## Architect Smolen Hired to Design **Retirement Housing on GHI Site**

The first step in initiating a program of housing for the elderly was taken last Thursday, September 22, when Greenbelt Homes, Inc. board of directors hired architect Victor Smolen to prepare preliminary sketches and work plans. The contract, which is subject to approval by GHI general counsel, commits GHI to an expenditure of \$500. Further payments to the architect will be dependent on whether the project is approved by GHI members at a special membership meeting and by the Federal Housing Administration.

The proposed site of the 56-unit project is the area behind 30-34 Ridge and 4-5 Gardenway. Objection to this site was voiced by director Allan Morrison who stated that it was not conveniently located to stores, post office, recreation facilities, churches, and transportation. He favored the site along Crescent between Parkway and the new fire house.

Morrison also objected to the proposed one-story type buildings with individual housekeeping apart. ments. He argued that 65 percent of aged are single persons who are more in need of housing which combines rooms with lodging. He visualized a multiple-story building with self-operating elevators, glassed-in porches, dining room and cafeteria services, and recreation and health facilities.

Bruce Bowman, acting president, stated that adoption of the onestory type construction in the Ridge Gardenway area will not preclude development of multiple-story construction in another area if needed. As it stands, he said, the Ridge-Cardenway area does not lend itself to high-level construction. As for nearness to community facilities, GHI manager Paul Campbell stated that FHA will inspect the site to determine this.

The contract with Smolen calls for an architect's fee of 21/2% of costs of development and construction plus builder's fee. Payments will be made in 4 stages: (1) \$500 when preliminary sketches, workplans, and cost estimates are submitted to FHA and to the GHI membership: (2) \$3,500 or 50% of total fee, whichever is higher, when precommitment submittals are made; (3) 75% when FHA initial closing takes place; and (4) 15% during construction, with 10% held back until job is finished.

GHI will be reimbursed for the architect's fee if FHA approval is forthcoming and if the project is completed. If the project is terminated at the end of any stage, GHI will be obligated to pay the architect's fee only through the stage completed.


