City Manager Presents Proposed Budget for Fiscal Year 2017

The city's annual budget review kicked off on Tuesday, March 29 with City Manager Michael McLaughlin's presentation of his proposed budget. The first of eight worksessions to drill down into the details of each department's budget followed the next night. McLaughlin's proposal calls for no change in the city's property tax rate, implementation of some of the recommendations from the organizational assessment study and contained some good news for city staff. The new fiscal year begins July 1.

The proposed budget calls for total expenditures of \$27.1 mil-

lion. Of this, 38.2 percent will be spent on public safety, 20.3 percent on recreation and parks, 12 percent on public works, 10.7 percent on general government (including council, the city manager's office, finance, human resources, information technology and community promotion) and 3.8 percent on Greenbelt Cares. The remaining 11.3 percent is accounted for by miscellaneous, non-departmental expenditures and fund transfers. The proposed total is 1.6 percent greater than the budget adopted for the current fiscal year.

Staffing in most departments is proposed to be unchanged. The

exception is Public Works where McLaughlin is proposing to add a full-time Volunteer Environmental Coordinator and to increase participants in the summer help program from 2 to 4 employees. The net change across all departments is 1.5 full-time equivalents.

Property Taxes

While McLaughlin is not proposing any change to the property tax rate, residential property owners will likely see an increase in their tax bills as Fiscal Year (FY) 2017 property taxes will be based upon a new assessment. The assessed value of single family homes, townhouses and condominiums increased 14.5 percent including new development in Greenbelt Station. However, apartment and commercial assessed values decreased by 4.6 percent and 5.8 percent, respectively. This nets out to an overall increase in estimated gross assessed value of real property of just 2.9 percent for a total of \$15.9 million. This is 19 percent lower than the total assessed value in FY 2010 and considerably less than the 10 percent increase city staff had originally anticipated based upon their analysis of property values.

Total property tax revenues, including personal and business property taxes are projected to account for 63.8 percent of city revenues. Other major revenue sources include other taxes (14.4 percent), license and permit fees

Greenbelt Youth Advisory Committee Trip to D.C.

Early last month, the Greenbelt Youth Advisory Committee traveled to Washington, D.C. to participate as youth delegates in the National League of Cities' (NLC) Congressional City Conference. This annual event hosts city councils from around the country as they share issues relevant to their localities and their consequent solutions, in the hopes that they can return to their cities with a wealth of information that can be used to better serve their communities.

As the city councils convene, a similar conference is held between the youth councils from those cities. This year, the threeday event was attended by youth councils from 21 different states.

The first day of the conference saw several discussions of the most pertinent issues facing the young people in their community. The topics discussed included ways to get funding for council endeavors, approaches for getting more young people involved in municipal politics and ideas for new initiatives in the youth delegates' respective cities.

The second day of the conference was a youth-driven simulation of the Democratic and Republican National Conventions. The delegates formulated political platforms regarding a variety of subjects: criminal justice reform, immigration reform, environmen-

City Council Takes Actions At Two Meetings in March

Some meetings of the Greenbelt City Council focus on large events that are reported in separate articles. Such was the case with the two meetings in March. Following is information on some of the shorter items from the agendas of those meetings.

Arbor/Earth Days

The March 29 council meeting featured the presentation of the city manager's proposed budget to the city council, but several other items were also on the agenda. The meeting opened with two proclamations from Mavor Emmett Jordan, one declaring Saturday, April 2, to be Arbor Day in Greenbelt and another recognizing the 46th anniversary of Earth Day, which will be celebrated in the city on Saturday, April 16. Receiving the Arbor Day proclamation were Brian Townsend, the city arborist, and Charles Jackman and Ethel Dutky, representing the Advisory Committee on Trees.

Townsend also accepted the proclamation on Earth Day and gave an overview of activities planned for April 16, including the annual watershed cleanup, which is sponsored by the city, the Chesapeake Education, Arts and Research Society, the Alice Ferguson Foundation and American Rivers. Cleanup volunteers are needed from 1 to 4 p.m., starting from the Springhill Lake Recreation Center at 6101 Cherrywood Lane. Participants should bring work gloves and a reusable water bottle, and they should wear weather-appropriate clothing and closed-toe shoes. High school students are invited to bring a service-learning form for their graduation community service requirements.

Senior Transportation Needs

The council unanimously approved a letter of support for a grant application being developed by staff of the Department of Planning and Community Development and the Greenbelt Assistance in Living (GAIL) Program. If funded by the Transportation/ Land-Use Connections program of the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments Transportation Planning Board, the project will assess the transportation needs of older residents of the city relative to existing transportation options, as well as looking at practices in other cities.

According to City Planner Jessica Bellah, the GAIL program has found from the experience of its participants that current options provide only limited connectivity to commonly requested routes and to needed services located outside the city. Bellah said the project should result in a set of recommendations for transportation services for Greenbelt

At its March 14 regular meeting, the city council considered

Rare Disease Strikes Journey Butler

Owed a Response

On Monday, February 22, we petitioned Council to work with City Manager Michael McLaughlin to stop advertising Greenbelt Animal Control (GAC), which includes the shelter, as No Kill or No Kill for Convenience and to implement within GAC adequate recordkeeping policies and practices. Council has not responded to our petition.

Councilmember Judith Davis has claimed that the city has improved its recordkeeping practices and that there is new management at GAC, but provided no details. Councilmember Rodney Roberts responded that he is not aware of changes in the management and that McLaughlin has not been responsive to requests by council to move GAC to another department. After the February 22 meeting we contacted McLaughlin to ask him about the new management at GAC. He replied that he needed a few weeks to provide us with an answer; he has yet to do so.

We have suggested that, at most, the city should describe GAC as "Striving to be No Kill," which would allow GAC to demonstrate they want to be able to meet the No Kill standard in the future while acknowledging that they currently fall short. This would have to be accompanied by adequate and verifiable re-

This completely up-to-date military techno-thriller raises many of the same moral questions that warfare has confronted mankind with since the Roman Empire. Helen Mirren stars as the cold and intense British Colonel Katherine Powell, who is supervising a longdistance surveillance project aimed at capturing a group of terrorists in Nairobi, Kenya. When surveillance by a drone-yes, this movie is truly current-suddenly reveals that a plan for a violent terrorist attack is well advanced, the project suddenly escalates from "capture" to "kill". 

Small Cities Coming Soon

Since Councilmember Silke Pope is this year's chair for the Small Cities Steering Committee of the National League of Cities, the city council will join her in the honor of hosting the committee's 2016 meeting in Greenbelt in July. The city will provide some support for the meeting and fundraising is being undertaken to cover other expenses. The council voted unanimously to endorse holding the meeting in Greenbelt and authorizing up to \$1,000 for front-end expenses.

Geothermal/Propane

As a result of discussion of residential geothermal and propane conversions at the council's recent stakeholder meeting with the Greenbelt East Advisory Coalition, Councilmember Edward Putens asked to put on the agenda discussion of whether the city should be receiving notification or could perhaps require a permit for this relatively new type of

work, which at this point goes on without notification to the city or to neighbors. Asbestos removal was subsequently added to the list of concerns.

After some discussion with Planning Director Celia Craze regarding which levels of government have purview over these matters, council directed City Manager Michael McLaughlin to draft a letter to County Councilmember Todd Turner regarding the city's interest in receiving notification of such matters.

State Legislation

At its second meeting in February, the city council had tabled discussion of SB 607/HB 829, which would limit the routine use of antibiotic drugs for farm animals, on a 4 to 2 vote. A majority of councilmembers wished to seek clarifications on the bill at the city's Legislative Dinner with its state delegation. Senator Paul Pinsky is the primary sponsor of SB 607. At tonight's meeting, the bill was supported unanimously with the understanding that it is aimed at the larger producers and exempts smaller ones.

Historic Turner Cemetery Preservation Begins

Underbrush and debris have been cleared from the historic Turner Cemetery, making visible a number of native stone grave markers as part of the city's effort to restore this site.

Following research and field work for an article on the historic graveyards in Greenbelt that appeared in the Greenbelt News Review on October 15, 2015, the Reverend Daniel Hamlin brought the findings on the Turner Cemetery to the Community Relations Advisory Board (CRAB), of which he is a member, on November 12, 2015. Those findings included the discovery of 15 unengraved native stones at the site as well as research that strongly indicated those stones marked the burial places of people held as

slaves by the Turner family.

After the January 12 CRAB meeting, the members of the board drafted and submitted a report to Greenbelt City Council. Council approved the recommendations in the report at their regular meeting on March 14 and work began at the site shortly afterwards.

The site is now clear: native stones are marked with blue flags and the city is continuing to work on preserving the site. There is a plan to clean the display case and update its information, among other things, in the near future according to Assistant City Manager David Moran. There is also hope to have a more extensive historical site survey completed.

Maryland Same-Day Voter Registration

Party affiliation changes may not be made during early voting. No same-day registration will be held on the day of the April 26 primary.

Other documentation that can be offered as proof of address might include a paycheck, bank statement, utility bill, or other government-issued document showing name and new address. (5.7 percent), grants from other agencies (3.8 percent), service charges (7.8 percent), and fines (3.6 percent).

Organizational Assessment

McLaughlin is proposing to implement some of the recommendations from the organizational assessment including moving parking enforcement responsibilities from the Department of Planning and Community Development to the Police Department, and the creation of a Deputy City Manager/Management Analyst but did not incorporate the recommendation to move Animal Control back to the Police Department from Planning and Community Development.

McLaughlin is also working to establish performance measures as recommended in the study. Staff has been researching practices of other municipalities but there is no consistent standard. He is proposing to subscribe to the International City/County Management Association's Insights service that will give the city access to their database of performance metrics.

Employees

McLaughlin's budget has some good news for city employees. He is proposing a 1.9 percent cost of living increase, plus a merit/step increase for all employees. He noted this is just the second merit increase he has proposed since FY 2010.

The proposed budget also includes \$100,000 to cover the increase in the minimum wage as set by Prince George's County. The minimum wage will increase

to \$10.75 per hour as of October 1. At the March 30 worksession, Mayor Emmett Jordan asked what it would cost to raise the city's minimum pay to \$15. Treasurer Jeffrey Williams did not have such an estimate but noted that each increase is more expensive, as it affects more employees.

The minimum wage increase only affects seasonal and nonclassified employees since council adopted a Living Wage policy for classified employees in 2007. In his budget comments, McLaughlin states that the state's living wage level is \$13.59 as of September 2015 and that all classified employees are paid more than this amount.

McLaughlin is also proposing a shift in how the city provides health insurance to its staff. In the face of a projected premium increase of 15 to 19 percent to maintain the current plan, he is proposing to switch to a different plan with the same insurer. The plan will have a higher deductible but has lower copays. McLaughlin is proposing to raise the current \$200 per employee medical reimbursement to \$300 for staff with individual coverage and \$600 for those with family coverage to offset the higher deductible.

Fees

The budget proposal calls for a \$3 per quarter increase in refuse collection fees. The city's costs have increased due to the county increasing tipping fees at the dump and implementing a \$25/ton fee for recyclables.

Reserves

The city continues to be in good financial health. The estimated reserves at the end of the current fiscal year are 13.2 percent of total expenditures, well above the 10 percent target. However, one large unknown expense is state-mandated repairs to the dam at Buddy Attick Park.

While the city is preparing to rebid the project soon, McLaughlin is not confident that the city will be able to successfully let a contract for the work in FY 2016.

Other Needs

Briefly touched on at the meeting were possible additions to the budget suggested by council and the city manager. Jordan wanted more new funding for economic development and an Economic Development Coordinator. Councilmember Konrad Herling asked whether Planning and Community Development needs additional staff if Greenbelt is selected for the new Federal Bureau of Investigation headquarters. McLaughlin said if that happens the city may need a construction inspector/engineer and an additional planner.

Cigarette Butt Litter Creates Pollution and Poses Threats

Spreading the word is the quickest way to drive action and initiate behavioral changes: organize events, create posters and write to inform. Individuals can help further actions by raising awareness of cigarette butt litter and supporting the product stewardship approach. Finally, the product stewardship approach is a global movement that attempts to shift the responsibility and cost of preserving the environment from consumers to the producers. Proper cigarette disposal is the responsibility of individuals. Neighbors are encouraged to work together to bring awareness about cigarette butt litter in Greenbelt and the Chesapeake Bay Watershed.

Cigarette butts are the most common litter in Greenbelt and around the world. It is estimated that 4.5 trillion cigarettes are discarded annually; accumulating to over 176 million pounds of waste that infiltrate our land and water systems. An estimated 30 percent of total litter along U.S. shorelines is comprised of cigarette butts, and these landbased wastes, according to Keep America Beautiful, contribute 80 percent of all marine debris. Moreover, the Ocean Conservancy estimates that one in every five items collected during environmental cleanups is a cigarette butt. Improper disposal of cigarette butts is costly to the economy and environment.

Cigarettes include cellulose acetate (plastic) filters that are non-biodegradable due to high levels of acetate substitution and low nutrient content. These hazardous wastes leach harmful chemicals and heavy metals into the environment that is toxic to living organisms.

Discarded cigarettes often cause wildfires, resulting in over 900 deaths and 2,500 injury reports, annually in the United States. Costs of homes and infrastructure from careless disposal total over \$6 billion in taxpayer money. Costs to clean up the

Prevention of cigarette litter calls for enforcement of governmental law and initiative action from citizens. Local police officials and enforcement agencies must take an active role in targeting litterers and enacting strict punishments. Increased accessibility to well-designed ash receptacles helps relieve the rate of littering. In fact, according to Keep America Beautiful, for every additional ash receptacle, nearby litter rates decrease by 9 percent. Well-designed receptacles should include instruction on proper cigarette disposal and have side openings to fend against inclement weather. Chronic smokers could consider investing in reusable portable pocket ashtrays. No matter the circumstance, both products allow smokers to properly dispose of cigarette residue. Personal change is the utmost important consideration in keeping our environment free of cigarette



tal policy, and small business economics. The delegates then divided up based on their home states to vote on the presidential candidates and select a nominee for each party. On the Democratic side, the youth delegates nominated Vermont Senator Bernie Sanders by a wide margin, while Ohio Governor John Kasich narrowly won the Republican nomination over Florida Senator Marco Rubio.

On the third and final day of the conference, the youth delegates and the city councils attended a lecture regarding a specific issue; the youth delegates from Greenbelt, for example, attended a lecture on a program that helps foreign refugees integrate into cities and find jobs in those communities. The conference concluded with lunch and speech from U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack, who spoke about the dangers of substance abuse and how communities can fight drug addiction while preserving the dignity of those afflicted.

The NLC Congressional Cities Conference was a learning experience for the Greenbelt Youth Advisory Committee, and the committee members returned with a plethora of new, innovative ideas for getting involved in Greenbelt and improving our city. The committee looks forward to attending the conference again next year to continue serving Greenbelt.

Greenbelt Mamas and Papas Offers Fun For Kids, Parents

This article is part of a periodic series profiling the city's recognition groups and how they serve the city.

Every Wednesday morning in the Youth Center one can find Greenbelt Mamas and Papas, a parent-led group for children ages 0 to 3 that features activities such as Rhythm and Rhyme, story time and regular old running around fun.

The group is free to attend, and aims at offering "stories, music and movement plus playtime ... and opportunity for caregivers to meet up and socialize during playtime," said Naomi Littlefield, one of the group's leaders.

This year's leaders are Littlefield, Jessica O'Roark, Cara Leisnham and Amy Caruso. "Every group of parents has a different approach," Littlefield said.

"About four leaders are recruited each year by the previous year's leaders. Each one leads once a month and brings their own personal style and skills," Littlefield said. "Greenbelt Mamas and Papas provides opportunities for parents from Greenbelt and surrounding areas to meet up and get to know each other. I think this is particularly valuable for new parents and parents that are new to the area."

Even if a child is still too young to run, talk or sing along, Greenbelt Mamas and Papas feels there is much to be gained by young families who attend.

"It can sometimes be pretty isolating and overwhelming to have an infant," O'Roark said. "The Rhythm & Rhyme time is a place where parents can connect and have others be able to relate, swap stories or just have other people around who are in a similar place in life. The babies get to take in all kinds of new experiences, including seeing

The group's history dates back to 2000, when it consisted of local families who gathered every two weeks for potluck lunches in the Greenbelt Community Center. The format has changed over the years, but their foundation of bringing together families with young children remains. Today, the group has the support of the Greenbelt Recreation Department, who give the group a place to meet indoors if they so choose. Oftentimes they spend days with good weather outdoors.

"We are grateful to the Greenbelt Recreation Department and Youth Center for their support, space and toys provided for this weekly program," Littlefield said.

The children are just as pleased as their parents with what
