# The Big Snow Brings Greenbelters Together

"I just thought that was wonderful," said Bunny Fitzgerald of Greenbriar on discovering her upstairs neighbor had shoveled out her car. "I couldn't clean off my car because the snow was too high. But I went out on Sunday and everyone in our building and the building next door was out shoveling snow. The young woman who lives above me shoveled out my car," Fitzgerald explained happily.

Both Fitzgerald and Mayor Emmett Jordan, who also lives in Greenbriar, were happy with the work of Public Works and CVI, the management company of Greenbriar; crews were working as early as Friday night shoveling, salting and sanding walkways around the complex. "They've done a beautiful job," said Fitzgerald.

Jordan, speaking on Saturday, noted that the driveway to his complex was clear. He walked around parts of Greenbelt that day and observed that Greenway Center was open and the parking lot clear for people who had emergencies and needed to store, closed on Saturday, was back in operation on Sunday and had a steady stream of shoppers. The Old Greenbelt Theatre opened every day, with some free shows for children during the days such as Pixar Shorts on Monday and Frozen on Tuesday, as well as its originally scheduled movie lineup. Members received email notice that the theater was open.

According to Jordan, Public Works ran round-the-clock staff during the storm, with the crews "working really hard. They are on rotating shifts; they're on call, on duty, sleep there." Jordan explained that Public Works was focused first on getting major roadways clear, then residential streets and then public walkways and sidewalks. Already most streets are clear, excepting where people have shoveled snow back into the roads as they clear off their cars. Some of the inner walkways have been plowed and salted. "I think they're doing a really good job," said Jordan.

# GSA Requests Bids for New FBI HQ, D.C. Hoover Building Swap

On Friday, January 22, the General Services Administration (GSA) announced that it had issued Phase II of its Request for Proposals (RFP) for the Federal Bureau of Investigation Headquarters Consolidation Project. It also announced that President Barack Obama's Fiscal Year 2017 budget proposal to Congress will include funding in support of full consolidation of the project.

The following is the GSA release:

Washington —The U.S. General Services Administration today issued Phase II of the Request for Proposals to the bidders that will compete for title to the J. Edgar Hoover Federal Building in exchange for the construction of a new 2.1 million rentable square foot Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) headquarters facility. To ensure that GSA can make an award for the project in FY17, GSA also announced that \$1.4 billion in construction funding will be included in the President's FY17 budget to be released on February 9, 2016.

"The Administration is committed to acquiring a consolidated new headquarters facility for the FBI, a member of the intelligence community," said Bill Dowd, project executive for GSA's Public Buildings Service. "The consolidated headquarters facility will allow the FBI to perform its critical national security, intelligence and law enforcement missions in a new modern and secure facility. We appreciate Congress' support of the project through the inclusion of \$390 million in the Fiscal Year 2016 Omnibus."

In October, GSA notified the short-listed bidders that they had

been selected to participate in Phase II. In Phase II, bidders will submit proposals to construct the consolidated FBI headquarters in exchange for the J. Edgar Hoover Federal Building. The project will bring together FBI headquarters functions currently housed at the Hoover building, as well as those dispersed at multiple locations across the Washington, D.C., metropolitan area.

Three potential sites Greenbelt, Landover and Springfield, VA for the new FBI headquarters facility have already been identified: The National Environmental Policy Act evaluation process is underway and GSA released the draft environmental impact statement in November, held public meetings in each of the three local jurisdictions, and is in the process of reviewing public comments.

# GHI Board Approves City's Request to Buy 10-A Crescent

Eight members of the Board of Directors of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. voted unanimously at their January 21 meeting to allow the City of Greenbelt to acquire the use of the house at 10-A Crescent Road for the purpose of expanding the space available to the Greenbelt Museum, which currently occupies the other half of the duplex, 10-B Crescent Road. Board Member Diana McFadden was ill and did not attend the meeting.

The motion to support was made by Treasurer Chuck Hess, who listed the board's two conditions for the approval. One was that the city agree to sign new commercial Mutual Ownership Contracts (MOCs) for both 10-A and 10-B, since the MOC for the second house would otherwise be based upon a more recent template than the first. The second condition was that the city pay all legal costs associated with the creation of the MOCs for the two houses. bers as a result.

Vice President Susan Ready added that, in fact, the situation was quite to the contrary. "The City of Greenbelt has always been a good member at 10-B," she said. "Not only do they always pay their co-op fee on time, they always pay it a year in advance."

The next steps involve the city's review of the draft MOC. President Steve Skolnik indicated that the draft MOC for 10-A is based not on the MOC for 10-B but on another commercial membership. The 10-B MOC will be

redrawn from that commercial membership. Hess recommended that the city's attorney first look at the draft, with review by GHI's attorney to follow, including any queries or requested changes from the city.

### **Mutual Benefits**

City Councilmember Judith Davis, who was also present at the meeting, reinforced the idea that having the Greenbelt Museum located in a GHI house really is a benefit to both the city and to GHI, since people's first

Board Member Bill Jones said it should be understood that "GHI will neither receive any less money nor spend any more money than [if the occupants were] natural-born members." In short, he said that although the unit would be removed from residential occupancy, there would be no financial loss to other mem-

Barnet has lived in Greenbelt for over 25 years. For the last two decades, he has developed algorithms for monitoring the Earth's weather and climate from advanced Earth-orbiting sensors.

As always, the last portion of the evening will be used for local announcements and updates on Greenbelt sustainability projects.

# **Obituaries**

### Charles "Chuck" Ashurst

On Tuesday, January 5, 2016 Charles "Chuck" Roderick Ashurst, 64, of Greenbelt died peacefully in his sleep at home. Originally from Fowler, Colo., he served as a teletypist for the U.S. Army during the Vietnam War. He then moved to Alexandria, Va., where he started his government career at the Bureau of Public Debt. Later while working at the National Archives, Mr. Ashurst completed his bachelor's degree in history. In the mid-1980s, he worked briefly as a cab driver before transitioning to the U.S. Postal Service, where he spent 15 years serving Hyattsville and Riverdale. He completed his doctor of law degree at the University of the District of Columbia in 2000, joining the Maryland Bar Association and practicing family law in Prince George's County.

Mr. Ashurst enjoyed gardening, cooking and helping others. He was an active church member

### **Chrissy Wilkin's Art** At New Deal Café

### **Hoover Federal Building**

The FBI has occupied the J. Edgar Hoover Federal building since 1974. The building is situated in a prime location on Pennsylvania Avenue. The 1.77 million rentable square foot (2.4 million gross square foot) building sits on 6.7 acres of land and is a prime location for office, retail and residential uses.

### Reducing Federal Footprint

The FBI Headquarters Consolidation Project is part of GSA's ongoing effort to meet the Obama Administration's goals to reduce the footprint and operational efficiency by consolidating federal agencies into government-owned space and getting under-performing federal facilities off the government's books. (end of release)

### Washington Post

The Washington Post reported this announcement in its January 24 edition. It also reported that Obama is seeking \$1.4 billion in appropriations in the FY17 budget which is to be released February 9. Senator Barbara Mikulski had previously obtained a \$390 million set-aside, concerned that sale of the Hoover Building would not be enough to provide a feasible plan to build the proposed 2.1 million square foot building.

The Post article also said, "Although the agency has declined to name which teams remain, executives familiar with the search say there are four, led by Boston Properties, Lerner Enterprises, the Peterson Cos. and the JBG Cos. along with Vornado Realty Trust. Those firms have declined to publicly confirm their participation." Lerner Enterprises has been part-owner in a number of Greenbelt development projects and built the University Square apartments. However, the company is also reported to be the owner of the former Landover Mall property which is in contention for the FBI headquarters. Ted Lerner is the principal owner of the Washington Nationals baseball franchise.

Mikulski also issued a press release on January 22. In it she is quoted as saying, "I've fought tooth and nail for the men and women of the FBI, working to secure a \$390 million significant down-payment in the FY16 funding bill. And now that the President has requested full funding for the new headquarters. . . . I'll work my earrings off to put the funds in the federal checkbook."

The Post story notes however that, "House Minority Whip Steny Hoyer, D-Md., a proponent of the project, has said he is not a big fan of the swap idea because he believes the Hoover Building would probably bring in more money if it were sold independently, rather than offered only to companies that also have the capability and interest needed for building a campus."

Unclear is whether the final arrangement will remain the lease-purchase deal originally proposed by GSA or if the government will construct the building with its own funds, although the proposed appropriation would indicate that the government will build and own the building. It is also unclear if land ownership could be an issue, since the Greenbelt site is owned by Metro and was to be made available for development on a long-term lease basis.

introduction to GHI often comes through the museum.

City Manager Michael McLaughlin attended the meeting, as did Museum Board Member Anna Socrates and Sheila Maffay-Tuthill, education and volunteer coordinator for the museum. **Pending City Ordinance** 

On January 11 council introduced for first reading an ordinance to authorize the city to acquire by negotiated purchase the rights-to-use 10-A Crescent. The ordinance was scheduled to return for second reading and adoption on council's January 25 agenda. Because of the snow over last weekend, the meeting is currently rescheduled for Thursday, January 28. While there is thus one step left to close the loop, little doubt exists that council will adopt the ordinance at the first possible snow-free opportunity.

The city's ordinance stipulates the sale price to be up to \$200,000, plus any related costs or fees. Since GHI is a cooperative, the sale would not actually be for the real estate at 10-A but rather to enter into a mutual ownership contract (MOC) with GHI that would give the city a right to perpetual use of the unit. Since the city is already a GHI member by virtue of its MOC for 10-B, it would still be allowed to hold only one membership vote following the purchase of 10-A.

The house at 10-B was acquired by the city for use by the museum as part of its 50th Anniversary celebration in 1987. At the time, it was recognized as extraordinary good luck to have a house become available in a location so near the town center, the Municipal Building and what eventually became the renovated Community Center.

Ever since then, the staff and friends of the museum have hoped that in time it would be possible for the museum to occupy 10-A as well. The additional space would permit consolidation
