New Co-op Store Plans Reopening Celebration for this Saturday

The Greenbelt Consumer Co-operative, Inc. (GCC), commonly known as Greenbelt Co-op Supermarket, will be celebrating its reopening Saturday, June 30. GCC took over the store on June 10.

The Reopening Celebration will begin at 10 a.m. and programs will repeat at 3 p.m.; however, interested consumers are encouraged to drop in anytime.

Everyone is invited including current and prospective members of the Co-op. Mayor Gil Weidenfeld, city and county council members, leaders of civic organizations, and pioneers of the original Coop, founded in 1937, are expected to attend. Local newspapers, including the Washington Post, and television stations have also been invited.

The central activity of the celebration will be an introduction of Store Manager Bob Davis to the consumers, followed by a store tour with introductions of the assistant managers and department heads. Consumers will be able to express their concerns and ask questions of the new management.

"We want to give members a chance to meet the manager, assistant manager, Dave Brinks, and department heads," said Jim Cassels, current chairman of the voluntary board of directors. The management also hopes to discover what consumers want from the new Co-op. Davis, who has been with the Greenbelt store only four weeks, said "The questions consumers ask will be informative to me. I want to know what people are interested in, what kind of store they want to have."

Other activities planned for the celebration include a free raffle drawing for a 19-inch color television, a demonstration by Pepsi, and other presentations. Tastetests of the Red & White brand labels, currently replacing the Co-op brand label, will be provided by the distributors.

Although the Co-op Supermarket is reopening under new management and policies, few changes have occurred. "The only obvious change is in the personnel," Cassels said. However, Davis, former manager of the Severna Park Co-op added, "There are five or six employees who worked under the former management. We did not fire a single person—we gave all employees the opportunity to

stay. However, most took jobs elsewhere or at other GCI stores, such as in Kensington or Severna Park."

There are few physical changes, although Davis notes a cleaner and more organized store than before the transfer of ownership. "What happened is that the store has been going out of business for six months now. The employees went elsewhere. There were no long-range plans, and no incentive to keep the store (up)," Davis said. He added that this is a process common to stores suffering divestiture dilemmas. "In a short period of time, we hope to be cleaner, better merchandised and better stocked."

Cassels commented that the store will go with the same suppliers until "we find ways to improve things to accomplish as much as we can in as short a time as possible." He added, "First, we need to get on a firm financial basis."

However, consumers will note the absence of the Co-op brand label since it is not currently available from wholesalers. Instead, the Red & White label will be offered, according to Davis.

Cassels foresees other improvements in the store, such as buying a new computer which would keep pharmacy and membership records, but which also must be compatible with the cash registers. GCI's lease of the old GCI computer will expire September 1, 1984. A committee of volunteers is currently researching the purchase, which could run from \$5,000 to \$10,000. Cassels' other ideas include putting a photocopying machine and an automatic coffee dispenser in the store for consumers' use.

Consumer Input Sought

The major focus of the store, however, will be increased consumer input. "We want (consumers) to tell us the pros and cons on how they see us. We welcome comments, good and bad," Mike Burchick, another member of the board, said. Management agrees with the board's emphasis. "We are more receptive than most retail enterprises. We want to know what they want," said Davis. "We'll put in products they want to see and remove those that are not worthwhile."

Davis cautions that the store must support itself, however. "Break even is what we have in mind," he said. "Our long-term

goal is to pay patronage refunds."

"In a sense, we are back to the 1940's, where the members are in control," commented Burchick. "The people own and control the store, so they should feel a part of it."

How can consumers become more involved? The information/membership table located in the front of the store will remain. It currently is being used as a distribution point for new membership cards, including for members transferring from GCI to GCC. (The new cards will not be mailed, warns Burchick.)

Burchick emphasizes the need for consumer education. A shopper's guide will be published to help consumers make price comparisons. Davis believes a highly visible suggestion box will also promote input by consumers. He also hopes consumers will speak directly to the store staff about suggestions and complaints. "Any time I'm here, I'm available and so is the rest of my staff."

Members are also encouraged to attend the weekly Board of Directors meetings held Fridays at 8 p.m. in the Greenbelt Homes Office. The current board is composed of seven volunteers. In October, after GCC's first fiscal quarter, elections will be held for a new board; each Co-op full member (at least \$100 invested) will be entitled to one vote.

The relationship between the current board of directors and the paid management is reported as good by both sides. Both plan to see a rise in sales, despite a recent drop.

"We have a long way to go," Burchick said, "but we hope people give us a chance to build ourselves up to be a competitive store in the area."

"If there were negative vibrations the last several months—a certain sadness amongst the employees the administration and the managers—it was recognized by the shoppers," Davis explained. "We want to emphasize an openness, a service to the community," the aim the residents held when they purchased GCC, Davis said. "We offer a good alternative. We are optimistic. There will be no bad news coming from 121 Centerway."

Celebrate With Fireworks, Concert at Attick Park

Two of Greenbelt's favorite traditions, the annual concert of the Greenbelt Concert Band of Prince George's County and the spectacular 4th of July fireworks display, await Greenbelters at the "Buddy" Attick Park on Independence Day. The concert will begin at 7 p.m. and the band, conducted by John Del Homme will perform marches and pieces including "America", with Nancy McGuire as soloist, "Over There Fantasy" and ending with "1812 Overture".

At dusk the fireworks will begin. Fireworks were purchased from Columbus Fireworks of Ohio, the same as last year. The show will consist of a total of 472 shells and eight ground displays, including the American Flag, Niagara Falls and Two Tanks in Battle. City public works staff will set the fireworks off. In case of rain, the fireworks will be postponed until the next non-rainy evening.

A six-team softball tournament is scheduled Saturday, June 30 and Sunday, July 1, at Braden Field at 9 a.m.

Beginning July 4, the Green-

belt Municipal Swimming Pool will be opened to the public from 10 a.m. until 8 p.m. The Youth Center will operate with reduced hours. It will be open from noon to 6 p.m.

Anyone who can is advised to walk to the lake. Alcohol is prohibited. It is also advised that animals be left at home because of the large number of people expected and the loud noises caused by the fireworks. If brought, animals must be leashed. Private fireworks, firerackers and sparklers are prohibited. They are not only illegal in Maryland but can be very dangerous in large crowds.

GHI Moves Forward With Plans For Cooperative Mortgage Co.

The selection of GHI representatives to the new cooperative mortgage company, a review of parts X and XI of the Rules and Regulations, and various issues involving the boiler rooms were discussed at the Greenbelt Homes Inc. Board of Directors meeting on June 14.

Cooperative Mortgage Services, Inc. (CMS)

The new cooperative mortgage company, Cooperative Mortgage Services, Inc., (CMS) authorized by GHI membership at the last annual meeting and formed in cooperation with the National Consumer Cooperative Bank, is being established. GHI and NCCB have begun the process of negotiating the mortgage product to be offered as well as developing the bylaws

The formation of CMS is slated for July 2; with the bylaws ready for review by the GHI Board on June 28. The next step is the appointment of members to the CMS Board. NCCB has indicated that it will appoint three bank staff members to the Board of Directors. The first board is considered an interim board and primarily operational during the first, formative year of the cooperative. The board, management and GHI members present then entered into a lengthy discussion of the functions, skills, and background necessary or desirable for the two CMS members to be appointed by GHI. Managment outlined alternatives-both seats occupied by GHI staff; one by staff, one by board; both by GHI board or other members; or other various combinations. Management recommended that both sets be filled by GHI staff at the present time. General Manager Shakar Narasimhan felt that there were several advantages to this approach—knowledgeable people would be dealing with the specialized work required in the first year of operations and that it was important to have procedure matters handled in an efficient, timely manner. Finally he mentioned that policy issues will most likely not arise until See GHI, page 4, col. 1

'PRECIOUS METAL' 'SATYR' ROCK-N-ROLL AT UTOPIA

"Precious Metal," a five-member group, promises a "crash course in Rock-n-Roll" at its concert Saturday night, June 30, at the Utopia Theater, beginning at 8 p.m.

The D.C.-based band includes lead vocalist Dennis Clark (formerly with New York Dolls), lead guitarist Dave Celantano, and three musicians formerly with Rampant—Michael Glazer on bass, Pete Stefanelli on rhythym guitar, and drummer Mark Phaux.

Much of it original, their style is mainstream commercial rock. The two-hours-plus show will be opened by special guest group "Satyr," a 5-man band based in College Park. Doors open at 7:15

METRO RAISES FARES

A tapered Metrorail rushhour fare package with a \$2.40 limit was approved by the Board of the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority. The new fares go into effect June 30.

The package raises the peak Metrorail boarding charge by a nickel to 80 cents for the first

three miles and raises the mileage charge by a penny to 15.5 cents per mile for three to six miles, and lowers the charge by 1.5 cents to 13 cents per mile after six miles. The maximum fare a patron will be charged is \$2.40.

For example, a trip from New Carrollton to Eisenhower Avenue will drop from \$2.75 to \$2.40.

However, a trip from New Carrollton to Metro Center will increase from \$1.80 to \$1.85.

The off-peak fare structure introduces for the first time a distance based fare in which rail trips of 7 miles or less will cost 80 cents; rides between 7 and 9 miles will cost \$1.00 and trips over 9 miles, \$1.10. Current fares are 75 cents for all off-peak trips within the system regardless of length. The maximum fare increase for off-peak riders will be 35 cents.

Bus fares were approved with minor exceptions as proposed in the public hearing docket: the base fare in all jurisdictions rises from 75 to 80 cents.

Fares for the elderly and handicapped in the District will be 25 cents, and in Maryland Bloodmobile in City July 4



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

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

later when board or other GHI members will have been appointed to the CMS board.

Virtually everyone was in agreement that the general ma-nager occupy one of the board seats. Don Volk wanted the other seat to be occupied by someone from the board or membership. Several others supported this view. There were some doubts expressed that GHI would be able to find a volunteer to serve by the appointment date. Several members urged GHI to canvass the membership. Joe Jenkins, arguing for membership appointees to the board, stressed the need for a "thread to the community" which GHI staff does not possess. The final motion, passed unanimously provided for Narasimhan to serve on the CMS board and for the second board member to be selected from the membership, if possible, by June 28. If no candidate from the membership is identified the appointment of a GHI staff member to the second board seat will be made. All were in agreement that GHI needed to have both representatives on the Board when the mortgage company officially begins work.

Rules and Regulations

Two more parts of the rules and regulations received Board review. The sections covering additions and painting were assembled and brought together for Board review in light of current needs. There was little new in the discussion with minor points being raised and decided upon. At the next meeting, the board will approve the final set of these regulations. This is part of an on-going process to update GHI regulations prior to distributing a comprehensive set to all mem-

The meeting had begun an hour earlier at the free-standing boiler plant on Research Road. This plant has undergone considerable work to make it a usable shell structure, as part of a pilot project authorised in the 1984 budget. So far, \$12,000 has been spent for trusses, removal of chimney, plywood and shingles for the roof and labor. Further expenditures depend upon a decision for final use. The next steps the Board decided, were to check with neighbors on their preferences or ideas for its use,

to check on zoning requirements and to make limited contact with a group identified by the general manager as having experience in this type of renovation. The limited solicitation of outside interest was in response to Board Member Ray McCawley's urging that the availability of the structure be advertised widely. He felt that a creative use might be identified this way and that no risk was involved since the board would have the final say. The Board then authorized the sale of three adjacent frame boiler rooms. Two of these sold for \$1,000; the third, in need of more repair, for \$750. The Board rejected a \$400 offer for a fourth boiler room and requested management to offer the boiler room at the going rate of \$1,000. The board adjourned to executive session.

NOTICE OF CHARTER AMENDMENT

(ANNEXATION)

At its regular meeting, held on May 14, 1984, the City Council of Greenbelt, Maryland, adopted Charter Amendment Resolution Number 1984-1 (Resolution No. 564), and the following title of

the Resolution is a fair summary of the amendment: Resolution of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, enlarging the corporate boundaries of the City of Greenbelt under the provisions of Article 23A, Section 19(b)(2) of the Annotated Code of the State of Maryland, by annexing certain lands and property bounded on all sides by real property presently within the corporate limits of the City of Greenbelt, such lands commonly known as the properties of Elinor M. Seger and the Holy Cross Lutheran Church, and as more fully described in plat of annexation prepared by John D. Emler & Associates, P.A., dated March 1984, all lo-cated adjacent to the intersection of the Baltimore-Washington Parkway and Capital Beltway (Interstate 95), near Greenbelt Road (Route Md. 193); and further providing for the special treatment of taxable real property by the City in the area annexed from the effective date of annexation until such time as said property is rezoned, or its ownership or its character or its usage changes from that in effect at the time of this annexation, whichever change shall occur first.

On May 14, 1984 a public hearing was held by the City Council of Greenbelt on the above resolution, and the hearing was adverised and held in all due form according to the laws of the State of Maryland. The enclave is being annexed under the provisions of Section 19(b)(2) of Article 23A of the Annotated Code of Maryland, which provides that a resolution of annexation under this paragraph is not subject to the referendum provisions of subsection (f) pertaining to petition for referendum by residents of area to be annexed. Charter Amendment Resolution No. 1984-1 shall become effective 45 days after passage, which shall be the 28th day of June, 1984.




