Many Issues Arise Concerning **Proper Surfaces for City Parks**

On November 20 the Park and Recreation Advisory Board (PRAB) presided over an informative and spirited worksession. The subject of the session concerned the feasibility, as well as the advantages and disadvantages, of utilizing various types of playground surfaces including engineered wood fiber, poured in place and other unitary rubberized surfaces and rubber mulch

At present the city utilizes all three types of surfaces in its playgrounds.

considered as a viable option for playground material because it does not provide sufficient accessibility for disabled individuals, as mandated in 2010 in the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

Some Greenbelt residents in attendance at the meeting welcomed this development, albeit for different reasons. Although based on studies by the Environmental Protection Agency and others, the city concluded that "there is no definitive source which addresses the safety of, exposure to or ingestion of [rubber mulch]," some studies and articles (based largely on the study of crumb rubber which is made up of small, dust-like particles) suggest the opposite. From those studies residents have argued that the chemicals present in recycled tires (from which the rubber mulch is derived) contain carcinogens and should not be utilized in playgrounds.

This issue surfaced most prominently in March when resident Theodora Scarato expressed health concerns due to exposure to the rubber mulch in the process of being installed in a playground at Hillside/Laurel Hill. As Scarato alleged in a March 18 email to Doss, public works supervisor, "When you are nearby, you can smell the off-gassing . . . The shorter you are the more you will inhale these chemicals so it will impact the younger children more." When it appeared that the mulch had to be replaced because the wrong color was used, Scarato and other residents used the time to continue to raise

Long Worksession Focuses **On Theater Renovations**

Three months since the last Greenbelt City Council worksession on the long-proposed renovation of the Old Greenbelt Theatre, the new council was at it again on December 18. They were trying to tie down the final costs, decide what would be in and what out and, most importantly, get to a point where the issue can be placed on the council agenda to move the project forward.

With the exception of Councilmember Silke Pope, all councilmembers were present, as well as City Manager Michael McLaughlin, Assistant City Manager David Moran and Director of Planning and Community Development Celia Craze.

Also attending were Clyde Hirst, the city's consulting mechanical engineer, and Kady

Sheridan of Gardiner & Gardiner. Like the last worksession, the meeting room was full.

To start discussion Mayor Emmett Jordan asked Craze to go over the city staff's assessment of potential costs of the project based on changes that had been decided at the September 17 meeting. In response, Craze provided council with a handwritten cost comparison between the September estimates and the following proposed changes (see chart on page 6).

The total for the December 18 estimate is actually \$1,500,700, based on the latest estimate for the Gardiner & Gardiner revised contract. (Celia Craze Memo December 13, 2013.)

Craze further noted a very slim contingency allowance of

Patricia McManus, a licensed landscape architect whose staff is responsible for the design and/ or renovation of playgrounds and other recreational facilities in Montgomery County, was the featured speaker. Other guests in attendance included Steve Lienesch, an employee of Gameland Sales, which sells and installs playgrounds; Assistant City Manager David Moran; Assistant Director of Recreation Operations Joe McNeal and Public Works Supervisor Joe Doss. The Public Safety Advisory Committee (PSAC), which is partnering with PRAB and the Youth Advisory Committee (YAC) in studying this issue for council, also sent two representatives.

Rubber Mulch

One of the more surprising conclusions communicated by McManus was that rubber mulch (loose rubber) can no longer be

safety concerns. Eventually the project was suspended pending further study. After extensive debate and meetings, council decided to utilize a poured in place rubberized surface at that playground, substituting for the mulch.

The issue of alleged harmful chemicals in rubber mulch may well be moot in view of the accessibility issue precluding its use, as discussed earlier in this article.

Engineered Wood Fiber

According to the Maryland Recreation and Parks Association, 12 of 13 jurisdictions across Maryland use engineered wood fiber on their playgrounds. The majority of the playgrounds within the City of Greenbelt also use wood fiber. Among the advantages of wood fiber is that with the proper depth it safely cushions falls; it meets ADA standards for accessibility when properly maintained; it is the least expensive to install, at least initially; and it is a natural product without any known harmful effects when utilized and maintained properly.


On the other hand, engineered wood fiber surfaces require frequent replenishment and maintenance, which is an ongoing cost and workload burden; is susceptible to mold and fungal growth which can impact health; can provide less cushioning when iced over in the winter season and can be ingested by children. Other Surfaces

Non-mulch rubberized surfaces provide fall cushioning and is the best surface for mobility, easily satisfying ADA standards. It may also be the most durable surface. However, it has the highest initial cost and is vulnerable to vandalism, which may be quite expensive to repair. Perhaps most importantly, there are two serious safety concerns not applicable to engineered wood fiber.

First, it has been shown that rubberized surfaces absorb heat and sometimes can reach temperatures of up to 160 degrees in the peak of summer. Second, the residents who expressed health concerns about the chemicals in rubber mulch have some of the same concerns about other rubberized surfaces.

At the meeting, one of the residents requested the opportunity to present updated studies and expert witnesses to substantiate their concerns about unitary rubberized surfaces, an offer which PRAB and McManus welcomed.

According to McManus, Montgomery County has drawn no firm conclusions as to which playground design has a clear advantage over others both in terms of safety and cost. The complexity of the issues was also recognized by Lola Skolnik, PRAB chairperson, who expressed relief that "we don't have to make decisions tonight."



Katelin River McMullin

Katelin Elizabeth River McMullin, 25, died Thanksgiving Day, November 28, 2013, after a courageous battle



Growing up, Katelin was a spokesperson for Children's National Medical Center. In that role, she attended college fundraiser dance marathons, posed for informational brochures and participated in radio shows, most notably Charles Kuralt's On the Road. She was selected as the Washington, D.C. Children's Miracle Network Champion in 2005 and regularly appeared in local media spots supporting the organization. She was a Girl Scout for 12 years (eventually volunteering as assistant leader of her local troop), a softball player and a rascal.

Katelin was an avid reader and an excellent student. She attended Matthew Henson Montessori Magnet School and Thomas Pullen Creative and Performing Arts Magnet School. It was at Pullen, performing in the play Ebony Scrooge, that she discovered her love for theater, which caused her to change her major from visual arts to drama. She was inducted into the National Junior Thespian Honor Society in seventh grade. Katelin graduated from Eleanor Roosevelt High School, where she performed in plays, was a founding member of the Chevy's Tuesday Club, was elected class clown and broke her nose playing rugby.

After a brief stint living and acting in San Diego, she graduated with an associate's degree in theater performance from Prince George's Community College and was inducted into Phi Theta Kappa, the international honor society. She performed in several plays including Baby with the Bathwater and The Complete Works of Shakespeare (Abridged), directed a series of one-act plays and was president of Hallam Players. In 2013 she graduated with honors from Towson University with a bachelor's degree in acting. In her short time at Towson. she performed in Ninjas and Squirrels and Darkroom. She was also a member of Lambda Kappa Tau, a filmmaking fraternity, and starred with them

in several short films.

Outside school, Katelin performed in plays at Studio Theatre in Washington, D.C., Single Carrot Theatre, Fells Point Corner Theatre and Acme Corporation in Baltimore and the Greenbelt Arts Center. At Fells Point Corner Theatre, she played the title role in Following Sarah, which won the Carol Weinberg Award for Best Play in the Baltimore Playwrights Festival. Film and television credits include 562, No Sleep Tonight and End of Occupation. She starred in a public service announcement for the Food and Drug Administration and recently filmed background roles for Veep and House of Cards.

Katelin loved to travel. She went to the 2004 Olympics in Athens, Greece, with the Makea-Wish Foundation and took separate trips to Italy, France, Spain, India, England, Belize and Puerto Rico with friends and family. She was a diehard Washington Nationals fan and loved heckling the other team but hated booing. She knew how to drive a stick shift and did backflips off of diving boards. She leaves behind far too many friends and family members who were forever changed by her humor, strength, compassion, intelligence and artistic talent.

A memorial service was held at the Center for the Arts main stage at Towson University on December 14. Memorial contributions may be made in her honor to the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation to help fulfill her goal of raising \$25,000 for CF research in celebration of her 25th year of life. 

about \$33,000. Council and the mayor also felt the margin was slim. Other large projects operate with up to a 25 percent contingency reserve.

Projection Upgrade

Craze shared with council the estimates for the proposed upgrade of theater projection equipment. These include a D-Cinema 4K resolution system, including 10 hearing assist/ descriptive service receivers and five text receivers within a system that provides open and closed captioning, a system estimated to cost \$100,000.

Her memo lists other options from the vendor: a rear window projection assistive listening system, a Blue-ray/DVD player, a sound upgrade from 5.1 to 7.1 and the repair of existing equipment. With those additional features, Craze suggests a projected cost for equipment at \$110,000.

The city staff is concluding that the plans contain appropriate detail to continue contract negotiations with the intent to secure contract approval by the end of January 2014. A further staff recommendation to council would direct staff to prepare a contract for construction with Gardiner & Gardiner.

Council Comments

Council's overall reaction was to move forward with the project even though they wondered how the revised project would be funded. Some members had reservations, however, about various details of the project.

A critical factor for council is the potential that several sources of grants to support the renovation project are getting close to a use-it-or-lose-it stage. The city must show evidence of progress for such grants to be Councilmember Judith Davis opined that such details can be left to the time when the project is underway. She also suggested that the owner of the rest of the building should share in the costs of the roof and some of the HVAC issues. Craze said it may be possible for the city to make claims in those areas.

Davis also wondered if there were incentives for the contractor's finishing on time or for penalties for a late completion. She suggested the experience of other cities may be helpful.

Funding Sources

Councilmember Konrad Herling expressed interest in funding sources for the revised project. He said he supports using a certain percentage of the city fund balance for the project.

Herling also wondered if there could be savings in the scope of the restroom upgrades, possibly by doing one at a time. Craze said there could be safety and health issues if the bathrooms were not done at the same time.

Herling also asked if the drawings relating to the restroom renovations submitted to Craze by Frank Gervasi could be considered for the project. She said that modifying the project at this point might trigger a new permit.

Councilmember Edward Putens asked if the purchase of a new projection equipment package included warranties, to which Craze responded that she will check on the issue.

Roberts again raised the possibility of seeking competitive bids instead of doing a negotiated contract with Gardiner & Gardiner. Jordan responded that seeking such competitive bids would delay the start of the (FOGT), provided a Power Point presentation offering ideas on the lobby and concession area, highlighting historic aspects of the theater. She urged that the project consider efforts to return its spaces and fixtures to as close to the original as possible.

She said that FOGT has begun fundraising and hopes to gain support for available historic preservation funding. She also commented on the proposed renderings by Gardiner & Gardiner, feeling that they could be improved.

Craze noted the city was

looking at finishes, carpet, tile and fixtures and that the contract would provide for an optimal, faithful restoration.

Many comments from the audience were directed to the quality and availability of equipment for the hearing and visually impaired. Other comments by attendees seemed to support ideas relating to independent reviews of project costs.

Others wondered why the city would not just use cosmetic approaches on a piecemeal basis. Some urged the city to just move ahead on the project.

Late in the worksession a suggestion was made that council consider the formation of an advisory group to assess preservation items. Jordan responded that would be an operational item that could be discussed at a subsequent worksession.

Wrap-Up

Craze advised council that staff would be prepared to have their recommendations for moving ahead at the first 2014 council meeting. Councilmember Leta Mach urged that information on the city's fund balance be provided. Jordan added that staff input should include the impact on the city's efforts to pay down its debt.

This concern did not stop Councilmember Rodney Roberts from continuing to challenge Hirst on the remainder of the air conditioning ductwork necessary in the revised details of the project. Roberts also remains unsatisfied that the \$140,000 estimate for upgrading the projection room is not more specific in detail and continues to wonder if the aggregate estimates by Gardiner & Gardiner are reliable. project.

McLaughlin reminded council that the original request for bids had been sent to about 20 to 25 firms with a single response from Gardiner & Gardiner. Since theirs was the only bid, it could not be opened, he said, and the city thus entered into a negotiated purchase for their doing the work.

"I'm very thrilled. It's easy. It's fun," said Lynn Tu, owner. "It's a blessing to have it here."



"I like getting my face painted," said Kalari of the annual event.


Children chose from umbrellas, perfume and other treats and ate from a buffet, along with gingerbread men placed in the children's bags, donated by Chef Lou.
