

## Councilmen Go on Record Favoring GVHC, Despite Some Reservations

"How do you feel about the sale of Greenbelt?" This question was put to the city council by W. Earl Thomas, member of the board of directors of the Greenbelt Veterans Housing Corporation, at last Monday's council meeting. Thomas, appearing as a resident and not a GVHC board member, wanted the council's viewpoint in addition to the "over 100 residents" he had interviewed during the week.

### Councilmen View Housing

Mayor Frank Lastner is "sold on the idea that PHA will sell. If we don't buy, Greenbelt will be sold to a private concern." Councilman Ben Goldfaden: "The figures are too high. Most residents are scared of buying at those monthly charges." Councilman Thomas Canning reiterated the statements of the council at Congressional hearings on the disposition of the city: "While we do not favor the sale of Greenbelt, we favor purchase by the residents if Greenbelt must be sold." Councilman James Wolfe agreed with Canning.

Councilman Steve Comings had two viewpoints — personal and council. He declared he owed allegiance to the majority of the citizens who he feels do not want to buy under existing payments, policies, and lack of harmony. He felt the present solution would not make for a happy place to live, and cited the boisterous membership meeting a few weeks ago. Personally, he felt the payments were reasonable, but were proof the residents are "subsidized" by the government. A meeting with the GVHC board was arranged for the discussion of water and electricity supply, possession of the driveways in courts, and the problem of future development.

### Swimming Pool Rate

Admission rates for the swimming pool were established for the summer season. Adult rates were raised to 45 cents. A new age bracket, 16 to 20 inclusive, will pay 25 cents; 12-15 inclusive, 15 cents; and 6-11 inclusive, 10 cents. Taxes on admissions were cancelled by the federal government this year, and all the revenue will go into the city treasury. Swimming class rates will remain the same.

An ordinance to prohibit passing a school bus when loading or unloading passengers was passed by the council, after discovery was made that the state law exempts such a violation in cities over 5,000 population. The peculiarity in the state law came as a "revelation" to the mayor, and he hoped other Maryland municipalities would take notice.

A first reading of a resolution to relinquish the Western Union service supplied by the police department was passed.

### Lake Police

City Manager Charles MacDonald requested consideration of placing a uniformed policeman at the lake area to prevent the littering, vandalism, and impropriety of guests at the lake. The cost was put at \$1000, including the uniform. Several council members expressed disappointment at the shocking condition of the lake area, and urged a plain-clothesman be used to apprehend violators.

Comings disapproved of the plan. He urged the police to enforce existing ordinances and offered the scarcity of arrests on littering violations as examples of poor enforcement. When the police make some arrests and still fail to clean up the lake problem, then come around, he declared. Any expenditures for lake area enforcement should come from present funds in the department of public safety, Comings added.

"Scotchlite," a luminous material, will be applied to the 862 bicycles in Greenbelt by the police department, in cooperation with the North End PTA, after an appropriation of \$76 for the tape was approved by the council. The tape will provide a safety measure for bike-riders after dark, as the material has high visibility. Application of the Scotchlite is free. The meeting was attended by several members of the North End PTA.

**Public Health:** Health Nurse, Mrs. Frances Stouffer, has returned to duty after a weeks vacation in the hills of North Carolina. The Tuesday clinic was well attended. A number of cases of three-day measles has been reported during the week.

**Public Library:** The library will be closed Friday, which is observed as a municipal holiday. A nice display of Easter reading is on the tables this week.

**Finance:** The annual audit for the year 1951 was completed last week by a firm of certified public accountants from Baltimore.

**Public Works:** The tree-planting project along Southway has been made possible by an assist from the Maryland State Department of Forestry. It is hoped that additional planting, especially in the North End, will be possible in the near future, now that the streets have been dedicated to the city.

**Recreation:** The athletic fields were swarming with tryouts for the several Boys Club and Little League teams over the weekend. The condition of the fields has not permitted the Public Works men to prepare them for use this spring because of the frequent rains.

**Bus Operation:** Special trips to the American Legion and St. Hugh's socials on Tuesdays and Fridays have been discontinued because of the lack of customers. During the Easter holidays, neither the School Special nor the Shoppers' Special buses will operate.



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## Residents Must Buy Present Dwellings

 Reversing the policy announced at the April 2 membership meeting, the board of directors of Greenbelt Veterans' Housing Corporation voted Monday night to require participating members to make down-payments and pay carrying charges on the houses they occupy at the time they sign the perpetual use contract. Members may state their preference for another unit following the signing of the contract.

The decision was reached after a lengthy discussion of the difficulties foreseen if a member paid rent or charges on the house he lives in and made the down-payment on the house of his choice while waiting for the tenant of the selected unit to vacate.

### Meet April 14

Next membership meeting will be held on Monday, April 14, at 8:15 p.m. in the Center school auditorium. Consideration of by-laws and announcement of the membership drive plans are on the agenda for the meeting.

It is expected that the decision made at the April 2 membership meeting to require that all 800 participants be Greenbelt residents will be challenged, and another vote may be taken on this matter.

The Board was reminded by President Mike Szalman that 400 of the 800 participating members required by Public Housing Administration by April 30, 1952, must be veterans.

### Council Backing 100%

Earl Thomas reported that the City Council had expressed 100% support of the mutual housing plan for Greenbelt and had asked for a meeting with the housing board. The only reservation expressed by Council members, Thomas said, concerned the "high carrying charges." Board member Adelbert C. Long asked if Thomas had asked the Council if they had considered reducing the taxes.

Szalman was questioned about his progress in renegotiating the sales price, in accordance with the directive of the April 2 membership meeting. He replied that GVHC could not renegotiate effectively until a group of members had made their \$100 deposits.

Other subjects discussed by the Board on which decisions were not reached included zoning problems, the undeveloped land, and commercial properties.

### Leslie Atkins

Leslie Atkins, former Greenbelt resident, died last Monday at his home in Bladensburg, Maryland. He is survived by his wife, Edith, and two children, Ann, 16, and Pierce, 13.

Mr. Atkins will be remembered by Greenbelters for his participation in community affairs during the early years of Greenbelt. He moved to Bladensburg in 1943.

A talented musician, he was active in organizing the Greenbelt band and secured the first instruments used by the band. His service on the board of directors of the Greenbelt Health Association led to an interest in the distribution of medical supplies. His positions with UNRRA and the World Health Organization were in this field.

The Greenbelt Theater will be closed on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays beginning soon as a result of action taken Tuesday night by the board of directors of Greenbelt Consumer Services. Jack Fruchtman, theater manager, proposed the curtailment of operations and concentration on weekend showing as a means of keeping the enterprise financially sound, since midweek attendance has been light with the advent of television.

The public had been invited to attend the meeting and express opinions on means of solving the theater problem. Seven non-board members were present but no opinion contrary to Fruchtman's suggestion was expressed. It was explained that the theater would be available for civic and voluntary affairs and entertainments on the off days. Announcement will be made in the Cooperator of the date when the new policy will go into effect.

The educational and promotional budget amounting to some \$13,000 was discussed but not adopted, pending further study. It was decided to include "partial members" (people who have accumulated partial credit toward a share of stock by leaving their patronage refunds on deposit with the corporation) on the mailing list.

Ben Rosenzweig reported on plans for the Cooperative Institute to be held at Amherst, Mass., July 20-26, and management was requested to find out how many employees and members would like to attend.

## Anna G. Volckhausen

One of Greenbelt's original residents, Miss Anna Volckhausen, died March 28 at Gallinger Hospital. She moved into Greenbelt in October 1937 with her sister-in-law and nephew Bob.

Miss Volckhausen was born in New York City in 1869. A graduate of Hunter College, she taught for a time in New York City schools.

After the death of her parents she made her home with her brother and his family, and helped to bring up his two sons, Bob and Louis.

She was a charter member of the Greenbelt Community Church, Greenbelt Consumer Services, and the Greenbelt Health Association. Funeral services held at Community Church April first were the first to take place in the new church. Interment was at St. John's Church, Beltsville. Pallbearers were Hans Jorgensen, Frank Harper, Frank Galvin, Ben Perelzweig, Henry Walter and George Reeves.
