claimed film. "However, many local rock and roll fans and researchers contend that it never took place because there is no existing documentation to corroborate the event."

Opsasnick said Silver Spring filmmaker Jeff Krulik – best known for his documentary Heavy Metal Parking Lot - read his book and wanted to investigate. Krulik's movie probes this mystery, as he pursues reports about the elusive concert. "When he decided to make this the subject of a documentary, I was the first person he (Krulik)

contacted for information," said Opsasnick. "I appear on screen throughout the film, telling how I heard of the concert and providing details that were provided to me by my sources."

Opsasnick - who also authored The Lizard King was Here: the Life and Times of Jim Morrison in Alexandria, Va., and The Real Story Behind the Exorcist - and Krulik will take questions after the screening, which starts at 2 p.m. in Roosevelt Center. "I love telling stories from my suburban Maryland universe, and the story of Led Zeppelin's first local concert in a nearby gymnasium, and whether it actually happened or not, was irresistible," said Krulik. "Particularly since the main character, the Wheaton Youth Center, is literally frozen in time and could transport you back to that cold and snowy January 20, 1969, the same date as President Richard Nixon's inauguration."

Election Veterans Judith Davis And Edward Putens File

Incumbents Judith F. Davis and Edward Putens are the first two candidates for city council to submit their biographies to this newspaper. Their nomination forms have been certified by City Clerk Cindy Murray. Incumbent Silke Pope has also filed with the city clerk's office and her forms have been certified.

The biographies are prepared by the candidates.

Judith F. Davis

Judith F. "J" Davis is in her tenth term on the Greenbelt City Council. Currently, Davis serves as mayor, a position she has held since 1997. Prior to her election to the city council in 1993, she was appointed to the city's Advisory Planning Board (APB) for 10 years and was elected chair by its members from 1988 to 1992. Davis represents the council on the Anacostia Trails Heritage Area Board of Directors.

Davis moved to Greenbelt in 1975 and soon became active in local affairs. As a condominium owner in Greenbriar, she was elected to the Greenbriar Phase

1 Board of Directors, serving for 14 years. She was Carnival Chair for the Labor Day Festival Committee for 18 years. In 1995, Davis was on the Project Design Committee that led to the formation of GIVES, the Greenbelt Intergenerational Volunteer Exchange Service, of which she is a charter member. She served on its board as vice president for nine years.

Davis has honed her leadership skills and expanded her experience and effectiveness by serving in many roles. As mayor, she is the council's representative to the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments (COG) Board of Directors. In 2005, she was elected chair of the COG board for a one-year term. In 2010, she also served as its corporate president. Davis is a member of COG's Chesapeake Bay and Water Resources Policy Committee, on which she has served since its inception, and its Pension Plan Administrative Committee. In the past, she served on COG's Budget/Finance Committee, Ad Hoc Elected Officials' Green Building Committee and Climate, Energy and Environment Policy Committee. Davis is a member of the Energy, Environment and Natural Resources Policy Steering Committee for the National League of Cities (NLC), having first been appointed in 2005. Due to her focus on environmental issues, she has brought back innovative ideas and best practices to be incorporated by the city. She successfully urged Greenbelt's registration in the Sustainable Maryland Certified Program and serves on its Mayors' Advisory Council as a Founding Mayor.

Davis is currently the immediate past president of the Maryland Municipal League after serving as president, president elect and is completing her 11th term on its Board of Directors. In addition, Davis is a past president of the Maryland Mayors Association, the Prince George's County Municipal Association (PGCMA) and the Prince George's Elected Municipal Women. Davis served nine years on PGCMA's Board of Directors advocating Greenbelt's positions at the county level. In 2002, Davis became a Graduate Fellow of the Academy for Excellence in Local Governance established by the Institute for Government Service. Appointed by Governor Martin O'Malley, Davis represented the Maryland Municipal League on the Blue Ribbon Commission on Maryland Transportation Funding. In 2011, Davis was presented COG's highest honor, the Elizabeth and David Scull Metropolitan Public Service Award. For her environmental work, Davis was given the Greenbelt Green Man Award in 2010. She was selected Woman of the Year 2000-2001 by the Business and Professional Women/USA. She is also a recipient of an award for Outstanding Leadership and Service in Politics by the Minority Affairs Committee of Prince George's County Educators Association (PGCEA). Davis retired in 1999 after 30 years as a sixth grade teacher at Gaywood Elementary School in Seabrook, Md. An educator for 35 years, she holds bachelor's and master's degrees from West Chester State University, West Chester, Pa.

Helioviewer Project Explores Solar Physics

The September meeting of the Astronomical Society of Greenbelt will feature a presentation by Dr. Jack Ireland of NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center. Ireland will speak about the Helioviewer Project, which enables people around the world to visually explore multiple solar physics datasets in easy and intuitive ways.

This talk will be less about the physics of the Sun and more about how solar physics has entered the era of "big data" and how people - professional scientists and members of the public - around the world are able to explore very large, interconnected datasets.

A native of Scotland, Ireland did his undergraduate and graduate work at the University of Glasgow. He became fascinated by the Sun while working at the University of St. Andrews and is currently employed as a solar physicist at the Goddard Space Flight Center.

The Greenbelt Community Center Art Gallery presents Moving in Circles, the first solo exhibit of art quilts by fiber artist Russ Little of College Park. Connected to the community, Little served as Artist in Residence at the Greenbelt Community Center for five years. It was in Greenbelt that he created the pieces in his show, "Moving in Circles," a series of works constructed from fabrics which have been hand-dyed, arranged and manipulated by Little.

When describing the pieces he notes, "My work is abstract and has most recently featured large gestural circles that have been cut apart and reassembled. These pieces speak to the search for wholeness and integration despite the brokenness and jagged edges that are part of the life journey for many of us."

Adding color, rich visual texture, and interesting marks to plain white cloth, Little thoughtfully layers his materials to create full expression within abstraction. Complex arrangements allow his pieces to transcend traditional notions of quilting, while maintaining a familiar tranquility and engaging the viewer. "In this work I hope to create images that are visually interesting, but which also touch the viewer and communicate a shared human experience in a way that words cannot," Little says.

At an earlier point Little studied geography, earning both bachelor's and master's degrees in the subject. He then worked as a cartographer. The influence of this knowledge is evident in Little's work; strong meandering quilt lines and varying pattern densities evoke the graphic language of his map-making days.

Little's work has been featured in numerous juried exhibitions, including previous group shows at Greenbelt Community Center. A reception, open to guests of all ages, will take place from 1:30 to 3 p.m. on October 6 as part of the free Artful Afternoon program. The show closes October 11. Bring your Excess Plants To the First Plant Swap

Of all the activities that garden clubs put on, probably the most popular is the plant "swap" or plant exchange. Thanks to swaps, people find good homes for all their extra plants, thus providing free plants for people who need them - or simply want to try something new. But Greenbelters don't have to start a garden club to put on a swap; we're doing it without the formalities.

The date of the swap is Saturday, September 21, and the location is in front of the Greenbelt Homes Inc. offices at One Hamilton Place. All are welcome not just GHI members.

To help your donated plants survive being dug up and moved, pot them up or at least put them in a plastic bag with some soil and moisture, and please label everything. Also, if you have gobs of something, too much to pot or bag them all up, you can invite Swap attendees to come and dig them up themselves and save you the trouble. They'll even do needed divisions for you. That's how I acquired some giant hostas last April – by offering to dig and divide a neighbor's overgrown plants, then replant the right-sized division for her. So, if you have perennials in need of dividing or just too many of something to dig up, bring that offer to the swap and you'll probably find a taker for those extras - maybe someone new to town who's desperate to fill up their empty yard and turn it into a garden.

The swap is also a great way to find homes for your extra pots, tools, even gardening magazines. And if you have absolutely nothing garden-related, bring yourself and a snack to share. Just come!

People arrive starting at 10:00 and their donated items are organized according to whether they're best in sun or shade, for example. Attendees will also be checking out the offerings. Starting at 10:30 sharp, we'll hear briefly (one minute or less) about what people are donating, which will help people decide what items to make a beeline for. Then at the sound of the bell everyone can approach the goodies and take one. Then there will be another round for taking one more item. If there are still items to be grabbed, we'll have a free-for-all for the remainders.

If you can't attend but have items to donate, email me (gardenersusan@gmail.com) and I'll arrange for them to be picked up. We don't want valuable plants ending up in a yard waste bag!

discussion of her film after its screening at noon on Saturday, October 19, at the P&G Old Greenbelt. Potters Kevin and Linda Crowe, who appear in the film, also will take questions.

"I made this film in part because I am a filmmaker and potter who is fascinated with the technique of wood-firing," said Singer, whose film is making its East Coast premiere at Utopia. "But more importantly, I made the film because Kevin and his crew inspired me.'

PTSD Syndrome

A third film with a Greenbelt connection, From Hell to Here, explores the impact of war and post-traumatic stress syndrome on a Vietnam veteran. Greenbelt resident Robert Mitchell, who served as a combat helicopter pilot in Vietnam, portrays the vet.

Mitchell said, "I thought the script brought out some very important points about the Vietnam War. "I could relate to the feelings and emotions that this guy was going through, although the things we were doing were completely different."

Director Rachell Shapiro said a report by National Public Radio that the number of military suicides was outpacing the number of combat deaths stunned her and inspired the movie.

"I was shocked and surprised by that statistic, and had recently read a rough script with a very loose theme of combat PTSD,' said Shapiro. "I realized I could take that script and revise and develop it into more than just an interesting piece of entertainment - a film that had the chance to help promote change, and start a dialogue about the invisible wounds of war."

"From Hell to Here is one of my favorite films," said Greenbelter Dea Zugby, who manages Utopia's filmmaker reception and helps make movie selections. "Because the star of this Utopia short is a Greenbelt resident, I look forward to many people coming out to see his dynamic portrayal of a troubled veteran's struggles."

Shapiro's film, also making its East Coast premiere, will screen at 2 p.m. on Saturday, October 19 at the P&G Old Greenbelt Theatre.

DPRK: Land of Whispers

DPRK, which follows From Hell to Here offers rare glimpses of North Korean life by a young filmmaker determined to probe its unique authoritarian culture. Shapiro and Mitchell will be available for questions when both films conclude. (The director of DPRK is in Vietnam.) Utopia is an annual project of non-profit Greenbelt Access Television (GATE). Edward Putens is completing his 16th term on the Greenbelt City Council. Putens has been a resident of Greenbelt for 46 years, starting in Springhill Lake. He has also lived in Charlestowne North, Windsor Green and most recently Greenbrook Estates. He was born in Hazelton, Pa, and grew up in Baltimore.

Putens has been employed by the federal government for 41 years and has received many awards and commendations. He has worked for the Food and Drug Administration for the past 26 years, mostly in high management positions. He previously served in management positions at three other federal agencies.

Putens has taken a leading role in

improving police protection and crime prevention. He has for many years advocated the revitalization of Springhill Lake, now called Franklin Park, and other property west of Kenilworth Avenue, in part to improve public safety. Council earlier supported his initiative to use video cameras in strategic areas in the city and to place two School Resource Officers in Greenbelt schools for security, and he has successfully proposed traffic safety improvements.

Putens has taken a leading role on senior citizen concerns and initiated a Senior Task Force, which led to establishment of the permanent Senior Citizen Advisory Committee. He proposed the city's Public Safety Advisory Committee, as well as the Advisory Committee on Education (ACE). Putens also successfully initiated the Four Cities Coalition among Greenbelt, College Park, New Carrollton and Berwyn Heights to expand inter-city cooperation on issues and projects of common concern.

Putens was the first resident of Greenbelt East elected to the council, and has worked actively with the Greenbelt East Advisory Committee (GEAC), of which he was a co-founder. He was an original member of the Windsor Green Board of Directors, and served on its board for eight years. He has been the president of Greenbrook Estates for the past 13 years.

While on the council, Putens has served on numerous county, state and national committees to represent Greenbelt's interests. He is the past chair of the Small Cities Council of the National League of Cities, and has also served on numerous other NLC committees. He is also a member of the regional Washington Metropolitan Council of Governments, Prince George's County Municipal Association and the Maryland Municipal League.

Putens is a graduate of the University of Maryland, where he earned his degree in microbiology and was a member of the university's lacrosse team. After college, he was employed in various research capacities for medical and research development companies and co-authored several patents dealing with minimizing air pollutants.

Plant the Right Flowers For the Critters to Come

What I've been trying to do for a couple of years worked beautifully this year. I always loved the way a garden near me attracted tiger swallowtail butterflies. Last year I started trying to make my yard more attractive to them and I got the rewards this year, with a little help from all that rain Mother Nature gave us.

For one thing, the Korean dill I planted five years ago really came into its own. It attracts lacewings and I saw them swarm in May. You want lacewings, they go after the eggs and young larva of harmful insects. The dill also played host to at least one swallowtail butterfly caterpillar that I saw. When it blooms, Korean dill gives off a delicious aroma which I think smells like vanilla but most sites describe as anise or licorice. And it's blooming now.

I planted golden cosmos, tickseed, hollyhock, morning glory, impatiens, scabiosa, nicotiana, Indian Blanket and a couple of other things I don't remember.

This year the bees were all over them, as I wanted. I saw clouded sulphur butterflies on both the golden cosmos and my "signature" pokeweed that the birds brought and the birds benefit from. Catbirds, mockingbirds, cardinals and robins all come for the pokeberries from July through October. I also saw a red admiral butterfly sucking on some overthe-hill pokeberries.

Yellow and Gold

One day I saw the heads of the golden cosmos bobbing. I waited for a moment and soon I could tell the rich gold of the cosmos from the lemon yellow of the goldfinch which was picking at the ripe seeds. Every afternoon at about 2, if I was looking out, I could see them on the flowers or perched inside the fence meshes they're that small – to get the seeds. They're so cute!

Yellow flowers attract bees like red ones attract hummingbirds. Mustard flowers are yellow and the greens make a nice, peppery addition to salads from early spring until they bloom in June. Cucumbers and melons also have yellow flowers, as does zucchini.

Butterflies like celery and parsley. I bought some seeds that were labeled celery but it turned out to be a biennial instead of an annual. The first year it hosted half a dozen swallowtail caterpillars. The second year it shot up to six feet high, bloomed massively and when the bees had done their job, the house finches and sparrows went after the seeds.

Hollyhocks are biennials and this year they bloomed. One June morning it paid off being a morning person, because I saw a hummingbird at the hollyhocks. They also visited the Indian Blanket a couple of times.

Bees and Butterflies

The rain made my fast-growing privet bloom like mad. There were bees and butterflies everywhere and not just carpenter bees or bumblebees. There was a genuine honeybee one day, pollen sacs swollen as far as they could go. And we all know how few honeybees there are left. This autumn the privet will have seeds that the sparrows will go after like crazy and then I'll prune the bushes way back and hope for a repeat performance in a couple of years.

There were two keys to success. One was buying openpollinated flower seeds that would reproduce themselves automatically without me having to spend another penny.

I also use fully composted leaves to plant in and neither pesticides nor fungicides. This year it came out that it's fungicides that kill the bees. If you have a lawn service, it would be worthwhile finding out what they spray on your stuff.

Just one hint. Morning glories are pretty and the critters love them but you have to harvest all the seeds you can see. Enough will escape you to grow the following year. If you don't harvest, the morning glories will take over.

So pick your flower seeds right, plant them and they will come; all the pretty and useful critters that can be hard to find because they're visiting somebody else's yard.

Lancaster Bible College of Lancaster Pennsylvania unveiled its new Teague Learning Commons in a ribbon cutting at its Greenbelt campus on September 12. The multimedia education center is located on the first floor of Patriot Business Park on the Golden Triangle and school officials are already describing it as the "living heartbeat" of the college. Despite delays due to bad weather, around 40 students, faculty and members of the Greenbelt community came out to see the new facility.

Lancaster Bible College President Dr. Peter W. Teague led the events, which included a reception and a chance for the public to explore the center. The evening began with words from Teague, who encouraged students to make use of the complex. "This is your facility." Teague explained. "nothing will make us happier than you being here 24/7."

Andre Rogers was also in attendance to represent the Prince George's County Chamber of Commerce, assuring the school that the Chamber will be available to help with any of its business needs. "Institutions like this are important to making better people and business leaders." Rogers explained.

Construction for the center began on July 1 and took roughly six weeks, according to Teague. The school estimates that the renovation cost around \$150,000. Teague said that the acquisition took four years of negotiation, but he is now looking forward to the school making a new home in Greenbelt.

The School

The Learning Commons contains several computers and approximately 8,000 volumes of Christian literature, moved from the school's Lancaster campus in August. Teague explained that the center itself was designed as a replica of the library on the school's main campus in Lancaster.

Bible College Opens Learning Commons

Lancaster Bible College established its new Greenbelt location after officially acquiring Capital Bible Seminary in January. The school reports that 400 students will be using the new campus.

The Greenbelt campus offers courses for students pursuing graduate-level or doctoral degrees in Bible studies as well as a degree completion program.

College Event Director Renee Crowe explained that students have the option of part time and evening classes as part of the school's attempt to reach and accommodate a broader community.

Crowe said she can't wait to see what students will make of the new facility. 'I'm so excited for the students to utilize it." she remarked.

The two existing LPFM stations in Maryland both serve the mid-Chesapeake Bay area.

LPFM stations will be available to nonprofits, noncommercial educational entities and public safety and transportation organizations but not to individuals or for commercial operations. Cur-
