Greenbelt's Census Figures Show Shifts in Ethnicity

The first Census 2000 data for Greenbelt have arrived. The news is that there are now 21,456 people living in Greenbelt. However, over 21,000 people were living in Greenbelt in 1990 -21,096 to be exact. Thus there has been only a very small increase in the city's population -1.7 percent over the decade. Of the 15 largest incorporated places in Maryland, Greenbelt was near the bottom with regard to growth.

Two places, Baltimore City and Cumberland had decreases in population. Following them is Greenbelt. The population of Bowie, Greenbelt's sister city in Greenbelt's congressional district, now tops 50,000, an increase of 34 percent since 1990.

By law, the Census Bureau is required to provide certain statistics on each state by April of the year following the Census for

Congressional redistricting purposes. Thus the data now available are limited to summary figures and race and ethnicity data.

In the last decade, the racial composition of the city has shifted dramatically. The black population now represents the largest racial group in the city, with 41 percent. Whites follow closely with 40 percent of the population. These figures represent large shifts from 1990, when blacks represented 19 percent and whites 70 percent. In addition, the Asian population has increased from 9 to 12 percent of the residents.

For the first time, Americans could select more than one race in the 2000 Census. In Greenbelt, 3.5 percent classified themselves as belonging to two or more races. Hispanic ethnicity is a question separate

Mayor to Appoint City Clown Laureate

On Sunday, April 1, Greenbelt Mayor Judith "J" Davis will inaugurate her latest political appointee to the Greenbelt team. It won't be to an advisory board or the election board. Instead, Davis will name the city's first (and only) Clown Laureate.

That's right. Clown Laureate. The first official Clown Laureate of Greenbelt is Adam Gertsacov, a 36-year-old professional clown originally from Providence, RI. Gertsacov is a graduate of the Ringling Brothers Clown College and the Dell'Arte School of Physical Theatre: among other places. He has also worked around the world with distinguished clown luminaries such as Nobel Laureate Dario Fo, MacArthur Fellow Bill Irwin, and Avner the Eccentric.

As the official Clown Laureate, Gertsacov will preside over and initiate a wide variety of clownrelated activities at the Greenbelt Arts Center as part of a six-week residency called Acme Clown Month. "It's a new and improved month," says Gertsacov. "It's got 50% more weeks!"

Activities scheduled to take place during Acme Clown Month include classes and workshops for adults and children, performances, a world premiere puppet show, an art exhibit, talks, films, and other activities. Most of the activities will take place at the Arts Center.

"To the best of our knowledge, this is the first and only Clown Laureate program in the United States," says Kim Kash, producer of the event for the Arts Center. "We've gotten great response from the city, from our board,

Registration for GED To Be Held April 17

The registration for Greenbelt CARES 10-week GED Course will be held only on Tuesday, April 17 from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The first class will be held on Thursday, April 19. Classes will be held every Tuesday and Thursday through June 21 at the Greenbelt Municipal Building, 25 Crescent Road.

GED I is held from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. GED I covers basic math and English grammar skills. GED II is held from 1 to 3 p.m. and is suitable for students who have successfully completed GED I and/or are ready to learn algebra and geometry, English literature and writing skills, and prepare to take the GED test.

There is no charge for Greenbelt residents in either course but they must present proof of residency (i.e., current lease, phone or electric bill, driver's license or Motor Vehicle I. D. card). There is a fee for non-Greenbelt residents. All students must purchase a textbook. Students do not have to be 16 years of age and may take a GED pre-test given at Greenbelt CARES, at no cost. The actual GED test is given by the State of Maryland, not Greenbelt CARES. However, students who are ready to take the test can obtain the application forms from Greenbelt CARES.

from race; Hispanics can be of any race. Here 6.4 percent classified themselves as Hispanic, up from 3.8 a decade ago.

City Manager Michael McLaughlin indicated that he is "not surprised" by the changing composition of the city. "The same changes in Prince George's County obviously will happen in Greenbelt." He indicated however that there is some question if the Greenbelt figures are correct. In the 1990 Census, certain areas such as Greenway Village were counted as Greenbelt, even though they are outside the city limits. It took time for the Greenbelt figures to be corrected. The city will be contacting the Census Bureau to make sure that the correct areas were included.

McLaughlin also stated that the city was not taken by surprise at the lack of growth. Greenbelt's planning figures have been reflecting a growth in housing units over the decade but smaller household sizes. These projections were based on ongoing data from Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission and other sources.

When asked how Bowie's growth could affect Greenbelt, McLaughlin indicated that the new figures would be used to redistribute countywide elected offices. This includes what size each legislative district will be. The redistricting could affect county council seats as well as state senate and delegate offices. Currently Bowie and Greenbelt are in the same districts for these offices. A group will start looking into redistricting issues this summer.

We moved back to Greenbelt in the late 1990s from Delaware. We renewed a more active friendship with Maryliss and John which was always warm and supportive. We were always amazed at how they were able to handle John's dialysis treatments at

When we visited Maryliss and John they never wanted us to leave. John, you have not left us. you will always be in our hearts. Our thoughts and prayers are with Lenah and all the grandchildren.
