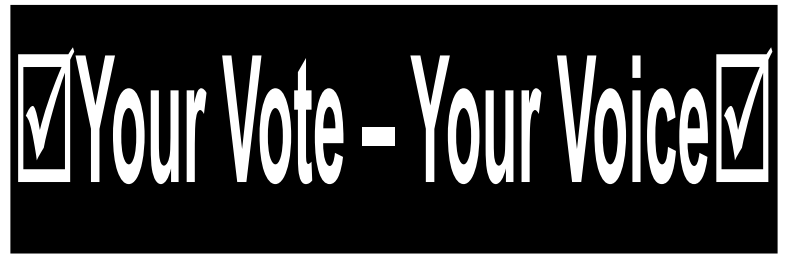
Such changes also may be made by simply writing a signed letter to the county Board of Elections. Completing a change of address form at the MVA also will send the change to the county for processing, unless the voter asks that this not be done.

Party Affiliation

Greenbelt's city council elections are nonpartisan, which means there are no primary elections, no party designations and no slates. A resident has the option, however, of registering with any of the state's recognized political parties for the purposes of voting in partisan primaries in national, state and county elections.

The political parties currently recognized in Maryland include the Democratic, Republican, Libertarian and Green parties. Choosing no political party results in an "unaffiliated" registration, which means the voter can vote in general elections but not usually in primary elections other than nonpartisan primaries in a local jurisdiction—for example, to select nominees for school board elections.

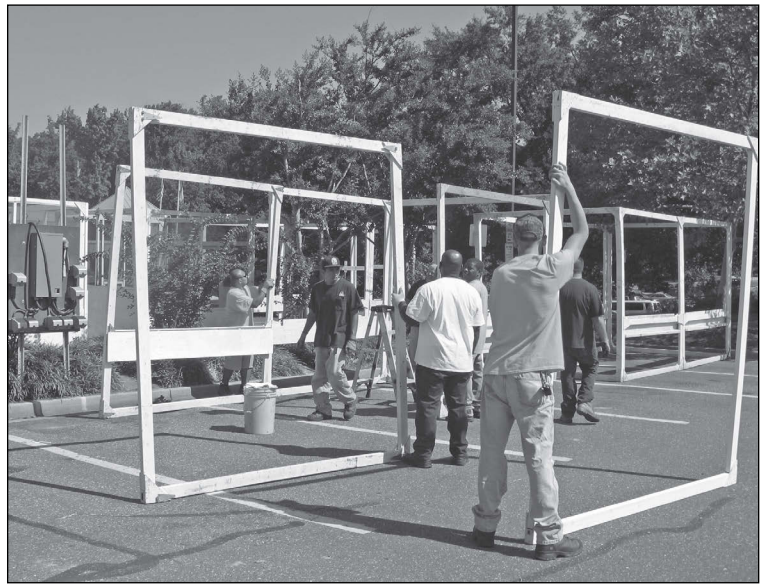

In the past, some vendors went far beyond expectations and served food on plates and with utensils made from biodegradable corn or soybeans.

• The foam food and beverage containers many restaurants provide for take-out, leftovers and hot drinks are made from petrochemicals?

Affordable alternatives are readily available made from renewable paper products.

Although typically more expensive, some food containers and utensils are made from corn or soybeans. These products are not recyclable, but are biodegradable and may be composted in a commercial composting operation, though Greenbelt does not currently have such an operation.

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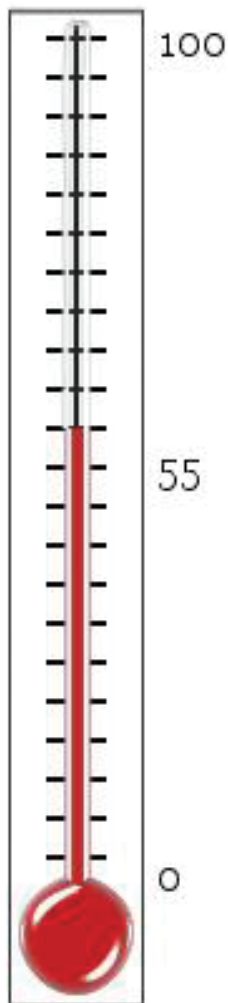
Greenbelters Run Show at PG Little Theatre

"Mistaken Mulberries"

Trees do not often make the News Review front page, certainly not paired with "special" and "support" so it was with great interest that I read the article last week by Barbara Hopkins, "Council Expresses Concern for Special Tree Support," regarding efforts by Greenbelt staff, the Advisory Committee on Trees and Bartlett Tree Experts to save the impressive mulberry specimen at Buddy Attick Park. I am quite familiar, as are many Greenbelters, with this beautiful multi-stemmed specimen whose spreading bower graces the walking path near the dam. Unfortunately, I have to point out a glaring, yet far too common, identification error that is being perpetuated. The mulberry in question is most definitely a male form of the invasive white mulberry (*Morus alba*) from China. My colleague at the U.S. National Arboretum, taxonomist Dr. Alan T. Whittemore, a Greenbelt resident familiar with the tree, confirms its identity.

White mulberry has been cultivated for nearly 3,000 years in

China as the food source for the silkworm and hence, silk production. It was for this purpose that the species was introduced by the Spanish to Mexico and the English to Virginia, in the early 16th and 17th centuries, respectively. Our native red mulberry (*Morus rubra*), while found throughout much of the United States from Texas north to Wisconsin and into New England, is indeed uncommon in our area. Red mulberry is, despite evidence to the contrary, easy to distinguish from the invasive white mulberry. As pointed out in the article, fruit color is not diagnostic, as the white mulberry will have fruit that ranges from white or pink to the more common dark red-purple. The most diagnostic feature is actually the leaves. The leaves of red mulberry are a dull, matte green and are rough to the touch, not unlike sandpaper, owing to the upper leaf surface being covered in dense hairs. The lower surface is densely covered in hairs but these are generally soft to the touch. The invasive white mulberry has dark green, glossy leaves that are smooth to the touch, with only a trace of hair along the leaf veins on the lower surface. The leaves look as though they have been waxed and shine in the sun. There are other important features; however, the leaf traits are so diagnostic that once they are understood, one shouldn't mistake the two. We have seen a plant in College Park on BARC research property and a small, remnant population at the U.S. National Arboretum in Washington, D.C. It is typically an understory tree, with a horizontal branching and growth habit, and is quite beautiful and distinct.

One final but important note is that mulberry pollen is a severe allergen and is used in pollen counts reported during allergy season. This combined with the invasive nature of white mulberry, puts the tree low on my desiderata list for urban landscapes. Unfortunately, we have far too many of this invasive tree species in Greenbelt. While I think the white mulberry at Buddy Attick Park is an impressive specimen, I think the above facts may affect the justification used by the city for saving it.

too long. In 1963, those of us who marched had a very strong sense of purpose, urgency and hope. We knew this was our time to march, to boycott and to demand our rights as citizens of America. At that time the crowd was ethnically mixed but mostly Black American.

2013

This year the crowd's diversity and multicultural representation demonstrated clearly the frustration and economic needs of many Americans.

All speakers mentioned the Supreme Court attack on the voting rights act, the need to end racial profiling and they warned as well against the country's growing economic disparity. Few, however, offered viable solutions.

I felt the call for and support of immigration reform, acknowledged by the very diversity of the audience. One irony was that some former civil rights speakers turned politicians (such as D.C. Councilmember Marion Barry and D.C. Mayor Vincent Gray) now face dissatisfied constituents who believe that these leaders have failed to support a living-wage bill and have allowed developers to destabilize older African American communities.

Lessons learned from the Montgomery boycott were not mentioned, however, such as an economic boycott of states and cities that do racial profiling, have stand-your-ground rules or harass immigrants.

The 2013 speakers were unable to offer a viable plan of action to address the economic and educational opportunity concerns of young people. Speakers urged the audience over and over again to vote.

The problem is that most of those who are eligible did indeed vote. But those for whom they voted then changed the eligibility rules for obtaining federal student loans, thus preventing many students from completing college and threatening the continuation of historically black higher education institutions. They also did not stop sequestration, leaving many people in dire economic straits.

My sense now is that the door to educational, social and economic advancement is being closed and that we are headed back into the past. I left the march not feeling hopeful or inspired but determined to work to help young people advance because it is their future and ours that is at stake.
