### Police News Review

Two runaway teenage girls, one a resident of Greenbelt, one a resident of Langley Park, were found in N.W. Washington on Sunday night by Officer Joseph O'Loughlin and a father of one of the girls. A tip from a former neighbor led the searchers to the northwest area and the girls were spotted in a pawn shop as the men drove by. It was disclosed that the girls had planned to leave for N. Y. the following morning.

Pre-Halloween pranksters have already caused complaints to the police department when a car on Plateau was soaped up. Two B-B guns were confiscated from children on Laurel Hill. They were caught shooting in the woods from the playground at the end of Laurel Hill.

Last week, a complainant called police stating that his car had been forced off the road. Police investigated and found a drunken man in a car. He was not seen driving but was taken to Hyattsville and charged with being drunk. The following night, another man was picked up sitting in his car, also drunk. He too, was charged.

A woman pedestrian, walking to get her ride to work on Tuesday morning, was struck by a car heading east on Ridge Rd. The pedestrian was walking with traffic and was apparently a few feet out on the road. The motorist claimed to be riding into the sun and could not see the woman. The pedestrian was taken to the hospital where no major injuries were diagnosed.

Callers are requested to ask whether or not to keep their telephone lines open in order to supplement their initial information to help the investigating officers in locating the suspects.

### Lakewood Organizes Citizens Association

# City to Borrow \$200,000 from Bank To Complete Municipal Buildings

The city will borrow \$200,000 from the Suburban Trust Company for a period of 15 years at three and one-quarter percent interest payable semi-annually, it was indicated by the city council when it approved an ordinance for first reading last Monday night. The purpose of the loan is to complete the building program embarked on last year and nearly two-thirds complete with the imminent dedication of the new fire department building and the youth center. A third building, the city administration offices is still in the planning stage. The major portion of funds for the first two buildings came from the sale of the Center elementary school to the county.

# City Planning Board

Appointed by Council
Appointments to the seven-man city planning commission were completed by the city council at a special meeting that lasted until 1:30, Wednesday morning. The new commission will make the first organized attempt to plan and guide the future growth and development of the Greenbelt community.

In order to stagger the terms of office, three men were appointed for three year terms, two for twoyear terms, and two for one-year terms. Serving for three years on the commission are John F. Downs of 3-H Crescent, Harvey Geller of 117 Northway, and Clayton Werner of 4-Y Laurel Hill. Two-year terms went to Elliott Bukzin of 6-N Ridge and Eli Crupain of 6-K Ridge. Appointed for one year terms were Clifford Simonson of 8-C Ridge and Lewis Bernstein of 123 Northway. The planning commission will meet in the near future to elect its chair-

### Anti-Loitering Law Dissatisfies Council

The city council voted unanimously against an anti-loitering ordinance last Monday night. Dissatisfaction with the working of the ordinance and its failure to carry out the intent of the council was indicated as the reason for its failure to pass.

One councilman stated: "We are trying to pass a curfew law without calling it a curfew law." The ordinance called for a warning first, and then arrest, of anyone loitering in the Center area after 10 p.m. It was felt loitering was ill-defined, and mannerly citizens resting in the evening would be imposed upon by the ordinance.

The new city solicitor, Jerrold Powers, will assist in drafting a new ordinance using as a guide the antiloitering ordinance of the District of Columbia and Fairfax county.

A Gala Costume Parade will be held at 6 p.m. The parade will start at the statue and proceed in and around the Center. Prizes will be awarded for the prettiest, funniest, and most original costume in the following age groups: 0-4, 5-7, 8-12.

### RUMMAGE SALE

'The Women's Group of the Jewish Community Center of Prince Georges County will be holding a Rummage Sale on Friday, Oct. 28 in front of the Greenbelt Theatre between the hours of 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. Clothes for all seasons will be on sale.

Citizen approval of the longterm loan was indicated through a referendum last September, which permitted either a municipal bond issue or long term bank loans. The latter method was chosen by the council as the most economical after an investigation of the bond market. The loan will be repaid in yearly instalments of \$13,333.

To qualify for the loan the city manager, Charles McDonald, was authorized to prepare a certified statement showing the assessed value of real property owned by, the city, the city charter reference to Statuatory Debt limits, a legal opinion from the city solicitor as to the issuance of certificates of indebtedness, and a certificate of "no-litigation" at present in which the city is involved. The ordinance also forbids the use of the money for other than expenditures in connection with the construction service equipment and site improvements of the new municipal building, fire department and youth center building.

Final passage and discussion of the ordinance will take place at the next regular meeting of the city council November 7.

The option was granted following disclosure last month that many Lakewood home owners were surprised by a sudden boost in their monthly payments due to the failure to include back taxes and present taxes in their monthly charges.

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




