Lincoln Place Survives Proposed Demolition

In February, 2005 I wrote a story about an apartment project in Los Angeles called Lincoln Place that had a double interest to Greenbelters. Lincoln Place was a somewhat more modern version of original Greenbelt. Both projects followed garden city concepts, were nearly the same size and had some similarities in architecture and communal outdoor amenities. Both were originally rental units. Greenbelt was originally built for low income residents. Lincoln Place had become a boon to some because Los Angeles had frozen rent increases for tenants who remained in place.

While Greenbelt had more community amenities like a school-community center, city government, parks, etc., Lincoln Place, built a decade-and-a-half later, had more modern interiors that included hardwood floors, tile kitchen counters and dishwashers. Both have convenient small commercial districts. Both have achieved historic designa-

The second reason for interest was that Lincoln Place and Greenbelt's Springhill Lake Apartments had the same landlord, Apartment Investment and Management, Inc. (AIMCO). At both locations AIMCO was proposing to tear down and rebuild; at Lincoln Place with condos and in Greenbelt with new, high rise apartments. While the city and county were in negotiations with

AIMCO and reconstruction of Springhill Lake appeared to be a possibility (although opposition was developing), at Lincoln Place tenants were in battle with the landlord.

My story recounted details of some of the Lincoln Place buildings being torn down, illegally some claimed, tenants being evicted by the sheriff and others refusing to budge. There were lawsuits and numerous hearings before city legislative and administrative bodies.

Later in Greenbelt, in the midst of the recession, AIMCO sold Springhill Lake and the new owners chose to retain it as a garden apartment complex but to upgrade the units and increase rents, renaming it Franklin Park.

And what happened in Lincoln Place since the article? A happy ending for all is reported in a non-bylined story in the 2015 winter issue of Preservation Magazine published by the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Lincoln Place remains as a rental apartment project, AIMCO remains its owner, new apartment units compatible to the original razed units have been built, the tenants who refused to budge now have life tenancy rights and the original buildings have been spruced up with modern wiring and plumbing added but with many of the original features retained to become "retro-chic."

The goal of the AFYI National Registry is to increase the safety of persons with autism and first responders who encounter them, often under stressful circumstances. Autism is a biological and neurological condition that lasts a lifetime and can cause any combination of social, emotional and cognitive disabilities, each of which can range from mild to severe. Each person's symptoms are unique; some are so mild that autism is not apparent, while in others they present major problems when interacting with others. Some persons with autism are unable to communicate

"It is important to recognize how autism presents itself," said Greenbelt Police Department Public Information Liaison George Mathews. Some autistic persons do not recognize personal space and like to touch things. "They might [try to] go up to touch the face of an officer who [not knowing the person is autistic] may be taken by surprise and perceive





A televised community forum on July 30, 1 to 3 p.m. at the New Deal Café will explore environmental justice in Greenbelt, Prince George's County and Maryland. In some countries they are starting to use relatively quiet/ silent fireworks, and I recommend investing at least an hour in reading the articles which come up in Internet searches. Unfortunately, even with the quieter displays there is still chemical and particulate pollution – surely not good for our lake.

A few revel in the loud booms, crackles and pops and may even allow this to represent for them the memorable strife and heroism of war. I believe that these persons should add authenticity to their experience by joining our military or helping organizations who position themselves in war-torn countries.

Some of our young veterans have returned suffering PTSD, and sometimes permanent, partial hearing loss. They would like to be able to bring their young families to a Fourth of July display without risking further damage to their own more-vulnerable hearing, or to their children's hearing.

Admirably Greenbelt has its own animal shelter, which unfortunately is less than 1/4 mile from the fireworks displays. It is most upsetting to some of these animals, already stressed from homelessness, illness and disability, to be hearing these extremely loud fireworks displays.

As Greenbelters, defined by our environmentalism, we have no business allowing these flagrant harms to each other, the animals and our environment.







Museum Anarchist Lectures, Then Sleeps in Greenbelt

Museum hosted Franklin Vagnone not just for a lecture, but also for an unprecedented overnight stay in the Museum's historic house at 10B Crescent. A self-described "domestic-archeo-anthropologist," Vagnone has been traveling the country staying the night in historic homes as part of a series that he calls One Night Stands. As the former executive director of the Historic House Trust of New York City, and through years of work in the preservation field, Vagnone is uniquely qualified to experience, and then thoughtfully write about, the historic homes in which he stays. He recently co-authored a book with Deborah Ryan entitled, The Anarchist's Guide to Historic House Museums, in which he makes the case that house museums and historic sites have largely become stale, restrictive spaces, far from the active centers of life and habitation that they once were. Though not without critics, which he is the first to admit, his ideas have galvanized many in the field to rethink how museums can evolve to be more welcoming, lively spaces.

The Museum invited Vagnone to Greenbelt to participate in their quarterly lecture series, sponsored by the Friends of the Greenbelt Museum (FOGM). He gave his presentation, Sleeping Around, to nearly 60 attendees in the Multipurpose Room of the Community Center. In the talk, which was lavishly illustrated with photos and short videos from the sites he has visited, he explained how each home had a unique story, one that he could best access and come to know by spending time in it, listening, looking, absorbing and living in the space. Other sites he has visited include the Gless-

On July 19, the Greenbelt ner House in Chicago; the Hull Family House and Farmstead in Lancaster, N.Y.; Gadsby's Tavern in Alexandria, Va.; and Historic Richmond Town, Staten Island, N.Y. Just prior to the talk Vagnone, his partner John Yeagley, FOGM Board President Jennifer Ruffner, Museum Director Megan Searing-Young and Education and Volunteer Coordinator Sheila Maffay-Tuthill gathered at the museum house for a dinner. Each person made a recipe from the Greenbelt Woman's Club Cookbook. Vagnone and Yeagley brought two Jell-O salads (see photo). Dining, working, bathing and sleeping in the house are all part of Vagnone's process.

Following the lecture, Vagnone and Yeagley stayed the night at the Greenbelt Museum's historic house. The Museum is the only site so far to host both men. Vagnone wanted to explore ideas about family units and to compare and contrast the average early Greenbelt family with his own, more modern hybrid version, so everyone at the Museum was happy to welcome them both. The write up of his "One Night Stand" in Greenbelt, Traveling with Tomatoes, covers a great deal of intellectual ground. Through careful research and thoughtful observations, it raises many important questions and issues about Greenbelt's history. It is now on his website, Twisted Preservation, twistedpreservation. com/one-night-stand-series/. In a follow up conversation, Vagnone said, "I am always looking for how these fragile historic sites can inform my life today - and with Greenbelt, that wasn't very hard to do because it is an active and alive community. This place has so much to share to the world around you. Keep doing a great job!"







is triangular, with a puzzle piece in the center of a yellow background. It is yellow to grab a person's attention, has a yield sign shape to remind the observer to hesitate and proceed slowly (as one would do when driving) and the puzzle piece to show that many aspects of autism remain a puzzle.

The package includes a bracelet that allows USB access to medical, demographic and behavioral information, a decal for use on a home window or car windshield, a membership card and other items with the autism logo. The AFYI Registry logo on these items alerts public safety responders and persons in the community that the person is autistic and may have special needs.

After registration is completed, the Registry sends a letter to the person's local police and fire departments, notifying them of the person's membership and their ID number. The home address of the registrant is entered into the police department's computer-aided dispatch system so that when officers are sent to a location where a registrant lives, responding officers are provided identifying information and notice in advance of arrival that a person with autism lives at that location. The records management system will issue an autism alert if the

registrant's name is entered into the system for other reasons.

Information

The USB bracelet provides a registrant's medical history and medicines, emergency contacts, behavioral triggers, calming strategies, names of physicians and demographic data. The registry's 24-hour hotline (1-855-487-0777) can provide a registrant's information when USB access is not available. Information about Autism FYI Organization is available at 301-367-1042 and admin @autismfyi.org.

Bowie residents Joyce and James Benjamin, parents of two adult autistic sons, founded Autism FYI Organization about five years ago. They felt the need to do something when interactions between persons with autism and police in other states made national news because of poor outcomes. They devised the registry and its logo and began introducing first responders and the public to autism. People from other parts of the country and police have found out about the registry and the work of the Benjamins. There are now chapters in Michigan, Hawaii, Wisconsin, Minnesota and New Orleans. "We are very excited that the word is getting out," said Joyce Benjamin.

Greg May: Life of a Clown Questions and Answers

As the camp's writing teacher and editor of CKC News, I asked Greg May, the instructor of Greenbelt's Circus Camp, about his life. I emailed questions. He emailed answers. The campers then listened to the answers as if they were at a press conference. The campers, or cub reporters, wrote stories and drew pictures, but here is the original interview.

Q: What were your living arrangements when you were with the circus?

A: All of the clowns lived in the same train car, each in his/her own 3-foot by 6-foot roomette. At one end of the car, we had a community kitchen with two hot plates, a microwave, and eight small college dorm style refrigerators. We each shared a small fridge with one other person. The hallway down the middle car was so skinny, you had to turn sideways to pass some-

For the most part we bought and cooked our own food, but if we were really, really hungry, we could purchase food on the circus' kitchen train car. We called that place the roach-coach and basically stayed away from it as much as possible.

Though my room was small, I had a giant window, so I could watch the world go by on our train runs. That, along with the gentle rocking of the train while I slept made for some of my happiest memories on the road. I still have dreams that I today.

Good dreams!

Q: What was your favorite part?

A: As we walked out to our opening positions right before each show, I'd stand in the dark on the arena floor and look up at constellations of flashy lights in the hands of thousands of kids high up in the seats. You could feel the excitement in the arena like an electrical charge. I'll never forget it.

Q: What was the hardest part? A: Being away from and totally out of touch with family was critically difficult. I was there in the time before cell phones, Internet and Skype, so my family could never, ever contact me, and when I wanted to reach them, I'd have to try to find a pay phone

Q: How long did it take you to learn how to be a clown?

A: I learned to juggle when I was 10. By 16, I had taught myself to unicycle and built my own stilts. There was no Internet or YouTube, so I just tried to figure it all out. At 22, I left for the Clown College training program, and at 23, I joined the circus itself – so basically, it took 13 years. But I'm still learning each day.
