

## **Citizens Association Plans Census Of All Families on Income Order**

A comprehensive schedule was prepared Sunday by the special Citizens Association committee headed by Harry B. Hyman to conduct a survey relative to the effect of the maximum income decree on Greenbelters. Interviewers representing the committee and the G.C.A. will contact all families in town during the next ten or fifteen days for the purpose of obtaining the information called for in the schedule.

Results of this community-wide survey will be compiled and used in general report form by the Citizens Association in a document to be dispatched to Farm Security Administration, and to such other organizations or individuals as are deemed appropriate, to testify as to the social, civic, and personal disadvantages and the economic hardships being wreaked on those affected by the income limitations by the recent F.S.A. order: "Curb your income or git!"

Mr. Hymans committee incor-Mr. Hymans committee incor-porated numerous questions in the survey schedule bearing on the amount of income received, num-ber of shares owned in G.C.S. and the Credit Union, and debts being paid off by the residents. It is recognized, the committee stated, that these are intimate questions and must be kept confidential. They are not to be disclosed to any person not authorized by the They are not to be disclosed to any person not authorized by the special committee to work on the project, and no names will be used in the final compilation and report to F.S.A. cr elsewhere. The committee members observed that it was essential to obtain these facts in order that an ac-curate economic picture might be drawn as to the immediate status of the residents involved in the eviction problem.

Other questions in the schedule will bring out whether the "excess' income is due to bonus ,temcess' income is due to bonus ,tem-porary appointment, overtime pay, wife or other member of family employed, etc. The inter-viewers will ask about schools at-tended by the children and sev-eral other questions bearing di-rectly or indirectly on how the continual migration of many families now and in the future will affect the progress of the community, the permanency of its organizations and enterprises, the intactness of its churches, and continuance of its fraternal, recreational, and civic groups. and continuance of its fraternal, recreational, and civic groups. Data will be secured as to how those immediately affected plan to meet the problem of having to move during the school season and in the midst of a winter notable for its difficult housing problems problems.

The Citizens Association Executive committee urges all resi-dents to cooperate fully and com-pletely in this project and help bring the survey to a close quickly and pleasantly.

## Facing Member Loss, **G<sup>-</sup>C.S.** Plans Drive

Although there is no indication as to just when the new families will start moving in, the membership committee of Greenbelt Consumer Services is rapidly lay-Consumer Services is rapidly lay-ing the groundwork for an ex-tensive share drive. An effort will be made to interest the new-comers in the cooperative, there-by gaining new members as well as increasing the organization's share capital. Faced with the present loss of

share capital. Faced with the present loss of membership due to transfers of employment, in addition to the prospect of losing an estimated large number of members be-cause of the recently announced income restrictions, G. C. S. board members are considering any plans which are likely to in-duce present residents and new duce present residents and new-comers alike to join the coopera-tive and members to purchase ad-

What is needed immediately, stated a spokesman for G. C. S. are hostesses living near the new houses who will aid the commit-tee by sponsoring group mediated tee by sponsoring group meetings tee by sponsoring group meetings for the newcomers. Refreshments for these gatherings will be fur-nished. The co-op's story will be told by discussion leaders and prospective members may sub-scribe for their shares at the meetings meetings.

Another 1,000 families in the community means that Greenbelt Consumer Services must expand some of its services to provide for the needs of these residents. In order to expand it will be nec-essary to raise additional share capital with which to install a new food store and another serv-ice station and to enlarge the drug store facilities. The board recently went on record as favoring and recom-mending a 5 per cent dividend on capital stock unless unusual con-ditions arise. This, the directors feel, will provide considerable in-centive for people to invest Another 1,000 families in the

centive for people to invest money in the cooperative. They not only will have a share in the profits, but will have a voice in the affairs of the organization.

# **Eligibles Listed**

One hundred and fifty-two of the 1000 homes to be built in Greenbelt, are in the final stages of construction, and are being in-spected prior to acceptance by Farm Security Administration.

Because of the lack of detailed information as to when the build-ings will be accepted, and there-fore actually ready for occupancy, less than one hundred applications have been received to date. How-ever, according to Miss Helen Raymond of the tenant selection staff, this is not a true indication of interest, as many of the sources of eligible applicants have not made a complete survey to ascer-tain the number who may apply.

Correcting the impression gathered in some quarters that appli-tions will be accepted from the Navy Yard only, Miss Raymond advised that employees of 13 Army and Navy establishments may apply. These include: The Navel Becometh Laboratory New may apply. These include: The Naval Research Laboratory, Nav-al Air Station, Naval Reserve Aviation Base, Naval Amunition Depot, Navy Yard, Naval Obser-vatory, Naval Radio Station, Nav-al Torpedo Plant, Naval Model Testing Basin, Naval Hospital, Bolling Field, Army Medical Cen-ter, Arlington Cantonment Fort ter, Arlington Cantonment, Fort Meade, Fort Myer, and the Army War College. These wore selected War College. These wore selected by Army and Navy officers. Ap-plications will also be accepted from any of the enlisted person-nel in the first three non-commis-sioned ranks. So far, the majority of the applications have come from Bolling Field.

Already under inspection, it is believed that, if accepted by F. S. A. within the next week, some of the homes may be occupied by the middle of December. After acceptance, arrangements for heat, electricity, etc. will have to be made.

Now using the council room for an office, the tenant selection staff will move into one of the new buildings, as soon as they have been accepted and arrangements made for heating facilities. The staff consists of Miss Helen

The Rev. In his profession for the past 35 years, Mr. Johnston has followed the ministerial calling in the South, Mid-West, and in New England. He and his wife are both natives of Virginia. Mr. Johnston pays warm trib-ute to former minister "Bob" Kincheloe. "He has done a won-derful piece of work here, and I hope to build on the foundation he has laid. My methods will be

hope to build on the foundation he has laid. My methods will be based upon needs as I find them." Mr. Johnston's future plans ir-clude a method of reaching the occupants of the new defense homes and a "very active" pro-gram for the young people. The apartment at 8-B Parkway is now serving as a church office

In the serving as a church office, Mr. Johnson announced, and a telephone will be installed there. At the time of his interview with the Cooperator, Mr. Johnston was planning to take a house on Edmonston Road. Gréenbelt's new minister was born at Delaplane, Virginia. He received his AB degree from Randolph Macon College, in Ashland, Virginia, and his B.D. from Van-derbilt University at Nashville, Tennessee. He has also taken post-Tennessee. He has also taken post-graduate work at the Yale Divin-ity School in New Haven, Connec-ticut. He entered the ministry in 1908, and served in the Methodist Church ten years. In 1918 he ac-cepted the position of assistant minister of the First Congrega-tional Church in Washington, D. C., which he held for three years. He officiated for ten years at the First Congregational Church in West Haven, Connecticut, prior to his acceptance of the pulpit at Oak Park, Illinois, from which he

## **Prince Georges Seeks Grant For Schools**

A request to the Federal Works Agency for a grant of \$48,251.05 was approved yesterday by the Prince Georges County Board of Education.

The funds would be used for added teachers' salaries and other expenses caused by the adding of pupils residing in the defense housing areas at Greenbelt and Fort Washington to the rolls of the county's schools, Orem said. The sum asked would cover the remainder of the current school year and the 1942-43 year. An estimated 108 high school students and 494 elementary pupils will be added at Greenbelt according to figures compiled by the Farm Security Administra-tion when all of the 1,000 home units are occupied. This is based on the estimated average that 754 of the families will have children of school age. It will probably be necessary to use the double shift system there in order to accommodate the ex-panded enrollment as the present facilities will be inadequate to handle the increase. Last July 22 Supt. Orem asked for \$289,000 from the Federal Government for

#### In the Interest of Public Safety

The resignation of two of the three doctors employed by the Health Association again leaves Greenbelt without adequate medical protection. Greenbelt has been faced with this situation before, in fact so often that it has now become a matter of public interest. We feel that no longer can the internal strife of the Health Association be ignored and passed off as just another organizational fight. Your safety and your neighbors' safety in an emergency depends entirely upon the doctors employed by the Association.

The Health Association stands charged with the public responsibility of acquiring and maintaining an adequate medical staff, so long as it keeps the doors open for treatment to all persons, members and non-members alike, and so long as it remains under the cooperative agreement of Greenbelt, whereby all services in Greenbelt are to be maintained by cooperatives.

The Health Association's rcord of disunity in the past few months has been one to bring a blush of shame to the whole cooperative movement, and loud laughs from the members of organized medicine.

In the interest of public safety, we feel that the Health Association must clean its house of any person or persons and all factions that are now preventing the association from performing its necessary public function. Failing to do this, will only give impetus to the demands that Greenbelt be opened to resident private practitioners.

Our statements herein may seem to be a direct contradiction of our pledge to support the cooperative movement. and especially Greenbelt cooperatives. We still believe that after a house-cleaning a bigger and better Health Association could come out. In the meantime, our pledge to the public interest is more important in this case than anything else. Our safety comes first, above all matters, and any person who reads into this editorial statements or thoughts that do not appear, does so at his own risk. We are not taking sides in the controversy, but are decrying the whole situation. Both factions, their backers and personnel are equally damned in our sight, because we believe that if these persons would spend as much time trying to help the association as they do attempting to stab the other fellow. the association troubles would soon iron out.

There are those who claim that the situation is beyond peaceful settlement or mediation, claiming that no common point can be reached from which a settlement or agreement can be worked out. In the face of the claims of both factions that they are attempting to serve cooperative medicine in Greenbelt, those claims are silly. There is no finer point of agreement from which a start can be made than the belief in cooperative medicine. Therefore, if both sides are sincere in their desire to further cooperative medicine, they can meet and settle their differences through the medium of that belief, if nothing else.

## **Greatest Co-op Is** 21 Years Old

On Monday, September 8, the giant London Cooperative So-ciety, largest retail cooperative in giant the world, came of age.

It was born on September 8, 1920 when the Stratford and Edmonston societies united to form The London Cooperative Society. Almost incuperable prob-lems befell the organization at its inception and in the crisis year 1922 no dividends were paid, trade and membership fell and carnings had to be used for stock carnings had to be used for stock reduction. In 1922, the society had 111,988 members, a trade of 3,215,000 pounds and 2,949 em-ployes. By 1930, the society's membership had more than trebled to 380,000; sales had grown to the colossal sum of 9,428,000 pounds and 10,474 employes were serving an ever-exemployes were serving an ever-extending membership.

Today, on its twenty first rthday, The London Cooperabirthday, The London Coopera-tive Society serves a trade area of 400 square miles. It has 817,-035 members. Its trade exceeds 16,000,000 pounds (approximate-ly 65,8000,000) annually; and vor 19,000 employes serve the society. Scarred by repeated "Blitzes", bereft of the loyal service of over 5,000 employes, who are now in the armed forces, and effected by evacuation—The London Cooperative Society carworld's mightiest society and still an outstanding example of cooperation.

The National Co-op Radio Committee, meeting here last weck, set the three months of January, February and March as the period for a drive to find Fifty Thousand One-Dollar-A-Year-Men who are anxious to make individual contributions to 'tell America from the housetops" about the advantages consumer cooperation. The pro-posed broadcast series will be posed broadcast series w part of the Nationwide Co-op Drive.

In preparation for the campaign, the committee is preparing Co-op Radio Fund stamps and Co-op Radio Fund stamps and other materials, which in themselves will help tell the story of cooperation as individuals make contributions to the radio fund. contributions to the radio fund. Radio committees will be set up in regional and local coopera-tives, not only to help with the drive but to organize listening groups when the series gets underway later in the year. Em-phasis of the drive will be on voluntary individual contribu-tions by co-op members who want to give more than their present to give more than their present contribution of 5 cents per mcm-ber per year to the national educational work on cooperation.

## **C. U. To Report on 1942** Cars

What's happened to all those savings auto manufacturers were supposed to make, to aid the na-tional defense? CU found few tional defense? CO found traces of them in this season's models. True, some substitutions of one metal for another, or for a metal, have been forced on the manufacturers (and its too soon yet to tell how they will turn out). But also, manufacturers have made expensive and unnecessary changes in the body styles. Use of bright-work and plastic trim is more ex-travagant than ever. And im-provements which would make for significant gas economy have not been introduced. Bodies are heavy, engines about the same as last year's. Most 1942 cars will have difficulty even in meeting the gas mileage of previous models. One exception is Studebaker, which has changed axle ratios towards greater economy

Prices are higher all along the line. Some manufacturers, like Chrysler, are refusing to set any list price—a move against con-sumers at the present time.

In February, CU will report in detail on the 1942 models. In the meantime, it can be stated that 1941 models at the old prices are definitely better buys. The Studebaker Champion is likely to be best buy in its price desc to be best buy in its price class for the coming year.

Don't get your child a science set unless he's old enough to read and understand instructions. And and understand instructions. And don't get him one just because you think he ought to have it, or you would have loved it when you were his age. There has to be some natural interest to make this kind of gift attractive. Again, don't grab the first set that you're offered at the price

that you're offered at the price you want to pay. Look over the materials. Read the instructions to see if the experiments are in-teresting and constructive. Ex-periments that are too long are todiance will discourse the abild tedious will discourage the child; those that are merely flashy will be tried just once. Make sure the directions are clearly worded, with plenty of warnings and with instructions as to what to do if things are used.

Instructions as to what to do if things go wrong. A science set should be more or less foolproof. That is, the c o m b in at i o n of ingredients should be such that even if the child strikes out into new exper-iments of his own, or has an acci-dent, the results will not be dis-astrous. astrous.

CU rated a number of physics sets and chemistry sets on their safety, educational and entertain-ment value, and variety of exper-iments possible. Best Buys of the physics sets were Gilbert No. 1 (\$1.25); Sciencecraft No. 302 (\$2.50); Gilbert No. 2 (\$2.50).

You may choose between two main types of cleaners: those nain types of cleaners: those with handles which you push around and those with tanks which rest on the floor. The tank type is easier to carry up and downstairs if you have that prob-lem. The handle type may be simpler for you to use in clean-ing, if you don't bother with many of the accessory attach-ments. Best way to decide which you prefer is to try them both in your own home. Don't take the list price too seriously, especially in the vac-uum cleaners sold from door to door. You can often get them cheaper than the list price if you try.

CU tested 20 models of vac-uum cleaners, ranging in price from \$29.95 to \$82, for their cleaning ability, durability, con-venience and economy. Best Buys were: Sears' Cat. No. 991 (\$44.95 plus transportation), tank type; Ward's Cat. No. 841 (\$34.95 plus transportation), handle type.
