Next Council Will Act On Gobbel's Resignation

Councilman Morrison Frames Motion Delaying Decision Till September

Nearly 400 Greenbelt citizens Monday night heard three members of the town council refuse to accept Town Manager James T. Gobbel's resignation as of June 30. An amendment making the resignation effective September 30, after the new council is elected, was introduced by Councilman Allen Morrison and agreed to by Councilmen Paul Dunbar and Joseph Rogers.

The change of date nullifies the attempted removal of Mr. Gobbel from office by Mayor George Bauer and Councilman John Cain, as a town manager tenders his resignation to a newly-elected council as a matter of form.

ever, by insisting that the public interest demonstrated by the large attendance be recognized by a clarification of the issues.

Moves To Auditorium

A petition from the overflow crowd outside the town office that the meeting be moved to a larger space resulted in the session moving over to the center auditorium, where comments and questions from the floor were answered by the council or Mr. Gobbel.

Insisting that he wanted to keep the meeting "clean," Mr. Bauer refused for some time to state specific charges against Mr. Gobbel. Several citizens claimed that Greenbelters were entitled to know why the mayor, who in the past had praised the town manager, suddenly found him "uncooperative." Mr. Bauer then read a long list of complaints, dating back almost to Mr. Gobbel's appointment as town manager. The issues ranged from alleged inadequacy of the town budget for the fire department to alleged assumption by the town manager of duties and privileges properly belonging to the mayor. The presentation of a bond to a Capital Transit employee and the manager's participation in the CTC's ceremony initiating the Branchville carline were cited as examples.

John S. Beckham, 2-L Eastway, stated that the list of complaints against Mr. Gobbel surprised him by their insignificance, in view of Mr. Bauer's former reluctance to divulge what he had termed "the dirt." Referring to Mr. Bauer's complaint that the budget figures were not properly broken down, Mr. Beckham asked, "Does the Council wish to go on record as having approved a town budget which it did not understand?"

Budgets Baffle Bauer

Mr. Morrison quickly replied, "I did," thus starting a flare of argument between the councilmen, during which Mr. Cain jumped up and paced the floor. The mayor remarked that Greenbelt councils never understand budgets because of the form in which they are drawn up. He asked for confirmation from former Councilman Sherrod East, who answered that when budgets presented to his notice seemed complex, he asked questions until he understood them.

Mr. Gobbel rated pin-drop silence from the audience when he made a plea for Greenbelters to forget their differences and work together to preserve their town. He charged that the Federal Public Housing Authority was taking advantage of the splits between local factions, and that there was a danger of the community, with all its planned advantages, "degenerating into a muck-heep."

Ben Rosenzweig and GCS General Manager Sam Ashelman emphasized the necessity of the Council forgetting its differences at the present time, and of citizens working with the Council to preserve a united front, in view of the uncertain future facing Greenbelt.

Had Planned Resignation

A question put by Mr. Ashelman brought out the point that Mr. Gobbel planned to give his resignation to the new council this fall, "so they would not feel their hands were tied." Councilman Rogers then remarked that perhaps the date of resignation in Mr. Gobbel's letter could be changed. Mr. Morrison's amendment setting the date ahead was thereupon adopted.

War Houses To Get \$45,000 Paint Job

A contract is now being let to paint all of Greenbelt's war housing, according to FPHA manager Charles M. Cormack. Mr. Cormack announced that the contract provides for the painting of the exteriors of the 1000 homes: trim, doors, windows, porches and chimneys. The asbestos shingling will not be painted.

Funds have just been approved by the Budget Bureau for the project, the cost of which will be "in the vicinity of \$45,000, according to Mr. Cormack. Painting will begin soon and probably be completed by fall, he told the Cooperator.

To determine colors to be used in painting the houses, an experiment will be conducted using four buildings of four houses each. Each building will be painted in a different color combination (the houses alike) so that on completion, the net result may be observed at a point where the four buildings are adjacent.

Memorial Stone

According to Frank Lastner, design chairman of the Victory Day Committee, the grey granite stone for the World War II memorial is now being cut and polished. The bronze plaque with the names of the gold star soldiers is being cast in Alexandria. It will measure 24 by 24 inches and be surmounted by an eagle.

The site for the memorial, to be dedicated May 30, is the center of the green area between the post office and Southway Road. The four foot stone, with concrete base, will be surrounded by hedging, and access will be provided by a sidewalk.

Committee member Paul Dunbar said last week that several projects had been considered by the Victory Day group, including a memorial park and bandstand. The memorial stone was the only one on which the committee was able to unite, he stated.

Total new registrations reported by Town Clerk Winfield McCamy are 45 to date. The Town Office is open weekdays from 8 to 4:30. Residents over 21 who have lived in the state for a year and in Greenbelt six months are eligible to vote in the town elections this fall if duly registered. Theater Patrons To Get Fresh Air

The air conditioning in the Greenbelt theater will be in working order this weekend, Greenbelt Consumer Services manager Sam Ashelman told the board of directors Friday night. The board has authorized the general manager to spend up to \$4500 for theatre repairs. Estimates on recovering the seats are being sought, the projection equipment is being improved and the generator has already been repaired. The faulty generator was the cause of recent blackouts of the film, Mr. Ashelman said.

The highest volume of sales since last Christmas was reported for the two weeks ending May 3 by Mr. Ashelman, at this board meeting. For the five weeks' period ending May 3, Mr. Ashelman said, the food store, valet shop and appliance department made excellent records, increasing their 1946 volumes by 33%, 63% and 45% respectively.

It is understood that Dr. James W. McCarl, Greenbelt dentist, is also considering moving his office to the new site.

Clothing Drive Nets Ton And A Half

Over a ton and a half of clothing has been turned in for the community clothing drive, reports Mrs. Charles East, chairman. Although the drive was supposed to end May 3, clothing was turned in until last Saturday. Anyone who has not been able to bring their clothing to the collection point may have it picked up by calling Mrs. East at 4887.

The clothing matinee held May 2 brought in nearly a ton of clothing. Collections at the schools and pickups by Lee Fink, Selma Posner and Mrs. Matthew Fontaine accounted for a good share of the clothes, and the rest was turned in at the collection station in the center.

Mrs. East stated that, in accordance with the clothing committee's request, nearly all the clothing was in very good condition and most of it was heavy winter apparel. According to Graham Hodges, Church World Service representative, clothing collected now will not arrive overseas until late next fall due to the shortage of shipping space.

Councilman Morrison mentioned that there had been at
least two "closed" meetings on the subject of Manager
Gobbel's resignation.

How can Greenbelters support a town council that con-
vines in secret? We submit that the gentlemen should con-
duct their business openly and honestly, and keep citizens
informed about what is going on. As was emphasized
several times last Monday night, the future of Greenbelt
hangs in the balance, and unified action by all groups is
necessary to hold our town together in the face of the dis-
integrative forces at work in the present Congress, this
Congress which sees us as a

species of parasites enjoying a
good thing here at the public's expense.

First Bookmobile Will Tour County

The County Memorial Library Board recently appointed Graydon Harris, 36-D Crescent Road, driver of the Library's "Bookmobile." The truck, an "Internat'l Metro," has been purchased and is now being painted and equipped with shelving.

The first Bookmobile in the United States operated out of Frederick, Maryland, during 1904-5, touring Washington County, according to Mr. Harris.

A movie projector and screen have been purchased for a planned film library. A record player and records are also available for loan to groups anywhere in the county. Books are now being kept in the Masonic Hall on Gallatin street, Hyattsville, where Mrs. Mary Kenan is the librarian in charge.
