Explore Your Greenbelt: Open House at GAC

Greenbelt becomes Italy for more than two hours with "Enchanted April" at the Greenbelt Arts Center (GAC). This story of two English housewives on a life-changing trip to Italy after WWI, "Enchanted April" illustrates how a community theater fuels the imagination of its residents. The community is invited to an open house on April 8 from 7 to 8 p.m. at the Arts Center. This event, immediately prior to opening of the play, is part of the Explore Your Greenbelt with the Greenbelt Community Foundation to celebrate its 10th anniversary. This is a series of 14 monthly events and activities that will feature organizations who have received Foundation funding. All are invited to attend to learn about these organizations and how the Foundation lives out

its mission of "nourishing all of Greenbelt's Neighborhoods."

The first organization featured is the Arts Center (GAC) which received funding to assist with major renovations. Operating on a shoe string budget with only one paid part-time staff position, the facility is now ADA compliant with improved restrooms, a renovated lobby, new front doors and enhanced air quality, all making it more attractive and accessible to a broader audience.

In addition to offering local theater and numerous volunteer opportunities, the Arts Center trains future actors and technicians through its collaboration with the Greenbelt Recreation Department Creative Kids Summer Camp. Many of those

Greenbelter Amanda Brozana Is National Grange Officer

On Friday, March 25, the nation's oldest agricultural advocacy and fraternal family organization, the National Grange, welcomed Greenbelt resident Amanda Leigh Brozana back as the organization's director of communication.

Brozana served the Grange as director of communications from March 2011 to August 2014, and in November 2015 was elected National Lecturer of the organization. In that position, she serves as the officer charged with creating programming and generating ideas for local Granges, of which there are more than 2,100 across the nation, as well as contests for members and those not affiliated with the Grange.

"The Grange is an amazing organization and I am fortunate to be a part of it," Brozana said.

Brozana, originally from Orwigsburg, Pa., said she is working with National Grange Leadership/Membership Director Joe Stefenoni to hold informational meetings for Greenbelt and surrounding area residents in late April and May to charter a local Grange in Greenbelt.

"With all the civic participation and activism, I was shocked to find out that Greenbelt was not one of the more than 40,000 communities across the country to have a Grange at one time in it," Brozana said. "As a grassroots organization, every Grange serves its community differently, but meets the challenges residents of that area identify. Some focus on education about food and the food system, others raise money and support things like teen pregnancy centers and efforts to reduce teen pregnancy; but

took place about which kind of sign to place at which location. Generally, council preferred using column signs instead of pole, although the latter would be less expensive.

There was also difference of opinion expressed on whether or not a map of the city should again be placed at the Southway entrance to the city. The matter was not resolved.

A remaining obstacle to achieving this council objective, referred to as a 15-year project, is permission from the Maryland State Highway Administration (SHA) to place these signs on state highway right-of-ways, according to Planning and Community Development Director Celia Craze. Mayor Emmett Jordan urged staff to get an answer from SHA. If it is a "no," then council, he thought, can seek the support of the city's representatives in the state legislature. City Manager Michael McLaughlin cautioned that while money was budgeted for this project, "it may not be enough."

Southway

An entrance sign reading "Welcome to Greenbelt" and a Plexiglass-protected and wood framed map board of the city were installed when Southway was rebuilt as a boulevard around 1970. The purpose was to aid travelers unfamiliar with the city's curving streets, one of which goes in all four directions of the compass. The map was hand-painted by volunteers since the city had no money budgeted to have it done professionally. The map did not include Greenbelt East which was not yet developed. While a similar map board was planned for other

city entrances, funds were never budgeted.

When Greenbelt East was first developed, the Southway map board was updated by another volunteer, there being sufficient room on the board to do it. But when a significant area was annexed to Greenbelt East, there was no room available on the board and so the additional modification could not be made. When a car struck the board in an accident, severely damaging it, the map was removed.

Bradley proposed lowering the height of the retaining wall and placing a monument sign to replace the old map board, with shrubbery behind it. Councilmembers raised two issues. Should a bus shelter be installed there? Should a map be put there as well?

Craze thought that the rightof-way there was not sufficient to add a bus shelter. Councilmember Konrad Herling said a bus shelter

Thank you for your attention and thoughtfulness toward making Spellman pedestrian bridge safe. Although we maintain the bridge itself (lights, fencing, etc.) we do not own Gardenway nor the paved trail on either side of the walkway bridge. The City of Greenbelt owns the land and beautiful bronze plaque bearing Mrs. Spellman's name. If you contact the City of Greenbelt, I'm sure they would answer any question or concerns you may have.

NPS needs access to work on the bridge. If the bridge is blocked off with barriers (like the ones that exist) we would need a crane truck every time we need to do repairs. Perhaps a lock/fold barrier may be the answer, but again that is a city decision.

Use or Lose New Sunday Bus Service

Some have labored for years to get Sunday Metrobus service here in Greenbelt, but now that we have it, two drivers have already told me that if there is no ridership this service will be discontinued.

Once again we Greenbelters have an opportunity to demonstrate how green and how diverse we actually are. Ever since 1981 the experience of public commuter transit (mixed with bicycling exercise in getting to the bus stops, of being able to safely and freely text and talk, of getting to meet more of one's neighbors, of getting into more political discussions, of making new friends, of riding more collision-safe in the bigger vehicles, of making one's way through traffic where one dare not drive, of non-furtive sight-seeing, of seeing up close more of the issues in public transit, of playing a real role in helping our environment.

Just as owning and operating a car requires a specialized skills set, so does using the public transit system. I claim that these skills are well worth learning. One could get started by doing some outings with a friend familiar with the public transit system. Notably, we now can usually find out, using a smartphone, when the next bus will be arriving.

Hopefully, now, more of my neighbors will feel that they can reduce car ownership by at least one car as I did when I became car-free 10-1/2 years ago.

Edward Greene

Long-time Greenbelt resident Edward P. Greene died peacefully at Calvert Memorial Hospital on February 23, 2016. The cause of death was complications from Alzheimer's disease. Ed and his wife Janet and two young daughters moved to Lakeside Drive in the late 1960s. They had many happy years there before retiring to Port Republic, Md., in 2004.

Ed was born in Boston on September 29, 1935, to Edward A. and Josephine Greene. He received a bachelor's degree in math in 1957 and a master's degree in physics in 1959 from the University of Florida. In 1980 he earned a master's degree in electrical engineering from the University of Maryland.

Mr. Greene had a long and dedicated career working for NASA. At Goddard Space Flight Center he was an electronic engineer for Ground Systems Management. Later in his career he worked for the Office of Space Communications at NASA headquarters in Washington, D.C., where he served as the coordinator for international data systems standards. During his career he enjoyed solving problems using his mathematical and computer programming skills as well as collaborating internationally with professional colleagues. He also enjoyed serving as bookkeeper and treasurer for several organizations and was active in the Unitarian Universalist Church of Silver Spring.

The Greenes took many wonderful trips throughout their marriage. His passion for travel took them to China, Russia, Greece, the Galapagos Islands, Peru, Ireland, Turkey and Poland. He loved to hike and especially enjoyed the Milford Track in New Zealand. Other favorite journeys included Nepal, Thailand and India. Closer to home, he could be found walking his dogs around Greenbelt Lake or searching for fossils along the Chesapeake Bay.

Mr. Greene is survived by his wife Janet, his daughters Amanda (Steve) Hogan and Sandy (Tom Egan) and grandchildren Patrick and Kathryn Hogan. A memorial service will be held on Saturday, May 7 at 3 p.m. at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Silver Spring, 10309 New Hampshire Avenue. Barbara Simon's Art Depicts Human Tenderness, Kindness

Then, as I viewed Barbara Simon's art exhibit at the New Deal Café, entitled Drawing Women, I felt a clear sense of human tenderness and had the realization that innocence and works of gentle kindness are surviving; they have not been lost. And these compositions, sensitive and lovely, are not trite. Their beauty is a result of a healthy knowledge of form.

I stood in the front room of the Café and looked into a picture named Dark Mary in the Moon. It's done in the simple tools of pencil and charcoal. The moon softly turns into the shape of a hammock tied to the branches of a tree where Mary rests. The work appears to be fragile, yet there is the presence of some substantial strength.

The mother Mary is still with us in the second work. But now she holds her child, balanced on her arm. The moon appears as a circle beneath the pair and the two seem to be walking through the moon or maybe the moon is walking with them. Its title is Mary and Jesus in the Moon.

The third work, Mary in the Moon, is done in pencil and charcoal and the two figures, human and celestial, merge as one shape. The moon is echoed in Mary's robe as though she is clothed in moonlight.

First Blosson, the fourth work, is done completely in pencil. Here, a woman and a plant fuse into one shape, forming a new structure. The woman bends to the plant as if she understands it to be a part of her own existence.

Visit is done in pencil, pastel and colored pencil. Mary sits in a chair with her baby. The visitor also sits in a chair beside her, holding a bowl of food in her lap, and she extends her hand, holding out a morsel of bread, to the baby. The three figures sit in front of a window arched by trees standing against a yellow sky.

In the back room, the first work is entitled Mary and Jesus in the Beltsville Farm. Mary sits on a rock, again holding her child while trees on either side of the pair create a doorway. Jesus is entertained by a small butterfly. Two angels playing musical instruments perch in the trees bending over the mother and child. Mary looks out directly to the viewer, and the child Jesus looks at the butterfly. Mary and Jesus in the Apple Tree is a pencil drawing where Mary and the tree seem to connect as one figure. Jesus, as a small child, reaches for an apple dangling from a tree branch. This work clearly shows the strong relationship between the mother and child. Mary's son is protected by a mother who also gives him the freedom to explore. In the next works, modern figures are portrayed with the Madonna's classic loveliness. The first of these works is of a woman standing balanced on one foot. As she removes her sandal, she holds on to the wall so as not to slip on the wet floor. The design of the background, lines and blocks of solid color are repeated in the woman's dress. This work title is Changing Room in the Greenbelt Aquatic Center.

Silent Woman Speaks is done in pencil, charcoal and pastel. The woman's gown and shawl form a flowing S shape. Everything about this lady is still and calm, as if a creation of some other place than the material world. If she is speaking, it must be in silent communication.

In the next work, a woman is either in the state of prayer or in deep spiritual resignation. Her head is bowed, her eyes are closed. Her arms curve around her body as if she is protecting herself. Her head scarf and dress are done in a solid color to form a shape of their own. This piece has the title of Silent Woman.

The next work is of a woman surrounded by several lily plants. The flowers move in a curving path around the woman so that the human figure and the plants combine as one. The hair of the woman, her shawl and dress combine as one unit with the flowers.

Waterfall - Greenbelt Aquatic Center is done in pencil and pastel. This is the waterfall at the shallow end of the Greenbelt outdoor swimming pool. A single woman stands alone while the waterfall, formed by squares and lines, rises above her.

All these works are beautifully framed. And in all of them, kindness, innocence and an unblemished, sacred kind of wisdom occur. Demure, solemn and untarnished, these women are drawn with a gracefulness devoid of sentimentalism. These works must have been inspired by a spiritual presence.

Now, as I wait at the outdoor patio of the Café, I look out at the trees and find myself saying, "Oh, I see a branch where a beautiful lady could sit, perhaps holding a little child!"

About the Artist

Barbara Simon's parents lived in Greenwich Village, New York City. In 1939 Barbara's father saw the World's Fair and was taken by the Greenbelt exhibit. That day he went back to the Village where he and Barbara's mother decided to get married. Then they moved to Greenbelt.

Barbara and her sister were both born here. This was when Generous Joe's was a post office. Barbara remembers how, as a child, she checked each day to see if anything arrived in her post

ings and Loan.

Barbara's mother found a great art teacher in D.C. who lived in the top floor of an old brownstone building. She used the ground floor to hold her art classes. Barbara studied with this woman from 1st grade all through high school.

Every Saturday morning, Barbara's dad took her to D.C. They visited museums, especially the Phillips Collection. At that time the National Gallery of Art was an old building hidden behind the Smithsonian's American Art collection.

When she was a teenager, Barbara began to design the family's Christmas cards. Her Mom took these cards to the Artist's Mart, a co-operative art gallery on Wisconsin Avenue in Georgetown, where they were accepted and sold. Using offset lithography, her father printed out Barbara's cards.

Then, in the 1960's, a bad recession hit the U.S. Everyone suffered, including the publishing industry. There was no work; all illustration and artistic endeavors dried up.

So Barbara's parents decided to buy an offset press and put it in the garage. Their philosophy was, "A recession is a good time to start a business because you can only go up."

Barbara and her folks printed all kinds of greeting cards in that garage and continued the work for the next 15 years. Barbara, together with her sister, Kathleen, designed many types of cards, especially Christmas cards.

Drawing was what absorbed and defined Barbara as an artist. To her, it was drawing that constituted the foundation for all other art forms.

Barbara went to art school and graduated from the Pratt Institute in Brooklyn, N.Y. However, as a student, she was told that she "couldn't do just drawing," that drawing was not significant, not relevant or serious enough. And she couldn't major in it.

So she decided to study printing and illustration.

After her schooling, she became a freelance children's book illustrator, just as her mother had been.

Barbara was always a champion for the art of drawing. She bravely stood up for it.

Her favorite artist is Edgar Degas, the man who created such masterpieces as the Italian Head and the many studies of the female figure. He proved that the essential structural and defining elements of painting stem from drawing. In the last 20 years, drawing has again become recognized as a legitimate art form. It is not merely a preparation for something more substantial. Drawing stands on its own.

The sisters went to the Coop Nursery School held in the Parkway Apartments behind the Co-op. After that they attended classes from kindergarten up to the 4th grade at the Center School, which is now the Community Center. Then, from the 5th grade, they were students at the North End School, now the Greenbelt Elementary School.

This was the time when the library was housed in the community center and the outdoor pool was the only swimming pool. It was a safe place for children. No busy streets to cross, since there were the underpasses. All around the community people walked and shopped and looked out for each other. Barbara loved to walk alone or with her sister to the library and then on to the swimming pool.

Barbara's earliest art exhibit was held at the Twin Pines Sav-

Raiders Boys Basketballers **Once Again State Champions**

First it was 13-2. Next 24-6. Then 38-13. The 2016 boys basketball state championship game wasn't officially over until the scoreboard flashed a final score of 72-39; however, the final whistle signaled a foregone conclusion - the Eleanor Roosevelt High School (ERHS) Raiders were on top for the second time in four years.

After a 10-point victory in the state semi-final over Perry Hall, the Raiders sprinted to a commanding first quarter lead over the Meade Mustangs the 2015 state champions - and never relented. Coach Brendan O'Connell's squad started with a suffocating defense that only allowed five baskets in the entire first half. As the Raiders' extensive height harassed the Mustangs, senior guard Delascio Dancy further frustrated Meade's leading scorer, Tristan Easton, by producing four steals as he shadowed Easton all night.

The air-tight defense parlayed into easy offense for the Raiders, who used their height advantage mercilessly, scoring 60 of their 72 points from the paint. The Raiders were led by guards Naji Marshall (21 points) and Jaden Faulkner (16 points). Yet it was senior forward Trent Bishop's 13 points, scored early and effortlessly, that were symbolic of

the Raiders' dominant interior performance. While 10 players ended up scoring for the Raiders, senior Victor Okafor was certainly the most electrifying. The 6'7" Okafor twice snuck free for backdoor alley-oops - a play ERHS opponents fell victim to all winter-that sent the extensive ERHS student section into a frenzv.

The game ended with the starters celebrating on the bench. But even after receiving their state championship trophy, the Raiders had one task left to perform - they organized themselves in a pre-game warmup that involves diving on the floor for imaginary loose balls. Led by Dancy, Marshall and Okafor, the Raiders took one last dive - symbolic of their defensive identity into a championship dogpile that they won't soon forget.

should be placed there if it was to be used as a stop. It was noted that there was another bus stop down the street and councilmembers wondered if that might not be sufficient to serve the area. Staff was asked to look into the use and need for bus stops in that area.

Maps

Jordan said he preferred to leave the wall as is and see a map at Southway. Councilmember Rodney Roberts strongly advocated for a map, expressing preference to restoring the old map. Councilmember Judith Davis opined that "the day of maps is gone" with the advent of GPS. Councilmember Leta Mach thought the present wall didn't look "too terrific."

Another issue raised was what to do about all the organization and directional signs lining the street, particularly on Southway and Crescent Road near Kenilworth Avenue. Bradley said that she had looked into this 10 to 15 years ago and had determined that there were 46 organizations eligible to place such signage. It would take a very large sign structure to consolidate them all in one place. She also noted that this information is now easily available on the Internet.

Jordan asked if it was a right for such organizations to place signs on the right-of-ways. McLaughlin responded that it had been a city practice.

Column Signs

Some councilmembers expressed preference for use of column signs over the pole signs at more locations while others thought the less expensive pole signs would do. Jordan thought that some column signs should be taller and suggested that banners could be attached to the back sides. He also thought that the city logo should face both directions, depending on the specific location.

Mach thought the signs should all be of standard height, but it was noted that some would be at higher or lower elevation with respect to the road. Davis expressed concern that the city was seeking commercial properties to limit free-standing signage to a height of six feet while the column signs were proposed to be taller. Roberts said he would like to know the costs for each sign type.

Councilmembers discussed the placement of signs at various locations with differing opinions
