Greenbelters Urged To Write Gov. Lane

Greenbelters were urged this week by Councilwoman Elizabeth Harrington to write to Governor W. Preston Lane and State Senator L. Harold Sothoron, asking for a quadrupling of the State's "in-centive fund" to aid the counties' school building programs.

Large majorities of both houses of the State Legislature this week signed companion bills to this effect. It is expected, however, that Gov. Lane's commitment to a program for improvement in mental institutions may cause him to reject the bills. Senator Sothoron, member from Prince George's County, did not sign the Senate bill.

Last Thursday, a delegation of 40 representatives of State and County organizations called upon Senator Sothoron at Annapolis to plead for his support of the bill. While remaining non-committal, the senator did not speak against See WRITE, Page 4

Bloodmobile Coming Thursday, March 24

The Red Cross bloodmobile will in Greenbelt on Thursday, March 24, from 12 noon to 5:45 p.m. at the Center school auditorium. According to Mrs. Joseph Rogers. chairman, the bloodmobile is equipped to take 100 pints of blood which is sorely needed by the hospitals in the county. At present Prince Georges County is not meeting the need for blood, which is being furnished by other chapters.

The bloodmobile is under the direct supervision of qualified physicians, nurses, and laboratory technicians, and a physician is always in the center while blood is being taken from donors. No charge is made by Red Cross for furnishing blood; while doctors and hospitals may charge for their services in administering blood transfusions, this is not a charge for the blood itself.

Greenbelt residents who wish to donate a pint of blood should ocntact Mrs. Rogers at 3171 at the earliest opportunity for an appointment. Donors' blood will be typed and examined for RH factor, and this information will be forwarded to the donor.

Maryland's V. D. Campaign Extended

Widespread public information. comibned with modern treatment and adequate facilities, has proved so effective in the Eastern Shore venereal disease campaign that the program is being extended to other areas in Maryland. Dr. R. H. Riley, Director of the State Department of Health, announced today that the extended project goes into effect immediately in the Southern Maryland counties on the western side of the Chesapeake Bay, and stated that "every thinking adult belongs in this fight to cut down venereal disease from its top-ranking position among the reported communicable diseases." In 1947 syphilis ranked first among all communicable diseases reported from Maryland's twenty-three counties. and gonorrhea ranked second. Tuberculosis, chickenpox, pneumonia, whooping cough and measles followed in that order.

A new penicillin compound is being used by the health department clinics. Treatment for syphilis can now be completed in five days.

The campaign aims to place the facts before the public, and to find and treat the victims of venereal diseases-syphilis and gonorrhea. "Through knowledge and understanding of this problem," said Dr. Riley, "we hope to gain the full cooperation of all citizens and civic groups."

To Find His Mary

The Greenbelt girl named Mary who sent a valentine to a boy named John, in a certain New England state, should hereafter sign her last name. Apparently John loves more than one Mary! At least, he indicated as much in a letter to the town clerk, as follows: "Please send me a list of girls names by the name of Mary-there's a certain girl down there by the name of Mary and would like to know who she is-she sent me a valentine with just her first name and no address.'

In addition to insertion of John's plea in the record, the Greenbelt Town Council Monday night endorsed Col. LeRoy S. Mann, 360th Antiaircraft Artillery Group, District of Columbia National Guard. for the position of commanding general of the D. C. Guard when a new appointment is made.

Other business included instruction to Town Manager Charles T. MacDonald to draw an ordinance with respect to opening a taxi stand; a request to the Prince George's chapter of the American Red Cross to appoint a separate campaign captain from Greenbelt; approval of a Woman's Club request that live Christmas trees be planted for permanent civic use; and the reading of a letter announcing that April 17 to 23 is Religious Toleration Week in Maryland. Enroll Jr. March 16 For Kindergarten

Wednesday, March 16, is kindergarten enrollment day at both the Center and the North End schools. If your child will be five years of age on or before December 31, he or she is eligible to enter kindergarten in September.

It is very important that parents enroll their children on that day. in order that plans can be made for employing the required number of teachers and arranging for the proper class room space for all of the children who will enter kindergarten next fall.

The present kindergarten classes will be dismissed on that day so the teachers will be available to consult with the parents in filling out the questionnaire. The children whose last names begin with letters from A through K will be en-rolled in the morning from 9 a.m. to 12 noon. The children whose Z will be enrolled in the afternoon misplaced. from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Birth certificates should be brought along for verification, as cle. well as health records.

The public health clinic will be open that day for administration of booster immunization shots.

Cormack. A variety of problems are continually confronting the administration in the management of a project of the size of Greenbelt and the community manager stated that it is more efficient in the long run to get expert technical advice before beginning any program of repairs.

Among the problems to be tackled are those of drainage, particularly where it has caused soil erosion; and repair of roadways and parking areas.

GMHOC Gets Quorum; Rec's Meet Skins Patman Absent

Elected last night to the Greenbelt Mutual Home Ownership Cor-poration's board of directors were five incumbents and four new members. Reelected were Paul Borsky, Sherrod East, Benjamin Goldfaden, Wells Harrington and Max Salzman. Newcomers are Bruce Bowman, Henry Pearlman, Thomas B. Ritchie and James Walsh.

The bare quorum of 100 members who attended the meeting heard John Carson, Washington representative of the Cooperative League—USA compare mutual housing to the rural electrification programs. "REA housing," he said, could successfully fight the trend toward government ownership. "Without private owner-ship." he added, "we lose our inde-pendence." Carson spoke in the absence of Congressman Wright Patman (D., Tex.), whose scheduled appearance was cancelled because of an emergency committee meeting.

The Patman bill, which would establish a mutual housing department on a par with Public Housing Authority under Housing and Home Finance Agency, was discussed by Lawrence Westbrook. Westbrook, president of the Trans-American Development Corporation hired to represent GMHOC in attempting to buy Greenbelt, said he considered the small attendance a the meeting an expression of confidence in the board of directors and TADC, rather than complacency. Sherrod East, vice-president of the corporation, presided in the absence See GMHOC, Page 4

GHS To Field Football Team

The Board of Education of Prince Georges County announced last Friday a plan to inaugurate interscholastic football next year in six high schools: Greenbelt, Hyattsville, Bladensburg, Maryland Park. Mt. Rainier and Laurel. The program announced by the board is quite comprehensive. Money to set up the program, advanced by the board, is to be returned from the gate receipts from the games. All games will be played at the University of Maryland on Friday and Saturday nights. Each school will play five league games and one outside contest. The University has made Byrd Stadium available for eighteen nights.

The administration and financial control of football will be vested in a three-man committee appointed by the Board of Education. As far as the individual player is concerned, each boy will be insured against injury; each boy will be completely outfitted with two uniforms; and there will be a doctor at every

Teams will be permitted two weeks of spring practice. Fall practice will not start before the opening of school. No one not connected directly with the school will be permitted to assist in coaching. Schools cannot accept outsde financial aid.

Chorus Plans To Give "Bohemian Girl"

Balfe's opera, "Bohemian Girl," to be presented by the Greenbelt Community Chorus in May, will represent a complete change in the. type of music formerly sung by the group, according to its president, Fred W. Pfeiffer.

Now in rehearsal under the direction of Harlan Randall, the chorus at present has a membership of over fifty. Mr. Pfeiffer stressed the importance of members' attendance at rehearsals, and invited all Greenbelters interested in singing to join the chorus.



Community Church Plans Building

The congregation of Community Church is looking forward to the completed blueprints of its projected church, which should be ready about April 15. The firm of Ferrara and McLeod, architects, is now surveying the site recently bought from the Federal government at Crescent and Hillside, and contractors will be invited to bid as soon as the blueprints are ready. Bids will be opened on May 1, and work will begin as soon as possible thereafter.

The board of trustees of Community Church plans to have the ground-breaking ceremony on a Sunday afternoon, so that all Greenbelt can participate, "bringing their own shovels." Estimated time for completing the building varies, with one optimistic contractor saying that he could get it done by September 1.

Plans for the church building include. besides the 300-capacity chapel proper, a large social hall to seat about 250 people for lectures, suppers, or Sunday school. This basement hall will have a dividing, portable partition, as well as a kitchen, store rooms, and a small workshop connected with the heating plant. A church parlor designed to seat about 60 people will have a good-sized fireplace for social and

club activities. The sanctuary will have a center aisle, divided chancel with pulpit, lectern and altar, with the choir seated facing the organ console. A plain balcony over the vestibule will accommodate an additional 50 persons. The church plans to have two morning services and an additional evening service as soon as the building is completed.

Anyone Singing Lunch Pail Blues?

Lady, are your children singing those "Lunch Pail Blues"? Or is your husband guilty of "overlooking" an occasional sandwich? Remember, sandwiches are the mainstays of lunches carried to work or to school, and they should be attractive and varied as well as nourishing if the lunchbox meal is to be eaten with relish.

Home economists of the University of Maryland Extension Service offer some tips guaranteed to empty that lunch pail to the last crumb. Begin by using mediumthin, day-old bread, because it is firm enough to spread easily and hold the filling, yet not hard and dry as older bread may be. Personal taste may decide the question of trimming off crusts, but it does take extra time, is wasteful unless the crusts are saved for other uses, and causes sandwiches to dry out

Soften the Butter

For smooth spreading and untorn bread, soften the butter at room temperature or "cream" with a fork, but don't melt it, since this makes the fat soak into the bread. Work in a bit of seasoning-a pinch of mustard, or chipped parsley, or onion juice, depending on the filling to be used. Of course, spreads such as peanut butter and soft cheese may go directly on the bread, but whatever your choice, apply it lightly and evenly to the very edge of each slice.

Do you know sandwich filling mixtures are so numerous that a different one may be used every day in the year? Different breads also may be used for variety or half-and-half sandwiches made with one slice of rye and one of white bread. Rolls, biscuits and buns may vary the lunchbox too. In making bun sandwiches, slice the bun only three-fourth through to secure the filling for easy eating.

Avoid Overloading Beware the sandwich that is drippy or sticky. Avoid overloading the bread with filling or using wilteasy lettuce or juicy tomatoes. Instead, carefully wrap a wedge of cold lettuce, a quartered tomato and crisp carrot and celery strips separately in waxed paper for an easy-to-eat "finger salad."

Sandwiches made up the night before should be kept cold overnight to prevent staling, so wrap each one separately in waxed paper
