## City's Gateway Signage Revisited By Council After Many Years

Gateway signage, a topic that comes and goes as a topic of conversation for city government, was dusted off and reviewed again at a city council worksession on August 5. Gateway signs are the ones that say, or at least imply, welcome to travelers who cross a boundary from one jurisdiction into another.

Except for welcome signs that sprouted during the city's 75th Anniversary year, Greenbelt's gateway signage historically has been limited to the entrance to Old Greenbelt as one comes in on Southway from Greenbelt Road or from southbound Baltimore-Washington Parkway. Although other sites have been discussed, the conversation has been on hold for a number of years, primarily because of sign planting efforts on the part of the county and the state. With that activity having leveled off, and with \$20,000 in this year's capital projects budget for improvements to the Southway entrance sign, the worksession was held for city staff to seek guidance from the current council on how to proceed.

In aid of getting everyone up to speed, Assistant Planning Director Terri Hruby had provided a memorandum on the history of the project. Fourteen years ago, when only three of the current seven members of council were in office, council reviewed design concept drawings prepared by Greenbelt resident Sharon Bradley of Bradley Site Design, Inc. for signs to be placed not only on Southway but also at other major and minor entrances to the city. Council at that time approved an art deco style monument sign and a modified pole sign designed by Bradley.

Following those discussions, the project was put on hold as a number of agencies and organizations approached the city with plans to place identification signs throughout Greenbelt. According to Hruby, since the initial work on the project, the county has installed a welcome sign on Kenilworth Avenue, and the 75th Anniversary Committee installed temporary welcome signs throughout the city. Most recently, as a bump for economic development under its

Tourist Area and Corridor Signing Program, the state installed wayfinding signs on major and minor state roadways, including signs directing visitors to Historic Greenbelt.

Hruby said that at the behest of the 75th Anniversary Committee, the signage on Southway was also improved, the plexiglass display case replaced, and the existing stone wall repaired, though these improvements were understood to be stopgap measures. Since then, the Southway sign has been significantly damaged by vehicles crashing into it and the stone wall. At this point, even after repair, it is obvious that the wall has been damaged.

Mayor Emmett Jordan pointed out that there is another, possibly related topic that has been under discussion for some time: finding a way to consolidate the signs of churches and service organizations along the entrance to the city on Crescent Road from Kenilworth Avenue to the entrance to Buddy Attick Park.

Regarding the Southway entrance, Jordan said he would be

## Greenbelt Station Park Plan Reviewed by City Council

On August 19, more than 20 residents of a new South Core neighborhood attended a city council worksession on a proposed Greenbelt Station park plan. The 2.7 acre neighborhood park is proposed to be a central gathering area on land to be dedicated by the developer as a city-owned and managed park. The meeting was held with the goal of gaining city approval of the detailed design in sufficient time to bring the park online as an operational community asset in spring 2016.

## Plan Elements

The design plan is a collaborative effort of Woodlawn Development Group LLC and city staff. The goal of the plan is threefold. First, the plan is intended to produce a flexible design that can respond to community input and needs after full build-out of the neighborhood. Second, the plan is designed to develop a multifunctional space to accommodate informal and formal, as well as passive and active uses. And third, the plan seeks to efficiently allocate development agreement funds. Jessica Bellah, a community planner with the city Department of Planning and Community Development, displayed the proposed park plan and stated that the park will need to be graded

in a gradual stair-step fashion to deal with topography that drops off from southeast to northwest.

The plan shows an urban park area on the northwestern third of the park near Greenbelt Station Parkway. This portion of the park could potentially accommodate a small amphitheater, consisting of several rows of curved seating facing a turf area surrounded by hardscape. Above and east of the seating area, an active urban space is proposed to contain a north-south pedestrian throughway connecting North Center Drive to South Center Drive. A larger area southeast of the active urban space extends to Stream Bank Lane and is proposed as an open area consisting of a turf field that will measure 150 feet by 350 feet, an area approximately 15 percent smaller than a regulation soccer field.

Bellah emphasized that the open nature of the large active play area provides the flexibility to add other uses at a later time. "Only 70 residents now live in Phase 1 of the Greenbelt Station development; however, at full build-out the community may want other uses," she explained. Councilmember Leta Mach agreed, saying "It's a good plan because it leaves room for leeway to adjust for future needs."

The entire park will be surrounded by shade trees and a nine-foot sidewalk, with ornamental trees added to the urban park area on the west. The park plan shows other amenities scattered throughout the park, such as light posts, banner posts, trash receptacles, benches and a bike rack. A statement sent by Councilmember Judith Davis expressed her suggestion for the inclusion of a water feature and restrooms.

## Resident Concerns

Councilmember Rodney Roberts pointed out that the residents were seeing the park plan for the first time and that council needed to hear from residents. Florence Awosika and other speakers were in general agreement that the park should be developed now in order to grade the land, plant trees and construct the proposed park features. Residents are concerned about the potential parking, security and noise problems that could be caused if too many visitors from elsewhere are attracted to the large open space or to the possible programming of movies at the amphitheater.

City officials sought to address these concerns. Councilmember Silke Pope said that the city has many parks for other residents

## First Step for 2015 Election: Register to Vote in Greenbelt

Participating in the November 3 city election to run for office, to sign a candidate's petition or to vote requires being registered with Prince George's County at a residence address that lies within the boundaries of the City of Greenbelt. This year, with new residential streets at Greenbelt Station with exotic names like Sable Court and Settling Pond Lane, the city's address list for voting will expand for the first time since its 2001 election.

For those not already registered, the deadline to do so and be able to vote in the city election is Monday, October 5. Registrations must be received by the Prince George's County Board of Elections no later than 4:30 p.m. at 1100 Mercantile Lane, Suite 115A, in Largo. Since glitches may occur at any level, would-be voters are advised not to wait until the last minute.

Verify Registration
Newly registered residents can

call the county Board of Elections at 301-341-7300 if they have not received a voter notification card within three weeks of registering. Alternatively, they or any others who wish to be sure they are properly registered can look up their registration on the website for the Maryland Board of Elections at elections.state. md.us. From the home page, click on Voter Services under the heading Hot Topics. While this information will confirm the residence address at which the voter is registered, users should be aware that the polling place listed for them on this site will be the one to be used for county, state and federal elections and not necessarily their voting place for the city election.

## Eligibility to Register

Besides residing at an address within the city limits at the time of registration, a resident wishing

## **Process Problems**

I agree that council should stop the city from awarding a contract to a Forest Conservation Act (FCA) Service Provider to assess the health of the Preserve (see advertisement "Protect the Forest Preserve – Come to the August 31st Work Session").

This started with a recommendation to hire a forest ecologist but has grown into the selection of a firm to do more than just assess the health of the Preserve (it now includes recommending changes to the Preserve Guidelines).

It appears council has been working with staff to expand the assessment into a comprehensive study without limitations (i.e. not limited to invasive plants).

Robert Snyder, former chairman of the Forest Preserve Advisory Board (Board), sent Report 2014-04 to council on October 23. The report recommends that council hire forest ecologist Dr. Joan Maloof of the Maryland-based organization Old-Growth Forest Network to assess the health of the Preserve.

At the November 24 meeting, council chose not to consider this recommendation and directed staff to hire a forest biologist or ecologist, but this time opened the door to changes that could weaken the documents that provide protection of the Preserve. These changes are not limited to invasive plants.

Councilmember Judith Davis, according to the minutes, points out there were disagreements within the board. The board's motion recommending Maloof passed (6-3). According to the minutes, Davis acknowledges that staff gave council several actions to consider. The public needs to know more about these actions.

Davis has attended board meetings since January even though the official council liaison is Councilmember Rodney Roberts. During this time the board worked with Celia Craze, staff liaison, to develop the Request for Proposals (RFP). The RFP heavily favors FCA Service Providers (who generally act as consultants to developers) which received 25 times more solicitations than forest biologists or ecologists. According to Snyder, unexplained acronyms were used on the three meeting agendas that included the RFP as a topic for discussion and the RFP was discussed for a total of only 50 minutes at these meetings. The board never voted on the RFP.

The board has not provided a position on the RFP or the firms. This process appears to be driven by council and staff with almost no participation from the public.



## In Memoriam – Ronnie Fendlay

Ronald Fendlay, a Greenbelt boy from birth, passed away on July 17 at Magnolia Nursing Home after a series of up and downs mostly related to his diabetes and liver problems. He was 60 years old. He was the son of the late Lee and Jane Fendlay, longtime residents on Southway. Ronnie is survived by his two older brothers, Bunky and Davey, a younger sister Patty Fendlay Rousseau, and two younger brothers, Harry and Kevin, as well as his in-laws and many nieces and nephews.

A memorial gathering was held at the Greenbelt American Legion on Thursday, August 13 with about 75 persons in attendance. Ronnie was a long-time member of the Sons of The Legion, his Dad being a longtime Legion member. Ronnie had two son, Ronnie and Derrick, from Salem, Virginia, near Roanoke. He lived there for a couple of years when he was married to his wife Babs. His elder son Ronnie, who is 35, attended the gathering.

Ronnie had the normal experience of being a youth in Greenbelt. He attended Greenbelt Center Elementary School and later Greenbelt Junior High School. He played on the Indians Little League team (somehow you always remember your team's name) and later played some football for the Boys Club. He worked as a drywall hanger and at other construction and labor jobs. He had an accident that caused him to lose some of the use of his arm and made heavy lifting problematic.

You could say that Ronnie was often a man of few words. Patty's husband Marty, another Greenbelt boy of course, tells of how he first went to meet the family in the court on Southway. Patty's brother Bunky lived in the same court at the time. When Marty knocked at the family home, Ronnie peered out of the screen door. Marty asked if Patty was home, Ronnie just

said "No" and started to walk away. Marty knew she sometimes spent time at Bunky's so he asked if she was there instead. Ronnie answered "Yes" and walked away completely at that point. Patty noted that, at other times, he liked to tell stories and make up wild details when talking to his nieces and nephews.

Being somewhat of a daredevil, Ronnie tried to score points with his Greenbelt friends by engaging in various adventures (as a group, we were easily impressed). He was one who learned from experience. Jack Leslie tells of the time that he and Ronnie and others were at a water swing. That's a contraption with a rope knotted for your hands to grip, that swings out over the water where you can then let go and jump in (diving was a little too extravagant for Greenbelt kids). When Ronnie grabbed hold and started to swing out, the rope broke and Ronnie fell to the ground tumbling a few times. Jack noted that Ronnie just got up and shook it off and said, "That was fun. Let's do it again!"

As an adult, Ronnie liked to watch football and to play bingo and was a bingo caller at Green Ridge House, where he lived until he could no longer care for himself. The diabetes that later plagued him had cost Ronnie his right leg below the knee towards the end of his life. He had a motorized scooter that he liked to ride down to Roosevelt Center. You were likely to hear a shouted "Hey Man!" from him if you were there when he was passing through in one of his Harley Davidson berets that he always wore.

I imagine that whatever awaits Ronnie in the next life, he will begin it by offering a hearty "Hey Man!" to whoever greets him at the entrance.



happy just to have a new and updated map, with any needed repairs to the sign and stone wall. Councilmember Rodney Roberts also spoke in favor of keeping the city's traditional sign and map as the gateway for Southway.

Councilmember Judith Davis questioned whether having a map was meaningful anymore now that travelers have GPS units and all manner of mobile devices with internet access. She also stressed that the issue was not only about Southway but rather required planning for at least three or four gateway signs. Davis also suggested having all the church and service group signs at the Southway entrance, but that idea did not meet with enthusiasm from all. Nor did a suggestion from Councilmember Konrad Herling that entrance signs be lighted.

Councilmember Leta Mach said she had been envisioning a gateway sign that would include logos or medallions for the organizations, so she was thinking of it as one problem, not two. Councilmember Silke Pope commented that what could be done in that regard would be limited by the size of the sign.

There was general agreement that in Greenbelt East a sign should be placed on Greenbelt Road westbound near the city boundary at the end of Windsor Green. When the entrance on Research Road from BARC was also proposed, Hruby confirmed that that site had been approved by council at the time of the earlier review.

Hruby pointed out that in some instances the use of a monument sign versus a pole sign might not be a sign of status but rather what was permissible. When this work was done earlier, staff learned that the state does not permit monument signs on state-maintained highways. Since she was unsure whether that was still true, she said she would investigate.

Jordan pointed toward Hanover Parkway and Good Luck Road as a significant gateway that should be marked. City Manager Michael McLaughlin said there was no city property there except right of way and no room for a monument sign. Hruby was also uncertain about the extent of city right of way at Kenilworth Avenue and Good Luck Road.

Hruby commented that she has not seen many monument entrance signs in this area, which she thought might be a simple cost/benefit decision since all that jurisdictions are attempting to achieve is announcing to people that they have arrived in the city. As a result, although staff members agree there should be a monument sign at Southway, they suggest rethinking whether pole signs would do just as well elsewhere.

Hruby added that staff was concerned about clutter if other signs were to be placed on the monument and thought perhaps a second structure further in on Southway might be a better place for church and service group signs. McLaughlin added that

since some of the existing organization signs are fairly large, issues would arise about size and amount of text.

Hruby advised against restoring the map, which she pointed out would be in a state of nearly perpetual obsolescence for the next several years as Greenbelt Station develops.

Roberts said he thought the monument sign should be separate and that multiple monument signs, especially with lighting, were unnecessary, with poles being good enough for the job.

Mach objected to the idea that the only monument sign would be at the Southway entrance, pointing out that council has decided the three sections of Greenbelt should be treated equally. She believed there should be a monument sign in all three areas.

Council agreed to move forward with discussing the project and asked staff to request Bradley to review her 2001 designs to see if she had any further recommendations or advice. The mayor said that despite the range of opinion he thought council was in general agreement to go with three monuments if locations permitted with pole signs to go elsewhere.

What to do about the signs from the fraternal groups and churches was less defined. Putens and Pope agreed that they did not want to see medallions cluttering up a plain art deco sign. Pope suggested that the existing signs might be a separate problem after all. She concluded, "We might need to look at the whole city on that."

## **How Many Signs Are There?**

Throughout the city council's discussion of the appearance of the signs clustered in the first tenth of a mile of Crescent Road off Kenilworth Avenue — from Kenilworth to the entrance of Buddy Attick Park — questions were raised about how many signs there actually were. No one knew, but there sure seemed to be a lot of them!

The questions being asked were targeted at the signs posted by churches and service organizations, but a bit of investigative journalism undertaken by this reporter revealed the shocking fact that the majority of signs at that location are either directly or indirectly attributable to the City of Greenbelt.

Of the 24 signs, two belong to service organization (Lions and Rotary). Four belong to churches (Redeemed Christian Church of God; St. Hugh's; Mowatt Memorial United Methodist; and Greenbelt Baptist Church). Although the Community Church has a sign on Crescent, it is considerably farther down the road and stands alone.

There is one sign for the county's TheBus at the bus stop.

The remaining 17 signs (71 percent of the total) are city-related. Twelve regulate traffic or parking. Three are directional (Police Department, Public Works Department, Fire Department). The remaining two are signs for the 75th Anniversary and Neighborhood Watch

At the intersection of Southway and Ridge, however, it is true that the churches and service organizations have pride of place. The same six organizations have signs there, with no clutter at all contributed by the city.

## Rudacious Audacity, **Audacious Rudacity**

I had a mild epiphany after seeing Shakespeare's The Life and Death of King John, as creatively tweaked - nay, rather morphed completely - by The Rude Mechanicals' irreverent brilliance.

Now at the Greenbelt Arts Center, the Rudes offer a carnival of fun - excellent acting, sumptuous costumes, spot-on comedic timing, enormous physical energy and original conceits.

A puzzlement. I'm a huge Rudes fan, so why didn't I like the play? It's a peculiar, paradoxical feeling to be pleased again and again throughout the evening (90 minutes, including a 15-minute intermission) and leave pouting with disappointment.

One of many pleasures was the grafting of Monty Pythonesque comic moments onto the plot. Josh Engel, as Philip the Bastard – a lovely moniker – gets to trot about on an invisible horse trailed by Trevor Jones (Mr. Gumby) clacking two coconut halves together to simulate hoof beats. A French nobleman hurls insults from the ramparts of Angiers down on the besieging English army. Remember "You silly King!"?

Director Alan Duda hilariously breaks the fourth wall, talking directly to the audience, never letting us forget that we are watching a play. He enters from stage left prematurely to urge the audience to recommend the play, beginning next week at the GAC. "We are at GAC," he is reminded, and the play is not over.

At the real end of the play, the cast all take a bow, gesture in homage toward the light and sound people (Jeff Paretsky and Eric Honour) and leave the stage. All but the corpse of King John (Evan Ockershausen), who irritatingly lingers on his throne after an ignominious death. As intended, the audience doesn't know whether or not to exit the premises, until we are shooed out by Mr. Gumby. The conceit works.

More moments of hilarity: Jaki Demarest as the sneering French Dolphin (Dauphin) repeatedly spits on English dignity - "Patoo!" Lovely.

Melissa Schick, very unhappy with her role as the corpse of Queen Elinor, whines "I must really talk with my agent!" while miming rigor mortis. Excellent.


Carol Calhoun, as a papal legate sent to quell the bickering French and English rivals, beautifully bloviates at length on matters of faith and morality, promptly rendering her listeners comatose with boredom. Lovely.

Is it my imagination or did Sam David, as a black-cowled monk, subtly imitate the crazed look of Marty Feldman in Young Frankenstein? The Rudes are that slick.

So. My epiphany... at home, wrenched by contradictory impulses, wrestling with my critical angst, how could I have had so much fun and still wallow in a serious pout?

I read Duda's detailed director's notes for the first time and voila! The clear explanation of the dynastic maze and plethora of assassinations, battles, arranged marriages, power struggles which inform KJ's plot, dissipated my confusion and banished my silly

The moral? First, never begin a play review with the pronoun "I" – the play's the thing, not the reviewer. Next, always read the program before seeing the play, so you'll know what the heck is going on. Last, go enjoy this rudaciously flamboyant production on Fridays and Saturdays at 8 p.m. on August 28 and 29, September 4 and 5, and on Sunday, August 30 at 2 p.m.

ducing your household waste through reusing, recycling and composting!







and that the city wants to work with residents to plan appropriate uses for the park. City Planning Director Celia Craze stated that the active play area would be for open play and not for soccer league play. Craze pointed out that "the park is intended for the neighborhood's use and that with limited parking and strong connections to the path system, walking to the park will be encouraged.

Bellah explained that the existing parking problems are being caused by construction vehicles and that more parking should be available for residents as development proceeds. Norman Rivera, attorney for Woodlawn, reminded council that the developer has contributed \$240,000 for two new Greenbelt police officers and that city police have been patrolling the area. Councilmember Konrad Herling told residents that "he hopes they will find the park to be an instrument to develop interpersonal connections with neighbors that can create a strong sense of community."

A. J. Stevens, a resident in attendance, reported that it has been difficult for residents to get information about the status of shuttle bus service and trails to Metro. Kristen Weaver told council that residents want to keep informed and are distributing the Greenbelt News Review and using an online service to improve communications among neighbors. Justin Frye, representing the developer, said he would absolutely address the problems of residents not being able to

contact the Homeowners Association. Councilmember Edward Putens strongly urged Frye to schedule a forum with residents in order to improve communication with residents about the park and other matters such as the status of the traffic light at South Core Parkway and Greenbelt Road (Md.193).

## Financing

A memorandum from Assistant City Manager David Moran cited a 2012 agreement between the city and Woodlawn Development Group that outlines the provisions for recreational amenities in the Greenbelt Station South Core, including approximately \$1.5 million for nature trails, public recreational facilities, playgrounds and sitting areas. In addition. \$1 million is to be provided for public recreational facilities for future use on site or in Greenbelt West. The developer is to execute the work as approved by the city pursuant to conditions of the South Core's detailed site plan (DSP 04081).

## **Next Steps**

Mayor Emmett Jordan said that the city is trying to approve the detailed park plan in time for construction to start this fall. Frye agreed, saying that "the fall is the prime construction season and the best time for planting trees."

The staff reported that the city Advisory Planning Board reviewed the park plan and had a favorable reaction. The staff has referred the park plan to the city Park and Recreation Advisory Board who will meet on September 16. The mayor said that council could possibly be ready to act on the plan in October.

## Streets

The cross sections for streets surrounding the park are designed to fit into the walkable nature of the community, with street trees, sidewalks, parallel parking along the residential side of the street and two nine-foot lanes for cars. The lanes for cars are slightly narrower than traditional lanes and will have the effect of encouraging slower traffic speeds.

There are two options for a small 0.35 acre park area across Stream Bank Lane concerning the amount of landscaping to be installed, with a balance to be struck between the need for a buffer between the park and the homes versus the goal of having "eyes on the park" for security. Another small 0.24 acre area across Greenbelt Station Parkway from the neighborhood park is designated for either retail development or parkland according to certain conditions to be reviewed as part of the development of Phase Three of the South Core, located west of Greenbelt Station Parkway. Other recreational elements of the community, but not covered in the detailed park plan, are an existing tot lot and trails which are under review for tree impacts by the city and the county.



## Cookies at the Bridge Needs Volunteers

The highly-successful Cookies at the Bridge project is continuing into another school year and needs assistance to keep the students safe. Cookies at the Bridge is a project that began several years ago after rumors of violence and gang fights on the Greenbelt Homes side of the Spellman Overpass were noted after school let out.

Spearheaded by Mowatt Memorial United Methodist Church, the project of handing out cookies and having a friendly adult presence near the bridge has

helped prevent violence and bullying. Teams of volunteers come from Mowatt and College Park United Methodist Churches, Greenbelt Community Church, Greenbelt Safety Patrol and Greenbelt City Council.

Volunteers are needed to help form groups of two or more that meet once a week from 3:25 until around 4 p.m. to smile and hand out cookies to students crossing the Spellman Overpass into Old Greenbelt. Those interested in helping just one afternoon per week or on an on-call basis may call 301-474-9410 and leave a name and telephone number. Calls will be returned ASAP.

to register to vote in this year's election must be a U.S. citizen and should have a birthdate no later than November 3, 1997. Individuals who have been found by a court to be incapable of voting by reason of mental disability are not eligible to register. No one is allowed to register who has been convicted of buying or selling votes. People may register who have been convicted of other felonies if they have completed their court-ordered sentence of imprisonment, including any required term of parole or proba-

## **Student Registration**

Otherwise qualified students attending colleges in Maryland may register to vote if they consider their local address to be their legal address or domicile. Usually that means it is the address that appears on tax returns or other government documents, driver's license, bank accounts, charge accounts and so forth. ## Registering – Just Do It

There are now so many ways to register to vote in Maryland that it is easier to "just do it" than to come up with a reason not to. Registration may be accomplished online, by mail or in person. Registering online at the state Board of Elections site using Maryland's Online Voter Registration System (OLVR) requires submission of a name, date of birth, and last four digits of a Social Security number that match information on file with the Maryland Motor Vehicles Administration (MVA). The signature on file at the MVA will become the official voter registration signature.

Anyone who has neither a valid Maryland driver's license nor a substitute MVA-issued ID card must complete a paper voter registration form and either mail it to the county Board of Elections or submit it in person at the office of the county board in Largo by the deadline. This form cannot be faxed or emailed because it requires an original signature.

Voter registration forms may be downloaded and printed from the state Board of Elections site. They are also available in hard copy at City Clerk Cindy Murray's office in the Municipal Building at 25 Crescent Road, as well as at the Greenbelt Library at 11 Crescent Road. If picking up a form is not possible, call the county Board of Elections office at 301-430-8020 and ask to receive one by mail. In addition to the county Board of Elections office, voter registration forms may also be completed and submitted at any full-service MVA office.

## **Registration Changes**

Registered Maryland voters are no longer required to re-register if they move to a new address within the state, even if they are crossing county lines, but they must update their information. (Of course, moving out of the city will preclude voting in the city election.) Address or name updates to existing registrations can be made using the same methods used for registering. Changes may be made online using the OLVR system at the state Board of Elections site if one has a Maryland driver's license or MVA identification card. Changes may be made using a voter registration form to be mailed to the county Board of Elections or submitted in person in Largo by the October 5 deadline. Such changes may also be made by simply writing a signed letter to the county Board of Elections. Completing a change of address form at the MVA will also send the change to the county for processing unless the voter asks that it not be.

## Party Affiliation

Greenbelt's city council elections are nonpartisan, which means there are no primary elections and no party designations or slates. In registering to vote, however, a resident has the option of registering with any of the state's recognized political parties for the purposes of voting in partisan primaries in presidential, state and county elections. Maryland's primary election for the 2016 presidential election will be held on Tuesday, April 26.

The political parties currently recognized in Maryland include the Democratic, Republican, Libertarian and Green parties. Choosing no political party results in an "unaffiliated" registration, which means the voter will be able to vote in general elections but usually not in primary elections other than nonpartisan primaries in a local jurisdiction—for example, to select nominees for school board elections.

## Good Biologists Are In Our Own Backyard

I was very disturbed by Ms. Donna Almquist's half-page advertisement in last week's (August 20) News Review outlining the city's plan to contract a Forest Conservation Act Service Provider to assess the health and well-being of our Greenbelt Nature/Forest Preserve with the aim of "recommending changes to the city code and to the Forest Preserve Management and Maintenance Guidelines"; guidelines which have worked well and have protected the Forest Preserve for the last 12 years.

One of the reasons my husband and I bought a house in Old Greenbelt was to be able to walk in those woods and feel like we were really "in nature" even while living in one of the most densely populated regions in the United States. I have seen people of all walks of life and ethnicity walk on the peaceful trails in the Preserve. The 220 forested acres of Greenbelt are not to be bargained with for the community living here.

I agree with Ms. Almquist's remarks that a forest/biologist/ ecologist (as required by the existing Greenbelt Guidelines) is a better choice for assessing the health of the forest than some management plan that will come from a FCA Service Provider which is, (like all organizations that have become influenced by neoliberal privatization and unchecked capitalist exploitation in our contemporary American society), only going to look out for its self-interests and serve those who lobby it to get a piece of the pie. These lobbyists will be represented by business and development interests that will. most probably, have their sights set on how to build on prime DC-greater-metropolitan realestate.

I do not understand why the city council has not thought of looking to the University of Maryland to find an excellent forest biologist/ecologist capable of assessing our forest within the stipulations of the city's forest preservation guidelines. We live right next to a major research institution of higher learning with one of the best biology departments in the country. As a professor (albeit focusing in the humanities), I can attest than many of my colleagues in the biological sciences would most likely welcome the possibility to serve as an expert. The assessment of the forest would even make an amazing class project for UM students working in forest preservation. Believe me, professors are always looking for ways to engage with the communities surrounding our campuses. I'm sure if the City of Greenbelt's leaders were to reach out to the University of Maryland biological sciences department, qualified people could be found; people who appreciate the beauty of our local, natural surroundings and who are interested as much as we are in preserving them.

We must resist becoming co-opted by outside, "managing" provider organizations which will never have the Greenbelt community's interests as their main priority.

## HIP Too Costly, Problematic

Other GHI members and I feel the spiraling membership fees need to be brought under control. The cost increases are seriously affecting many, especially seniors. Members trying to sell their unit are finding it harder and harder to find buyers because of the high coop fee, several realtors tell me.

We need to chart a new course. Please come to the next GHI Board Meeting to have your voices heard on Thursday, September 3, 7:30 p.m., One Hamilton Place.

Facts you need to know: Product Life Expectancy

The GHI Board has argued that our windows and baseboard heaters have reached their life expectancy and need to be replaced but have given no criteria to prove it. They also say that original doors need replacing but have no objective criteria to prove that.

Economies of Scale

The GHI Board has said that for the Home Improvement Project (HIP) it will be cheaper to replace ALL the windows, doors, and baseboard heaters over 5 years, rather than when they are judged to be defective. They use the term "Economies of Scale" as their rationale. Economies of scale are proportionate savings in costs, gained by an increased level of production.

However, there is a finite upper limit to how large an organization can grow to achieve economies of scale. After reaching a certain size, it becomes increasingly expensive to manage a gigantic organization for a number of reasons, including its complexity, bureaucratic na-

ture and operating inefficiencies. This undesirable phenomenon is referred to as "diseconomies of

On Thursday, August 20, at the Finance Committee Meeting, Eldon Ralph proposed an annual budget of \$430,000 to hire 4 fulltime employees and one half-time employee to manage the HIP. The project is scheduled to take 5 years to complete at a total management cost of \$2,150,000. This is a good example of diseconomies of scale.

Greenbelt Police Department and Greenbelt CARES staff and concerned residents ask the public to join them and participate in International Overdose Awareness Day on August 31. Other law enforcement and government agencies and activist groups around the world will focus that day on recognizing and spotlighting the widespread and growing epidemic of drug overdose inci-

An information desk will be set up in the police station lobby on Monday, August 31, from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m., with staff present from 10 a.m. to noon and 1 to 3 p.m. to answer questions. Written materials will include how to recognize drug abuse and addiction, ways to intervene and treatment options.

A Greenbelt police public safety information outreach booth will be set up during part of the Greenbelt Labor Day Festival next week and will also focus on drugs. It will be staffed by residents, concerned friends and neighbors who have experienced first-hand the results of family members struggling with addiction and its consequences, including death.

Maryland Governor Larry Hogan has initiated a state of emergency on drug overdoses. A statewide task force has been formed specifically to address the increase in heroin overdose







## Is It the Golden Anniversary? GES PTA Book Sale - A History

Is this the 50th year of the PTA book sale at the Labor Day Festival? Calling all historians, book lovers and other curious minds.

And this loved event has been happening for so long its origin is getting somewhat lost in the sands of memory. Greenbelt resident and teacher Beth Novick re-

Greenbelters love the book sale. In the words of long-time volunteer Anne Gardner, the book sale is a "win-win for everyone! People get rid of some of the clutter in their homes, they get new books very cheap and the school gets some money. It's wonderful for everyone!"


flected that she didn't "know the history of the book fair; it's been happening for such a long time!"

Novick went on to note how critical the book sale is to the community. During the time she worked at Greenbelt Elementary, teachers would get first pick of the donated books and could supplement their classroom libraries. "It was kind of a reciprocal arrangement," Novick said, explaining that teachers would sign up for shifts of staffing the book stall over the Labor Day weekend. Students would see their teachers working, which provided a feeling of comraderie for the young people; teachers new to Greenbelt would "get a chance to see the community in action at an event that is really important to the children"; and later teachers would get financial support in return from the funds raised by the PTA.

Mary Moien, who was involved with what was then known as the book booth in the mid-1970s, described how it is "a great place to meet your neighbors." She noted that people "congregate there," checking back to see what books have been unearthed through the festival. "People in Greenbelt love to read," she said, "and they love to read cheap books and free books." Greenbelter Mary Ann Baker, who with her family was involved with the book sale from 1977 to 1979, remarked that the book sale is "one of the things folks really look forward to about the Labor Day Festival." She has seen the book sale change throughout the years and likes that people can now donate - and purchase for low cost - DVDs

and CDs as well as books. As for when did the book sale

## Written History

The first mention of the book sale this reporter could find was an ad in the August 26, 1965

Needed", the ad referenced "the Used Book Sale at the North End PTA's booth at the Labor Day

Indisputably, the PTA book sale was started by Norman Weyel, a staunch PTA member at all the schools his children attended, according to his obituary in the Greenbelt News Review on February 28, 2002. Baker recalls that Weyel founded the book sale as part of his role with the North End School PTA. When North End School closed in 1981, the book sale, along with so many students, moved to the Center School and ultimately to Greenbelt Elementary.

## Protect the Forest Preserve - Come to the August 31st Work Session!

Attention all Greenbelters: Protect the Greenbelt Forest Preserve. Please come to the August 31st work session in the Municipal Building at 8 p.m. Be sure to check the city website for any changes to this date (www. greenbeltmd.gov).

The council should stop the city from contracting with a Forest Conservation Act (FCA) Service Provider to assess the health of the Forest Preserve. The city intends to include language in the contract asking the FCA Service Provider to recommend changes to the city code and to the Forest Preserve Management and Maintenance Guidelines (Guidelines) which together have protected the Forest Preserve for the past twelve years.

In October 2003 the council passed legislation creating the Forest Preserve which consists of over 220 acres of forested areas in Greenbelt managed as protected, undeveloped, and undisturbed areas for the benefit of current and future generations. The council, at the time, determined the residents should be stewards to protect the natural qualities of these areas and appointed a task force to write the Forest Preserve Guidelines. The Guidelines include a provision for a forest biologist/ecologist to provide a health assessment if such an assessment were deemed necessary. They did not require a health assessment be done.

On November 24, 2014, council passed three important motions. (1) According to draft minutes, Rodney Roberts moved that council proceed on contracting with a professional forest biologist/ecologist to assess the health of the Forest Preserve. Mayor Jordan responded by encouraging staff to seek a professional forest biologist/ecologist. (2) According to the minutes, Judith Davis moved that council direct the Forest Preserve Advisory Board to review the Forest Preserve Guidelines and prepare a list of recommended changes to council. (3) Judith Davis also moved that council direct city staff to review the Forest Preserve chapter of the city code and update it as needed and that proposed changes be referred to the Advisory Board for review and then to council.

A Request for Proposal (RFP) was written by the city. According to Celia Craze, the city sent over 120 solicitations for proposals. These primarily went to firms identified as Forest Conservation Act (FCA) Service Providers listed on the Maryland Department of Natural Resources (DNR) web site. Only five solicitations went to individuals or firms suggested by Advisory Board members. According to Celia Craze, only five proposals were received by the city. All of the proposals are from FCA Service Providers.

FCA Service Providers are entities approved by the Maryland Department of Natural Resources to assist developers in creating the Forest Conservation Plan that is required for certain planned developments in Maryland. The list includes foresters, landscape architects, and others. The mindset is controlled development rather than preservation and ecology.

According to Dr. Marc Lapin, ecologist and environmental studies professor at Middlebury College, a forest biologist/ecologist (as required by the Forest Preserve Guidelines) is a better choice than a forester to do the assessment (if one is done at all). A forest biologist/ecologist has a broad perspective of the relationships between plants, animals, soils, water and rocks. In contrast, a forester's perspective puts more emphasis on 'managing' the forest for use and economic gain.

A contract with a FCA Service Provider will be inconsistent with Roberts' motion (approved 7-0), Mayor Jordan's encouragement, and the Forest Preserve Guidelines.

Please contact the members of council and the city clerk to let them know that you want the process to award a contract stopped and to leave alone the documents that protect the Forest Preserve. The contact information is:

has attracted more and more donations and, correspondingly, raised increasingly more money. Approximately 25,000 books are donated each year. While the recent average in revenue has been \$10,000, last year the book sale brought in a whopping \$12,000 in proceeds for the Greenbelt Elementary school PTA.

## **Benefits**

Funds raised from the book sale have benefited students and staff in a myriad of ways. In a letter to the editor of the News Review printed on September 14, 1972, North End Elementary School PTA member Theresa Crowley expressed her thanks to those who contributed books and to those who bought them. She wrote that the "year's proceeds will be used to begin a musical instrument lending library at the school." Darrell Mach, who served as PTA treasurer during

a period of the 1980s, recalled signing the check that paid for the school's first computers. Leta Mach remembered PTA funds going towards buying and stocking

cently, PTA book sale money has gone to support field trips; purchase new overhead projectors; provide school-wide assemblies of performing groups such as members of the Baltimore Opera; pay for the gifts given during national Teacher Appreciation Week; purchase new carpet for the front entrance and the kindergarten room; enhance curriculum; purchase school supplies for students; support teacher projects and more.

## Challenges

Betty Timer, who was very involved with the PTA throughout the 1980s and early 1990s, remembered when the books were kept in boxes on the ground. One year a terrible thunderstorm rolled in overnight and about one third of the books were destroyed. The following year they set up pallets for the books to rest on, so that even if it rained the water could flow underneath them. Amy Hansen, who chaired the book sale for three years in the early 2000s, recalled that "rain gave me nightmares." She remembered waking up at just the hint of a thunderstorm and rushing to the Festival grounds

to ensure the tarps laid over the books were secure.

"It's a very exhausting weekend," said Gardner, "but well worth it." Consensus is that gathering to see what books are avail-

able – and to run into neighbors

and friends – is a highlight of the





## French Immersion School Renamed for Dora Kennedy

Dora Kennedy French Immersion School, formerly Robert Goddard French Immersion School, has now occupied the former Greenbelt High School – more recently the Greenbelt Middle School – for one year. As of July 1, the school has officially been renamed in honor of a local champion of language immersion schools, Dr. Dora F. Kennedy.

There is currently a huge pile of rubble beside the gym where the old administrative wing is being demolished as students come back to school. The school administration had sought its own facility for many years and the many improvements still being made to the building have made the change even more welcome.

The dedicated building in Greenbelt has allowed the school to use French language more consistently throughout the building, in signage and art. The library can focus on providing French language materials. Freedom from sharing a building with another school, often making scheduling of common space challenging, has meant greater opportunities for night-time activities like bingo, movie nights and talent shows. It also permits serving meals and providing childcare at PTA meetings. The gym has not only been accessible for school teams in season, but is available for off-season clinics in soccer, basketball and cheerleading.

For the first time in many years, the school, which carries a long wait list, is expanding, adding about 25 students every year.

Art, music, band and orchestra, formerly meeting of necessity in storage rooms and on the school stage, now have appropriate and spacious classrooms. The fifth grade, which was housed entirely in temporary classrooms, now has permanent classrooms, new furnishings and up-to-date technology. English language arts, which were in rooms designed to be office space, now enjoy high ceilings, fresh air and sunlight beaming through the windows. Although we have seen many improvements resulting from having our own building, some concerns remain. The refurbished gymnasium, for example, is unbearably hot. This results from the installation of new windows which do not open, compounded by delay in approval for air conditioning.

The whole building is alive after hours with Destination Imagination, Chess Club, Lego Robotics, Makers Club, Art Club, Sciencematics, S.M.A.R.T. Club, Rising Stars and three environmental clubs: E.S.W.A.T., Environmental Entrepreneurs and Green Team.

For all these reasons the students, faculty and staff are grateful for their move to Greenbelt. Look for Dora Kennedy French Immersion School to highlight its diverse interests in the Greenbelt Labor Day Parade.


The lights went on, the enchantment faded, the memories linger.
