Who Maintains Greenbelt Station Access Considered by Council

It's a complicated but minor problem needing to be resolved. The first 120 feet of Greenbelt Station Parkway, plus a bridge over Branchville Road, initially provides the only road access to the new development in the South Core of Greenbelt Station. The road was built there by the developers with county permission. One end connects to a state highway, Greenbelt Road. It is located in the Town of Berwyn Heights. North of the bridge, it is within the city of Greenbelt.

Since Prince George's County has agreed to maintain the bridge, maintenance of that first 120 feet was the issue for discussion at the August 3 Greenbelt City Council worksession. Nearly all councilmembers reluctantly agreed that the city would have to participate even though the road is outside the city limits.

At the time the city was negotiating an annexation agreement for the Smith property (now the South Core), Berwyn Heights quietly annexed other properties on both sides of Branchville Road. Branchville Road runs

parallel to Greenbelt Road on the north side providing the only road access to these properties. Most likely the property owners agreed to be annexed for fear of otherwise being annexed to Greenbelt, which has a higher tax rate.

While the South Core has frontage on Branchville Road, the developers sought and obtained direct access to Greenbelt Road. At this point, Greenbelt Road is at a much higher elevation than Branchville Road as it is ramped up to cross the CSX Railroad and Metro tracks.

Access

With the acquisition of a 120-foot-deep parcel of land between Branchville and Greenbelt Roads and by building a bridge over Branchville, the South Core developers were able to build the access sought to Greenbelt Road. The bridge and 120 foot connection were completed in 2007 according to Jessica Bellah, Greenbelt Community Planner. But the ensuing building slump delayed development until just recently.

Greenbelt will maintain that part of Greenbelt Station Parkway that is north of the bridge and within the city limits once the city approves the construction done by the developers. The road will provide Greenbelt Station residents and future businesses or other occupants with access to Greenbelt Road and will eventually connect to the Greenbelt Metro Station and Capital Beltway to the north.

Prince George's County will maintain the bridge that crosses over Branchville Road because Branchville Road is a county road. The soon-to-be-formed homeowners association for Greenbelt Station will be made responsible for maintaining brick walls and a stairway from the new road to Branchville Road because those were built to benefit the new development.

But what about that first 120 feet of Greenbelt Station Parkway between the bridge and Greenbelt Road that is within the town limits of Berwyn Heights? Greenbelt city staff believe the city

Green Team Volunteers Strive For Zero Waste at Festival

The 2015 Greenbelt Labor Day Festival will be the greenest one yet as it evolves into a zero waste event. Reduce, Reuse, Recycle or Compost is the message. As part of the efforts a new program will be introduced: Greenbelt Water Works. For the program, multiple locations around the center city will offer free water bottle refills. Everyone is encouraged to bring a reusable water bottle and to fill

up at Greenbelt Water Works locations. Signs will indicate which locations around the Roosevelt Center and which public buildings are participating.

The motive behind Greenbelt Water Works is to reduce the use of single-use plastic water bottles. Be sure to check in with the Green Team/GreenACES booth so a tally can record how many community members bring a reusable water bottle. A map

showing the Greenbelt Water Works locations and water fountains will be at the booth.

Volunteer Opportunities

The Green Team/GreenACES booth will rely on volunteers to lead fun educational children's games and a scavenger hunt of Greenbelt Water Works locations. Another volunteer opportunity will be to educate community members in how to identify recyclables from landfill trash and how to choose the right bin for each. The Green Team expects mainly students as volunteers but will also need adults to provide light supervision.

In the spirit of zero waste, the signs from the Green Man Festival will be reused to label trash bins as recycling, compost or landfill in order to increase visibility and distinction. Throughout the Labor Day Festival, volunteers will monitor the bins for contamination and promote zero waste event efforts.

Leftover food scraps will be collected from vendors and delivered to the MOM's of College Park BiobiN. The compost ma-

National Night Out in Greenbelt Community Trumps the Rain

It rained on August fourth, but people showed up anyway. With free food and a promise of good times with neighbors, the National Night Out was celebrated in Greenbelt in half a dozen different locations.

National Night Out was started in 1984 by the National Association of Town Watch, an organization that promotes crime prevention programs. These programs include neighborhood watch groups, law enforcement agencies and other organizations devoted to safer communities. The evening brings together neighbors, businesses, police and fire departments. While most of the night is just fun, food and demonstrations from the talented K9 (dog) police officers, the real aim is to build trust.

"People feel a lot of security at the event," said Janubi Devendra, Director of Marketing for the Beltway Plaza Mall and coordinator of the event for the Franklin Park area. "It's good to know the police, fire, businesses and Franklin Park are all working together." Devendra said that each year the event has been improving, gathering more businesses and more residents. "It definitely sends out a very positive message."

On the other side of town, Greenbriar also enjoyed National Night Out. Resident Bunny Fitzgerald said she won a gift certificate to Chevy's but more importantly enjoyed time with her neighbors, as well as the mayor (Emmett Jordan) and Police Chief James Craze.

There were also celebrations in Roosevelt Center, Windsor Green, Hunting Ridge, and Schrom Hills. Holding the event in neighborhoods, instead of one central location, is part of the community-building theme. The many locales, however, make for a busy, night for councilmembers, and other dignitaries who move from party to party around town.

"I made it to all the locations," said councilwoman Silke Pope. "And I talked to many res-

Professionals Needed

As Donna Almquist mentions in her ad "Who Will Protect the Greenbelt Forest Preserve?" it is important to adhere to the city's Forest Preserve Guidelines. If there is to be an assessment of the condition and health of the Forest Preserve then it should be done by a professional biologist/ecologist.

Our Forest Preserve (225 acres) was officially set aside by Council in 2003 as a preserve to

protect undisturbed forested lands from development and intrusive human activities.

It is troubling to see that city staff is seriously considering several engineering firms that have a forester or forest management perspective or mindset more suitable for a city park (such as Buddy Attick) to conduct an assessment of the Forest Preserve.

One of the firms being considered displays the slogan "Consulting Engineers" on their letterhead and cover letter, and the first page of their proposal sent to the city states they will provide "...forest stewardship and management strategies."

Another firm being considered by the city had been employed in the past to design and construct several stream and water culvert projects and to administer the use of herbicides and chemical treatment to control invasive plants, by the city and Greenbelt Homes Inc., respectively.

In addition, this firm states on page one of their proposal) that they "will inventory forest stand delineation using Maryland's DNR (Dept. of Natural Resources) protocols established in their 1997 technical manual." Again, this is a forest management or 'forester-for-hire' timber monetary value perspective not suitable for an assessment of our natural undisturbed Forest Preserve.

A senior city staff member stated previously that she favored these firms since they had done work previously for the city. This familiarity seems to be the major reason these firms are being considered, rather than making an effort to seek a qualified professional biologist/ecologist as directed by City Council.

If the city were to employ one of these firms or another of a similar perspective then the city would be violating the purpose and intent of the city's Forest Preserve Guidelines.



will have to maintain it because the road's users will be city residents and because nobody else will have maintenance equipment nearby. To assume this responsibility, city staff recommends that the city enter into a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with all the concerned parties.

As construction is new, the most immediate maintenance need is snow plowing. Since the city will have to run its plow trucks over this roadway in order to turn around, it is only a matter of keeping the plows dropped when they pass over this section. At the worksession City Manager Michael McLaughlin told council that it would probably be 10 to 15 years before the road would require more costly maintenance.

Recommendations

In making its recommendations, city staff believed that the 120 feet was a road that no one had assumed responsibility for, but Justin Frye, a construction manager for the developers, Woodlawn Development LLC, told council it was his understanding from county staff that this was a county road, but that the county wanted Greenbelt to maintain it.

Director of Planning and Community Development Celia Craze said this was new information to her and she would have to check

Most councilmembers, although reluctantly, agreed that the city would have to assume maintenance because the road served Greenbelt residents. Councilmember Judith Davis reflected that point of view, noting that it would be a low level priority for Berwyn Heights to maintain it. "You can stand on principal," she said, "but the best thing for our residents is for the city to maintain it."

Councilmember Rodney Roberts, however, took exception. He disagreed with those who felt that Berwyn Heights would never remove the road from its boundaries and that the city could accept it. Roberts thought the obligation to maintain it would be sufficient for the town to rid itself of it. He objected to the city maintaining another jurisdiction's road.

Councilmember Edward Putens was concerned about who would maintain the brick entrance walls and the stairway from Greenbelt Station Parkway to Branchville Road. He also felt there was a need for a sidewalk along Branchville Road from the stairway to Greenbelt Road. He was told that one had been built alongside the South Core property, but that none existed adjacent to any other property.

Payments Sufficient

Frye said that the homeowners agreement, which was being prepared, would provide sufficient payments from each property to assure adequate reserves to undertake major repairs when the time comes. These reserves would also cover maintenance needs for the private streets and other common property of the development. He noted that some developers will sell their homes with very low homeowner association dues in order to make easy sales, not

worrying that there would be insufficient reserves when needed. Frve said that would not be the

Norman Rivera, legal counsel for the developers, urged a speedy resolution to the problem as the road and bridge have been built for many years but the construction bonds required by the county, worth millions of dollars, were being held up pending resolution of the issue of maintenance.

Staff is to clarify the county's role in this matter and may return with a MOU.





terials will be added later to the Prince George's County compost pilot program. Ultimately, less methane gas will be emitted from a landfill, and high quality compost will be produced for use by gardeners and others.

Recycling Tips

If one's waste is recyclable and most will be—discard it into a recycling bin, not the trash can. This year, food vendors will provide mostly recyclable dinnerware. Look for the chart on the recycling bins showing the items to recycle (in green) and the few that can't be (in red). Also, put only recyclables in the recycling bins.

Think taxes should be used for something other than trash? The less money spent on trash collection, the more the city can use those savings for other programs and activities. Greenbelt is charged \$56 per ton brought to landfill but actually gets money back from recyclables.

Greenbelt is a leader in sustainability. One great way to educate friends and neighbors and to encourage the practice of recycling is to raise awareness during the Labor Day Festival.

The Labor Day Zero Waste effort is a project of the Zero Waste Circle comprised of members of the Green Team and affinity groups with support from the Greenbelt Department of Public Works and the Chesapeake Education Arts and Research Society (CHEARS).



Who Will Protect the Greenbelt Forest Preserve?

The council should stop the city from contracting with a Forest Conservation Act (FCA) Service Provider to assess the health of the Forest Preserve. The city intends to include language in the contract asking the FCA Service Provider to recommend changes to the city code and to the Forest Preserve Management and Maintenance Guidelines (Guidelines) which together have protected the Forest Preserve for the past twelve years.

In October 2003 the council passed legislation creating the Forest Preserve which consists of over 200 acres of forested areas in Greenbelt managed as protected, undeveloped, and undisturbed areas for the benefit of current and future generations. The council, at the time, determined the residents should be stewards to protect the natural qualities of these areas and appointed a task force to write the Forest Preserve Guidelines. The Guidelines include a provision for a forest biologist/ecologist to provide a health assessment if such an assessment were deemed necessary. They did not require a health assessment be done.

On November 24, 2014, council passed three important motions. (1) According to draft minutes, Rodney Roberts moved that council proceed on contracting with a professional forest biologist/ecologist to assess the health of the Forest Preserve. Mayor Jordan responded by encouraging staff to seek a professional forest biologist/ecologist. (2) According to the minutes, Judith Davis moved that council direct the Forest Preserve Advisory Board to review the Forest Preserve Guidelines and prepare a list of recommended changes to council. (3) Judith Davis also moved that council direct city staff to review the Forest Preserve chapter of the city code and update it as needed and that proposed changes be referred to the Advisory Board

A Request for Proposal (RFP) was written by the city. According to Celia Craze, the city sent over 120 solicitations for proposals. These primarily went to firms identified as Forest Conservation Act (FCA) Service Providers listed on the Maryland Department of Natural Resources (DNR) web site. Only five solicitations went to individuals or firms suggested by Advisory Board members. According to Celia Craze, only five proposals were received by the city. All of the proposals are from FCA Service Providers.

FCA Service Providers are entities approved by the Maryland Department of Natural Resources to assist developers in creating the Forest Conservation Plan that is required for certain planned developments in Maryland. The list includes foresters, landscape architects, and others. The mindset is controlled development rather than preservation and ecology.

According to Dr. Marc Lapin, ecologist and environmental studies professor at Middlebury College, a forest biologist/ecologist (as required by the Forest Preserve Guidelines) is a better choice than a forester to do the assessment (if one is done at all). A forest biologist/ecologist has a broad perspective of the relationships between plants, animals, soils, water and rocks. In contrast, a forester's perspective puts more emphasis on 'managing' the forest for use and economic gain.

A contract with a FCA Service Provider will be inconsistent with Robert's motion (approved 7-0), Mayor Jordan's encouragement, and the Forest Preserve Guidelines.

Please contact the members of council and the city clerk to let them know that you want the process to award a contract stopped and to leave alone the documents that protect the forest preserve. The contact information is:




